## 3. Comprehensive Surface Water Management Plan Presentation

Public Works and Consultants from SEH will be at the meeting to review with you the City Comprehensive Surface Water Management Plan. In your packet is a brief background. There will be a 15 minute Power Point presentation and then open up for discussion. **Requested Commission Action:** Hear presentation and then discussion.

## 4. Community Engagement Task Force Report

Greg Simbeck and Randall Doneen serve on the Human Rights Commission Community Engagement Task Force as representatives of the Parks and Recreation Commission. Simbeck and Doneen will be prepared to report on the latest progress on this effort. **Requested Action**: Commission discussion and feedback.

## 5. Park and Recreation Renewal Program

On Monday, April 23<sup>rd</sup> the Court of Appeals ruled in favor of the City. A 30 day period is allowed for an appeal to the Minnesota Supreme Court. If this occurs, then the Supreme Court can either accept or reject the case. If an appeal happens within the 30 day time frame, it is anticipated that it could take around 30 days for the Supreme Court to decide whether they will hear the case. If an appeal does not happen, the program will continue.

When projects can begin is still undetermined. Funds will be released when the legal challenge is resolved. It was anticipated that the entire PRRP would use the Best Value Procurement method with the first step of hiring a lead consultant to assist with plan timing, neighborhood meetings and initial design work. This is extremely important at least for the larger construction projects such as the buildings and shelters. As time moves on, we are nearing a concern stage for being able to construct this season. However, there are some projects that are more straight forward than others such as the playground replacements. Enclosed is a copy of the 4 year renewal program to refer to as we discuss potential timing and scenarios of projects.

No future meetings have been scheduled.

Requested Action: Hear update, discuss 2012 projects.

## 1. INTRODUCTIONS/ROLL CALL/PUBLIC COMMENT

None

## 2. APPROVAL OF MINUTES - MARCH 6, 2012 MEETING

Minutes of the March 6, 2012 meeting were approved unanimously. Chair Etten thanked former Commissioner Gale Pederson for her work.

#### 3. INTRODUCTION AND OATH OF OFFICE FOR NEW COMMISSIONER

Nolan Wall took the Oath of Office from Commission Chair Etten. After the swearing in ceremony, Wall and other Commissioners shared a brief background of themselves.

#### 4. COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT TASK FORCE REPORT

Etten introduced the topic and explained that Commissioner Simbeck and Doneen serve on the Human Rights Commission Community Engagement Task Force.

Doneen updated the Commission on their current work indicating that the task force is charged with developing recommendations for civic engagement. Overall the city does a good job in this area and the task force is searching for room for improvement. They are discussing areas such as neighborhood notifications, neighborhood identity development and enhanced internet activities. A draft recommendation has been discussed with the City Manager and City Planning Staff with a preliminary report expected to be provided to the City Council soon. For various reasons, the task force is a bit behind the early 2012 deadline.

#### 5. PARK & RECREATION RENEWAL PROGRAM DISCUSSION

Chair Etten introduced the topic. No new information is available on the litigation status. The City is waiting for the decision of the appellate court. Etten commented on the good weather this spring that would be ideal in accomplishing many of the renewal projects but emphasized to the commission and to the community that work cannot begin until the litigation is cleared up.

Staff communicated to the Commission that most of the preparation work that can be done has been done without incurring substantial costs.

Staff and the City Attorney have been working through the Arizona State Agreement on the Best Value Procurement but the contracts have not yet been executed. Timing of execution is very important due to the need of having ASU on board for the duration of the four year program. Concerns were expressed about missing the reasonable construction season for projects.

Leveraging resources to compliment the Park and Recreation Renewal Program has been successful so far including partnerships with FORParks, FORHANC, Roseville Rotary and the award of a natural resource grant for tree planting.

A meeting with FORParks and FORHANC was held to discuss the Nature Center improvements and explain the status of the renewal program. It is still the hope of the groups that 2012 is the year to begin the projects.

Staff reminded the Commission and the Community that, in anticipation of the Renewal Program, the Park Improvement Program (PIP) had been substantially reduced in 2012 not allowing for a typical PIP project year.

Doneen mentioned his desire to tap into the huge volunteer resource. Specifically, in the time of waiting for a court decision, are there possible projects that can be done to maintain the community enthusiasm. Doneen volunteered to frame possibilities that could limit staff resources and costs, provide training and be done safely. For example, with buckthorn eradication being of extreme interest to the community, could there be a smaller project area that could be done to keep people engaged while waiting for a decision. Commissioner Doneen will draft a proposal for staff and commission review.

Ristow commented on the reduction of staff and resources to the parks and recreation system making it more difficult to accomplish natural resources tasks like buckthorn removal. It is not only the removal of buckthorn, but substantial resources are needed for disposal.

Staff reminded the Commission that the full time park supervisor position that handled these efforts in the past was eliminated from the department's budget leaving a substantial void. The Renewal Program was intended to help in this area.

Wall summarized some of the key items outlined by the Commission and staff that should be addressed including awareness, safety, proper training, proper supervision and disposal.

#### 6. **DIRECTORS REPORT**

- O Brokke described the City Council Work Plan that was included in the packet. It is work in progress and begins with the community aspirations followed up with the existing work plan and short term and long term plans. Eventually when the City Council completes their work, it is anticipated to be incorporated into Commission goals and individual department's strategic plans. Following were some general comments:
  - o Chair Etten commented on the importance of the goals reflecting parks and recreation as an integral part of the community.
  - Azer commented on her observation of the important role of the parks in the community and how they are intermingled in many sections of the work plan. Much work has been done by the Commission to get people involved.
  - O Doneen encouraged the city to identify the specific need for the shoreland and erosion control ordinance item and contact the area hydrologist to work on it rather than wait for the DNR. The DNR is not anticipating doing anything at this point.
  - O Doneen commented on the overall interweaving of parks and recreation in many of the items, whether they are called out specifically or not. He assumed parks and recreation staff would be involved and that the budget would follow the direction.
  - O Ristow commented on the importance of and the high use of our parks and the need to keep them vibrant as gas prices are increasing and people staying home more.
- Doneen commented on how parks and recreation recently touched him and his family as his son registered for the high school disc golf program. Specifically, if there was not a disc golf course, there would be no program.
- o Brokke distributed the 2011 annual report and thanked Jill Anfang for her work. Chair Etten asked Commissioners to review the report and come back to the next meeting with any questions.
- o Roseville Parks and Recreation will be providing recreation opportunities to the City of Lauderdale again in 2012 through a Recreation Agreement.

- o Reminder that the annual ethics training will take place on Wednesday April 11<sup>th</sup> at City Hall.
- O Preliminary word has been received on the success of a \$25,000 Community Forest Grant to plant trees.
- 107 o Preliminary word has been received on the success of a \$5,000 grant from the Metropolitan Regional Arts Council for the 2012 Summer Entertainment Series.
- Over 1000 people attended the Arts at the OVAL event on March 24 and 25, 2012.
  - o Summer staff interviews are complete. More than 100 applications were received.
- o Genisys Credit Union will be the title sponsor for Rosefest 2012.
- o Affinity Plus Credit Union will be the title sponsor for the 2012 Rose Parade.
- o Garden Plot reservations begin April 9th for Roseville residents.
- o Earth Day celebration is scheduled for April 21<sup>st</sup>.
- o Cedarholm Golf Leagues are now forming.
  - o The 43<sup>rd</sup> annual "Everything Coming Up Roseville" Ice Show will be April 27<sup>th</sup> 29<sup>th</sup>, 2012.

# Roseville, MN Comprehensive Surface Water Management Plan - 2012 Update Parks and Recreation Commission Meeting 6:30 PM – Tuesday May 1, 2012

#### **BACKGROUND**

The City has recently initiated an update to its Comprehensive Surface Water Management Plan (CSWMP) which was originally developed in 1990 and was last updated in 2002. The CSWMP is a document that is required to be updated to maintain consistency with local watershed standards and with the Metropolitan Surface Water Management Act. The CSWMP is a required chapter of the City's overall Comprehensive Plan and establishes the City's vision for managing storm water and surface water drainage throughout the City.

Roseville completed its Parks and Recreation System Master Plan in 2010 and also has a Parks and Recreation Natural Resources Management Final Report completed in 2002. Both of these Parks and Recreation documents address surface water and natural resource management topics that have direct connections to the scope of the CSWMP. In addition, Roseville's Parks have historically been associated with water features including lakes, ponds and wetlands and many of the parks have played a significant role in managing stormwater. This strong connection between parks and surface water management will continue and coordinating the goals of the various plans and programs will provide for greater consistency in implementation efforts and reduce potential conflicts between the plans.

There are three primary goals for this meeting with the Parks and Recreation Commission. First is to give the Commission a brief overview of the CSWMP update process and schedule. Second, staff will highlight some examples of how other cities have combined stormwater management and park system goals by repurposing park areas and increasing the overall value of the park system. Third, and most importantly, we are looking for input from the Commission on potential opportunities to combine goals and efforts towards improved education for park users, new or improved water quality treatment systems, and changes in the type or reductions in the costs of maintaining water and natural resource areas within the parks system.

## Goals and policies

This section describes a series of statements of intended directions for Roseville's parks and recreation system. These goals and policies are used by parks and recreation department staff, the Parks and Recreation Commission, and the City Council as they make regular and long-term decisions about the elements of the parks and recreation system. Goals are established for:

- · Park and recreation systems management
- · Parks development, redevelopment, and rehabilitation
- · Park and open space acquisition
- · Trails, pathways, and community connections
- · Recreation programs and services
- · Community facilities
- · Natural resources management

## Goal 1 Parks and Recreation Systems Management

Maintain ongoing parks and recreation planning, maintenance, and asset management process that involves citizen engagement, adheres to professional standards, and utilizes prudent professional practices. Ensure timely guidance for protecting the community's investment in parks, open space, and recreation programs and facilities to enhance their long-term and sustained viability. Policy 1.1: Re-evaluate, update, and adopt a Park and Recreation System Master Plan at least every five years to reflect new and current trends, changing demographics, new development criteria, unanticipated population densities, and any other factors that affect park and recreation goals, policies, and future direction of the system.

Policy 1.2: Monitor progress on the Parks and Recreation System Master Plan annually to ensure that it provides actionable steps for maintaining, improving, and expanding the system.

Policy 1.3: Maintain and operate parks, open space, and recreation facilities in a safe, clean, and sustainable manner that protects natural resources and systems, preserves high quality active and passive recreation opportunities and experiences, and is cost-effective.

Policy 1.4: Consider staffing and resource needs in

the evaluation of proposals for additions to parks, programs, and facilities.

Policy 1.5: Use the Sector and Constellation organization structure as the basis for park, recreation program, and facility locations, development, and service delivery.

Policy 1.6: Enhance neighborhood and community identity in the design of parks, programs, and facilities through public art, special events, and stewardship of natural features.

Policy 1.7: Establish a service standard of having a neighborhood park or active play space in every park service constellation.

Policy 1.8: Preserve parks and school open space areas as part of the citywide systems plan for structured recreation space and unstructured preserved natural areas.

Policy 1.9: Include Ramsey County park land and open space in planning and providing recreation services to Roseville residents.

Policy 1.10: Seek partnership to provide the community with a greater diversity or number of parks and facilities, and to offer a more expansive catalog of programs and events.

Policy 1.11: Seek sponsorships and scholarships and other revenue streams to facilitate program fee reductions.



Policy 1.12: Continue to coordinate, cooperate, and collaborate with adjacent communities, school districts, and governmental jurisdictions to leverage resources regarding the use of parks on common municipal boundaries and on joint programming where appropriate for mutual benefit to optimize open space, fitness, and recreation programming and facility options.

Policy 1.13: Complete park concept plans for all parks.

Policy 1.14: Evaluate the maintenance implications of potential park land acquisitions and capital improvements.

Policy 1.15: Annually recommend the adoption of a ten-year Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) for Parks and Recreation.

Policy 1.16: Use the procurement methods that deliver the best value for the community.

Policy 1.17: Research, develop, and recommend to the City Council and citizens periodic bond referendums, park and trail dedication fees, urban forest management fees, special assessments, or other funding programs to reinvest in parks and recreation facilities needed within Roseville.

Policy 1.18: Explore the potential for implementing a park service district as a means of creating a sustainable, independent source of local funding for the parks and recreation system.

Policy 1.19: Supplement the development and maintenance of parks and recreation lands and facilities with the use of non-property tax funds.

Policy 1.20: Pursue local option sales tax or State bond funds to support Roseville facilities of regional or State-wide significance.

Policy 1.21: Discourage commercial uses in parks, programs, or facilities and/or parks and recreation facilities. However, commercial uses could be permitted in situations in which the proposed use complements the park or recreation function, is benign, or where it does not conflict with the purpose of the park, recreation facility, or the overall intent of the Parks and Recreation System Master Plan. In no case should a commercial use be permitted in designated conservation or natural use areas.

Policy 1.22: Involve the Parks and Recreation Commission in the parks and recreation planning process. Support the Commission in its role as liaison between citizens and Roseville's elected officials and appointed staff to interpret citizen needs and interests and to recommend programs, facilities, and services that serve them. Stimulate additional volunteer involvement in the delivery and support of the parks and recreation system.

Policy 1.23: Involve a diverse and representative group of participants in the parks and recreation planning process. Conduct active and continuous interaction within the community

with neighborhoods, special interest groups, and individuals of all ages to achieve effective recreational programming and facility development.

Policy 1.24: Parks and recreation staff should play the key role in the delivery of parks, programs, and facility services. Community volunteers should be used whenever and wherever possible and appropriate to enrich the experience for the participant and volunteer.

Policy 1.25: Develop and implement an ongoing public information and marketing program to inform the public of their investments, opportunities, and benefits of a quality parks and recreation system.

Policy 1.26: Assign names, or change names, of Cityowned parks or recreation facilities, in consultation with the Parks and Recreation Commission, based on natural habitat, geographic location, and appropriate non-descript terminology. Only under certain and exceptional circumstances will consideration be given to names of individuals and/or organized groups, associations, or businesses.

You recently asked that I give you the statutory authority for Park Districts, Park Boards and Park Commissions. I am in this regard sending you a copy of Minnesota Statutes § 398.01, 398.08, 398.09, 412.501, 412.511, 412.521, 412.531, 412.111 and 412.271.

Minnesota Statutes § 398.01 provides that a Park District must be established by a Board of County Commissioners. Therefore, a City is not authorized to establish a Park District. Minnesota Statutes § 398.08 and 398.09 indicate that a Park District can act as an independent entity and sets forth the general and special powers of a Park District.

Park Boards are controlled by Minnesota Statutes § 412.491 through 412.531. While a Park Board can act independently on many matters, the funds for its operation are established by the City Council.

Minnesota Statutes § 412.111 gives the City the power to create departments and advisory boards. Minnesota Statutes § 412.271, Subd. 6 gives the City the power to give an independent board or commission the right to disburse funds without council approval. The City Council has not given the Roseville Park Commission such power. The Roseville Parks and Recreation Commission has only been given the power to act as an advisory committee and perform the other duties listed under Roseville City Code Section 203.04. As such, it does not have independent powers to make contracts and otherwise act as independent entity of the City.

When you get this memo, please give me a call. We can then discuss it further at that time.
