It is understood that each of these is a comprofit organization, that no part of the net earnings thereof incres to the benefit of any individual, that no substantial part of their activities is for promotion of legislation, and that none are private foundations under section 509(a) of the Code.

Item Description: Joint Powers Agreement with Ramsey County for Election Voting System

1 BACKGROUND

Ramsey County and the municipalities within the county jointly purchased election equipment in

- 3 2002. Ramsey County took responsibility to coordinate the equipment purchase and to maintain
- the equipment. The equipment has greatly surpassed its ten-year life cycle.
- 5 In 2011, Ramsey County established a task force with elections staff from Ramsey County and
- the cities of Maplewood, While Bear Lake, Shoreview and St. Anthony to review and test
- 7 possible replacement election equipment. After reviewing numerous options and ensuring that
- 8 the equipment was appropriately certified by the Secretary of State's Office, the task force
- 9 recommended the Hart Intervicic of Austin, TX for the purchase and use of a new voting system
- 10 for deployment in 2016.

11 POLICY OBJECTIVE

- By working together to purchase equipment, Ramsey County has been able to negotiate favorable
- pricing for new election equipment.
- By jointly owning the election equipment, voters in Ramsey County can be assured of efficient
- ballot preparation and the timely compilation of election results. The use of a uniform voting
- system throughout the county for all elections enhances election judges and voters'
- understanding of the voting process and helps to provide equitable treatment of all voters,
- regardless of the type of election.

9 FINANCIAL IMPACTS

- The Council's budgetary policy is to replace capital equipment when the useful life has been met
- or exceeded. The current election equipment has been in service since 2002, well past its ten-year
- 22 life cycle. The current election equipment breaks down and requires more election day
- maintenance than is acceptable.
- The City's share of the cost to purchase the new voting equipment is \$70,280. This price is
- nearly identical to what the city spent in 2002 for election equipment. Money has been allocated
- in the capital budget to cover the costs.

JOINT POWERS AGREEMENT FOR NEW VOTING SYSTEM ACQUISITION AND OPERATION

This Agreement is made by and between Ramsey County, through the Ramsey County Elections Office (hereinafter "County"), and the cities of Arden Hills, Falcon Heights, Gem Lake, Lauderdale, Little Canada, Maplewood, Mounds View, New Brighton, North Oaks, North St. Paul, Roseville, St Anthony, St. Paul, Shoreview, Vadnais Heights, and White Bear Lake and White Bear Township (collectively referred to as the "Municipalities").

WHEREAS, the County and the Municipalities ("Parties") are "governmental units" as defined in Minn. Stat. §471.59; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Minn. Stat. §471.59, the Parties, through actions of their governing bodies, are authorized to enter into a joint powers agreement for the exercise of commonly held or similar powers; and

WHEREAS, the Parties entered into a Joint Powers Agreement in 2001 for the purchase and operation of a new voting system, with a ten year term and automatic two year extensions; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the provisions of the 2001 Joint Powers Agreement, the County prepares ballots and compiles election results for all state, federal, county, municipal and school district elections for the Municipalities; and

WHEREAS, efficient ballot preparation and the timely compilation of election results depend upon the use of a uniform voting system throughout the County, and the use of a uniform voting system for all elections enhances election judge and voter understanding of the voting process and helps to provide equitable treatment for all voters, regardless of the type of election; and

WHEREAS, Congress mandated the use of an assistive ballot marking device in all polling places and in-person absentee voting locations for use by voters with disabilities, through enactment of the Help America Vote Act of 2002 ("HAVA"); and

WHEREAS, the Minnesota Legislature mandated the central counting of all absentee ballots under uniform state laws and procedures in Laws of Minnesota 2010, Chapter 194, effective in 2010; and

WHEREAS, the Parties have reached agreement on the need to replace the existing voting system and the funding formula for the new voting system; and

WHEREAS, the County Board has approved a contract with Hart Intercivic of Austin, TX for the purchase and use of a new voting system for deployment in 2016;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual undertakings and agreements hereinafter set forth, the parties agree as follows:

I. PURPOSE

The purpose of this Joint Powers Agreement is to establish and describe the roles and responsibilities of the County and the Municipalities in connection with the acquisition, implementation, and operation of a new voting system for use throughout Ramsey County ("Project"), including equipment that will be owned and operated by the County and equipment that will be owned and operated by the Municipalities.

II. COUNTY ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES-SYSTEM IMPLEMENTATION

A. General

The County will provide the services, materials, and equipment necessary to procure and implement a replacement voting system ("System") in Ramsey County, including software, hardware, materials, ballot printing, and other services as further described in this Agreement. Services may be provided directly by County staff or by outside vendors, as determined by the County.

B. System Description

The System will have the following functionalities:

- 1. The capability to create ballot styles for each precinct based on the appropriate contests and candidates and to generate ballots by either creating a print file that may be sent to a vendor or by printing ballots in the County offices;
- 2. The capability to program memory devices for each precinct for an election that will, when inserted into a ballot counter or ballot marking device, properly record the votes on ballots cast in that precinct, reject ballots that are not from that precinct or which do not have the proper validation marks, return to the voter ballots which contain an overvote or a crossover vote, and perform all other actions required by the Minnesota election law;
- 3. The capability to count absentee ballots at a central location in the County or at one or more Municipalities, at the option of each of the Municipalities, and to generate reports noting the number of absentee ballots counted for each precinct;

- 4. The capability to accumulate votes on ballot counters located in each precinct on election day, at other locations prior to election day, and from absentee ballot counting centers, to protect voted ballots in a sealed ballot box; to generate paper tapes of election results for review and certification by election judges; and to electronically upload or transmit election results to the County; and
- 5. The capability to compile election results from electronically transmitted files from each precinct through use of the memory device which recorded votes from the precinct and/or from the election results tape; to create an election results database that may be used for displaying results on the County website; and to generate needed reports for certification of election results.

C. System Equipment

The County will purchase System hardware and software (collectively referred to as the "System Equipment") as initially needed for use of the System by the County and the Municipalities. The System Equipment to be purchased by the County for implementation of the System under the terms of this Agreement is listed as the System Equipment Costs – Total in the System Equipment List, attached hereto and made a part of this Agreement as Appendix A.

D. Implementation Services

- 1. The County will provide services, including training, related to the implementation of the System by the County and the Municipalities, as described in Appendix B Implementation Services, attached hereto and made a part of this Agreement.
- 2. The County will provide implementation project management services through a Project Manager. Joseph Mansky, or his designee, shall serve as Project Manager for the County.
- 3. The goal is to have the System implemented and ready for use by the County and the Municipalities in time for the 2016 state primary. At the discretion of the County, the implementation of the System may be delayed for initial use at the 2016 state general election or a future election.

III. COUNTY ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES-POST IMPLEMENTATION OPERATING SERVICES

A. General

Following System implementation, the County will perform the duties described in Sections III. B. through E. (collectively, "Operating Services") either directly by County staff or by outside vendors, as determined by the County.

B. System Administration

The County will:

- 1. maintain all licenses and agreements from the vendor(s) necessary to operate the System;
- 2. obtain and implement all required software updates needed to operate the System in compliance with the requirements of the Minnesota election law;
- 3. perform diagnostic testing of ballot counters and ballot marking devices to ensure the proper functioning of all equipment;
- 4. provide election programming needed to generate ballots and program memory devices that allow the ballot counters to correctly record votes; and
- 5. accumulate and report election results cast on the ballot counters for all elections.

C. Warranty Services

- 1. Warranty services will be provided by the System vendor(s) in accordance with the warranty provisions contained in the contracts between the County and the System vendor(s).
- 2. The County shall obtain and enforce all System warranties, including warranties on equipment owned by the Municipalities paid for under the terms of this Agreement. All requests for warranty services shall be made by the Municipalities to the County.

D. Post-Warranty Maintenance Services

Maintenance services will be provided following expiration of the warranty period(s) in accordance with the provisions of the maintenance agreement(s) between the County and the System vendor(s).

- 1. The County will enter into a contract with the System vendor(s) for System maintenance services to be provided directly to the County. The County will manage the provision of maintenance services for the Municipalities.
- 2. Maintenance services shall include, at minimum, the following:
 - a. Preventative maintenance: inspect and clean all ballot counters and ballot counting devices, including the read heads, printers, motors and other related components.
 - b. Repairs: make basic repairs to ballot counters and ballot marking devices as needed; the County will maintain or obtain spare parts for this purpose.
 - c. Equipment Replacement: replace ballot counters, ballot marking devices and related hardware and components on an as needed basis in the case of complete or un-repairable equipment failure.

E. Ongoing Services

- 1. The County will provide the Municipalities with a set of test ballots (also known as the test deck) and pre-audited test results for each precinct in every election.
- 2. The County will provide ballot layout, printing and memory device programming as follows:
 - a. Ballot layout no cost to Municipalities for all elections
 - b. Ballot printing
 - 1) State and county elections no cost to Municipalities
 - 2) Other elections printing cost attributable to Municipal and/or School District offices and questions paid by

Municipalities and/or School Districts using cost formula provided by the Secretary of State

- c. Memory device programming no cost to Municipalities for all elections
- 3. The County will provide each Municipality with the hardware and software necessary to administer absentee voting for all elections. Each Municipality will have the choice of one of the following options:
 - a. make arrangements for the County to accept/reject, process and count all the absentee ballots for the Municipality;
 - b. accept/reject its own absentee ballots and make arrangements for the County to process and count the absentee ballots for the Municipality;
 - c. accept/reject, process and count its own absentee ballots.
- 4. The County will provide the Municipalities with the County's costs for options 3. a. and b. (above) no later than 24 weeks before the first election for which the System will be used and no later than 16 weeks before the date established in state law to begin absentee voting in subsequent years. Each Municipality shall inform the County in writing of its initial choice no later than 20 weeks before the first election for which the System will be used. Each Municipality shall notify the County in writing of any changes desired for its choice in subsequent years no later than 12 weeks before the date established in state law to begin absentee voting for a primary in a given year.
- 5. The County will provide inspection and replacement of consumable supplies.
- 6. Election Day technical support for the System will be provided by the voting system vendor (up to three days per election), as required by the County.
 - a. Programming and system administration operations
 - b. Ballot counter operations
 - c. Ballot marking device operations
- 7. Subject to approval by the County, during the term of this Agreement including any extensions, the County shall lease or purchase ballot counters, ballot marking devices, and other hardware and software in addition to those listed in Appendix A, on written request from a Municipality. Payment to

the County by the requesting Municipality shall be made within thirty (30) calendar days from the date of the invoice from the County following delivery of the hardware and/or software to the requesting Municipality.

- 8. During the term of this Agreement including any extensions, the County may lease or purchase any additional hardware or software that is necessary for the System to:
 - a. comply with the provisions of the Minnesota Election Law;
 - b. facilitate the processing and counting of absentee ballots; or
 - c. otherwise meet demand from the voters.

IV. ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE MUNICIPALITIES

A. Implementation

- 1. The individual who administers elections for the Municipality shall serve as the Municipality's project implementation liaison with the County. Each Municipality shall provide the name and contact information for the liaison within ten (10) calendar days of final execution of this Agreement.
- 2. Within thirty (30) calendar days of execution of this Agreement, each Municipality shall notify the County in writing of its plans for payment of the acquisition costs of the ballot counters, ballot marking devices and any other administrative equipment ("Equipment Costs"). Each Municipality may choose from one of the following payment options: a) a one-time reimbursement of costs or b) reimbursement of costs over two or more years, not to exceed a maximum of five years. A Municipality may not revoke its decision at any time after notice has been given to the County.

B. Post-Implementation/Ongoing

1. The Municipalities shall verify that ballots and memory devices tested by the County function accurately in the ballot counters and ballot marking devices that will be used in each election. If a Municipality identifies an error, the County shall correct the error within ten (10) calendar days of notification of the error, if practicable.

- 2. The Municipalities shall also perform all public accuracy testing provided by law for each election and may request the County's assistance in conducting these tests, at no charge.
- 3. The Municipalities may not lease or purchase any additional hardware and software during the term of this Agreement or any extensions without the prior approval of the County.
- 4. Each of the Municipalities shall lease or purchase at least one ballot counter, a ballot marking device, and a ballot box for each precinct in the Municipality.

C. Payment

Each of the Municipalities is responsible for payment in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement.

V. OWNERSHIP/SOFTWARE LICENSE

- A. The County will initially own all System Equipment.
- B. Upon payment in full to the County in accordance with the terms of this Agreement, each of the Municipalities will own the ballot counters, ballot marking devices, and related equipment that were originally purchased by the County under this Agreement; this provision shall not apply to equipment leased by the County. The County will maintain ownership of backup ballot counters and ballot marking devices, the central count ballot counters and any precinct ballot counters that are needed for counting absentee ballots, the memory devices for all ballot counters and ballot marking devices, and the computer hardware and software needed to operate and administer the System.
- C. The County is the sole Licensee of the System software and the Municipalities are users.

VI. WARRANTY

The County makes no representations and extends no warranties with respect to the use of the System and specifically disclaims all other warranties, express or implied, including but not limited to any implied warranty or merchantability or fitness for a particular purpose.

VII. SYSTEM IMPLEMENTATION FUNDING

- A. The County will provide initial financing for the costs of acquisition, installation, and implementation of the System ("Implementation Costs").
- B. As part of the initial financing of the Implementation Costs, the County will apply state grant funds received under the Help America Vote Act and required County matching funds as a setoff against the Implementation Costs.
- C. The Municipalities will provide the funds to reimburse the County for the System Equipment identified as the responsibility of the Municipalities in Appendix A.

VIII. COST ALLOCATION/PAYMENT

A. Cost Allocation-Implementation Costs

- 1. Each of the Municipalities will reimburse the County for the cost of the number of ballot counters, ballot boxes, and ballot marking devices required by that Municipality in accordance with the pricing in Appendix A. A list of the number of ballot counters, ballot boxes, and ballot marking devices for each of the Municipalities and the percentage of the total cost for ballot counters and ballot marking devices to be paid by each of the Municipalities is listed in Appendix C. The total number and each Municipality's percentage of ballot counters and ballot marking devices may be adjusted throughout the term of this Agreement including any extensions.
- 2. For those Municipalities that have elected to pay for the ballot counters, ballot boxes, and ballot marking devices over time, the total amount to be paid will include their proportionate share of any financing costs incurred by the County for the purchase, installation and implementation of the System Equipment, which financing costs will be shared among those Municipalities that have elected to pay over a period from two to five years. The County will charge each Municipality that chooses to finance the purchase of its System Equipment 2% per annum.

B. Cost Allocation-Post-Implementation/Operating Services

1. There will be no charge to the Municipalities for ballot layout for all elections, ballot printing for State and county elections or for memory device programming.

- 2. The Municipalities will pay the County's costs for Operating Services ("Operating Costs") on an annual basis.
- 3. The Operating Costs will be calculated to include costs for the items listed in Section III.B.-E. of this Agreement and, until repaid in full, the Implementation Costs described in Section VIII.A.2.
- 4. Except as identified as the responsibility of a Party to this Agreement, annual Operating Costs for Operating Services will be allocated as follows:
 - a. using the percentage of the total number of ballot counters requested by the Municipality as a proportion of the total number of ballot counters requested by all Municipalities for 80%, and using the percentage of the total number of absentee ballots accepted by each Municipality during the four most recent state general elections as a proportion of the total number of absentee ballots accepted in the County for 20%. The County will initially allocate the annual Operating Costs to the Municipalities as illustrated in Appendix C. The annual Operating Costs are subject to change, based on price changes for post-implementation services provided by the System vendor and changes to the costs of licenses and fees required for the County to administer the System, which have been submitted to and approved by the County.
 - b. The allocation will take into account any changes in the number of ballot counters requested by each of the Municipalities and/or the total number of ballot counters.

C. Payments

- 1. The County shall invoice a Municipality after the initial delivery of County-tested ballot counters, ballot boxes, and ballot marking devices to the Municipality. If a Municipality will pay over a period of 2-5 years, the County will invoice the Municipality its appropriate annual sum along with the invoice for annual Operating Costs. Payment shall be made within thirty (30) calendar days of the date of the invoice.
- 2. On or about June 1 of each calendar year during the term of this Agreement including any extensions, the County will invoice the Municipalities for their share of Operating Costs for the next calendar year. The total amount of the invoices will be calculated based on the actual Operating Costs incurred by the County in the previous calendar year, with adjustments made to account for increases or decreases in anticipated Operating Costs. The Municipalities

shall make payment to the County within thirty (30) calendar days of the date of the invoice.

- 3. If the County provides maintenance services through the System vendor on a time and materials basis, a Municipality that requires maintenance services will contact the County for the services and the County will contact the vendor.
- 4. If requested by a Municipality, the County shall invoice the School District(s) to pay a proportion of the Municipalities' annual cost for Operating Services using either: a) the cost-sharing methodology provided in the Minnesota Election Law; or b) another methodology developed by the County, in consultation with the Municipalities. The County will invoice the School District(s) for their proportion of the costs and payments will be made directly by the School District(s) to the County.
- 5. Payment of interest and disputes shall be governed by the provisions of Minn. Stat. § 471.425.

D. Proceeds from sale or lease of old equipment

The County shall determine if any existing voting equipment, including but not limited to ballot counters, ballot marking devices and related hardware will be sold or leased in conjunction with the purchase of the System. The County shall apply the proceeds of any sale or lease of existing voting equipment, including but not limited to ballot counters and ballot marking devices, toward the Municipalities' payment of Implementation Costs or Post-Implementation Costs.

IX. PROJECT SCHEDULE

A Project Schedule is attached hereto and made a part of this Agreement as Appendix D. The County may change the schedule set forth in Appendix D as appropriate based on changes in funding sources or the needs of the County.

X. TERM

- A. The term of this Agreement is for a ten (10) year period from the date of final execution by all parties ("Initial Term"), unless earlier terminated pursuant to the provisions of this Agreement.
- B. This Agreement shall be automatically extended for successive two-year terms ("Renewal Terms"), upon the same or better terms, conditions and

covenants, unless a majority of the Municipalities or the County gives notice of their/its intent not to extend at least 180 days prior to expiration of the Initial Term or the then-current Renewal Term.

XI. ANNUAL REVIEW PROCESS

At least once a year during the term of this Agreement, including any extensions, the County will convene a meeting of elections officials from the Municipalities to review the elections process and System operations.

XII. INDEMNIFICATION AND INSURANCE

- A. Each party agrees that it will be responsible for its own acts and the acts of its employees, elected officials, and agents as they relate to this Agreement and for any liability resulting therefrom, to the extent authorized by law, and shall not be responsible for the acts of the other parties or their employees, elected officials, and agents, or for any liability resulting therefrom. Each party's liability shall be governed and limited by the Municipal Tort Claims Act, Minn. Stat. Chapter 466 and other applicable law.
- B. Each Party agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless the other Parties, their employees, elected officials, and agents from any liability, claims, causes of action, judgments, damages, losses, costs or expenses, including reasonable attorneys fees, resulting directly or indirectly from any act or omission of the indemnifying party, its employees, elected officials, or agents, in the performance or failure to perform its obligations under this Agreement. Nothing herein shall be deemed a waiver by any Party of its limitations on liability, defenses or immunities under Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 466, or other state or federal law.
- C. Each Party warrants that it is able to comply with the aforementioned indemnity requirements through commercial insurance or a self-funding program.
- D. Each of the Parties shall insure the full replacement value of all System equipment stored on the Party's site.
- E. All insurance policies or self-insurance certificates shall be open to inspection by the other Parties and copies of the policies or certificates of self-insurance shall be submitted to a Party upon written request.

XIII. RECORDS

Subject to the provisions of Section XIV, each Party agrees that the other Parties, the State Auditor, or any of their duly authorized representatives shall, at any time during normal business hours, and as often as they may reasonably deem necessary, have access to and the right to examine, audit, excerpt and transcribe any books, documents, papers, records, etc., which are pertinent to the accounting practices and procedures of governmental entities and which involve transactions relating to this Agreement.

XIV. DATA PRACTICES

The Parties shall comply with the provisions of the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act, Minn. Stat. Ch. 13, or any other applicable state statutes, any state rules adopted to implement the Act and statutes, as well as federal statutes and regulations on data privacy.

XV. NONASSIGNMENT

No Party shall assign, subcontract, transfer or pledge this Agreement and/or services to be performed herein.

XVI. USE OF VOTING SYSTEM

The County shall only implement and support a single, uniform voting system throughout the County that must be used in every election conducted in the County. Each Municipality must use the ballot counters, ballot boxes and ballot marking devices provided in this Agreement for all elections conducted in the Municipality.

XVII. TERMINATION

- A. This Agreement shall terminate upon unanimous consent of the Parties as evidenced by a written resolution of the governing body of each Party or when necessitated by operation of law or as a result of a decision by a court of competent jurisdiction.
- B. Effect of termination. Termination shall not discharge any liability incurred by any of the Parties during the term of this Agreement including any extensions prior to the effective date of termination. Each Party shall be liable for its own acts to the extent provided by law.

XVIII. PROPERTY DISPOSITION

- A. Upon termination of this Agreement, ownership remains as stated in Article V.
- B. Upon termination, a Municipality will be given the option to make full payment for the ballot counters, ballot boxes, and ballot marking devices for which it has made partial payment. Such payment must be made within thirty (30) calendar days of the date of receipt of the notice of termination from the County.
- C. If the Parties reach consensus on the need to replace the System, the Parties will negotiate a new agreement, which shall include the disposition of the System Equipment, whether owned by the County or the Municipalities.

XIX. NOTICE

- A. All notices, reports or demands given or made by a Party under the terms of this Agreement or any statute or ordinance shall be in writing and shall be sent registered or certified mail.
- B. All notices, reports or demands shall be sent to the representative designated in writing by the Party. If none has been designated, notice to the Party's chief elected official shall be deemed adequate.

XX. ENTIRE AGREEMENT/ALTERATION

- A. It is understood and agreed that the entire agreement between the Parties is contained herein and that this Agreement supersedes all oral agreements and negotiations between the Parties relating to the subject matter hereof.
- B. Any alterations, variations, modifications, or waivers of provisions of this Agreement shall only be valid when they have been reduced to writing as an amendment to this Agreement signed by the Parties hereto.
- C. The parties may execute separate copies of any amendment to this Agreement and the signature pages will be part of the original.

XXI. VOTING SYSTEMS ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The County shall establish a Voting Systems Advisory Committee ("Committee") to facilitate the administration of the System. Any Party to this Agreement may request to become a member

of the Committee. Approximately eight years following final execution of this Agreement, or at such earlier time as the Parties may agree, the Committee shall begin planning for the acquisition of a successor voting system.

XXII. SEPARATE EXECUTIONS/EFFECTIVE DATE

Each of the Municipalities may sign a separate signature page and all of the signature pages taken together will constitute the original contract and will be as effective as if all of the signatures were on the same page. This Agreement shall be effective as to a Party upon execution by an authorized representative of that Party.

Wherefore, the Parties have executed this Agreement as of the last date written below.

BACKGROUND

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2 On April 20, 2015 the City Council awarded the Victoria Street Reconstruction Project to North

- Valley, Inc. of Nowthen, Minnesota. Work completed under the contract totaled \$2,510,717.11.
- The work was successfully completed during the 2015 season and the project is ready to be closed out. The project included the following items:
 - Reconstruction of Victoria Street from Larpenteur Avenue to County Road B.
 - New curb and gutter was installed from Roselawn to County Road B.
 - Construction of a pathway and retaining walls along the east side of Victoria from Larpenteur Avenue to Roselawn Avenue.
 - Construction of a sidewalk and retaining walls along the east side of Victoria from Roselawn to County Road B-2.
 - Upgraded the signal system at County Road B to meet ADA standards, including truncated dome pedestrian ramps and modifications to the pedestrian buttons.
 - Construction of new storm sewer including two underground infiltration systems, a storm water treatment pond and a rain garden.
 - Replacement of all hydrants in the corridor.
- The original awarded contract price for this project was \$1,809,925.93. There were five
- supplemental agreements that increased the contract price to \$2,535,734.26. The supplemental
- agreements were needed to address additional signal equipment requirements as well as
- 20 additional pedestrian ramp improvements that were necessary to meet State and County
- 21 requirements.

POLICY OBJECTIVE

- City policy requires that the following items be completed to finalize a construction contract:
 - Certification from the City Engineer verifying that all of the work has been completed in accordance with plans and specifications.
 - A resolution by the City Council accepting the contract and beginning the one-year warranty.

FINANCIAL IMPACTS

- The final contract amount, \$2,535,734.26, is \$725,808.33 more than the awarded amount of
- \$1,809,925.93, but \$25,017.14 lower than the final contract price of \$2,510,717.11. This
- represents an increase in the contract of 38.7%. The cost increase is due to a variety of factors
- 32 including;

- Major modification of the pavement reconstruction method
 - Change from a stabilized bituminous reclamation to a combination of road reconstruction and four inch mill and overlay. The change in design still resulted in a 9 ton roadway, which meets Municipal State Aid standards, with an expected pavement life of at least 30 years.
 - Change needed due to poor subgrade conditions that were found when portions of the pavement were dug up for utilities.
- Additional storm sewer replacement to fix pipe that was in need of replacement.
- Modifications to storm structures to accommodate utilities.

Although the project costs are higher than the original bid amount, the project costs are still within reason for the type of road that was constructed.

For example, in 2012 the City reconstructed Dale Street using conventional methods. The overall road cost for the road reconstruction was assessed in the same manner as Victoria Street for the same type of road; 32 feet wide, 7 ton design. The assessed cost per foot for this project was \$38.25/LF in 2011 dollars. This equates to an approximate cost of \$44/LF today.

The final costs of the modified pavement design for Victoria Street, although higher, are still less than what a traditional reconstruct would have been. The original road design was for a stabilized bituminous reclamation. If the subsoils had not become an issue this would have resulted in a 30 year road with a significant cost savings to the City versus a more typical street reconstruction. Had the street been constructed using conventional reconstruction methods, the cost would have been around \$44/LF for an approximately same design life.

The final project cost will be funded using the following funds;

Overall assessments will be higher than the preliminary assessment amount but will be set at or less than the maximum assessment rate as determined by the Benefit Appraisal which determined the maximum benefit realized by the properties as a result of the project. Residential properties will be assessed \$34.18/LF (Max \$35/LF) and all other properties (New Life Presbyterian Church) will be assessed \$60.00/LF (Max \$60/LF). The feasibility report for this project estimated assessments at \$27.49/LF for residential properties and \$54.97 for non-residential properties.

A final assessment hearing for the assessed portion of the project will be held in August.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

The work was completed in accordance with project plans and specifications, staff recommends the City Council approve a resolution accepting the work completed on the Victoria Street Reconstruction Project and authorizing final payment.

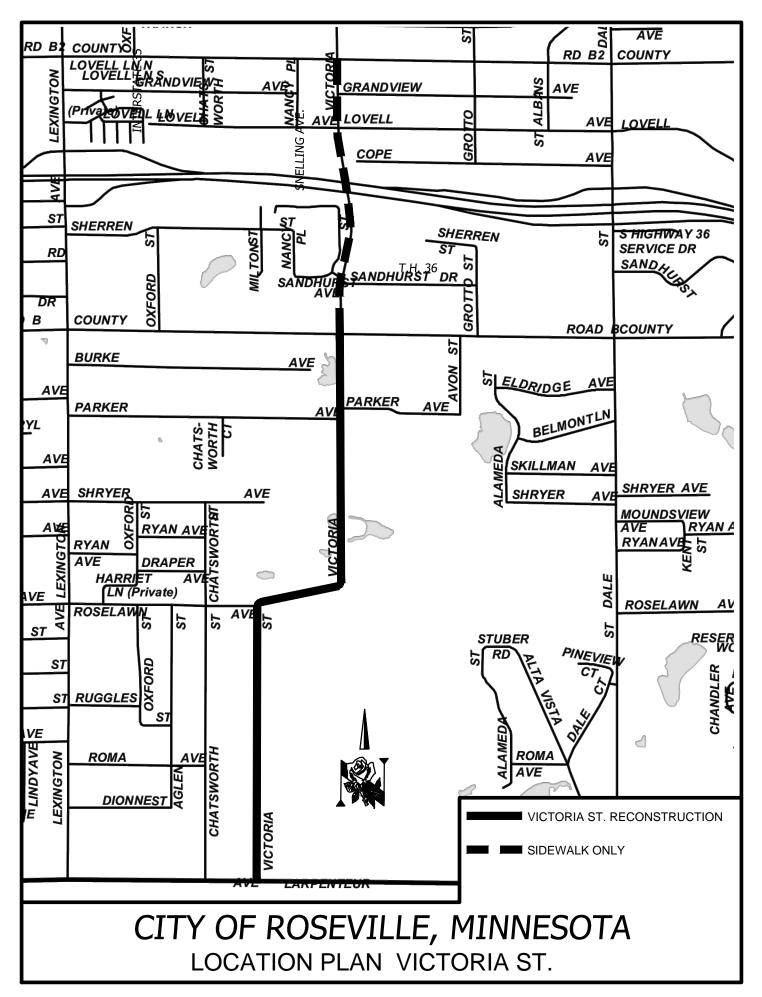

Item Description: Approve Terms of 2016-2018 Teamsters Police Sergeants Contract

1

BACKGROUND

- The City of Roseville has four collective bargaining units, the Police Sergeants Teamsters;
- 4 Police Officers- LELS; Maintenance Workers IUOE Local 49, and the Fulltime Firefighters -
- IAFF. With approval of this contract the Maintenance Workers IUOE Local 49 are the only
- 6 group not settled for 2016 and beyond.

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- This report is for the Police Sergeant's unit, which has 5 city employees participating in the bargaining unit. They are comprised of supervisory licensed law enforcement officers. The City and the union have a tentative agreement and the contract terms will be implemented upon
- 11 ratification of this contract.

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The City and union reviewed and compared 10 other Police department contracts in the metro area to negotiate this contract, as well as making internal comparisons.

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City staff and union members from Teamsters have met and found common ground for a settlement on a contract that spans three years. The membership has voted to accept the contract terms with implementation upon City Council approval and effective upon ratification. The following are the highlights of the contract:

- Payment will be made at the Employee's base hourly rate in effect on December 31st of the
- affected year.

8 POLICY OBJECTIVE

- Each year the City budgets wage and benefit adjustments for all employees. The adjustments
- stem from the best information known or anticipated from the metro labor market, labor
- settlements and consumer price indexing.

42 **BUDGET IMPLICATIONS**

- It is estimated that due to some recent personnel turnover the additional .5% requested for the
- 2016 contract will not reqire additional funding. The City Council will need to provide adequate
- funding for the subsequent years.

for Automatic Dispatch of the Closest Emergency Unit.

BACKGROUND

In 2014 the Ramsey County Fire Chiefs Association started a committee to research and evaluate the opportunity for increased Shared Services and a component of Closest Unit Dispatching amongst fire departments in Ramsey County. The Roseville Fire Department took an active role in the committee to assist with evaluating and vetting future opportunities.

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The concept behind Closest Unit Dispatching will be advanced and faster response times to our most critical calls: structure fires and cardiac arrests. It is hoped with a decreased response time for emergency personnel to these critical call types, the opportunity to provide for life-saving maneuvers is increased.

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The Fire Department has provided Council with several presentations and further insight into how the program will potentially look, as well as the critical benefits to the citizens of Roseville as well as neighboring communities throughout Ramsey County from this partnership.

FINANCIAL IMPACTS

- The financial impact of this agreement will be related to use of apparatus and personnel for response to emergencies as outlined in the JPA and presentation. As this program is new and untested it is not possible at this time to place a cost on this program.
- Fire Administration is committed to continual evaluation of all aspects of the program and will provide regular updates to council on outcomes, including costs.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

"Assistance" means the provision of fire personnel and equipment in response to an 38 Emergency Event. 39 40 3. "Dispatcher" means the person at the applicable public safety access point that 41 receives reports of Emergency Events and selects the appropriate Agency to respond 42 to and provide Assistance for the Emergency. 43 44 45 4. "Emergency" any request for fire department assistance.

- 5. "Emergency Events" means any Emergency incident in which an Agency may be called upon by a Dispatcher to provide Assistance within the scope of the Agency's service capabilities as determined by the respective member Cities and communicated in writing to the Emergency Communications Center.
- 6. "President" means the president of the Ramsey County Fire Chiefs Association.
- 7. "Protection Area" means the area within the Cities of Saint Paul, Roseville, Little Canada, Maplewood, Falcon Heights, North Saint Paul, North Oaks, Shoreview, Arden Hills, Lauderdale, New Brighton, White Bear Lake, and any additional city or town that joins this Agreement as provided herein.
- 8. "Requesting Party" means a Party which requests assistance from another Party to this Agreement and each such responding Party is considered a Sending Party.
- 9. "Sending Party" means a Party called upon to provide Assistance to another Party and which actually provides Assistance to the Requesting Party.
- 10. "Specialized Activities" means the provision of non-emergency assistance including, but not limited to, training of personnel and associated equipment and facilities.

II. AUTHORIZATION

Each of the Cities participating in this Agreement hereby authorize their respective fire Agencies to respond to and receive automatic mutual aid services pursuant to the terms of this Agreement and to otherwise take such actions as are needed to provide and receive Assistance as provided herein.

III. TERM AND TERMINATION

This Agreement shall be effective as of the date first written above and shall be ongoing until terminated as provided herein. Each City shall act by resolution to adopt this Agreement and shall forward a fully executed copy of its resolution and a signed original of this Agreement to the President of the Ramsey County Fire Chiefs Association.

Any Party may act by resolution to opt out of its participation in this Agreement. No such resolution shall be effective until the Party provides at least 60 days' written notice of termination to the President, the applicable County Emergency Communications Center, and each of the other Parties. The resolution must indicate the date of withdrawal from this Agreement, which must be sufficiently in the future to allow for the 60 day notice. The notice shall include a fully executed copy of the termination resolution.

IV. AUTOMATIC MUTUAL AID PROCEDURE

1. Whenever a Party to this Agreement receives a call for Assistance for an Emergency Event occurring within its jurisdictional boundaries, that call will automatically be

dispatched to the Agency having primary jurisdiction, as well as to any Agency for which the Dispatcher or Computer Aided Dispatch System (CAD) determines may provide a more timely response. The Sending Party shall respond to the call and make necessary Assistance available without undue delay. The typical response from the Sending Party shall be one apparatus and crew.

The extent of Assistance provided by the Sending Party shall be determined solely by the Sending Party based on its established response criteria and procedures. In the event a Sending Party determines it will not be able to provide Assistance, the fire official for the Agency making that determination shall immediately notify the Requesting Party.

- 2. The first arriving unit shall be in command of the emergency scene, until relieved by the Requesting Party. The Sending Party's fire official shall retain direction and control of the Sending Party's fire personnel and equipment on the scene.
- 3. Each Party, whether it be the Requesting Party or a Sending Party, shall be responsible for injuries or death of its own personnel. Each Party shall maintain workers' compensation insurance or self-insurance coverage covering its own personnel while they are providing Assistance pursuant to this Agreement. Each Party waives the right to sue the other Party for any workers compensation benefits paid to its own employee or their dependents, even if the injuries were caused wholly or partially by the negligence of the other Party or its officers, employees.
- 4. Each Party shall be responsible for damages to or loss of its own equipment. Each Party waives the right to sue the other Party for any damages to or loss of its equipment, even if the damages or losses were caused wholly or partially by the negligence of the other Party or its officers, employees, or volunteers.
- 5. Specialized Activities of non-emergency nature may be requested and/or provided by both parties to the Agreement. There is no obligation on the part of a Sending Party to provide Specialized Activities.
- 6. No charge shall be made to either party for Assistance rendered under this Agreement for incidents with duration under eight (8) hours. Provided, however, that in the event the Requesting Party is reimbursed for said personnel, equipment, or any other costs from a party or parties responsible for the Emergency, or is otherwise reimbursed by a third party source, then reimbursement, on a pro-rata basis, shall be made to the Sending Party for any equipment or personnel charges.

V. COOPERATIVE IMPLEMENTATION

The Parties agree to work in good faith through their respective Agencies to cooperatively establish any specific response criteria or procedures as they may determine are needed to implement this Agreement. Such criteria and procedures do not necessarily need to be the same for each Party, but they shall not be contrary to the

primary purpose of this Agreement. Each Party shall be responsible for communicating in writing its response criteria and procedures to each of the other Cities, the President, and the applicable County Emergency Communications Center.

VI. LIABILITY AND INDEMNIFICATION

- 1. For the purposes of the Minnesota Municipal Tort Liability Act (Minnesota Statutes, chapter 466), the employees and officers of the Sending Party are deemed to be employees (as defined in Minnesota Statutes, section 466.01, subdivision 6) of the Requesting Party. For all other purposes, all personnel remain the employees of their respective Party during the performance of duties under this Agreement.
- 2. The Requesting Party agrees to defend and indemnify the Sending Party against any claims brought or actions filed against the Sending Party or any officers, employees, or volunteers of the Sending Party for injury to or death of any third person or persons, or damage to the property of any third person or persons, arising out of the provision of Assistance by the Sending Party under this Agreement.

Under no circumstances, however, shall a Party be required to pay on behalf of itself and other Parties, any amounts in excess of the limits on liability established in Minnesota Statutes, chapter 466 applicable to any one Party. As provided in Minnesota Statutes, section 471.59, subdivision 1a, for the purposes of determining total liability the Parties shall be considered a single governmental unit and the total liability for the Parties shall not exceed the limits on governmental liability for a single governmental unit as specified in Minnesota Statutes, section 466.04, subdivision 1. Nothing in this Agreement shall be interpreted as any of the Parties waiving any exemptions or limitations on liability available to them under law.

The intent of the indemnification requirement of this section is to impose on each Requesting Party a limited duty to defend and indemnify any Sending Party for claims arising within the Requesting Party's jurisdiction subject to the liability limits under Minnesota Statutes, chapter 466. The purpose of creating this duty to defend and indemnify is to simplify the defense of liability claims by eliminating conflicts among defendants, and to permit liability claims against multiple defendants from a single occurrence to the defended by a single attorney.

3. No Party to this Agreement, nor any officer of any Party, shall be liable to any other Party or to any other person for failure of any Party to furnish Assistance to any other Party, or for recalling Assistance.

VII. ADDING MEMBERS

Any other city or town adjacent to the Protection Area may join this Agreement upon the written consent of all of the existing Parties to this Agreement that abut upon the boundaries of the joining city or town, the adoption by the joining city or town of a resolution authorizing execution of this Agreement, and the filing of a copy of the

executed resolution and this Agreement with the President. The Ramsey County Fire Chiefs may impose reasonable conditions on the admission of additional cities and establish procedures for removal of a Party for cause. The addition of a city or town to this Agreement as provided herein does not require an amendment to this Agreement. The joining city or town shall become subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement as of the effective date of its participation in the sharing of services under this Agreement as determined by the President.

VIII. MISCELLANEOUS

- 1. This Agreement may be amended by written agreement of the all of the Parties.
- 2. The Parties will execute this Agreement in any number of duplicate originals, each of which constitutes an original, and all of which, collectively, constitute only one Agreement. Each Party will deliver enough executed counterpart signature pages so that all of the Parties will have a fully executed original of this Agreement. The President will coordinate the delivery of the signature pages and compiling and delivering originals of the Agreement to each of the Parties.
- 3. This Agreement is made under the law of the State of Minnesota.
- 4. This Agreement is entered into for the benefit of the Parties and is not intended to provide any rights to any third parties.
- 5. This Agreement is not exclusive and is not intended to replace any other mutual aid agreements any of the Parties may have in place.

IX. EXECUTION

Each Party has read, agreed to, and executed this Agreement on the date indicated below.

Item Description: Approval of tree replacement fee identified in the recently adopted Tree

Preservation and Restoration in all District Ordinance (PROJ0017, Amdt27).

BACKGROUND 1

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On December 7, 2015, the Roseville City Council adopted Ordinance 1490, which established 2

new tree preservation, replacement, and restoration requirements. One component of this 3

approval was allowing replacement trees that could not fit onto a development site being placed 4

somewhere else, such as public property or the provision of a cash payment to the City. 5

1011.04.J reads as follows:

Replacement Tree Locations. Required replacement trees shall be planted on the site being developed unless doing so is deemed to be impractical (i.e. due to lack of space), inappropriate (available planting areas are not ideal for new plantings or would do little to enhance the site), or counterproductive to a property's intent (i.e. would entail too much screening for a retail business) as determined by the City Forester or other degreed forester or certified arborist as assigned by the Community Development Department. When such a determination is made, the applicant shall comply with replacement requirements in one of two ways: 13

- a. As directed by the City, required replacement trees may be located on public boulevards or other public lands throughout the City if such lands are deemed to be available with priority given to locations within or near the affected area; or
- **b.** The city may accept a cash in-lieu payment in accordance with the required fee listed in the 17 City Fee Schedule. In no instance shall cash in lieu of payment exceed 10% of the Fair 18 Market Value of the development site. 19

The Planning Division has researched past purchases by the Public Works Department, and received information from the City's forestry consultant. Given the vast range in costs associated with tree purchase, delivery, and installation of a 3 inch caliper deciduous or 6 foot tall evergreen tree, and that this process is new and not yet tested for effectiveness, the Planning Division is recommending that the fee be established at \$500 per replacement tree, which is at the lower end of the average cost estimate. The average cost of a tree can vary greatly depending on tree species, time of year, and the size of the installation.

S & S Tree Service information 3 inch maple installed = \$400-\$800

6 foot spruce/pine installed = \$300-\$600

City Engineering Estimate: \$400-\$500 (3"tree), \$100 (planting), \$100 (delivery), and

\$50 (large tree fee) = \$650-\$750

31 POLICY OBJECTIVE

- Approval of the proposed fee would complete the policy obective set forth in the recently
- adopted Tree Preservation and Restoration ordinance.

34 **BUDGET IMPLICATIONS**

- The establishment of the proposed replacement tree fee will create a new fund that can assist the
- City's ongoing efforts to maintain a healthy and vibrant wooded community.

37 STAFF RECOMMENDATION

- The Planning Division receommends the City Coucil establish a \$500 Tree Replacement Fee in
- 39 the City's Fee Schedule.

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I. **MISSION**

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The primary mission of the East Metro Swat Team (EMS) is to jointly provide specialized police services for its members in critical incident emergency situations more effectively and efficiently than those services could be provided by each member on its own. The EMS team assists member law enforcement agencies and non-member law enforcement agencies, should they request mutual aid, in the resolution of high risk or critical incidents. The EMS team is specially trained and equipped to work as a coordinated team to respond to and resolve critical incidents.

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Examples of situations where EMS can be of assistance include, but are not limited to, the 62 63 following:

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- Incidents of Hostage Taking. A.
- Incidents of a Barricaded Suspect(s). B.
- C. Building or Field Searches for Armed or Dangerous Suspects. 67
- High Risk Warrant Service. D. 68
- E. Incidents of Civil Disturbance and Crowd Control. 69
- 70 F. Providing and Assisting with Dignitary Protection.
 - G. Any Other High Risk Incident or Situation Deemed Appropriate by EMS Operating Board.

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II. JOINT POWERS AGREEMENT

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The parties to this Agreement are units of government responsible for critical incident response in their respective jurisdictions. This Agreement is made pursuant to the authority conferred upon the parties by Minn. Stat. § 471.59 and §473.407; see also Minnesota Chapter 629.

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NOW, THEREFORE, the undersigned governmental units, in the joint and mutual exercise of their powers, agree as follows:

1. Name.

The parties hereby establish the *East Metro Swat Team (EMS)*.

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2. General Purpose.

The purpose of this Joint Powers Agreement is to establish an organization to coordinate efforts to develop and provide joint response to critical incidents or high risk entries where there is a risk of criminal violence, occurring within the parties' jurisdictions.

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3. Parties.

The parties to this Agreement shall consist of the following units of government that have signed this agreement:

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109 3.01 Governing Board

The governing board of EMS shall consist of the following: 110

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- 112 East Metro Swat shall be governed by a governing board. Members of this board will be known as "Directors." The Chief Law Enforcement Officer from each member, or his or her designee, shall 113
- serve as Director. 114

Members of the governing board shall not be deemed to be employees of the governing board and 116 shall not be compensated by the governing board. 117

- Appointees shall serve at the pleasure of the appointing party and may be removed only by the 120 appointing party. 121

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3.03 Chair

The board will elect a chair. The Chair shall have no more power than any other Director except 124 that the Chair shall: give notice of meetings when scheduled or otherwise called; call meetings to 125 order and provide for their orderly and efficient conduct; provide for the preparation of minutes; 126 and when authorized by the passage of a motion by board, execute contracts, agreements, reports, 127

128 filing and other documents on behalf of EMS.

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3.04 Meetings 130

- The governing board shall have a minimum of one meeting per year. Special meetings may be 131
- 132 called by the Chair or two Directors. All meetings and notice of meeting shall comply with the
- Minnesota Open Meeting Law, Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 13D, as amended. The presence of a 133

simple majority of the Directors shall constitute a quorum. 134

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3.05 Voting

Each party to this agreement shall have one vote at any meeting of the governing board. Proxy votes are not permitted. The governing board shall function by a majority vote of board members or alternate members present, provided that a quorum is present.

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3.06 Duties of the Governing Board

The governing board will formulate a program to carry out its purpose.

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The governing board will coordinate information between the parties and EMS. 144

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- The governing board shall appoint and supervise the Team Commander of East Metro Swat. 146
- 147 Appointments require the concurrence of the chief law enforcement officer of the Team

Commander's employer. 148

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3.07 Powers of the Governing Board

- The governing board may enter into any contract necessary or proper for the exercise of its powers 151 or the fulfillment to its duties and enforce such contracts to the extent available in equity or at law, 152
- except that the governing board shall not enter into any contract the term of which exceeds the term 153
- of this agreement. No payment on any invoice shall be authorized unless approved by a majority of 154
- 155 its members. The chair shall report to the governing board any such payments at its next meeting.
- The governing board may apply for and accept gifts, grants or other property (excluding real 156
- property) or assistance from the United States government, the State of Minnesota, or any person. 157
- association, or agency for any of its purposes; enter into any agreement in connection therewith: 158
- 159 and hold, use and dispose of such money or other property and assistance in accordance with the
- terms of the gift, grant or loan relating thereto. 160

All powers granted herein shall be exercised by the governing board in a fiscally responsible manner and in accordance with the requirements of law.

The governing board may cooperate with other federal, state and local law enforcement agencies to accomplish the purpose for which it is organized.

3.08 Insurance

The governing board must obtain and maintain liability insurance in amounts not less than the statutory liability limits established under Minn. Stat. Ch. 466 and Minn. Stat.3.736 and may obtain other insurance it deems necessary to insure the parties, the governing board, its members and employees of the parties for actions arising out of this Agreement.

Any excess or uninsured liability shall be borne equally by all the members, but this does not include the liability of any individual officer, employee, or volunteer which arises from his or her own malfeasance, willful neglect of duty, or bad faith.

IV. BUDGET AND FINANCE

4.01 Budget

By March 31 of each year the governing board shall prepare and adopt a budget for the following calendar year and may amend the same from time to time.

4.02 Expenses

The parties intend to fund EMS through an equal, annual contribution paid by each party. The governing board shall establish the contribution by March 31 of the year prior to the year when the contribution is payable. The parties agree to pay the contribution as determined by the governing board on or before January 31 of the year following the determination. These funds may be paid from grants funds, drug forfeitures, and any funds voluntarily contributed by any member.

4.03 Accountability

The Roseville Police Department shall act as the fiscal agent for EMS. All funds shall be accounted for according to generally accepted accounting principles. A report on all receipts and disbursements shall be forwarded to the parties quarterly and on an annual basis.

V. POSITIONS

5.01 Team Commander

The Team Commander shall be a licensed peace officer appointed by the governing board. Appointment as Team Commander pursuant to this agreement shall not obligate any party to pay to its employees so appointed either supervisory or other premium pay.

5.02 Leadership Positions

The Team Commander shall appoint licensed peace officers to serve as executive officers, and team leaders subject to approval of the governing board. Appointment to a leadership position pursuant to this agreement shall not obligate any party to pay to its employees so appointed either supervisory or other premium pay.

Peace officers assigned to leadership positions within EMS at all times will remain employees of the members' own jurisdictions and will not be employees of the governing board.

Peace officers assigned to leadership positions shall be the liaison between the team members and the Team Commander when an EMS team has been deployed pursuant to this agreement.

5.03 Team members

- The chief law enforcement officer of each party shall assign licensed peace officers to serve as
- 217 EMS team members, subject to approval of the Team Commander. Appointment as a team member
- pursuant to this agreement shall not obligate any party to pay its employees so appointed any
- 219 premium pay.

Team members assigned to the EMS at all times will remain employees of the members' own jurisdictions and will not be employees of the governing board.

A party may decline to make its personnel available to respond to a call for assistance. Failure to provide assistance in response to a request made pursuant to this agreement will not result in any liability to the party that fails to provide assistance or to the EMS.

5.04 Direction and Control

Personnel and equipment provided pursuant to this agreement shall be under the direction and the tactical control of the licensed peace officer in command of the scene of the jurisdiction to which assistance is being provided. They shall remain under this tactical control until the request for assistance ends, or they are recalled by the Team Commander.

5.05 Compensation

When EMS provides services to a requesting party, the personnel of EMS shall be compensated by their respective employers just as if they were performing the duties within and for the jurisdiction of their employer. No charges will be levied by EMS or by parties for specialized response operations provided to a requesting party pursuant to this agreement unless that assistance continues for a period exceeding 48 continuous hours. If assistance provided pursuant to this agreement continues for more than 48 continuous hours, and the assistance is not provided in connection with a criminal investigation, any party whose officers provided assistance for EMS shall submit itemized bills for the actual cost of any assistance provided, including salaries, overtime, materials and supplies, to EMS and EMS shall submit the invoices to the requesting party. The requesting party shall reimburse EMS for that amount, and EMS shall forward the reimbursement to its respective members.

Each of the parties, with the exception of the Metropolitan Council, is required by Minn. Stat., § 12.27, Subd. 3 to designate employees or officers who are authorized to dispatch equipment and personnel, in certain emergencies, to other jurisdictions. For purposes of dispatching EMS teams, each of the parties delegates such authority to EMS, which is authorized to dispatch such personnel and equipment, taking into consideration each party's available resources.

Calls for assistance from non-parties to EMS shall be governed by Minn. Stat., § 12.331. Each of the parties, with the exception of the Metropolitan Council, delegates to EMS the authority to respond with the personnel and equipment of that party that are assigned to EMS as a sending political subdivision within the meaning of Minn. Stat., § 12.331, Subd. 1, which is authorized to dispatch such personnel and equipment, taking into consideration each party's available resources.

If EMS provides services to an entity not a party to this agreement, the responding parties may submit itemized bills for the actual cost of any assistance provided, including salaries, overtime, materials and supplies, to EMS, and EMS may bill such entity for the actual costs in accordance with Minn. Stat., § 12.331.

5.06 Workers' Compensation

Each party to this agreement shall be responsible for injuries to or death of its own employees in conjunction with services provided pursuant to this agreement. Each party shall maintain workers' compensation coverage or self-insurance coverage, covering its own personnel while they are

providing assistance as a member of EMS. Each party to this agreement waives the right to sue any other party for any workers' compensation benefits paid to its own employee or their dependents, even if the injuries were caused wholly or partially by the negligence of any other party or its officers, employees or agents.

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5.07 Damage to Equipment

Each party shall be responsible for damage to or loss of its own equipment occurring during deployment of EMS. Each party waives the right to sue any other party for any damages to or loss of its equipment, even if the damages or losses were caused wholly or partially by the negligence of any other party or its officers, employees or agents. Any equipment purchased or acquired by EMS shall be maintained and accounted for by the EMS Board and fiscal agent designated under section 4.03. Surplus property may be disposed of only under procedures authorized by law and distribution of property upon termination of this agreement shall be as provided for by Minn. Stat. §471.59, Subd. 5.

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5.08 Indemnification

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289 290 East Metro Swat shall defend and indemnify the parties, and their officers, employees, and volunteers, from and against all claims, damages, losses, and expenses, including attorney fees, arising out the acts or omissions of any person acting on behalf of the governing board in carrying out the terms of this agreement. This agreement does not constitute a waiver on the limitations of liability set forth in Minn. Stat. §466.04 or Minn. Stat. §3.736.

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Nothing herein shall be construed to provide insurance coverage or indemnification to an officer, employee, or volunteer of any member for any act or omission for which the officer, employee, or volunteer is guilty of malfeasance in office, willful neglect of duty, or bad faith.

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To the fullest extent permitted by law, action by the parties to this agreement are intended to be and shall be construed as a "cooperative activity" and it is the intent of the parties that they shall be deemed a "single governmental unit" for the purposes of liability, as set forth in Minn. Stat., § 471.59, subd. 1a (a), provide further that for purposes of that statute, each party to this agreement expressly declines responsibility for the acts or omissions of another party. The parties to this agreement are not liable for the acts or omissions of another party to this agreement except to the extent they have agreed in writing to be responsible for the acts or omissions of the other parties.

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When a party to this agreement loans an automobile to East Metro Swat, East Metro Swat's automobile liability coverage shall be primary when East Metro Swat is in possession of the automobile. East Metro Swat agrees to defend and indemnify the owner of the automobile and any other parties to this agreement for any liability claims related to the use of the automobile, subject to the limitations in Section 3.08 of this Agreement.

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5.09 Term

This agreement will be in force for a period of three years from the date of execution.

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VI. WITHDRAWL AND TERMINATION

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6.01 Withdrawal

Any party may withdraw from this agreement upon thirty (30) days written notice to the other 319 parties. Withdrawal by any party shall not terminate this agreement with respect to any parties who 320 321 have not withdrawn. Withdrawal shall not discharge any liability incurred by any party prior to 322

6.02 Additional Members and Change in Membership

A governmental unit may join EMS and become a member upon approval by the Governing Board and execution of a copy of this Agreement by its governing body.

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The Governing Board may involuntarily terminate a member if that member has failed to provide a minimum of one officer to East Metro Swat for more than 12 consecutive months.

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- 6.03 Termination
- This agreement shall terminate upon the occurrence of any one of the following events: (a) when necessitated by operation of law or as a result of a decision by a court of competent jurisdiction; or (b) when a majority of remaining parties agrees to terminate the agreement upon a date certain.

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- **6.04** Effect of Termination
- Termination shall not discharge any liability incurred by EMS or by the parties during the term of this agreement. Upon termination and after payment of all outstanding obligations, property or surplus money held by EMS shall then be distributed to the parties in proportion to their contributions.

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- **6.05 Amendments**
- This agreement may be amended only in writing and upon the consent of each of the parties' governing body.

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- 345 <u>6.06 Counterparts</u>
- This agreement may be executed in two or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all of which shall constitute one and the same instrument. Counterparts shall be filed with the Roseville Police Department.

1 BACKGROUND

- 2 The City Council approved the Preliminary Plat for Cherrywood Pointe of Roseville at Lexington
- on August 24, 2015. The existing utility easement through the property was vacated by the City

WHEREAS, the Owner is the owner of real property located in Roseville, Minnesota, legally described as follows, to wit:

WHEREAS, the City is the owner of a utility easement which was dedicated to the City on the plat of Cherrywood Pointe at Lexington a portion of which easement lies within an area legally described as follows, to wit:

A 20 foot wide sanitary sewer easement which was described and dedicated in the plat of CHERRYWOOD POINTE AT LEXINGTON, the center line of which is described as follows:

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants contained herein and for other good and valuable consideration, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. The Owner shall have the right to construct, maintain and repair the parking lot and sidewalks subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
- 2. The parking lot and sidewalks shall be constructed, maintained and repaired by the Owner at the Owner's sole cost and expense holding the City free and clear of same. The Owner shall maintain the parking lot and sidewalks in a neat, clean and safe condition.
- 3. The Owner shall be responsible for obtaining and paying for all permits, variances, approvals, costs, fees and other expenses necessary to construct, maintain and repair the parking lot and sidewalk. The Owner shall construct, maintain and repair the parking lot and sidewalk in compliance with all laws, rules, regulations, codes and ordinances imposed by all governmental authorities which have jurisdiction over the Right of way Area.
- 4. The Owner hereby covenants and agrees to release, indemnify, defend and hold the City, and its mayor, council, officers, employees and agents, harmless from and against any and all claims, losses, liabilities, demands, actions, judgments, damages, penalties, fines, costs and expenses (including attorney's fees incurred by the City) arising out of or related to: (a) the construction, maintenance and repair of the parking lot and sidewalks (b) the existence of the parking lot and sidewalks on the right- of- way, (c) The Owner's use of the parking lot and sidewalks and the right- of- way, and (d) any breach by the Owner of the covenants and agreements in this Agreement.

5. In the event that the parking lot and sidewalks is substantially damaged or totally

destroyed, or the Owners fail to comply with any of the Owner's obligations under this

Agreement, the Owners shall immediately repair or remove any remaining portions of the

parking lot and sidewalks which are located within the Easement Area. The Owners agree to

complete such repairs or removal at their own cost and in accordance with all applicable laws,

codes and regulations pertaining thereto. In the event that the parking lot and sidewalk are not

repaired or removed the City shall have the right, upon giving the Owner thirty (30) days prior

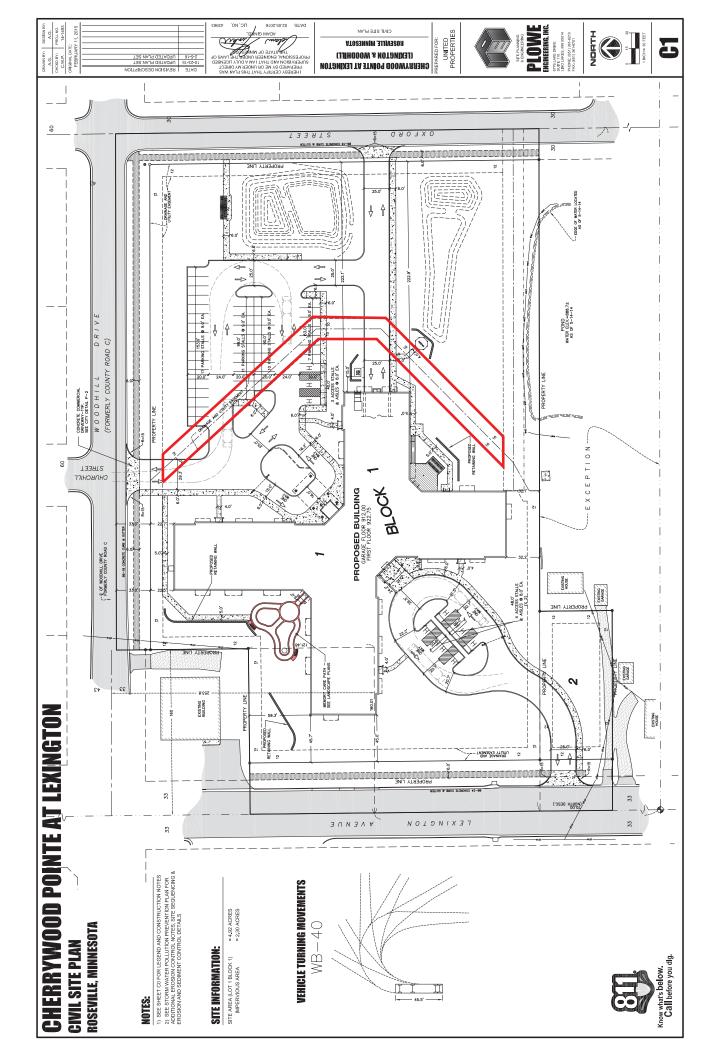

BACKGROUND

2 The City Council approved the Preliminary Plat for Cherrywood Pointe of Roseville at Lexington

- on August 24, 2015. The existing utility easement through the property was conditionally
- vacated by the City Council on September 14, 2015.
- 5 The Developer, Cherrywood Pointe of Roseville at Lexington, LLC, has worked with the City to
- 6 develop the Public Improvement Contact for the new infrastructure that is needed to serve the
- development. The new public infrastructure includes the relocation of a City sanitary sewer main
- through the center of the parcel and the construction of a six (6) foot concrete sidewalk adjacent
- 9 to the parcel along Woodhill Drive and Lexington Avenue. The existing sanitary sewer main
- would be removed.
- New development is served by existing streets and utilities so no new public streets or new
- utilities extensions are needed. New private water and sewer services will be extended from the
- 13 City's mains to each new parcel.

14 **DISCUSSION**

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- In order to serve the development in the plat, the following public improvements need to be made. The detail of such improvements are specified in the Public Improvement Contract (Attachment A) and shown in the plans (Attachment B) and are summarized as follows;
 - Sanitary sewer construction: The developer shall construct a new City owned sanitary sewer main to serve the City and to serve the Property. This sanitary sewer main will replace any exiting sanitary sewer main serving the Property.
 - Sanitary sewer facilities, including manholes and pipe, shall be constructed in accordance with City details, specifications, and the City approved Public Improvement Construction Plans.
 - The existing sanitary sewer main shall remain operational until the new main is operational or the existing sewer flow shall be bypassed properly during the construction of the new sanitary sewer main.
 - Restoration of existing streets: Curb cuts and street cuts shall be reconstructed to match existing street typical section.

- All unused curb openings along Lexington Avenue, Woodhill Drive, and Oxford Street curb line shall be removed and replaced with non- surmountable curb to match existing curbing. Curbs proposed to be replaced shall have a minimum of 3 feet of bituminous saw cut out to allow for proper compaction.
- o Utility trenches shall be restored by the Developer per City standard plate.
- Sidewalk construction: The Developer shall construct all sidewalk improvements determined to be necessary by the City to serve the Property, including the construction of Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliant curb ramps and sidewalks.
 - Sidewalk facilities including curb ramps and driveway crossings, shall be constructed in accordance with City details, specifications, and the City approved Public Improvement Construction Plans.
 - All sidewalk facilities shall be ADA compliant and meet the latest Public Rights of Way Accessibility Guide (PROWAG) requirements.
- All costs for the improvements will be paid by the developer. The estimated cost of construction of the public infrastructure is \$106,850. The developer will provide a financial security in the amount of 125% of the estimated cost of construction (\$133,562.50) in the event the developer fails to perform.
- The City would provide oversite on the construction. The Developer will pay the City \$4,274.00 for these inspection services.
- The attached contract has been reviewed by the City Attorney.

49 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

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- The estimated cost of these improvements based on preliminary figures provided by the developer's engineering consultant is approximately \$106,850.00.
- The contract as presented has the developer paying for all the costs of the improvement including; design, inspection, construction and city staff time related to the improvement.

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PUBLIC IMPROVEMENT CONTRACT CHERRYWOOD POINTE AT LEXINGTON

- I. **Parties.** This Agreement, dated ______, 2016, is entered into between the City of Roseville, a Minnesota municipal corporation, whose address is 2660 Civic Center Drive, Roseville, Minnesota 55113 ("the City"), and Cherrywood Pointe of Roseville at Lexington LLC, a Minnesota limited liability company (the "Owner") whose address is 3600 American Boulevard W, Suite 750, Bloomington, MN 55431 (the "Developer").
- II. **Request for Plat approval.** The Developer has asked the City to approve a plat of land to be known as "Cherrywood Pointe at Lexington" (also referred to in this Agreement as the "Plat"). The land is legally described as follows:

See Legal Description attached as Exhibit A hereto (the "Property").

- III. Terms and Conditions of Plat Approval. For good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties agree as follows:
- A. Plat Approval: Subject to the terms and conditions of this Public Improvement Contract, the recitals above, and all other applicable City Code provisions, the City hereby approves the recording of the Plat.
- B. Land Use: A senior housing facility will be built on the Property.
- C. **Public Improvements.** The Developer shall, subject to the terms and conditions contained herein, perform the following work and construct the following improvements ("Public Improvements") in compliance with City approved Public Improvement Construction Plans described in Section III D below and all rules, regulations, standards and ordinances of the City:
 - 1. Site Grading and Turf Restoration. The Developer shall grade the Property in accordance with the Grading, Drainage and Erosion Control Plan. Site grading improvements shall include common excavation, subgrade correction, embankment and pond excavation. The Developer shall perform turf restoration on the Property which shall include seeding, mulching and erosion control.
 - a) The Developer shall submit the Grading, Drainage and Erosion Control Plan prior to installation of the improvements.
 - b) All improvements to the Property and the final grading shall comply with the Grading, Drainage and Erosion Control Plan.

2. Sanitary sewer construction: The developer shall construct a new City owned sanitary 1 sewer main to serve the City and to serve the Property. This sanitary sewer main will 2 replace any exiting sanitary sewer main serving the Property. 3 a) Sanitary sewer facilities, including manholes and pipe, shall be constructed in 4 accordance with City details, specifications, and the City approved Public Improvement 5 Construction Plans. 6 b) The existing sanitary sewer main shall remain operational until the new main is 7 8

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- operational or the existing sewer flow shall be bypassed properly during the construction of the new sanitary sewer main.
- 3. Storm sewer construction: The Developer shall construct all storm sewer improvements determined to be necessary by the City to serve the Property, including the construction of outlet control structures and flared end sections.
 - a) Storm sewer facilities, including ponds and infiltration basins, shall be constructed in accordance with City details, specifications, and the City approved Public Improvement Construction Plans.
 - b) Infiltration basins shall be protected from silt during construction. If these areas do not function as designed, the Developer shall reconstruct them as directed by the City Engineer.
- 4. Restoration of existing streets: Curb cuts and street cuts shall be reconstructed to match existing street typical section.
 - a) All unused curb openings along Lexington Avenue, Woodhill Drive, and Oxford Street curb line shall be removed and replaced with non-surmountable curb to match existing curbing. Curbs proposed to be replaced shall have a minimum of 3 feet of bituminous saw cut out to allow for proper compaction.
 - b) Utility trenches shall be restored by the Developer per City standard plate.
- 5. Sidewalk construction: The Developer shall construct all sidewalk improvements determined to be necessary by the City to serve the Property, including the construction of Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliant curb ramps and sidewalks.
 - a) Sidewalk facilities including curb ramps and driveway crossings, shall be constructed in accordance with City details, specifications, and the City approved Public Improvement Construction Plans.
 - b) All sidewalk facilities shall be ADA compliant and meet the latest Public Rights of Way Accessibility Guide (PROWAG) requirements.
- 6. Erosion control. Prior to the commencement of any grading and before any utility construction is commenced or building permits are issued, the erosion control plan must be implemented, inspected and approved by the City. The Developer shall meet all requirements of the City's Erosion Control Ordinance including but not limited to the following:
 - a) No construction activity shall be allowed and no building permits shall be issued unless the Property is in full compliance with the erosion control requirements.

- b) Erosion control measures shall be installed in compliance with MPCA NPDES permit requirements.
 - c) The City will inspect the site periodically and determine whether it is necessary to take additional measures to address erosion. The Developer shall promptly comply with all reasonable City supplemental instructions.
 - d) To remove dirt and debris from streets that has resulted from construction work by the Developer, its agents or assigns, the Developer shall sweep streets on a weekly basis or more frequently as directed by the City Engineer until the site is stabilized. The Developer must sweep roadways with a water-discharge broom apparatus. Kick-off brooms shall not be utilized for street sweeping.
 - e) If the Property development does not comply with the erosion control plan or supplementary instructions received from the City, the City may, following 48-hour prior verbal notice to the Developer (or immediately in the case of an emergency), take such action as the City deems appropriate to control erosion, the cost of which action shall be paid by the Developer to the City upon demand.
 - D. **Development Plans.** The Property shall be developed in accordance with the following plans, specifications and other documents ("Plans") and Development Conditions set forth on Exhibit "B" attached hereto. With the exception of the Plat, the Plans may be prepared after the parties have entered into this Agreement, provided however, no work shall be commenced on the Property until all of the Plans have been submitted to and approved by the City. The Plans shall not be attached to this Agreement, but shall be retained in the City files while the work to be done under this Agreement is being performed. If the Plans vary from the written terms of this Agreement, the written terms shall control. The Plans (which are sometimes referred to herein as the "Public Improvement Construction Plans") are as follows:
 - a) Plat

- b) Civil Site Plan
- c) Grading, Drainage and Erosion Control Plan
- d) Sidewalk Plans
- e) Curbing and Paving Plan
- f) Utility Plans
- g) Sanitary Sewer Plans
- h) Details
- i) Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan
- i) Tree Preservation Plan
- k) Other
- E. **Notice to Proceed.** The improvements shall be installed in accordance with the Plans and the rules, regulations, standards and ordinances of the City. The plans and specifications shall be prepared by a competent registered professional engineer, furnished to the City for review, and shall be subject to the approval of the City Engineer. No work shall commence on the Property until the City Engineer notifies the Developer that the work can commence.

1. The Developer shall obtain all necessary permits from the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA), and other agencies and governmental authorities before proceeding with construction. Copies of these permits must be provided to the City Engineer.

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- 2. The Developer or its engineer shall schedule a preconstruction meeting at a mutually agreeable time at City Hall with all the parties concerned, including City staff, to review the program for the construction work.
- 3. The Plat complies with all City, County, Metropolitan, State and Federal laws and regulations including, but not limited to: subdivision ordinances, zoning ordinances and environmental regulations. If the City determines that the Plat does not comply, the City may, Following thirty (30) days written notice, refuse to allow further construction or development work on the Property until such time as the Plat is corrected.
- F. **Time of Performance.** The Developer shall complete all required improvements enumerated in Paragraph C by October 31, 2017. The Developer may, however, forward a request for an extension of time to the City. If an extension is granted, it shall be conditioned upon updating the security posted by the Developer to reflect cost increases and the extended completion date.
- G. **Inspection.** The Developer shall provide the services of a Project Representative and assistants at the site to provide continuous observation of the work to be performed and the improvements to be constructed under this Agreement.
 - 1. The Developer shall provide the City Engineer a minimum of one business day notice prior to the commencement of the underground pipe laying; and prior to subgrade, gravel base and bituminous surface construction.
 - 2. Developer's failure to comply with the terms of this section shall permit the City Engineer to issue a stop work order which may result in a rejection of the work and which shall obligate the Developer to take all reasonable steps, as directed by the City Engineer to ensure that the improvements are constructed and inspected pursuant to the terms of this Agreement; and shall further result in the assessment of a penalty, in an amount equal to 1% per occurrence, of the amount of the security required for Developer improvements, which amount the Developer agrees to pay to the City upon demand.
- H. **Engineering Coordination**. A City Engineering Coordinator shall be assigned to this project to provide further protection for the City against defects and deficiencies in the work and improvements through the observations of the work in progress and field checks of materials and equipment. However, the furnishing of such engineering coordination will not make the City responsible for construction means, methods, techniques, sequences or procedures or for the safety precautions or programs, or for the Contractors failure to perform his work in accordance with the Plans. The Developer is obligated to pay the City for City inspection services an amount equal to 4% of the estimated cost of the Public Improvements which includes the public sidewalk and public sanitary sewer main, which amount is \$4,274. This amount shall be paid at or prior to the execution of this Agreement.
- I. Security. To guarantee compliance with the terms of this Agreement, payment of the costs of all Public Improvements and construction of all Public Improvements, the Developer shall furnish either: a) a cash deposit, or b) an irrevocable letter of credit for \$133,562.50 in a form to be approved 42 by the City (the "Financial Security"). The amount of the Financial Security is 125% of the 43

estimated cost to construct the Public Improvements. The City shall have the right to draw on the Letter of Credit in the event that the Developer fails to perform any of its obligations under this Agreement.

- 1. **Reduction of Security.** Periodically upon the Developer's written request, the City Engineer may reduce the amount of the Financial Security for completed Public Improvements provided the following conditions are met:
 - a) The Developer's engineer certifies that the Public improvements have been constructed to City Standards and in accordance with the Plans.
 - b) The Developer provides documentation that its contractors and all their subcontractors and suppliers have been paid in full for the work completed and materials supplied.
 - c) The City Engineer determines that such Public Improvements have been fully completed in accordance with the Plans, specifications and provisions of this Agreement.

The amount of reduction shall be equal to that portion of the Financial Security which covers such completed Public Improvements; provided however, in no case shall the remaining amount of the Financial Security be less than the greater of: (i) 25% of the original amount of the Financial Security, or (ii) 125% of the estimated cost to complete the Public Improvements which have not been completed as determined by the City Engineer.

- 2. **Release of Security**. This Agreement shall run with the Property and may be recorded against the title to the Property. After the work described in this Agreement has been completed, the Developer may request that the City accept the Public Improvements. This is accomplished through a City Council resolution provided the following conditions are met:
 - a) **As-built Survey**. The Developer shall provide an as-built survey of the sanitary sewer and public sidewalk upon completion of the Public Improvements described in Paragraph C in reproducible and digital (AutoCAD) format. The locations and elevations of sewer and water services shall be accurately shown on the survey.
 - b) **Certification.** The Developer's engineer submits a letter certifying that the Public Improvements have been constructed to City Standards in accordance with the Plans and requests that the City accept the Public Improvements.
 - c) **Payment.** The Developer provides documentation that its contractors and their subcontractors and suppliers have been paid in full for the work completed and the materials supplied.
 - d) **Determination of Completion.** The City Engineer and the City Council have determined that all Public Improvements have been completed in accordance with the Plans, specifications and terms of this Agreement.

The date of City acceptance of the Public Improvements shall be the date of the City Council resolution accepting the Public Improvements. Upon Developer's request, the City shall issue a Release, in recordable form, that serves to memorialize the completion of all the obligation of the Developer hereunder.

In the event that a Letter of Credit is given as the Financial Security the term of any Letter of Credit provided by the Developer must be at least one year. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained herein, in the event that: i) some or all of the Public Improvements have not been completed and accepted by the City before the expiration date of the Letter of Credit, ii) the City has been notified that the Letter of Credit is not being extended for another term of at least one year, and iii) no replacement Letter of Credit satisfactory to the City has been delivered to the City, the City shall have the right to draw on the full amount of the Letter of Credit at any time prior to the expiration of the Letter of Credit. In the event of such draw on the Letter of Credit, the City shall have the right to use the amount drawn to complete any unfinished Public Improvements, perform any unperformed obligations of the Developer, pay the costs to draw on the Letter of Credit and/or pay any costs to enforce this Agreement. The Letter of Credit shall allow Partial Draws and shall provide that a draw can be made on the Letter of Credit at a location which is in or within 30 miles of the City of Roseville.

- J. Ownership of Improvements and Risk of Loss. Upon completion and City acceptance of the Public Improvements, all Public Improvements lying within public rights-of-way and easements shall become City property without further notice or action, except as follows: None. The Developer shall be responsible for the risk of loss of all Public Improvements constructed by the Developer until ownership thereof passes to the City. Any damage or destruction, in whole or in part, to any Public Improvement constructed by the Developer shall be repaired and/or replaced by the Developer until ownership of such Public Improvement passes to the City. The following special requirements shall apply with respect to the maintenance of Public Improvements which have been completed and accepted by the City: The maintenance of the sidewalk shall be the Developer's responsibility per city ordinance.
- K. Warranty. The Developer shall install and construct the Public Improvements in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement. The Developer warrants the Public Improvements and all work required to be performed by the Developer hereunder against poor material and faulty workmanship for a period of two (2) years after its completion and acceptance by the City. The Developer shall repair or replace as directed by the City and at the Developer's sole cost and expense: (i) any and all faulty work, (ii) any and all poor quality and/or defective materials, and (iii) any and all trees, plantings, grass and/or sod which are dead, are not of good quality and/or are diseased, as determined in the sole but reasonable opinion of the City or its Engineer, provided the City or its Engineer gives notice of such defect to Developer with respect to such items on or before 60 days following the expiration of the two year warranty period. The Developer shall post maintenance bonds or other security acceptable to the City to secure the warranties described herein, which bonds or other security shall be in addition to the Financial Security described herein.
 - L. **License**. The Developer hereby grants the City, its agents, employees, officers and contractors a license to enter the Property to perform all work and inspections deemed appropriate by the City during the installation of the Public Improvements. This license shall expire after the Property has been completely developed and all of the Public Improvements have been accepted by the City.
 - M. **Construction Management.** The Developer and its contractors and subcontractors shall minimize impacts from construction on the surrounding neighborhood as follows:
 - 1. Definition of Construction Area. The limits of the Project Area shall be defined with heavy-duty erosion control fencing approved by the City Engineer. Any grading,

construction or other work outside this area requires approval by the City Engineer and the affected property owner.

- 2. Parking and Storage of Materials. Adequate on-site parking for construction vehicles and employees must be provided or provisions must be made to have employees park off-site and be shuttled to the Project Area. No parking of construction vehicles or employee vehicles shall occur along Lexington Ave. No fill, excavating material or construction materials shall be stored in the public right-of-way.
- 3. Hours of Construction. Hours of construction, including moving of equipment shall be limited to the hours between 7 a.m. and 9 p.m. on weekdays and between 9 a.m. and 9 p.m. on weekends.
- 4. Site Maintenance. The Developer shall ensure the contractor maintains a clean work site. Measures shall be taken to prevent debris, refuse or other materials from leaving the site. Construction debris and other refuse generated from the project shall be removed from the site in a timely fashion and/or upon the request by the City Engineer. After the Developer has received twenty-four (24) hour verbal notice, the City shall have the right to complete or contract to complete the site maintenance work at the Developer's expense, which amount the Developer shall pay to the City upon demand.
- N. Certificate of Insurance. The Developer shall provide, prior to the commencement of any site work or other development of the Property, evidence that it has insurance in the form of a Certificate of Insurance issued by a company authorized to do business in the State of Minnesota, which includes workman's compensation and general liability. Limits for bodily injury and death shall not be less than \$1,000,000 for one person and \$1,500,000 per occurrence. Limits for property damages shall be not less than \$500,000 for each occurrence. The City shall be included as an additional insured on general liability and property damage policies. The Developer shall provide the City with a renewal certificate of insurance at least 30 days prior to the expiration date of any policy required hereunder.
- O. All Costs Responsibility of Developer. The Developer shall pay all costs incurred by it and the City in conjunction with this Agreement, the approval of the Plat, the development of the Property, and the construction of the improvements required by this Agreement, including but not limited to, all costs of persons doing work or furnishing skills, tools, machinery and materials; insurance premiums; Letter of Credit fees and bond premiums; legal, planning and engineering fees; the preparation and recording of this Agreement and all easements and other documents relating to the Plat and the Property; and all costs incurred pertaining to the inspection and monitoring of the work performed and improvements constructed on the Property. The City shall not be obligated to pay the Developer or any of its agents or contractors for any costs incurred in connection with the construction of the improvements or the development of the Property. The Developer agrees to defend, indemnify, and hold the City and its mayor, councilmembers, employees, agents and contractors harmless from any and all claims of whatever kind or nature which may arise as a result of the construction of the improvements, the development of the Property or the acts of the Developer, and its employees, agents or contractors in connection thereto.
 - 1. The Developer shall defend, indemnify, and hold the City and its mayor, councilmembers and employees harmless from claims made by itself and third parties for damages

sustained or costs incurred resulting from Plat approval, development of the Property, construction of the improvements or other work performed on the Property. The Developer shall defend, indemnify, and hold the City and its mayor, councilmembers and employees harmless for all costs, damages or expenses which the City may pay or incur in consequence of such claims, including attorney's fees.

- 2. The Developer shall pay, or cause to be paid when due, and in any event before any penalty is attached, all charges, costs and fees referred to in this Agreement. This is a personal obligation of the Developer and shall continue in full force and effect even if the Developer sells one or more lots, all of the Property, or any part of it.
- 3. The Developer shall pay in full all bills submitted to it by the City for obligations incurred under this Agreement within thirty (30) days after receipt. If the bills are not paid on time, the City may, in addition to all other rights and remedies the City may have, halt development and construction work on the Property including, but not limited to, the issuance of building permits for lots which the Developer may or may not have sold, until the bills are paid in full. Bills not paid within thirty (30) days shall accrue interest at the rate of ten percent (10%) per year, or the maximum amount allowed by law, whichever is less.
- 4. The Developer shall reimburse the City for all costs incurred in the enforcement of this Agreement, including all attorney and engineering fees.
- 5. In addition to the charges referred to herein, other charges may be imposed such as, but not limited to, sewer availability charges ("SAC"), City water connection charges, City sewer connection charges, City storm water connection charges and building permit fees. The Developer shall pay all such other charges and fees upon being billed by the City.
- P. Default. In the event of default by the Developer as to any of the work to be performed by it hereunder, the City may, at its option, perform the work and the Developer shall promptly reimburse the City for any expense incurred by the City, provided the Developer is first given notice of the work in default not less than 48 hours in advance or immediately before the City commences performing such work in the event of an emergency. This Agreement is a license for the City to act, and it shall not be necessary for the City to seek a court order for permission to enter the Property. When the City does any such work, the City may, in addition to its other remedies, assess the cost in whole or in part, against the Developer and/or the Property.
- Q. Remedies. Upon the occurrence of a breach of this Agreement by the Developer, the City, in addition to any other remedy which may be available to it, shall have the right to do any or all of the following:
 - 1. City may make advances or take other steps to cure the default, and where necessary, enter the Property for that purpose. The Developer shall pay all sums so advanced or expenses incurred by the City upon demand, with interest from the date of such advances or expenses at the rate of ten percent (10%) per annum or the maximum allowed by law, whichever is less. No action taken by the City pursuant to this section shall be deemed to relieve the Developer from curing any such default or from any other default hereunder. The City shall not be obligated, by virtue of the existence or the exercise of this right, to perform any such act or cure any such default.

- Obtain an order from a court of competent jurisdiction requiring the Developer to specifically perform its obligations pursuant to the terms and provisions of this Agreement.
 Obtain an order from a court of competent jurisdiction enjoining the continuation of an
 - 3. Obtain an order from a court of competent jurisdiction enjoining the continuation of an event of default.
 - 4. Halt all development work and construction of improvements until such time as the event of default is cured.
 - 5. Withhold the issuance of a building permit and/or prohibit the occupancy of any structure(s) for which permits have been issued.
 - 6. Draw upon and utilize the Developer's Financial Security to cover the costs of the City in order to correct the default, the costs to complete any unfinished Public Improvements, the costs to draw on the Financial Security and/ or the costs to enforce this Agreement.
 - 7. Terminate this Agreement by written notice to Developer at which time all terms and conditions contained herein shall be of no further force or effect and all obligations of the parties imposed hereunder shall be null and void.
 - 8. Exercise any other remedies which may be available to it at law or in equity.

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In addition to the remedies and amounts payable set forth or permitted above, upon the occurrence of an event of default, the Developer shall pay to the City all fees and expenses, including attorneys fees, incurred by the City as a result of the event of default, whether or not a lawsuit or other action is formally taken.

- The Developer shall defend, indemnify, and hold the City and its mayor, councilmembers,
- employees, agents and contractors harmless from any liability or damages, including reasonable
- 24 attorneys fees, which may be incurred as a result of the exercise of the City's rights pursuant to this Agreement.
- 26 R. Assignment. The Developer may not assign this Agreement without the written permission of the Roseville City Council.
- S. Notices to the Developer. Required notices to the Developer shall be in writing, and shall be either hand delivered to Mark Nelson, or an officer, employee or agent of the Developer, or mailed to the Developer by registered or certified mail at the following address:

- 1. The Developer shall comply with any and all applicable City, County, Metropolitan, State and Federal laws and regulations including, but not limited to: subdivision ordinances, zoning ordinances and environmental regulations that may apply to the Plat, the development of the Property, and the construction of the Public Improvements described herein.
- 2. The terms and conditions of this Agreement shall inure to the benefit of and shall be binding upon the parties hereto, and their respective successors and assigns.
- 3. The obligations of all parties signing this Agreement as a Developer shall be joint and several.
- 4. If any portion, section, subsection, sentence, clause, paragraph or phrase of this Agreement is for any reason held invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Agreement.
- 5. The action or inaction of the City shall not constitute a waiver or amendment to the provisions of this Agreement. To be binding, amendments or waivers must be in writing, signed by the parties and approved by the Roseville City Council. The City's failure to promptly take legal action to enforce a default under this Agreement shall not be a waiver or release of such default.
- 6. This Agreement shall run with the land and shall be binding upon the Developer, and its successors and assigns. The Developer shall, at its expense, record this Agreement with the Ramsey County Recorder if the Property is abstract property and/or with the Ramsey County Registrar of Titles if the Property is Torrens property. The Developer shall, prior to the time this Agreement is executed and recorded, furnish the City with title evidence and make arrangements satisfactory to the City to confirm that at the time that this Agreement is executed and recorded the Developer is the sole fee simple owner of the Property and that there are no other parties having an interest in, or a lien or encumbrance against the Property. No work shall commence on the Property prior to the recording of this Agreement.
- 7. This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Minnesota. Any legal proceeding pertaining to this Agreement, or the rights or obligations of the parties hereunder, shall be venued in courts or tribunals located in Ramsey County, Minnesota.
- 8. In addition to all other terms and conditions of this Agreement the Developer shall comply with and perform the Conditions of Development attached hereto as Exhibit B.
- 9. No interest shall accrue to the benefit of, or be payable to, the Developer on the Financial Security or any other monetary amount deposited with the City.
- 10. Third parties shall have no recourse against the City under this Agreement.

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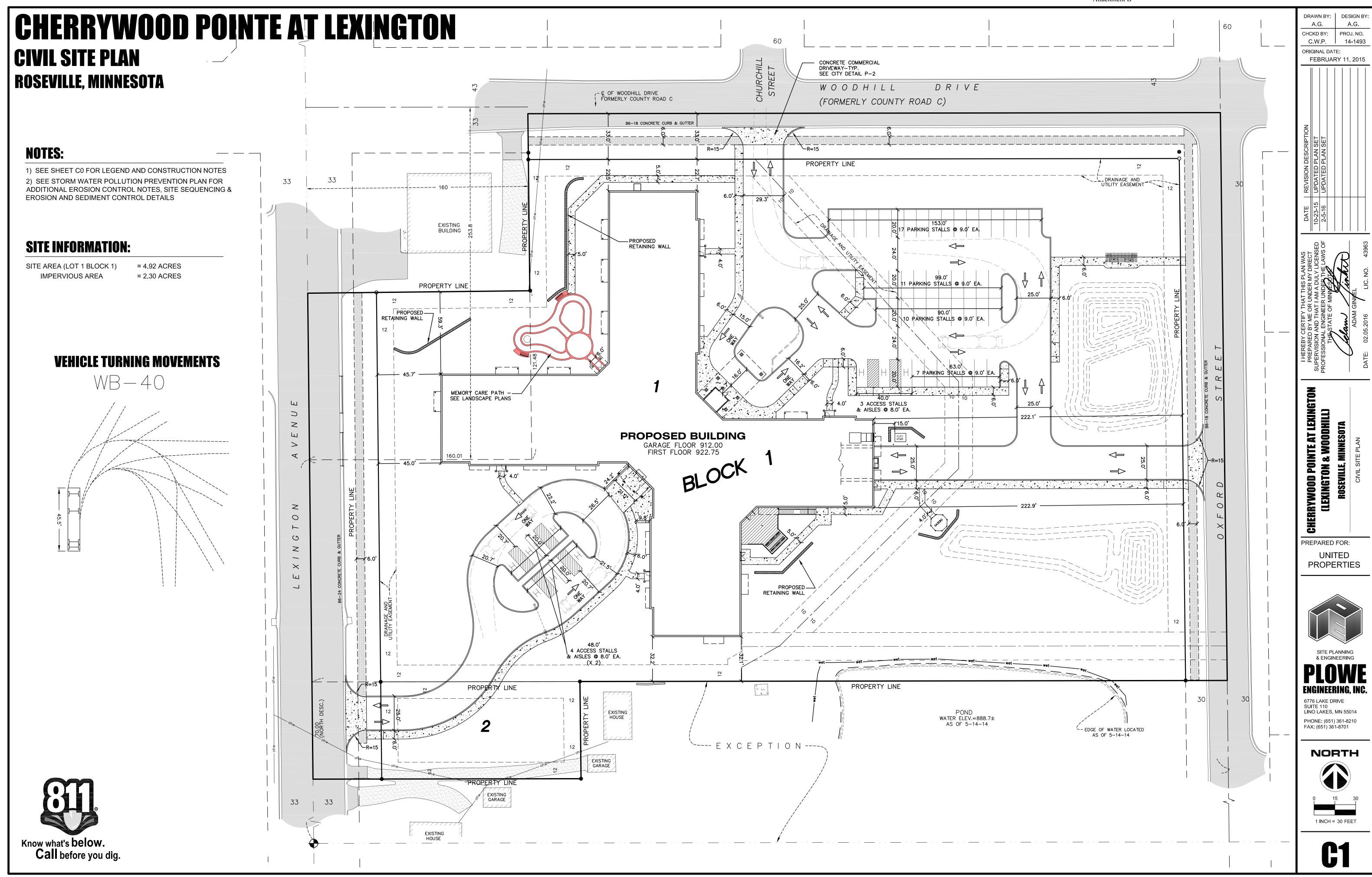
1. All property owners shall either dedicate on the Plat or otherwise convey all roadway, utility, drainage, and other easements required by the City.

2. The access points to enter and exit the Property shall be at locations approved by the City and any other governmental entity having jurisdiction over adjacent roadways.

3. The Developer shall provide the City proof that the Developer/Owner is the fee simple owner of all of the Property included in the Plat and that there are no liens, encumbrances or other parties having an interest in the Property at the time the Plat and the Development Agreement are recorded, or make other arrangements which are reasonably satisfactory to the City to assure that title to the Property following the recording of the Plat and the Development Agreement shall be acceptable to the City.

4. The Developer shall pay all unpaid City subdivision review and other fees prior to the City releasing the Plat for recording.

5. No building permits shall be issued for any use of the Property which is not a permitted use.

1 PRELIMINARY PLAT ACTION

- 2 On August 5, 2015, the Planning Commission unanimously recommended approval of the
- 3 proposed preliminary plat, subject to certain conditions, and the City Council subsequently
- 4 approved the preliminary plat on August 24, 2015, by unanimous vote and with the following
- 5 conditions.

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- **a.** The Public Works Department shall approve easements, grading and drainage, storm water management, and utility requirements as necessary to meet the applicable standards prior to the approval of the final plat or issuance of permits for site improvements;
- **b.** Permits for site improvements shall not be issued without evidence of an approved permit from the watershed district:
- c. Final plat approval shall not be issued without approval of a tree preservation plan, accounting for any changes to grading, utility, or storm water plans not yet anticipated, by the Community Development Department;
- d. Vacation of the existing sewer easement and dedication of the proposed replacement sewer easement shall be addressed in conjunction with the Public Improvement Contract that will be required for the reconstruction of the sewer infrastructure related to those easements;
- e. The applicant shall pay park dedication fees in the amount of \$3,500.00 per unit;
- f. The applicant shall complete a traffic study for this project. The traffic study will be reviewed by, and any required mitigation efforts approved by, the City Engineer prior to the issuance of a building permit; and

g. The applicant is aware that any future variance requests will be reviewed on their merits, and the platting process does not have any impact on the variance process, if needed, in the future.

FINAL PLAT APPLICATION

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- The final plat documents, included with this RCA as Exhibit A, conform to the approved preliminary plat with respect to the arrangement and size of lots, dedications of rights-of-way, and drainage and utility easements, all of which conform to the applicable standards of the subdivision code. The conditions of preliminary plat approval have all been satisfied as follows:
- a. The Public Works Department shall approve easements, grading and drainage, storm water management, and utility requirements as necessary to meet the applicable standards prior to the approval of the final plat or issuance of permits for site improvements.

 Public Works staff has approved these plans and easements as proposed.
- b. Permits for site improvements shall not be issued without evidence of an approved permit from the watershed district.
 The Ramsey-Washington Metro Watershed District has given its preliminary approval of the plans, which is typical of this stage of development; this condition is satisfied, but approved

37 permits are still required.

- c. Final plat approval shall not be issued without approval of a tree preservation plan,
 accounting for any changes to grading, utility, or storm water plans not yet anticipated, by the
 Community Development Department.
- The tree preservation and replacement plan submitted with this plat proposal is included with this RCA as Exhibit B. Roseville's consulting registered arborist has reviewed the tree preservation plan and generally found it to be adequate, but had the following comments about implementation of the plan.
 - 1. [Mark] would like to see a detailed plan for the fencing included in the specs. Steel posts, 6 feet apart, orange fencing, as is requested in the new ordinance.
 - 2. Per ordinance, the oak wilt season starts March 15th. It's best to wait until after that date to begin working in oak trees, especially with the immediate neighbors having some nice oak trees in their yards. If absolutely necessary, they can have someone on hand to seal wounds per city ordinance, stumps included.
 - 3. [Mark is] uncertain of timeline for transplanting oaks, but that should be determined as springtime would be best.
 - 4. Proposed fence in SW corner of property should be extended to street if catalpa is to be preserved.
 - 5. Proposed linden trees by north entrance may cause site line issues. Possibly some trees could be planted across the street as they are on Oxford St.
 - 6. Driplines are not included for trees being preserved. Ideally they would be projected onto plan at 1.25 times diameter of tree per ordinance for minimum tree fencing placement thresholds
 - 7. Plant schedule looks good

- d. Vacation of the existing sewer easement and dedication of the proposed replacement sewer easement shall be addressed in conjunction with the Public Improvement Contract that will be required for the reconstruction of the sewer infrastructure related to those easements.

 The vacation has been approved, and a Notice of Completion will be issued once the sewer is realigned in the new easement as proposed.
- e. The applicant shall pay park dedication fees in the amount of \$3,500.00 per unit; 66 The purchase agreement that pertains to both the Cherrywood Pointe and Applewood Pointe 67 sites includes payment of \$350,000 for park dedication fees (equal to 100 units at \$3,500 per 68 unit) for the Cherrywood Pointe development, which serves as a waiver of 100 units worth of 69 park dedication fees from the total obligation of the development. Because the total number 70 of units in the Cherrywood Pointe development is not specified as part of the final plat 71 application, the balance of the park dedication fee for units in excess of 100 should be paid 72 at the time building permits are issued. This condition does not require any specific action at 73 this time, but is a recommended as a condition of final plat approval. 74
- The applicant shall complete a traffic study for this project. The traffic study will be reviewed by, and any required mitigation efforts approved by, the City Engineer prior to the issuance of a building permit.

 The traffic study has been completed. No major ramifications from the proposed development
- The traffic study has been completed. No major ramifications from the proposed development were identified, but any required mitigations will be specified in the Public Improvement Contract.
- g. The applicant is aware that any future variance requests will be reviewed on their merits, and the platting process does not have any impact on the variance process, if needed, in the future.
 - This condition does not require any specific action at this time. No variances are being requested, and this is not a recommended condition of final plat approval.

OTHER COMMENTS

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- Lot 2 Block 1 of the plat essentially comprises the City-owned portion of the subject property.

 The purchase agreement noted above will transfer this land to United Properties, but will grant an easement to Roseville in order to ensure access from Lexington Avenue to potential future developments south of the Cherrywood Pointe site. This access easement does not appear on the plat, but it doesn't need to; it would be accounted for in the purchase agreement.
- The recently-adopted tree preservation ordinance provided some options for meeting tree replacement obligations that remained when a tree replacement plan cannot reasonably accommodate the full amount of replacement trees on a development site. Specifically, the City can direct that some or all of the remaining replacement trees be planted on public lands, presumably in conjunction with public works projects or parks improvements, or the City can accept a fee in lieu of trees, to be saved in a "tree fund" and used to acquire and plant trees in various places, as the need arises.
- Beyond the trees to be re-planted on site, United Properties is responsible for 1,298 remaining caliper inches of replacement trees. Assuming that replacement trees are equal to the 3-inch caliper minimum requirements, that would be 433 trees; further, if the City Council establishes a fee of \$500 per tree, the equivalent fee in lieu of trees would be \$216,500. But the new tree preservation code caps that fee at 10% of the Fair Market Value (FMV) of the site; Ramsey

- 104 County's 2015 land value estimate for tax year 2016 (Roseville's standard reference for FMV)
- is \$639,200 for the three parcels involved in the site. This means that the cash-in-lieu amount
- for the remaining obligation would be reduced to \$63,920, which, at \$500 per tree, is equivalent
- to 128 trees.
- The Directors of the Public Works and Parks and Recreation Departments are currently
- considering their respective needs for trees on public lands in a timeframe that coincides with
- the development of the subject property. Depending on the City Council's preference, the
- applicant could be required to plant all of those 128 trees on public lands, or pay the fee of
- \$63,920 in lieu of planting those trees, or contribute an equivalent combination of cash and trees
- planted on public lands, pursuant to a current need for such plantings. In the absence of specific
- recommendations for planting on public lands, Planning Division staff recommends accepting
- the cash fee in lieu trees, because those funds can be used for planting trees at any time.
- United Properties has inquired, about some alternative "in kind" payments of the cash-in-lieu
- fee. For instance, the applicant has indicated the capacity for planting some of the trees
- calculated in this fee at their nearby, proposed Applewood Pointe at Central Park development.
- Perhaps more compelling, however, is the applicant's suggestion that they could alert nearby
- homeowners that United Properties is giving away trees which the homeowners could plant in
- their yards. In either case, the incremental fee associated with each tree given to neighbors or
- planted at the Applewood Pointe property could be credited against the total cash obligation. If
- United Properties were to seek support for these alternative, in-kind options, they would submit
- a future request to the City Council since this issue is not germane to action on the final plat.

RECOMMENDED ACTIONS

- Adopt a resolution approving the Cherrywood Pointe at Lexington final plat, dated
- December 4, 2015, and generally comprising the property at 2668 2688 Lexington Avenue,
- based on the findings and recommendation of this RCA, subject to the following condition:
- Pursuant to City Code §1103.07 and condition "e" of the August 24, 2015, approval of the
- 130 Cherrywood Pointe at Lexington preliminary plat, and the purchase agreement pertaining to the

Tree Replacement Considerations

The new City of Roseville tree replacement requirements (December, 2015) indicate a total replacement requirement of 1,930 caliper inches. The proposed landscape plan shows a total of 450 deciduous caliper inches and 182 coniferous caliper inches, leaving an overall deficit of 1,298 caliper inches.

This calculation is based on only accounting for the tree sizes meeting the new requirements (3" caliper or greater for deciduous and 8' high for conifers) which were based on the following assumptions for conifer trees:

8' Conifer Tree = 3 cal. Inches

10' Conifer Tree = 4 cal inches

12' Conifer Tree = 6 cal inches

The proposed landscape plan includes a variety of new plantings in order to create a more natural landscape with more noticeable screening. The site plan also saves a number of existing trees along the perimeter in certain areas to leave a more natural landscape buffer intact. Where the tree replacement plan requirements are typically more suitable for onemercial sites that require more screening and use fewer shrubs, the proposed senior and memory care facility typically involves more diverse plantings and specialty garden areas that include significantly higher amounts of shrubs and perennial plantings for a more desirable and therapeutic landscape setting. There is a memory care garden proposed, along with several garden-type settings and overlook areas on the site in order to provide the users with outdoor settings that are pleasing to the residents.

The site is further limited to accommodate the tree requirements due to the utility easements that prohibit large plantings within them, the stormwater / infiltration basins that can only have a perennial cover with some shrubs and plantings along the perimeter, and simply allowing enough open turf space in contrast to the densely planted areas. From previous experience with related site plans, along with feedback from residents, maintaining some turf lawn spaces is a highly desirable feature to include for the residents.

The developer would like to suggest the following be considered for approval to count towards the landscape requirements based on monetary value:

(2) 1.5" cal trees = (1) 3" cal. tree

(10) 5-gal potted plants = (1) 3" cal. tree

(20) 1-gal potted plants = (1) 3" cal. tree

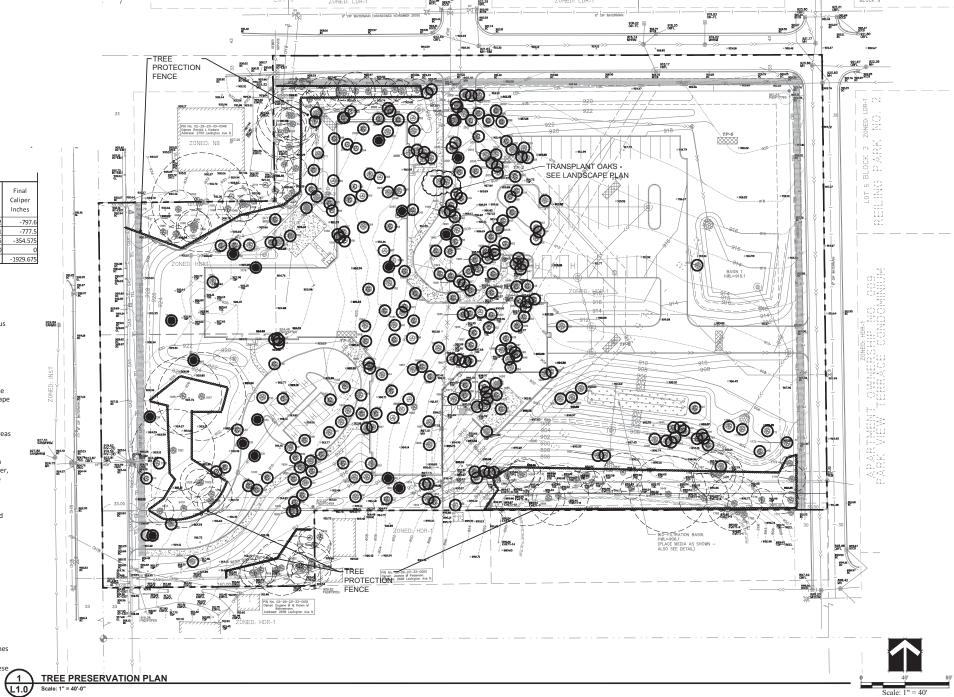
Following this formula the following would be applicable:

(43) 1.5" cal trees = 64 cal inches

(400) 5-gal plants = 120 cal inches

1800) 1-gal plants = 270 cal inch

This equates a total of 454 caliper inches of non-conforming material subtracted from 1,298 for a remainder of 844 caliper inches to be accommodated in another means. It may be possible to fulfill some of the remaining trees at the Applewood Pointe of Roseville Central Park location. There is potential to have an extra 400 caliper inches available at that site to count towards these requirements.

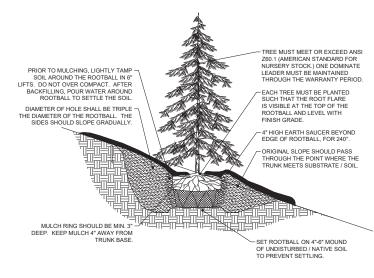

Extract of the January 11, 2016, Roseville City Council Meeting Minutes

a. Request for Approval of a Preliminary Plat at 934 Woodhill Drive and 2659 Victoria Street

City Planner Thomas Paschke briefly reviewed this Preliminary Plat request ad detailed in the RCA dated January 11, 2016. Mr. Paschke advised that since last coming before this City Council, United Properties had completed purchase of the property from Independent School District No. 623 and was now the sole owner of the property.

Mr. Paschke noted that the result of the plat was to create a lot to develop the Applewood Pointe of Roseville at Central Park for a senior project first, with subsequent dedication of Lot 2 for park purposes.

Mr. Paschke noted that the Preliminary Plat had come before the Planning Commission on December 2, 2015 and approved for recommendation as conditioned to the City Council on a 4/0 vote with two abstentions. While this two-lot plat would separate the development and a city park, Mr. Paschke noted that a large portion of the lot was dedicated for County Road C easement purposes, with all other easements also having been achieved. Mr. Paschke clarified that, due to zoning requirements, the development was not subject to any minimum lot size standards.

To further clarify, Mayor Roe with confirmation by Mr. Paschke, noted that the entire section west of the property at County Road C currently designated as a roadway easement was now being dedicated as a right-of-way instead. Mr. Paschke noted that it would remain a roadway easement as the preliminary plat didn't note its dedication, and further clarified for Mayor Roe that the transaction with United Properties was not related to this particular portion.

Item Description: Larpenteur Sidewalk – Authorization for Approval and Authorization of

BACKGROUND

As part of the focus on South East Roseville, the Community Development and Public Works

- departments have worked together to develop a sidewalk project on Larpenteur Avenue to provide
- 4 safer pedestrian connections. This neighborhood has a significant amount of residents whose major
- 5 form of transportation is walking.
- 6 City staff has worked with Ramsey County Public Works and Ramsey County Housing and
- 7 Redevelopment to develop a sidewalk project and to secure additional funding. The new sidewalk
- 8 would be installed on the north side of Larpenteur Avenue between Galtier Street and Mackubin
- 9 Street. The new sidewalk would provide pedestrian connections to existing sidewalks and pathways
- to both the east and the west.
- 11 Community Development has worked with Ramsey County Housing and Redevelopment (RCHRA)
- to secure additional funding for the project through a Community Development Block Grant
- (CDBG). RCHRA has agreed to pay for the sidewalk project for up to \$186,000. The agreement
- (Attachment B) details out additional contract requirements such as labor and environmental
- provisions and other requirements.
- Ramsey County Public Works has agreed to provide funding per its cost participation policy. The
- 17 County's cost participation in the construction of trails and sidewalks is limited to the grading, base
- material and concrete. The County's policy is to participate at a level of 50% of the cost of the
- sidewalk, but only along County State Aid Highway (CSAH) designated roadways. Due to funding
- availability, this project would be capped at \$76,500. This agreement (Attachment D) will be
- presented to the Ramsey County Board upon approval of the City Council.
- As part of the project, the City will be fixing some storm sewer and adding some additional storm
- sewer to accommodate the sidewalk construction. Costs for storm sewer improvements would be
- paid through the storm water fund.
- The gap in funding and any additional funding needed would be funded though Municipal State Aid
- 26 funds.

FINANCIAL IMPACTS

- The total estimated cost of the sidewalk construction is approximately \$343,520. The project would
- be funded using the following funding sources;

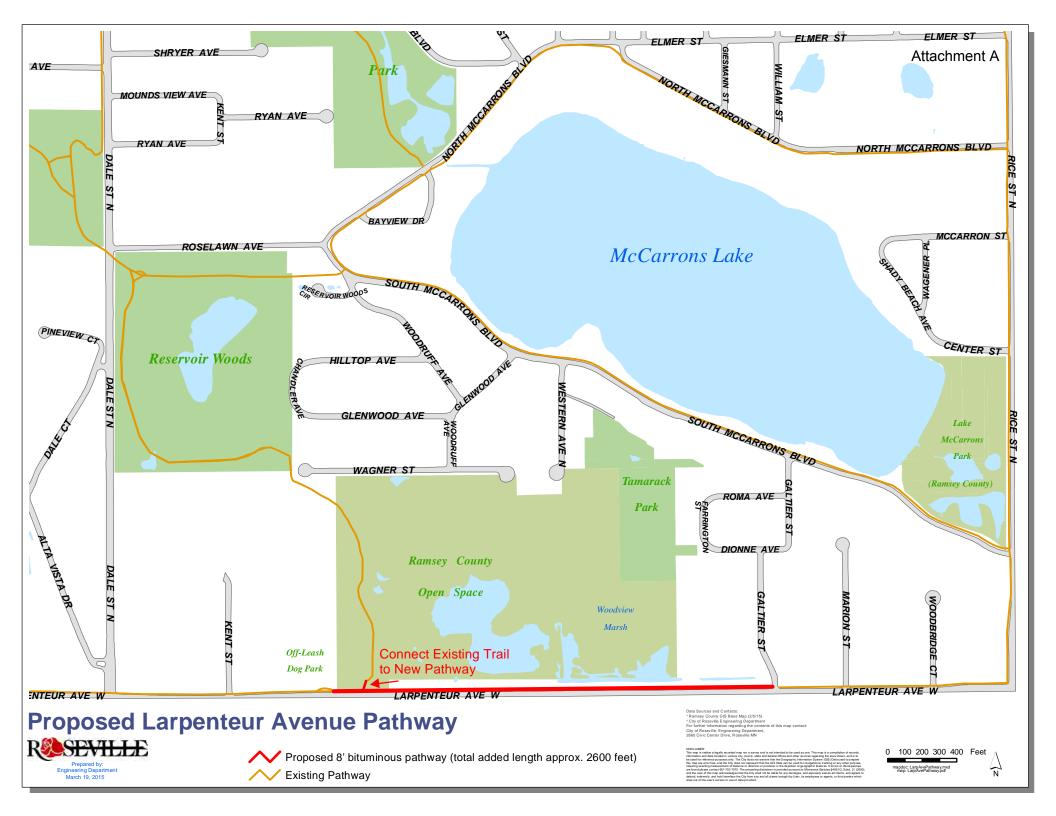

RECITALS

- A. The AUTHORITY is an urban county applicant for block grant funds under the Housing and Community Development Act, 42 U.S.C. §§ 5301-5321 (Act), and will receive block grant funds for the purpose of carrying out eligible community development and housing activities under the Act and under regulations promulgated by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (H.U.D.) at 24 C.F.R., pt. 570;
- B. An Urban County Consortium has been established by a Joint Cooperation Agreement between the AUTHORITY and municipal corporations within Ramsey County, the terms of which specify allocation of block grant funds to those participating jurisdictions for use in accordance with the County Housing Assistance and Community Development Plans accepted by participating jurisdictions and reviewed by H.U.D.;
- C. The AUTHORITY desires to have certain work or services performed by the GRANTEE as described within this agreement, and as authorized by Resolutions of the Ramsey County Housing and Redevelopment Authority Board for the purpose of implementing eligible activities under the Act and H.U.D. regulations;

- D. It is appropriate and mutually desirable that the GRANTEE be designated by the AUTHORITY to undertake the aforementioned eligible activities, so long as the requirements of the Act, H.U.D. regulations, state law, and local law are adhered to, as provided for herein;
- E. The purpose of this Agreement is to provide for cooperation between the AUTHORITY and the GRANTEE, as the parties in this agreement, in implementing such eligible activities in the manner described above;
- F. The parties are authorized and empowered to enter into this Agreement by the Laws of the State of Minnesota:
- G. The attached exhibits as listed below are hereby incorporated in this agreement and made a part hereof: The application letters dated January 12, 2015 and March 4, 2015.
- H. In consideration of payments, covenants, and agreements hereinafter mentioned, to be made and performed by the parties hereto, the parties mutually covenant and agree as provided for in this agreement.

PART 1. GENERAL CONDITIONS

1. SCOPE OF AGREEMENT

The Agreement between the parties shall consist of: the signature page; the general conditions; the federal, state, and local program requirements; the evaluation and record keeping requirements; Attachment A; each and every project exhibit incorporated into the Agreement; all matters and laws incorporated by reference herein; and any written amendments made according to the general conditions. This Agreement supersedes any and all former agreements applicable to projects attached as exhibits to this Agreement.

2. SCOPE OF WORK OR SERVICES

The Grantee shall perform and carry out in a satisfactory and proper manner the work or services set forth in the exhibit(s) attached hereto. In the case of multiple projects, each project shall correspond to a separate exhibit. This Agreement may be amended from time to time, in accordance with the general conditions, for the purpose of adding new projects, amending the scope of work, or for any other lawful purpose.

3. COMMENCEMENT AND TERMINATION OF PROJECTS

Upon release of project related funds by H.U.D. pursuant to federal regulations, the AUTHORITY shall furnish the GRANTEE with written notice to proceed. No work on the project shall occur prior to the notice to proceed without written approval from the

AUTHORITY. Termination dates for individual projects shall be specified in the appropriate exhibits. The termination date may be changed through amendment of this Agreement. In general, a project is expected to be completed within 24 months from the date which the Agreement is executed. Projects which do not show substantial progress within the timespan specified in the application may be terminated at the sole discretion of the AUTHORITY upon 30 days written notice to the GRANTEE.

4. **ADMINISTRATION**

- A. The GRANTEE shall appoint a liaison person who shall be responsible for the overall administration of block grant funded project(s) and coordination with the AUTHORITY. The GRANTEE shall also designate one or more representatives who shall be authorized to sign the monthly Voucher and Reporting Form. The names of the liaison persons and representatives shall be specified in the exhibits.
- B. For all agencies which are presently parties to Joint Cooperation Agreements with the AUTHORITY covering planning, distribution of funds, and program execution under the Act, the GRANTEE remains subject to the provisions of such agreement.

5. COMPENSATION AND METHOD OF PAYMENT

- A. The AUTHORITY shall reimburse the GRANTEE for the work or services specified in the exhibits in an amount not to exceed \$186,000.00. Reimbursement shall be based on a Community Development Voucher and Reporting Form submitted with supporting documents and signed by the GRANTEE's authorized representative.
- B. The GRANTEE shall submit a properly executed Voucher and Reporting Form no later than fifteen (15) working days after the close of each billing period. The AUTHORITY will make payment to the GRANTEE not more than twenty-one (21) working days after said invoice is received and approved by the AUTHORITY. The AUTHORITY will issue a statement of correction voucher in the event that the voucher request is erroneous. Payment does not constitute absolute approval.

6. **OPERATING BUDGET**

The GRANTEE shall apply the funds received from the AUTHORITY under this Agreement in accordance with the requirements of the exhibit(s) attached hereto.

7. FUNDING ALTERNATIVES AND FUTURE SUPPORT

A. The GRANTEE shall report all Program Income generated under this Agreement or generated through the project(s) funded under this Agreement. In the event the GRANTEE receives any Program Income it shall, in the sole discretion of, and at the direction of at the AUTHORITY, either utilize it solely for the purposes set forth in this Agreement or return it to the AUTHORITY. At the end of the program year the AUTHORITY may require remittance of all or part of any program income balances

(including investments thereof) held by the GRANTEE (except those needed for immediate cash needs, cash balances of a revolving loan fund, cash balances from a lump sum drawdown, or cash or investments held for Section 108 security needs).

- B. The AUTHORITY makes no commitment to future support and assumes no obligation for future support of the activities contracted for herein, except as expressly set forth in this Agreement.
- C. Should anticipated sources of revenue not become available to the AUTHORITY for use in the Community Development Block Program, the AUTHORITY shall immediately notify the GRANTEE in writing and the AUTHORITY will be released from all contracted liability for that portion of the Agreement covered by funds not received by the AUTHORITY.

8. AMENDMENTS

Either party may request modifications in the scope of work or services, terms, or conditions of this Agreement. Proposed modifications which are mutually agreed upon shall be incorporated by written amendment to this Agreement. A written amendment may affect a project or projects authorized by this Agreement or may be of general application.

9. ASSIGNMENT AND SUBCONTRACTING

- A. The GRANTEE shall not assign any portion of this Agreement without the written consent of the AUTHORITY, and it is further agreed that said consent must be sought by the GRANTEE not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the date of any proposed assignment.
- B. Any work or services assigned or subcontracted hereunder shall be subject to each provision of this Agreement and proper bidding procedures contained therein. The GRANTEE agrees that it is as fully responsible to the AUTHORITY for the acts and omissions of its subcontractors and of their employees as agents, as it is for the acts and omissions of its own employees and agents.

10. HOLD HARMLESS AND INDEMNIFICATION

- A. The GRANTEE further agrees that it is financially responsible (liable) for any audit exception which occurs due to its negligence or failure to comply with the terms of the Agreement.
- B. The GRANTEE and AUTHORITY mutually agree to hold harmless and defend each other, their officials, officers, employees, agents, representatives, customers, or invitees against any and all claims, lawsuits, damages, or lawsuits for damages arising from or allegedly arising from or related to the PROJECT, including but not limited to the GRANTEE's or the AUTHORITY's acts, failure to act, or failure to perform its obligations hereunder. The GRANTEE and AUTHORITY further agree to pay the

costs of and/or reimburse each other, their officials, officers, employees, agents, representatives, customers, or invitees for any and all liability, costs, and expenses (including without limitation reasonable attorney's fees) incurred in connection therewith. Each party shall promptly notify the other of any claim made for any such damage or loss and afford that party and its counsel the opportunity to contest, compromise, or settle such claim.

C. Nothing in this Agreement shall constitute a waiver by the GRANTEE or AUTHORITY of any statutory limits or exceptions on liability.

11. INSURANCE

- A. GRANTEE shall purchase and maintain such insurance as will protect it from claims which may arise out of, or result from, its operations related to this AGREEMENT, whether such operations be by the GRANTEE or by any subcontractor, or by anyone directly employed by them, or by anyone for whose acts any one of them may be liable.
- B. GRANTEE shall secure the following coverages and comply with all provisions noted. Certificates of Insurance shall be issued evidencing such coverage to the AUTHORITY throughout the term of this AGREEMENT.
 - 1. Commercial General Liability Insurance

\$1,500,000 per occurrence \$2,000,000 general aggregate \$2,000,000 products/completed operations total limit \$1,500,000 personal injury and advertising liability

This policy shall be written on an occurrence basis using ISO form CG 00 01 or its equivalent. The AUTHORITY, Ramsey County, their officials, employees, and agents, shall be added to the policy as additional insured on a primary basis with respect to the operations of the GRANTEE, using ISO endorsement form CG 20 26 or its equivalent.

2. Automobile Insurance

Coverage shall be provided for hired, non-owned and owned auto.

Minimum limits of \$1,000,000 combined single limit

3. Workers' Compensation and Employers' Liability

Workers' Compensation as required by Minnesota Statutes

Employers' Liability Limits:

\$500,000/\$500,000/\$500,000

4. Professional Liability/Errors and Omissions Coverage (if applicable)

Per Claim Limit: \$ 500,000 Per Occurrence: \$1,500,000 Aggregate Limit: \$2,000,000

This policy is to be written as acceptable to the AUTHORITY. Certificates of Insurance must indicate if the policy is issued on a claimsmade or occurrence basis. If coverage is carried on a claimsmade basis, then: 1) the retroactive date shall be noted on the Certificate and shall be prior to or the day of the inception of the AGREEMENT; and 2) evidence of coverage shall be provided for three years beyond expiration of the AGREEMENT.

The AUTHORITY, Ramsey County, their officials, employees, and agents, shall be added to the policy as additional insured; a separation of insureds endorsement shall be provided to the benefit of the AUTHORITY and Ramsey County.

5. Crime and Fidelity Bond (if applicable): \$	
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- C. GRANTEE shall notify its insurer that the AUTHORITY is requiring third party notice of mid-term cancellation per Minn. Stat. § 60A.36, Subd. 2a, such notice to the insurer to be provided to the AUTHORITY when the required Certificate of Insurance is delivered.
- D. The above sub-paragraphs establish minimum insurance requirements, and it is the sole responsibility of GRANTEE to purchase and maintain additional coverages as it may deem necessary in connection with this AGREEMENT.
- E. Certificate of Insurance must indicate if the policy is issued pursuant to these requirements. GRANTEE shall not commence work until the GRANTEE has obtained the required insurance and filed an acceptable Certificate of Insurance with AUTHORITY. Copies of insurance policies shall be submitted to the AUTHORITY upon request.
- F. Nothing in this AGREEMENT shall constitute a waiver by the AUTHORITY or Ramsey County of any statutory or common law immunities, limits, or exceptions on liability.
- G. Certificates shall specifically indicate if the policy is written with an admitted or non-admitted carrier. Best's Rating for the insurer shall be noted on the Certificate, and shall not be less than an A.

12. **CONFLICT OF INTEREST**

- A. <u>Interest of Officers, Employees or Agents</u>. No officer, employee, or agent of the GRANTEE who exercises any functions or responsibilities in connection with the planning and carrying out of the Block Grant Program, or any other person who exercises any functions or responsibilities in connection with the Program, shall have any personal financial interest, direct or indirect, in this Agreement, and the GRANTEE shall take appropriate steps to assure compliance.
- B. <u>Interest of Subcontractor and Their Employees</u>. The GRANTEE agrees that it will incorporate into every subcontract required to be in writing and made pursuant to this Agreement the following provisions:

The contractor covenants that no person who presently exercises any functions or responsibilities in connection with the Block Grant Program, has any financial interest, direct or indirect, in this contract. The contractor further covenants that he presently has no interest and shall not acquire any interest, direct or indirect, which would conflict in any manner or degree with the performance of his work or services hereunder. The contractor further covenants that in the performance of this contract no person having any conflicting interest shall be employed. Any interest on the part of the contractor or his employees must be disclosed to the GRANTEE and the AUTHORITY.

13. **TERMINATION**

- A. This Agreement is subject to termination upon thirty (30) days written notice by the AUTHORITY should:
 - 1) The GRANTEE mismanage or make improper or unlawful use of Agreement funds;
 - 2) The GRANTEE fail to comply with the terms and conditions expressed herein or the applicable federal, state, or county regulations and directives;
 - 3) The GRANTEE fail to provide work or services expressed by this Agreement; or
 - 4) The GRANTEE fail to submit reports or submit incomplete or inaccurate reports in any material respect.

- B. This Agreement may be terminated by the AUTHORITY immediately upon the receipt by the AUTHORITY of notice of the loss of federal funding for the Community Development Block Grant Program or any project of the GRANTEE.
- C. This Agreement is subject to termination upon thirty (30) days written notice by the GRANTEE should:
 - 1) The AUTHORITY fail in its commitment under this Agreement to provide funding for work or services rendered, as herein provided; or
 - 2) Block Grant Funds become no longer available from the federal government or through the AUTHORITY.
- D. This agreement may be terminated by the parties, in whole or in part, under such terms and conditions as they may agree, subject to the provisions of paragraphs A, B, and C herein.
- E. Otherwise, this Agreement shall terminate on the latest termination date specified on the exhibit(s) attached hereto and shall be subject to extension only by mutual agreement and amendment in accordance with the General Conditions of this Agreement.
- F. Upon termination of this Agreement, any unexpended balance of Agreement funds shall remain in the Block Grant Fund.
- G. In the event that termination occurs under paragraph A(1) of this section, the GRANTEE shall return to the AUTHORITY all funds which were expended in violation of the terms of this Agreement.

PART II. FEDERAL AND LOCAL PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS

1. **PROGRAM ADMINISTRATION**

The GRANTEE shall comply with the applicable uniform administrative requirements set forth at 24 C.F.R.§ 570.502.

2. **PROCUREMENT STANDARDS**

A. General. In awarding contracts pursuant to this Agreement, the GRANTEE shall comply with all applicable requirements of local and state law for awarding contracts, including, but not limited to, procedures for competitive bidding, contractor's bonds, and retained percentages. In addition, the GRANTEE shall comply with the requirements of the U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-102, relating to bonding, insurance, and procurement standards, and with Executive Order 11246,

as amended by Executive Order 11375, and as supplemented in Department of Labor regulations, 41 C.F.R., Ch. 60, regarding nondiscrimination bid conditions for projects over Ten Thousand and no/100 (\$10,000.00) Dollars. Where federal standards differ from local or state standards, the stricter standards shall apply. The federal standard of Ten Thousand and no/100 (\$10,000.00) Dollars for competitive bidding shall apply only if the applicable state or local standard for competitive bidding is less strict than Ten Thousand and no/100 (\$10,000.00) Dollars.

B. Construction. All contracts and subgrants for construction or repair shall include a provision for compliance with the Copeland "Anti-Kickback" Act, 18 U.S.C. § 874, as amended, and as supplemented in Department of Labor regulations, 29 C.F.R., pt. 3.

3. **ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW**

- A. <u>National Environmental Policy Act</u>. The AUTHORITY retains environmental review responsibility for purposes of fulfilling requirements of the National Environmental Policy Act as implemented by H.U.D. Environmental Review Procedures, 29 C.F.R., pt. 58. The AUTHORITY may require the GRANTEE to furnish data, information, and assistance for the AUTHORITY's review and assessment in determining whether an Environmental Impact Statement must be prepared.
- B. <u>State Environmental Policy Act</u>. Agencies which are branches of government under Minnesota law retain responsibility for fulfilling the requirements of the state law regarding environmental policy and conservation, and regulations and ordinances adopted thereunder. If the GRANTEE is not a branch of government under Minnesota law, the AUTHORITY may require the GRANTEE to furnish data, information, and assistance as necessary to enable the AUTHORITY to comply with the State Environmental Policy Act.
- C. <u>Satisfaction of Environmental Requirements</u>. Project execution under this Agreement by either the AUTHORITY or the GRANTEE shall not proceed until all applicable requirements of the National and State Environmental Policy Acts have been satisfied. The AUTHORITY will not issue a written notice to proceed until all such requirements are met.

4. **NON-DISCRIMINATION**

A. <u>General</u>. The GRANTEE shall comply with all federal, state, and local laws prohibiting discrimination on the basis of age, sex, marital status, race, creed, color, national origin or the presence of any sensory, mental or physical handicap, or any other basis.

- B. <u>Program Benefit</u>. The GRANTEE shall not discriminate against any resident of the project service area by denying benefit from or participation in any block grant funded activity on the basis of race, color, sex, or national origin.
- C. <u>Fair Housing</u>. The GRANTEE shall take necessary and appropriate actions to prevent discrimination in federal assisted housing and lending practices related to loans insured or guaranteed by the federal government.

D. **Employment**.

- 1) In all solicitations under this Agreement, the GRANTEE shall state that all qualified applicants will be considered for employment. The words "equal opportunity employer" in advertisements shall constitute compliance with this section.
- The GRANTEE shall not discriminate against an employee or applicant for employment in connection with this Agreement because of age, marital status, race, creed, color, national origin, or the presence of any sensory, mental or physical handicap, except when there is a bona fide occupational limitation. Such action shall include, but not be limited to, the following: Employment, upgrading, demotion or transfer, recruitment or recruitment advertising, layoff or termination, rates of pay or other forms of compensation, and selection for training.
- The GRANTEE shall provide training and employment opportunities for lower income residents within the area served by block grant assisted projects as required by the Housing and Urban Development Act, § 3, 12 U.S.C. § 1701u and in accordance with the requirements of the Ramsey County Section 3 Plan. As appropriate, the Section 3 Clause, a copy of which is attached hereto as Attachment A and made a part hereof, shall be included in contracts between the GRANTEE and contractors and subcontractors.

E. Contractors and Suppliers

- 1) No contractor, subcontractor, union or vendor engaged in any activity under this Agreement shall discriminate in the sale of materials, equipment or labor on the basis of age, sex, marital status, race, creed, color, national origin, or the presence of any sensory, mental or physical handicap. Such practices include upgrading, demotion, recruiting, transfer, layoff, termination, pay rate, and advertisement for employment.
- 2) All firms and organizations described above shall be required to submit to the GRANTEE certificates of compliance demonstrating that they have, in fact, complied with the foregoing provisions; provided, that certificates of compliance shall not be required from firms and organizations on contracts and/or yearly sales of less than \$10,000.

3) To the greatest extent feasible, the GRANTEE shall purchase supplies and services for activities under this Agreement from vendors and contractors whose businesses are located in the area served by block grant funded activities or owned in substantial part by project area residents.

F. Notice

- 1) The GRANTEE shall include the provisions of the appropriate subsections A, B, C, D, and E of this section in every contract or purchase order for goods and services under this Agreement and shall send to each labor union or representative of workers with which it has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding a notice advising the said labor union or worker's representative of the commitments made in these subsections.
- 2) In advertising for employees, goods, or services for activities under this Agreement, the GRANTEE shall utilize minority publications in addition to publications of general circulation.

5. LABOR STANDARDS

GRANTEE shall comply with all federal, state and local laws that apply to the construction or rehabilitation of the PROPERTY, specifically the Ramsey County Prevailing Wage Ordinance No. 2013-329.

GRANTEE shall require that project construction contractors and subcontractors pay their laborers and mechanics at wage rates in accordance with the Davis-Bacon Act, 40 U.S.C. §§ 3141-44 & §§ 3146-3147; provided that this section shall not apply to rehabilitation of residential property designed for residential use by fewer than eight families.

A copy of the current Davis-Bacon wage rate must be included in all construction bid specifications and contracts over Two Thousand and no/100 (\$2,000.00) Dollars.

6. **PROPERTY MANAGEMENT**

- A. The GRANTEE agrees that any nonexpendable personal property, purchased wholly or in part with agreement funds at a cost of Three Hundred and no/100 (\$300.00) Dollars or more per item, is, upon its purchase or receipt, the property of the AUTHORITY and/or federal government. Final ownership and disposition of such property shall be determined under the provisions of U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular No. A-102.
- B. The GRANTEE shall be responsible for all such property, including its care and maintenance.

- C. The GRANTEE shall admit the AUTHORITY's property management officer to the GRANTEE's premises for the purpose of marking such property, as appropriate, with AUTHORITY property tags.
- D. The GRANTEE shall meet the following procedural requirements for all such property:
 - 1) Property records shall be maintained accurately and provide for: a description of the property; manufacturer's serial number or other identification number; acquisition date and cost; source of the property; percentage of block grant funds used in the purchase of property; and location, use and condition of the property.
 - 2) A physical inventory of property shall be taken and the results reconciled with the property records at least once every two (2) years to verify the existence, current utilization, and continued need for the property.
 - 3) A control system shall be in effect to insure adequate safeguards to prevent loss, damage, or theft to the property. Any loss, damage, or theft of the property shall be investigated and fully documented.
 - 4) Adequate maintenance procedures shall be implemented to keep the property in good condition.

7. ACQUISITION AND RELOCATION

- A. Any acquisition of real property for any activity assisted under this Agreement which occurs on or after the date of the AUTHORITY's submission of its Block Grant application to H.U.D. shall comply with Federal Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act, Title III, 42 U.S.C. §§ 4601-4655 (Uniform Act) and the Regulations at 49 C.F.R., pt. 24.
- B. Any displacement of persons, business, non-profit organizations or farms occurring on or after the date of the AUTHORITY's submission of its Block Grant application as the result of acquisition of real property assisted under this Agreement shall comply with Title II of the Uniform Act and the Regulations at 49 C.F.R., pt. 24. The GRANTEE shall comply with the regulations pertaining to costs of relocation and written policies, as specified by 24 C.F.R. § 570.606.

8. HISTORIC PRESERVATION

The GRANTEE shall meet the historic preservation requirements of the National Historic Preservation Act, 16 U.S.C. §§ 470-470x-6 and the Archaeological and Historic Preservation Act, 16 U.S.C. §§ 469-469c-1 and Executive Order 11593, including the procedures prescribed by the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation at 36 C.F.R., pt. 800.

9. **ARCHITECTURAL BARRIERS**

Any facility constructed pursuant to this Agreement shall comply with design requirements of the Architectural Barriers Act, 42 U.S.C. §§ 4151-4157 and the Americans with Disabilities Act, 42 U.S.C. §§ 12101-12213.

10. ACTIVITIES FOR WHICH OTHER FEDERAL FUNDS MUST BE SOUGHT

The GRANTEE may use Community Development Block Grant funds for the provision of public services as described by 24 C.F.R. § 570.201(e) provided that the GRANTEE meets the requirements of and follows the procedures outlined in 24 C.F.R. § 570.607.

11. NON-PARTICIPATION IN POLITICAL ACTIVITIES

The GRANTEE shall comply with the provisions of the Hatch Act, 5 U.S.C. §§ 7321-7326.

12. CONDITIONS FOR RELIGIOUS ORGANIZATIONS

Where applicable, the conditions prescribed by H.U.D. for the use of CDBG funds by religious organizations shall be followed, and, if applicable, included in agreements between the GRANTEE and contractors or sub-contractors.

13. NATIONAL FLOOD INSURANCE

The GRANTEE may not receive Community Development Block Grant funding for acquisition or construction in any area that has been identified as having special flood hazards and is not participating in the National Flood Insurance Program, Flood Disaster Protection Act, § 3(a), 42 U.S.C. §§ 4001-4003, and the Regulations thereunder. The GRANTEE shall comply with the Regulations at 24 C.F.R. § 570.605.

14. AIR AND WATER POLLUTION

The GRANTEE shall comply with the provisions of the Clean Air Act, 42 U.S.C. §§ 7401-7642, and the Federal Water Pollution Act, 33 U.S.C. §§ 1251-1274, and the regulations issued thereunder.

15. LEAD-BASED PAINT POISONING

The GRANTEE shall comply with the regulations at 24 C.F.R., pt. 35, issued pursuant to the Lead-Based Poisoning Prevention Act, 42 U.S.C. § 4831, relating to the use of lead-based paint.

16. NON-SUBSTITUTION FOR LOCAL FUNDING

The Block Grant funding made available under this Agreement shall not be utilized by the GRANTEE to reduce substantially the amount of local financial support for community development activities below the level of such support prior to the availability of funds under this Agreement.

17. PUBLIC OWNERSHIP

For agencies which are not municipal corporations organized under the laws of the State of Minnesota, it may become necessary to grant the AUTHORITY a property interest where the subject project calls for the acquisition, construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or installation of publicly owned facilities and improvements. The GRANTEE shall comply with current AUTHORITY policy regarding transfer of a property interest sufficient to meet the public ownership requirement.

18. **PUBLIC INFORMATION**

If requested by the AUTHORITY, the GRANTEE shall comply with the following:

- A. In all news releases and other public notices related to projects funded under this Agreement, the GRANTEE shall include information identifying the source of funds as the Ramsey County Housing and Redevelopment Authority Community Development Block Grant Program.
- B. For all construction projects, the GRANTEE shall erect a sign to AUTHORITY specifications at the construction site, identifying the source of funds.

19. **REVERSION OF ASSETS**

The GRANTEE shall transfer to the AUTHORITY any CDBG funds, including but not limited to project income, on hand at the time of expiration of this Agreement, or received thereafter, and any accounts receivable attributable to the use of CDBG funds. Any real property under the GRANTEE's control that was acquired or improved in whole or in part with CDBG funds in excess of \$25,000 is either:

- (i) Used to meet one of the national objectives in 24 C.F.R., pt. 570, until five years after expiration of the agreement, or such longer period of time as determined appropriate by the AUTHORITY; or
- (ii) Is disposed of in a manner which results in the AUTHORITY being reimbursed in the amount of the current fair market value of the property less any portion thereof attributable to expenditures of non-CDBG funds for acquisition of, or improvement to, the property. Such reimbursement is not required after the period of time specified in accordance with (i) above.

20. PROHIBITED USE OF EXCESSIVE FORCE

The GRANTEE, if a unit of government, certifies by the execution of this Agreement that it has adopted and is enforcing a policy prohibiting the use of excessive force by law enforcement agencies within its jurisdiction against any individuals engaged in nonviolent civil rights demonstrations. 24 C.F.R. § 91.225(b)(5).

21. LOBBYING PROHIBITION

The GRANTEE certifies by the execution of this Agreement that it has adopted and is enforcing the following as required by 24 C.F.R., pt. 87:

- 1) No federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid by, or on behalf of, the undersigned to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a member of Congress, in connection with the awarding of any federal contract, the making of any federal grant, the making of any federal loan, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement.
- 2) If any funds other than federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a member of Congress in connection with this federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement, the GRANTEE shall complete and submit Standard Form-LLL, "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying", in accordance with its instructions.
- The GRANTEE shall require that the language of this certification be included in the award documents for all subawards at all tiers (including subcontracts, subgrants, and contracts under grants, loans, and cooperative agreements) and that all subrecipients shall certify and disclose accordingly.

PART III. EVALUATION AND RECORD KEEPING

1. **EVALUATION**

The GRANTEE agrees to participate with the AUTHORITY in any evaluation project or performance report, as designed by the AUTHORITY or the appropriate federal agency, and to make available all information required by any such evaluation process.

2. AUDITS AND INSPECTIONS

The records and documents with respect to all matters covered by this contract shall be subject at all times to inspection, review or audit by the AUTHORITY, federal or state

officials so authorized by law during the performance of this contract during the period of retention specified in this Part III.

The GRANTEE, regardless of the amount of funds received from the AUTHORITY, shall obtain at its own expense an annual certified financial and compliance audit.

All audits shall be submitted to the AUTHORITY within six months of the close of the GRANTEE's fiscal year and shall be prepared by an independent auditor who meets the independence standards specified in the General Accounting Office's yellow book, "Government Auditing Standards".

The GRANTEE shall submit a copy of the annual financial audited statements with the management compliance letter and the recipient's response to the management letter, to the Director of Community Development within six months of the end of the GRANTEE's fiscal year.

3. **RECORDS**

As required by H.U.D. Regulations, 24 C.F.R., pt. 570, the GRANTEE shall compile and maintain the following records:

- A. <u>Financial Management</u>. Such records shall identify adequately the source and application of funds for activities within this Agreement, in accordance with the provisions of the U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-102. These records shall contain information pertaining to grant awards and authorizations, obligations, unobligated balances, assets, liabilities, outlays, and income.
- B. <u>Citizen Participation</u>. Narrative and other documentation describing the process used to inform citizens concerning the amount of funds available, the ranges of project activities undertaken, and opportunities to participate in funded block grant projects.
- C. <u>Relocation</u>. Indication of the overall status of the relocation workload and a separate relocation record for each person, business, organization, and farm operation displaced or in the relocation workload.
- D. <u>Property Acquisition</u>. GRANTEE files must contain (a) invitation to owner to accompany appraiser during inspection, (b) at least one property appraisal, (c) statement of basis for determination of just compensation, (d) written offer of just compensation, (e) all documents involving conveyance, (f) settlement cost reporting statement, and (g) notice to surrender possession premises.
- E. <u>Equal Opportunity</u>. The GRANTEE shall maintain racial, ethnic, and gender data showing the extent to which these categories of persons have participated in, or benefited from, the activities carried out under this Agreement. The GRANTEE shall also maintain data which records its affirmative action in equal opportunity

employment, and its good faith efforts to identify, train, and/or hire lower income residents of the project area and to utilize business concerns which are located in or owned in substantial part by persons residing in the area of the project.

- F. <u>Labor Standards</u>. Records shall be maintained regarding compliance of all contractors performing construction work under this Agreement with the labor standards made applicable by the Davis-Bacon Act, as amended (40 U.S.C. Sections 3141-3148).
- G. Such other records as may be required by the AUTHORITY and/or H.U.D.

4. **RETENTION OF RECORDS**

Required records shall be retained for a period of six (6) years after termination of this Agreement, except as follows:

- (1) Records that are the subject of audit findings shall be retained for six (6) years after such findings have been resolved.
- (2) Records for nonexpendable property shall be retained for six (6) years after its final disposition.

5. **REPORTS**

The GRANTEE shall submit reports as required by the AUTHORITY on a monthly and annual basis and also prior to project execution.

6. DATA PRIVACY

All data collected, created, received, maintained or disseminated for any purpose in the course of the GRANTEE's performance of this Agreement is governed by the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act, Minn. Stat. Ch. 13, or any other applicable state statutes, any state rules adopted to implement the Act and statutes, as well as federal statutes and regulations on data privacy.

SECTION 3 CLAUSE

- A. The work to be performed under this contract is subject to the requirements of section 3 of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968, as amended, 12 U.S.C. 1701u (section 3). The purpose of section 3 is to ensure that employment and other economic opportunities generated by HUD assistance or HUD-assisted projects covered by section 3, shall, to the greatest extent feasible, be directed to low- and very low-income persons, particularly persons who are recipients of HUD assistance for housing.
- B. The parties to this contract agree to comply with HUD's regulations in 24 CFR part 135, which implement section 3. As evidenced by their execution of this contract, the parties to this contract certify that they are under no contractual or other impediment that would prevent them from complying with the part 135 regulations.
- C. The contractor agrees to send to each labor organization or representative of workers with which the contractor has a collective bargaining agreement or other understanding, if any, a notice advising the labor organization or workers' representative of the contractor's commitments under this section 3 clause, and will post copies of the notice in conspicuous places at the work site where both employees and applicants for training and employment positions can see the notice. The notice shall describe the section 3 preference, shall set forth minimum number and job titles subject to hire, availability of apprenticeship and training positions, the qualifications for each, and the name and location of the person(s) taking applications for each of the positions, and the anticipated date the work shall begin.
- D. The contractor agrees to include this section 3 clause in every subcontract subject to compliance with regulations in 24 CFR part 135, and agrees to take appropriate action, as provided in an applicable provision of the subcontract or in this section 3 clause, upon a finding that the subcontractor is in violation of the regulations in 24 CFR part 135. The contractor will not subcontract with any subcontractor where the contractor has notice or knowledge that the subcontractor has been found in violation of the regulations in 24 CFR part 135.
- E. The contractor will certify that any vacant employment positions, including training positions, that are filled (1) after the contractor is selected but before the contract is executed, and (2) with persons other than those to whom the regulations of 24 CFR part 135 require employment opportunities to be directed, were not filled to circumvent the contractor's obligations under 24 CFR part 135.
- F. Noncompliance with HUD's regulations in 24 CFR part 135 may result in sanctions, termination of this contract for default, and debarment or suspension from future HUD assisted contracts.
- G. With respect to work performed in connection with section 3 covered Indian housing assistance, section 7 (b) of the Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance Act (25 U.S.C. 450e) also applies to the work to be performed under this contract. Section 7(b) requires that to the greatest extent feasible (i) preference and opportunities for training and employment shall be given to Indians, and (ii) preference in the award of contracts and subcontracts shall be given to Indian organizations and Indian-owned Economic Enterprises. Parties to this contract that are subject to the provisions of section 3 and section 7(b) agree to comply with section 3 to the maximum extent feasible, but not in derogation of compliance with section 7(b).

RAMSEY COUNTY COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT WITH THE CITY OF ROSEVILLE FOR SIDEWALK CONSTRUCTION OF LARPENTEUR AVENUE (COUNTY STATE AID HIGHWAY 30) BETWEEN MACKUBIN STREET AND GAULTIER STREET S.A.P. 160,020,028, S.A.P. 062-630-063

This Agreement is between the City of Roseville, a municipal corporation ("City") and Ramsey County, a political subdivision of the State of Minnesota, ("County") for the sidewalk construction on Larpenteur Avenue between Mackubin Street and Gaultier Street, ("Project").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the City and the County desire to proceed with the Project; and

WHEREAS, the Project is identified in Ramsey County's Transportation Improvement Program; and

WHEREAS, Victoria Street, in the area affected by reconstruction, is designated County State Aid Highway (CSAH) 30; and

WHEREAS, the Project been designated by the Minnesota Department of Transportation (Mn/DOT) as eligible for County State Aid Highway funds; and

WHEREAS, the Project has been designated as State Aid Project (S.A.P.) 062-630-063, and State Aid Project (S.A.P.) 164-020-028; and

WHEREAS, the subject road segment is located within the City; and

WHEREAS, the proposed Project, includes, in addition to other items, grading, paving, concrete curb and gutter, bituminous sidewalk, pedestrian curb ramps, turf establishment, retaining wall, fence, and related features; and

WHEREAS, construction of storm sewer systems will be constructed as part of the Project in accordance with local watershed rules; and

WHEREAS, plans for the Project showing proposed construction will be presented to the County and will be on file at City of Roseville Public Works Department; and

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY MUTUALLY AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. Whereas recitals set forth in this Agreement are hereby made a part of this Agreement as set out in full.
- 2. Responsibility for Design Engineering
 - 2.1. The City will prepare plans, specifications, and proposals for the Project, which will include, among other things, the proposed reconstruction, alignment, profiles, grades, cross sections, paving, concrete curb and gutter, concrete sidewalk, storm sewer, pedestrian curb ramps, turf establishment, and utility replacement and adjustments.
 - 2.2. Any costs associated with Project revisions after the completion of plans and specifications will be paid for by the party requesting the revisions. Revisions must be consistent with Mn/DOT State Aid requirements and are subject to approval by the County.
- 3. Procurement and Award of Contract
 - 3.1. The City will take bids in accordance with state law and City rules.
 - 3.2. The City will prepare an abstract of bids and a cost participation summary based on the lowest responsible bidder's proposal, and will provide the same to the County.
 - 3.3. Prior to award of the contract, the City will receive concurrence from the County to award a contract to the lowest responsible bidder.
 - 3.4. The City will award a contract, and pay the contractor from the County State Aid Highway, Municipal State Aid Highway, and local funds identified for the Project.
- 4. Responsibility for Construction Engineering
 - 4.1. The City shall perform or contract the performance of the construction engineering for all elements of the Project.
- 5. Project Costs
 - 5.1. An estimate of the County's share of the Project costs is attached as Exhibit A, (Cost Participation Based on Engineer's Estimate). Quantities and unit prices in Exhibit A are estimates. Actual costs shall be based on the contract unit prices and the quantities constructed. Overall County participation shall be maxed at \$76,500.
 - 5.2.
- 5.2.1. The costs of contractor mobilization and traffic control will be allocated based upon cost participation percentages for the entire Project and

based on contract unit prices and quantities at the time of contract award. No adjustments in the allocation will be made if unit prices or quantities vary during construction.

- 5.3. Except as provided herein, the County and City will participate in the costs of construction in accordance with the Ramsey County Cost Participation Policy, attached as Exhibit C. If there is a conflict between Exhibit C and this Agreement, this Agreement will prevail.
- 5.4. Design Engineering Costs
 - 5.4.1. The City will pay for all costs related to design engineering.
- 5.5. Construction Engineering and Administration Costs
 - 5.5.1. The City will pay for all costs related to construction engineering.
- 6. Payment Schedule
 - 6.1. The City will invoice the County for construction costs incurred on a monthly basis or as determined by the payment schedule for the contractor.
 - 6.2. Payment will be made within 30 days of receipt of an invoice.
- 7. Maintenance Responsibility for Project Elements
 - 7.1. The County shall own and maintain all storm sewer leads and catch basins constructed on CSAH 30 as part of the Project.
 - 7.2. The City shall own and maintain all storm sewer mains constructed on CSAH 30 as part of the Project
 - 7.3. The City shall be responsible for all maintenance associated with sidewalk.

 Maintenance includes, but not limited to, snow removal and panel replacement.
- 8. The County grants the City temporary construction easements over all County owned rights-of-way and property within the limits of the Project for use during construction at no cost to the City.
- 9. The City and County shall indemnify, defend, and hold each other harmless against any and all liability, losses, costs, damages, expenses, claims, or actions, including attorney's fees, which the indemnified party, its officials, agents, or employees may hereafter sustain, incur, or be required to pay, arising out of or by reason of any act or omission of the indemnifying party, its officials, agents, or employees, in the execution, performance, or failure to adequately perform the indemnifying party's

obligation pursuant to this Agreement. Nothing in this Agreement shall constitute a waiver by the County or the City of any statutory or common law immunities, limits, or exceptions on liability.

10. This Agreement shall remain in full force and effect until terminated by mutual agreement of the parties.

- Next three closest search units.

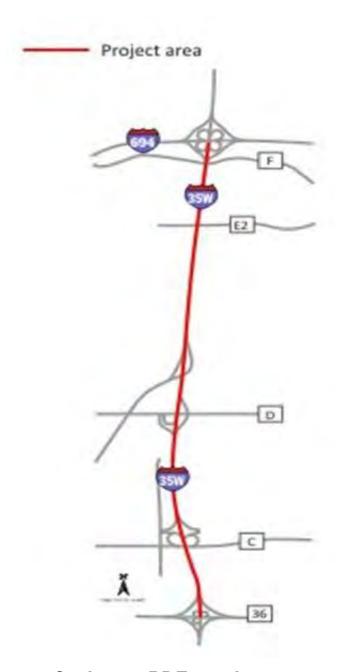

Update from Brownfields Consultant Item Description:

BACKGROUND

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In October, Liesch Associates (now Terracon) entered into a consulting contract with the City to 2 assist in establishing baseline conditions for the Twin Lakes area. Specifically, the contract had 3 5 primary tasks, as follows:

- 1. Project meetings with staff, landowners and a City Council presentation
- 2. Collection, consolidation and review of the vast amount of existing brownfield information in the Twin Lakes area
- 3. Funding Analysis to help the City plan for and participate in grant funding cycles to add greater leverage with outside dollars and lessen the reliance on existing City cleanup funds
- 4. Initial Project Schedule for the next viable grant cycles
- 5. As-needed brownfield support this item allows the consultant to have an ongoing relationship which has been helpful for review of the recent Calyxt headquarters development. The consultant has also conducted updated tests of the remaining monitoring wells.

Terracon has developed an electronic repository for all of the known brownfield documents to assist the City now and into the future which will be briefly introduced at the City Council meeting. Joel Koepp in the Community Development Department has been working closely with the Terracon team throughout the project and was the lead staff member in assisting Terracon with the development of the electronic repository.

- One of the goals of this initial project was to establish baseline conditions so the City and public 21 can better understand the brownfield conditions in Twin Lakes and then use that knowledge to 22 plot a course for future actions which will allow the City to be more proactive regarding 23
- brownfields as an economic development strategy.
- Terracon has provided a memo (Attachment A) which outlines its understanding of the general 25 baseline brownfield conditions after its initial review and will discuss a flowchart (Attachment 26
- B) of its proposed workflow for how the City may want to move forward in a more proactive 27 manner with both public and private sector initiated projects. 28
- Terracon has also participated with City staff in meetings with owners of some of the primary 29 development parcels in the Twin Lakes area.

POLICY OBJECTIVE

- Twin Lakes has been a primary policy objective for the City for many years. This effort will
- assist the community in cleaning up existing contamination and facilitating redevelopment of
- 34 contaminated sites.

35 **BUDGET IMPLICATIONS**

- The funding of this project is largely from the City's existing Hazardous Substances Subdistrict
- 37 (HSS) funds which are only to be used for brownfield activities. Development review of the
- Calyxt project is funded by an escrow provided by Calyxt related to the recent City Council
- approved brownfield cleanup funding for the development.

RE: Twin Lakes Development Environmental Review and Status Report

During the preparation of the Twin Lakes Development Area (TLDA) interactive mapping tool, the Terracon Team has had the opportunity to review environmental investigation and response action documentation for several of the properties located within the boundaries of the TLDA. This review, along with Terracon representatives' past work experience within the TLDA, has provided the necessary information to prepare the following summary of environmental conditions within the TLDA.

As you are aware, the TLDA has historically accommodated a large number of industrial businesses. These businesses included mainly trucking/hauling companies. However, demolition contractors, vehicle maintenance facilities and other industrial manufacturers have also occupied (or continue to occupy) parcels within the area.

Due to the number of trucking companies, contaminants of concern identified at many of the redeveloped properties in the TLDA consist mainly of petroleum based compounds such as gasoline range organics (GRO), diesel range organics (DRO), volatile organic compounds (VOCs) and lead (from leaks of leaded gasoline). However, non-petroleum VOCs (i.e. TCE), polyaromatic hydrocarbons (PAHs) and other metals have been detected within the boundaries of the TLDA. In addition, areas of buried waste (mainly demolition waste) have been documented in the past.

Soils, groundwater (both perched and glacial) and presumably sub-surface soil vapors within the TLDA have been documented to be impacted with the above contaminants. Past soil cleanup efforts have ranged from the excavation and off-site disposal of isolated areas of contaminated soils to the excavation, screening and off-site disposal/reuse of large deposits of buried waste. Some sites have completed cleanup activities while leaving some contaminated soils in place.

Based on its past investigation and cleanup work andreview of ground water investigation work completed by DPRA in 2003-2005, Terracon understands that essentially three groundwater formations exist within the TLDA; an upper perched groundwater formation (8-20 feet below ground surface), a lower perched groundwater formation (20-50 feet below ground surface) and a glacial formation (60+ feet below ground surface). Contaminated perched groundwater encountered during construction activities has required management through pre-treatment and discharge to the storm sewer system or direct discharge to the sanitary sewer system. Contamination has been identified within some areas of the glacial formation, although below typical drinking water standards.



Sub-surface vapor mitigation has typically involved the installation of both passive and active (i.e. modified radon mitigation systems) sub-slab venting systems installed beneath structures. Terracon is only aware of passive systems installed within the TLDA to date.

A majority of the properties redeveloped over the past couple of decades within the TLDA have been investigated and cleaned up under the oversight of the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) Voluntary Brownfields Cleanup Program(VBCP). Investigation and remediation of contaminated properties through the VBCP assures that the sites are investigated and cleaned up in accordance with MPCA standards and allows for legal assurances to be obtained in order to significantly limit, if not eliminate, environmental liability associated with contaminated properties. In addition, securing the proper legal assurances through the MPCA VBCP assures properties are cleaned up to levels allowing for the reuse of these properties for commercial, recreational and residential purposes.

Based on its review to date, Terracon has not identified contamination conditions atypical of areas with similar historical use in the metropolitan area. In fact, many areas within the metropolitan area that have been redeveloped successfully in the past have exhibited contaminated conditions significantly greater that what has been identified in the TLDA to date. It is recommended that the City require investigation and cleanup (if necessary) of properties to be redeveloped within the TLDA and that these investigation and cleanup activities be conducted in accordance with the MPCA VBCP in order to secure the proper legal assurances for each property, as necessary.

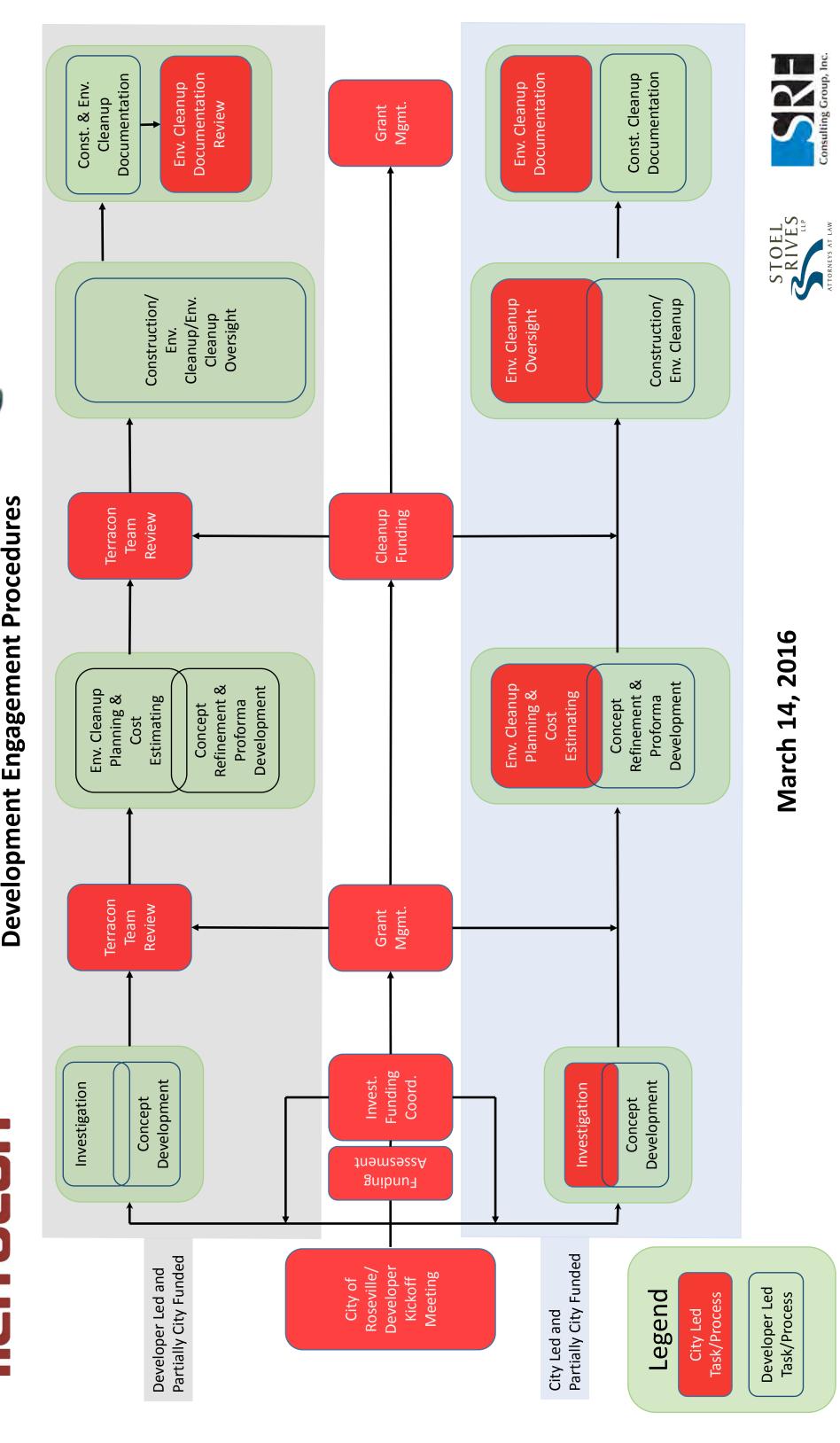
The Terracon Team is also very familiar with grant funding opportunities available for redevelopment through federal, state and local sources that the City can apply for in order to support redevelopment of contaminated properties. These grant funds, if awarded, can be used for both investigation and cleanup efforts of contaminated properties.

Item Description: Finalize Community Survey Discussion and Survey Budget

BACKGROUND

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On February 22, 2016, the City Council directed staff to obtain a proposal from the Morris
Leatherman Company to conduct a community survey of Roseville residents. Council also
directed staff to compile a a framework of potential questions for the survey and that the
framework should closly resemble the City's 2014 survey. All new or revised questions in the
proposed survey are highlighted in yellow and included in Attachement A.

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BUDGET IMPLICATIONS

The 2016 budget includes funds for a survey of Roseville residents. Morris Leatherman's proposal (Attachment B) includes conducting a 100-questions survey of 400 randomly selected residents. The cost to conduct a 400-resident survey (+/- 5.0% margin of error) is \$17,500. The proposal also includes pricing for additional questions of \$135 per question.

3/14/2016 Date: Item No.: 15 a Department Approval City Manager Approval Cttak K. mill Item Description: Discuss Long-Term Facility Options for the Roseville License Center BACKGROUND Since 1999, the Roseville License Center has been located in the Lexington Shopping Center just north of the City Hall Main Campus. The current lease includes 3,332 square feet and expires on January 31, 2017. Over the past decade there have been several discussions regarding the location of the License Center and whether it's more advantageous to continue leasing or secure space in a city-owned facility. The upcoming expiration of the existing lease necessitates that we revisit this discussion once-again. From Staff's perspective, there are three primary considerations when contemplating this decision. They include: 1) Operational Considerations 2) Financial Considerations 3) Business Risk & Other Considerations Each of these primary categories are discussed in greater detail below. **Operational Considerations** The License Center's operational needs include: ☐ Current and future space needs for customers and staff ■ Functionality of the current office design • Overall condition and general aesthetics of the facility

These needs are briefly addressed below.

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The current layout was originally designed in 2000 and modified in 2005 to accommodate passports. Since that time, the License Center has experienced significant growth in all service categories resulting in less functionality and some overcrowding in customer service and staffed areas.

Over the next several years, customer transaction volumes are projected to increase and when coupled with State and Federal *in-person* customer requirements, the diminished functionality and overcrowding will only worsen.

In addition, the general condition and aesthetics of the facility has steadily declined reflecting the decision to delay many capital improvements until the License Center's Strategic Plan was completed and a long-term location had been determined. The facility is in need of new carpeting, painting, furniture, and office redesign. These leasehold improvements will be needed to transform the License Center from its current dated and institutional feel, to a warm inviting space for customers.

To accommodate this growth and create a more functional and welcoming environment, it is suggested that 4,500-5,500 square feet of overall space be secured – an increase from the current 3,332 square feet of space.

Financial Considerations

In contemplating the decision on whether to continue leasing or move into a city-owned facility, there are a number of financial factors that should also be considered including:

- ☐ The current lease amount is \$63,775 per year and if renewed, is projected to rise 3-4% annually over the next several years.
- ☐ An additional 1,170–2,170 in leased space would likely require \$20,000-40,000 in additional rent bringing the total to \$85,000-105,000 annually plus inflation.
- ☐ An estimated \$100,000 in leasehold improvements would be recommended to return the License Center to a more customer-friendly and functional workspace.

As an alternative to paying higher rents and incurring significant leasehold improvements, the City could dedicate these funds to pay off financing costs associated with the expansion or construction of a city-owned facility that could accommodate the License Center.

For example, a \$100,000 annual commitment (in lieu of rent) would be sufficient to pay the annual debt service on a \$1.3 million bond issue over a 15-year period. If we coupled the bond proceeds with \$200,000-300,000 in cash reserves from the License Center Fund, there should be enough monies to construct a 5,000 square foot facility. The License Center's cash reserves are projected to be approximately \$550,000 by the end of 2016 so it could easily accommodate a spend-down of reserves for this purpose. It should be noted however, that the License Center continues to provide significant financial support for police, fire, streets, information technology, and other programs. That level of support may need to be adjusted to accommodate the financing of a new facility.

Based on these preliminary estimates, the License Center's future space needs could be accommodated with a new city-owned facility for the same financial commitment as it could with leasing. The major difference is that the City would own the new facility outright after 15 years. This obviously would not be the case with the leasing option.

When you factor in suggested leasehold improvements and rising lease rates, the financial commitment for city-owned space becomes even less. This is depicted in the charts below using a 15-year timeframe.

As shown in the table, over the next 15 years the purchase option (new construction) is approximately \$493,000 *less* expensive compared to leasing. This does not include any land acquisition or building demolition costs that might be associated with a new city-owned facility.

Business Risk & Other Considerations

Finally, when assessing the decision on whether to renew the lease or seek a city-owned facility option, there are a number of other considerations including business risk to measure.

In this context, business risk can perhaps be defined as a decline in space needs or revenue generation due to lower transaction volumes such as those that might result from increased competition or a loss in the City's ability to function as a Deputy of the State of Minnesota or as a Passport Acceptance Agency on behalf of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security.

These are legitimate concerns, but they are not vastly different that those associated with other City programs or functions which also must compete for customers. In the case of the License Center, it has consistently remained one of the highest volume and highest rated licensing facilities in the entire state. Roseville's reputation is strong in both the State and Federal government's eyes.

If it's determined in the future that a License Center is no longer viable or desirable, an expanded or new city-owned facility could be re-purposed or sold.

- high cost of repairing broken or leaking water or sewer lines.
- The NLC Service Line Warranty Program gives your residents who have not set aside money to pay
- 20 for an unexpected, expensive utility line repair the opportunity to obtain a low cost warranty that will
- 21 provide repairs for a low monthly fee, with no deductibles or service fees. The work is performed by
- licensed, local plumbers who will call the customer within one hour of filing a claim. The repair is
- performed professionally and quickly, typically within 24 hours. USP provides a personally staffed
- 24 24/7 repair hotline for residents, 365 days a year.
- 25 There is no cost to your city to participate in the program. PLUS, your city receives a share of the
- revenues collected! Implementation is easy and USP provides all of the required services."
- In order to offer this program to our residents, the City would enter into a Marketing License
- Agreement. A draft of this agreement is included as Attachment A.
- Also attached are examples of the Home Service Contracts water, sewer and internal plumbing,
- which is another option available to our residents.

- Several Minnesota Cities offer this program to their residents including Oak Park Heights and St.
- Louis Park. Attached is a snapshot of a survey of residents that had claims in the City of St Louis
- Park between May 1, 2013 and May 1, 2015. OF the 206 total claims in that timeframe, 45 residents
- completed the survey. 41 of those claims indicated they would recommend this program to others.
- 35 The PWETC received a presentation from Utility Service Partners in November and after that
- presentation passed a motion "recommending to the City Council that they pursue a potential
- agreement for this warranty opportunity with Utility Service Partners." During the presentation the
- Commission members asked several questions and seemed very impressed with the program. An
- excerpt of the draft minutes from the November meeting is attached.
- A representative from Utility Service Partners, Inc. will present to the Council about the program and
- answer any questions. (end previous RCA information)
- At the January 11th meeting, the Council asked for more information from Cities in Minnesota that
- currently have an agreement with USP to offer the Service Line Warranty Program. Staff has done
- some research but we have not received any significant information from the Cities that currently
- support this program. Attached is a summary of the information we did receive, mostly from the City
- of St. Michael. Also attached is information previously received from the City of St. Louis Park.
- 47 USP has provided the following information about this program throughout the State of Minnesota:
- 48 Active Enrollments in MN: Over 5,800
- Number of Claims Filed in MN: Over 650
- Amount of Claims Paid in MN: Over \$430,000
- Customer Satisfaction in MN: Over 90% of returned surveys rated Excellent of Very Good
 - The current USP City Partners in Minnesota are:
 - Oak Park Heights (population 4,788)
 - Columbia Heights (population 19,674)
- 55 St Louis Park (population 47,411)
 - Hawley (population 2,083)
 - Pelican Rapids (population 2,463)
- Perham (population 3,087)
 - St Michael (population 16,921)
- The Cities of Richfield (population 36,175) and Falcon Heights (population 5,491) also approved the marketing agreement within the past month.
- In response to the Council's question on backflow preventers, USP has responded that the installation of backflow preventers will now be a covered expense in the warranty program.

FINANCIAL IMPACTS

- There is no cost to the City to offer this program. There is an option for the City to receive a share of
- the revenues. The City could opt out of this revenue share which would reduce the monthly fee to the
- 67 resident.

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STAFF RECOMMENDATION

- Staff recommends the Council approve the Marketing License Agreement with Utility Service
- Partners, Inc., subject to final review and approval by the City Attorney.

MARKETING LICENSE AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF Attachment A ROSEVILLE, MINNESOTA, AND UTILITY SERVICE PARTNERS PRIVATE LABEL, INC. D/B/A SERVICE LINE WARRANTIES OF AMERICA

This MARKETING LICENSE AGREEMENT ("Agreement") entered into as of
[, 20] ("Effective Date"), by and between the City of Roseville, Minnesota
("City"), and Utility Service Partners Private Label, Inc. d/b/a Service Line Warranties of
America ("SLWA"), herein collectively referred to singularly as "Party" and collectively as the
"Parties".

RECITALS:

WHEREAS, sewer and water line laterals between the mainlines and the connection on residential private property are owned by individual residential property owners ("Residential Property Owner"); and

WHEREAS, City desires to offer Residential Property Owners the opportunity, but not the obligation, to purchase a service line warranty and other similar products ("Warranty"); and

WHEREAS, SLWA is the administrator of the National League of Cities Service Line Warranty Program and has agreed to provide the Warranty to Residential Property Owners subject to the terms and conditions contained herein; and

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing recitals, and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, and with the intent to be legally bound hereby, the Parties agree as follows:

AGREEMENT

- **1. Purpose.** City hereby grants to SLWA the right to offer the Warranty to Residential Property Owners subject to the terms and conditions herein.
- **2.** Grant of License. City hereby grants to SLWA a non-exclusive license ("License") to use City's name and logo on letterhead, bills and marketing materials to be sent to Residential Property Owners from time to time, and to be used in advertising, all at SLWA's sole cost and expense and subject to City's prior review and approval, which will not be unreasonably conditioned, delayed, or withheld. City agrees that it will not extend a similar license to any competitor of SLWA during the term of this Agreement.
- Effective Date. The Agreement will automatically renew for additional one (1) year terms ("Renewal Term") unless one of the Parties gives the other written notice at least ninety (90) days prior to end of the Term or of a Renewal Term that the Party does not intend to renew this Agreement. In the event that SLWA is in material breach of this Agreement, the City may terminate this Agreement thirty (30) days after giving written notice to SLWA of such breach, if said breach is not cured during said thirty (30) day period. SLWA will be permitted to complete any marketing initiative initiated or planned prior to termination of this Agreement after which time, neither Party will have any further obligations to the other and this Agreement will terminate. During the Term, SLWA shall conduct seasonal campaigns each year in accordance with the schedules set forth in Exhibit A. The pricing for each such campaign shall be in accordance with Exhibit A attached hereto.

- 4. <u>Consideration.</u> As consideration for such license, SLWA will pay to City a License Fee of Fifty-Cents (\$.50) for each month a Warranty shall be in force (and for which payment is received by SLWA) for a Residential Property Owner ("License Fee") during the term of this Agreement. The first payment shall be due by January 30th of the year following the conclusion of first year of the Term. Succeeding License Fee payments shall be made on an annual basis throughout the Term and any Renewal Term, due and payable on January 30th of the succeeding year. Each License Fee payment herein shall be paid within thirty (30) days after it becomes due. SLWA shall include with each License Fee payment to City a statement signed by an SLWA corporate officer certifying the calculation of the License Fee. City will have the right, at its sole expense, to conduct an audit, upon reasonable notice and during normal business hours, of SLWA's books and records pertaining to any fees due under this Agreement while this Agreement is in effect and for one (1) year after any termination of this Agreement.
- 5. Indemnification. SLWA hereby agrees to protect, indemnify, and hold the City, its elected officials, officers, employees and agents (collectively or individually, "Indemnitee") harmless from and against any and all claims, damages, losses, expenses, suits, actions, decrees, judgments, awards, attorneys' fees and court costs (individually or collectively, "Claim"), which an Indemnitee may suffer or which may be sought against or are recovered or obtainable from an Indemnitee, as a result of, or by reason of, or arising out of or in consequence of any act or omission, negligent or otherwise, of the SLWA or its officers, employees, contractors, subcontractors, agents or anyone who is directly or indirectly employed by, or is acting in concert with, the SLWA or its officers, its employees, contractors, subcontractors, or agents in the performance of this Agreement; provided that the applicable Indemnitee notifies SLWA of any such Claim within a time that does not prejudice the ability of SLWA to defend against such Claim. Any Indemnitee hereunder may participate in its, his, or her own defense, but will be responsible for all costs incurred, including reasonable attorneys' fees, in connection with such participation in such defense.
- **Notice.** Any notice required to be given hereunder shall be deemed to have been given when notice is (i) received by the Party to whom it is directed by personal service, (ii) telephonically faxed to the telephone number below provided confirmation of transmission is received thereof, or (iii) deposited as registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, with the United States Postal Service, addressed as follows:

- 7. <u>Modifications or Amendments/Entire Agreement.</u> Any and all of the representations and obligations of the Parties are contained herein, and no modification, waiver or amendment of this Agreement or of any of its conditions or provisions shall be binding upon a party unless in writing signed by that Party.
- **8.** Assignment. This Agreement and the License granted herein may not be assigned by SLWA without the prior written consent of the City, such consent not to be unreasonably withheld.
- 9. <u>Counterparts/Electronic Delivery.</u> This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, all such counterparts will constitute the same contract and the signature of any Party to any counterpart will be deemed a signature to, and may be appended to, any other counterpart. Executed copies hereof may be delivered by facsimile or e-mail and upon receipt will be deemed originals and binding upon the Parties hereto, regardless of whether originals are delivered thereafter.
- 10. <u>Choice of Law/Attorney Fees.</u> The governing law shall be the laws of the State of Minnesota. In the event that at any time during the Term or any Renewal Term either Party institutes any action or proceeding against the other relating to the provisions of this Agreement or any default hereunder, then the unsuccessful Party shall be responsible for the reasonable expenses of such action including reasonable attorney's fees, incurred therein by the successful Party.
- **11. Incorporation of Recitals and Exhibits.** The above Recitals and Exhibit A attached hereto are incorporated by this reference and expressly made part of this Agreement.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF THE SERVICE LINE WARRANTIES OF AMERICA ("SLWA") IN-HOME PLUMBING REPAIR PROGRAM ("HOME SERVICE CONTRACT")

This Home Service Contract covers residential (single-family, detached dwelling units) in-home water supply lines and in-home sewer lines and all drain lines connected to the main sewer stack that are broken or leaking inside the home after the point of entry. Broken or leaking water, sewer, or drain lines that may be embedded under the slab or basement floor are also covered. This warranty also covers the repair of clogged toilets. Coverage is limited to \$3,000 per occurrence.

In order for a claim under this Home Service Contract to be valid, you must call SLWA at 1-866-922-9006 before any repair work is performed. All repair work must be performed by an authorized SLWA contractor. No payments will be made for repair work performed by a contractor not authorized by SLWA to make a repair.

By enrolling, you represent that your interior plumbing and draining systems are in good working order.

The Home Service Contract does not cover lines that you were aware needed repair before you enrolled in the Home Service Contract. You agree to permit SLWA contractors to come into your home to service, repair or replace your lines under the Home Service Contract.

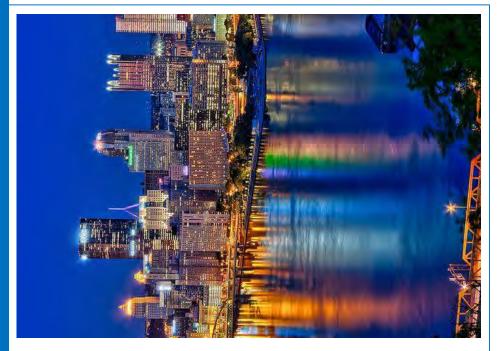

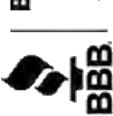

Excerpt from DRAFT City of Roseville Public Works, Environment and Transportation Commission Meeting Minutes

November 24, 2015

Continuation of Sewer and Water Private Services Discussion

As a follow-up to previous service line warranty program discussions, Mr. Culver provided historical information and references he'd pursued from other communities using this service; with all providing positive reviewed with the exception of one.

Mr. Culver introduced Ms. Shiwarski with Utility Service Partners in Pittsburgh, PA, for a short presentation to the PWETC and available to answer any questions of the PWETC afterward.

Ashley Shiwarski, Inside Sales Manager with Utility Service Partners, Inc., administrator of the service line warranty program through the National League of Cities

Ms. Shiwarski provided more detailed information than available in tonight's agenda packet as a bench handout, attached hereto and made a part hereof.

Ms. Shiwarski reviewed their program, including the educational aspects; typical listing by cities of available plumbers to perform work as needed through their firm's own research or by allowing the city to be as involved as they chose to be; and the three separate programs offered to customers by their firm: external water lines, external sewer lines, and internal plumbing.

Specific to Roseville with residents responsible for maintenance of their laterals up to the city main, as part of their premium, Ms. Shiwarski noted that Roseville residents would receive up to \$4,000 per repair incident, with no annual, calendar, or lifetime limits, a separation between their firm and others offering this service. Ms. Shiwarski noted there was also up to \$4,000 available toward each public street repair and \$500 for each sidewalk repair incident, with no deductibles or service fees.

At the request of Chari Stenlund, Ms. Shiwarski advised that their firm based their premiums on a standard across the United States, with 90% of their claims falling within that range cap of \$4,000. By request of current city partners, Ms. Shiwarski advised that their firm had tested out the option of providing in-home plumbing for several years before offering that option, initiated last year, and representing their newest offering by their firm after the point of entry of the laterals.

Ms. Shiwarski noted this could provide another small revenue stream, as their firm provided a 50 center/month revenue sharing plan to the municipality for each contract they received from individual homeowners as a form of royalty allotted to the city every January. Ms. Shiwarski advised that cities did a variety of things with that revenue, with the most common thing to develop a fund to assist low-income families with their utility bills or for those experiencing a high water bill due to a leak, and used to offset some of

the cost for that resident. Ms. Shiwarski noted other municipalities chose to put that revenue back into the public infrastructure program.

Specific to marketing their warranty program, Ms. Shiwarski reported that they do not do any door-to-door solicitation, but plan three separate campaigns in the spring, fall and winter to market each of their three products separately to limit confusion for residents. Ms. Shiwarski advised that residents could choose all three warranty programs, or any combination of the three. Ms. Shiwarski further reported that their firm did not send out any mailing to residents in a community without prior city review and approval of the marketing letter itself and envelope in which it will be sent. Ms. Shiwarski advised that this procedure was followed for each and every campaign, even if previously mailings had been approved by the municipality, allowing the city to have input on the mailing itself and the exact mailing dates. Ms. Shiwarski advised that their firm worked with each municipality on tools to limit calls to the city for the initial campaign, and to customize press releases for the media of the city's choice. Ms. Shiwarski advised that this typically involved a letter offering the city partnership and their firm's contact information, a customized web banner for the city website featuring a live chat for residents to visit with a customer service agent at their preference.

Once their firm partners with a municipality, Ms. Shiwarski reported that each city partner had access to their firm's online partner portal for city access and up-to-date resident enrollment for each product and a list of the number of claims and accruing royalty for the municipality. Ms. Shiwarski noted that each resident was surveyed to determine their satisfaction and to immediately address any problem areas.

Of their 290 municipal partners across the United States, Ms. Shiwarski noted there were seven in the State of MN as listed in the information provided to the PWETC tonight, including the City of St. Louis Park.

At the request of Member Cihacek, Ms. Shiwarski reviewed standard pricing for water, sewer and in-home plumbing averaging \$6.765, \$7.75 and \$6.99 respectively. Ms. Shiwarski noted that a resident could cancel at any time, and receive a refund of remaining premiums submitted.

At the further request of Member Cihacek, Ms. Shiwarski addressed how their firm maintained premium rates based on infrastructure prices nationally moving forward by basing their standard pricing on cities under 50,000 households and transferring that risk across the United States. Ms. Shiwarski noted that one city or year may result in a lot of claims, and others not, but by transferring those risks they were able to maintain that standard pricing to-date.

At the request of Member Cihacek, Ms. Shiwarski advised that their firm had not seen a significant price escalation over the last two years, and not typically with their current customer base. Ms. Shiwarski advised that their first client had been in West Virginia and their rates had been grandfathered in, with newer partners providing an opportunity to adjust rates accordingly to address risk.

Chair Stenlund asked if the rates escalated if using the service a lot.

Ms. Shiwarski responded that they did not, with every resident in a community paying the same rate no matter if or how often they used the warranty service. Ms. Shiwarski admitted there was no way to get around those who consistently abused the system, but reported that when the majority of their customers discovered what a repair could have cost compared to their premium, they were well satisfied and stayed with the warranty program.

At the request of Member Seigler, Ms. Shiwarski advised that their firm didn't need to legally get the city's approval before marketing its residents, but stated that their firm chose not to do so without city approval. By partnering with the city, Ms. Shiwarski noted that they were able to reach a greater amount of people and more generous coverage through that partnership with the National League of Cities than they could accomplish without that partnership; and therefore had chosen not to market independent of that partnership.

At the request of Member Lenz, Ms. Ashley confirmed that this warranty program was only available to single-family homes, unless a duplex had a single service line they could cover; but clarified it was not yet available to commercial properties.

If the city allows marketing of this program, Member Heimerl asked if it was accepting any additional legal risk or financial obligation for the city in endorsing this group.

Ms. Shiwarski advised that their agreement held the city harmless; with Mr. Culver noting that the City Attorney would need to review and report to the City Council providing assurances there was no city liability.

In referencing the three mailings by this firm, Member Wozniak asked if their focus was on educating the public by explaining their responsibility to maintain these utilities or simply aimed at selling them a policy. Member Wozniak opined that educating residents, as previously addressed by the PWETC, sounded attractive to help residents understand their responsibilities and cost liabilities for catastrophic failure of their service lines.

Ms. Shiwarski offered to provide Mr. Culver with a copy of their standard letter that started out stating the educational aspects for dissemination to the PWETC; but noted each municipality had input in that language as well and could customize it for their community and infrastructure situation.

At the request of Mr. Culver, Ms. Shiwarski confirmed that their firm typically sent out the letter to residents on city logo and including a co-signature by a city official, designated staff person or the city as a whole, at the preference of each municipality.

Mr. Culver reported that, during his research with another Minnesota community using the warranty program, some of its residents had become annoyed with the letter they were receiving after already subscribing to the warranty program but still receiving continued

mailings. Mr. Culver sought clarification from Ms. Shiwarski as to whether a resident would continue being solicited once they subscribed to the program.

Ms. Shiwarski advised that they would not receive additional solicitations for any service to which they subscribed, but may receive them for those services they had initially chosen not to receive. However, Ms. Shiwarski noted that all a resident had to do was call their firm and ask to be removed from future mailings. Ms. Shiwarski advised that their firm used their own mailing list by using their own mapping software, and not one provided by the city's utility company. Ms. Shiwarski advised that this way a city could state they were introducing this warranty program and assure their residents that the city wasn't giving out their personal utility information.

Chair Stenlund asked, without doing a community survey, if the city could seek interest of the community via an educational input, and receive their input to alert the public that this warranty program was being considered and seeking public comment and interest for such a program.

Mr. Culver suggested the Speak Up! Roseville website as another potential option.

If Roseville is interested, Ms. Shiwarski offered the services of their marketing team to help put that information out there.

Members agreed that there may be some concern among residents of another area of government intervention that they would prefer to avoid.

Member Cihacek opined that, as he heard the program described, he wasn't sure if that argument would hold weight for him, since residents had the option of accepting or opting out.

Member Lenz opined she found this fascinating, admitting before appointment to the PWETC, she had been unaware of her responsibilities as a homeowner for this infrastructure.

Member Seigler opined he was ready to sign up now.

At the request of Member Cihacek, Ms. Shiwarski advised the agreement between their warranty firm and a municipality was three years, with a 90-day opt out for either party.

Mr. Culver asked, if the city decided for whatever reason to discontinue the program after initially approving it, what would happen to those residents enrolled in the warranty program or whether they would be automatically removed from the program.

Ms. Shiwarski advised that any current customers would continue their service provided they continued their monthly premium payment; but no new customers would be enrolled.

Motion

Member Cihacek moved, Member Lenz seconded, recommending to the City Council that they pursue a potential agreement for this warranty opportunity with Utility Service Partners.

At the request of Member Seigler, Mr. Culver reported that he saw many positives for this warranty program and the only staff concern or negative he was aware of to-date was removing any incentive for residents to think long-term and consider proactive maintenance of their system. Mr. Culver opined that any resident subscribing to this warranty program would see no need to spend money on their line to protect against any current or future problems (e.g. root invasion).

Chair Stenlund concurred, noting that lack of interest would also be evident when a street construction project in area provided a good opportunity for that proactive maintenance or line replacement.

Mr. Stenlund advised that participation in this program would come into play with the City's I & I issues and requirements of the city by the Metropolitan Council to respond to and reduce that sanitary infiltration and inflow. If residents were not incented to be proactive in lining their sanitary lines, those cracked lines would continue to seep into the groundwater. However, Mr. Culver noted that the issue could still be resolved by implementing a point-of-sale requirement such as done by the City of Golden Valley and other municipalities. Mr. Culver advised that the city could work toward that even with this program in place and provide a financial savings to residents as well as easing their peace of mind. As Ms. Shiwarski stated, Mr. Culver agreed that the city was the first call made by a resident. Mr. Culver expressed his interest in taking this recommendation from the PWETC to the City Council to get their initial feedback.

Chair Stenlund reiterated his agreement that this would take away any incentive for residents to address their aging lateral infrastructure issues.

Ms. Shiwarski offered to provide Mr. Culver a report with information from various cities on I & I issues, showing residents are actually more proactive when having this warranty coverage. While it may be a slow leak and fear a large bill for repairs, Ms. Shiwarski noted the warranty program provided them with protection in place without deductible or service fees in addition to that coverage.

Motion carried.

Given this action, Mr. Culver asked if the PWETC wished to continue their discussion of lateral line ownership yet tonight. If this program is made available for residents, Mr. Culver noted it removed the risk of where that ownership ends. Mr. Culver noted Member Seigler's previous suggestion to cap costs to take care of the far side and near side issues through setting a cap at a certain limit or slightly above it and still provide some protection

to residents. Mr. Culver noted this would require a cost for the city and impact utility rates accordingly to offer such a cap. While it wouldn't cover the total costs of such a program, Mr. Culver suggested municipal revenue royalties from such an insurance program could serve to offset those costs.

Chair Stenlund stated he was not prepared to talk about an inspection cap at the property line any more at this time.

Member Cihacek stated that this remained his pet project and that he remained interested in pursuing potential bid alternatives in neighborhoods under construction for those residents desiring such an option, and for new construction moving forward but not old residences. With this program, Member Cihacek stated he was less concerned, as clean-up could be taken care of over time; but agreed to tabling further conversation on it until February or March of 2016 to review this program first to determine how well it would perform. However, Member Cihacek opined it provided a good solution for many of Roseville's residents and the aging infrastructure throughout the community.

Item Description: Private Sewer Service Lining Discussion

BACKGROUND

2 Over the past couple of years, staff and the City Council have had discussions about the maintenance

- of private sewer and water connections including current policies related to the ownership limits of
- 4 the service lines and how can and/or should the City assist in the maintenance of these service lines.
- 5 At their February meeting, the Public Works, Environment and Transportation Commission
- 6 (PWETC) received a presentation from a consultant who is a regional expert in the trenchless
- 7 rehabilitation of utility lines. This expert, Paul Pasko from SEH, Inc., provided a summary of what
- 8 other agencies around us, and some nationally, are doing to either require residents to line or replace
- 9 their service lines, or provide an option for rehabilitation. He also reviewed current technologies and
- the differences between main sewer line lining techniques and service line techniques.
- Staff will provide a summary of this presentation at this Council meeting, but we encourage the City
- 12 Council and any interested residents to watch the PWETC meeting to hear the presentation from Mr.
- Pasko. This archived video can be found by going to the following webpage:
- 14 http://www.cityofroseville.com/79/Public-Works
- and clicking on "Archived webstreamed meetings" and then selecting the 2016-02-23 meeting. The
- Sewer Services lining discussion begins at 13:00 minutes into the meeting and lasts about one hour.
- There is some very good information in this presentation the Commission members asked several
- 18 good questions.
- Staff will particularly focus on questions related to policy and if the City should require the
- 20 inspection of sanitary services and the lining of these services if they do not "pass" inspection. This
- 21 justification for this requirement would focus mostly on the long term prevention of Infiltration and
- 22 Inflow (I&I) that results in storm and/or ground water entering our sanitary sewer system and causing
- 23 additional expenses for the treatment of that water. However, this policy would also provide a
- program that would result in rehabilitated sewer lines providing long term peace of mind for
- 25 residents.
- 26 Attached are the minutes from the PWETC meeting.

27 FINANCIAL IMPACTS

- 28 There are no recommended costs to the City at this time however a policy discussion of contributing
- to the costs of rehabilitating private service lines would result in City expenses from the respective
- 30 utility fund.

31 STAFF RECOMMENDATION

- 32 Staff requests that the City Council receive this summarized presentation from staff and provide
- guidance going forward on a possible new policy and/or program for the lining of private sewer
- 34 services.

35 REQUESTED COUNCIL ACTION

Receive presentation and provide guidance to staff on further steps, if any.

HRSD has embarked on a pilot project that will identify and repair defective laterals (the pipes in yards that connect a nouse's plumbing to the city sewer pipeline in the street) at no cost to the homeowner. On the back of this flyer you will find a diagram of a sewer system and information about the methods of repair to be used if the tests explained below show that a lateral requires replacement.

The data we gather and the feedback we receive from the pilot participants will help us determine whether this is a program we should implement in other parts of Hampton Roads. If expanded, the project areas will be selected through coordinated efforts among HRSD and the localities it serves. Each future project would most likely include several hundred homes.

THE THREE TESTS

Imagine your air mattress has a small hole in it that is too

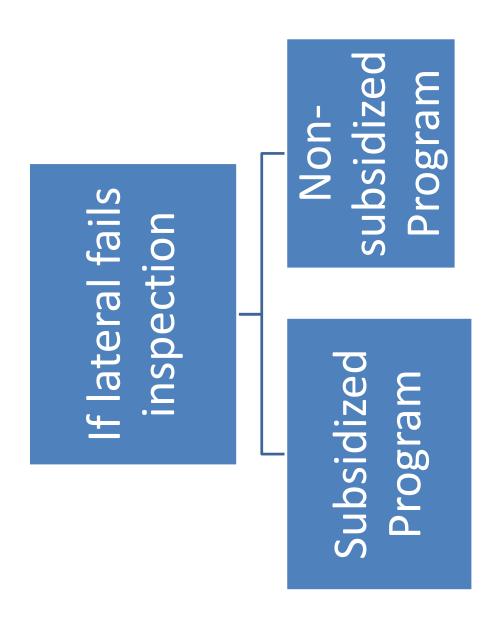

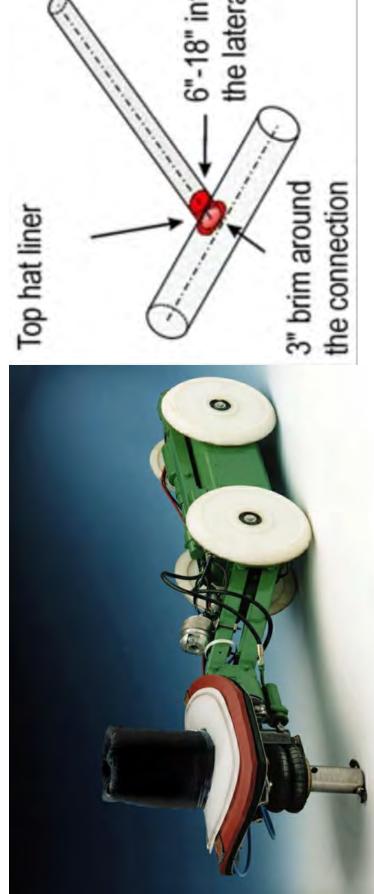


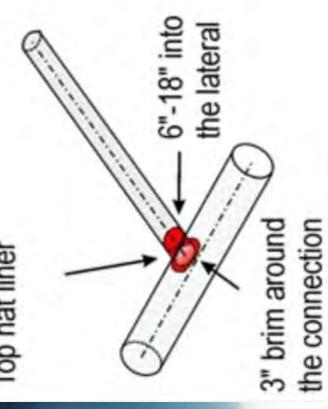

potential relocation to the sites of former shelters; report by staff of four watermain breaks over the last month; and attendance by staff at the recent meeting of the St. Paul Regional Water Services for its external customers.

Further discussion included the City's utility base rate structure being the envy of other metropolitan communities and intended to provide for future capital improvement program (CIP) planning for infrastructure updates and needs; and a future staff report to the PWETC on how and where tree trimmings end up.

Specific to PWETC questions related to the City of Roseville's purchase of water from St. Paul Regional Water Services (SPRWS), Mr. Culver advised that SPRWS's rate structure would be facing challenges to pay for improvements to their treatment facility and distribution system. Mr. Culver reported that the trend is for less water sales, and without a base rate, not as much may be sold as anticipated. Mr. Culver noted that the SPRWS's intent is to implement a base rate in the future that would theoretically build those treatment costs into it. While Roseville maintained its own infrastructure, that rate change may convolute the rate structure for Roseville; but he did anticipate future rate increases, but hoped they wouldn't be too excessive and impactful for Roseville residents. Mr. Culver noted that Roseville's water rates had not increased this year, while other customers had experienced increases.

5. Private Sewer Services Lining Options

Mr. Culver introduced Paul Pasko, Project Engineer and-Principal at S.E.H., Inc. and his credentials as someone considered in the industry as an experienced expert with lining technologies and practices in the Midwest area. Mr. Culver reported that Mr. Pasko had recently provided a presentation at a recent city engineer's conference based on his experience with watermain linings in the City of Hastings, MN. As a result of that very informative presentation, Mr. Culver advised that he had invited Mr. Pasko to share that presentation with the PWETC to outline options and what other metropolitan communities were doing to respond to this and similar issues.

Mr. Culver briefly reiterated, for background purposes, previous discussions of the PWETC about ownership of service laterals and the City Council's charge to the commission to recommend if any changes were evident. Mr. Culver reported that the City Council continued to question if there was more the City could do since it was pursuing an aggressive lining program for its aging sewer lines and in conjunction with that address some of those older laterals for which residents were responsible and to better protect those residents. As part of that consideration, Mr. Culver noted the yet-to-be-determined impact of inflow and infiltration (I & I) that the City of Roseville was undertaking as a mandate from the Metropolitan Council.

Mr. Pasko introduced his associate, Jen Schueman, in the audience, who worked with him on projects throughout Iowa, Wisconsin and Minnesota in addition to other Midwest areas.

 Mr. Pasko noted that his presentation would essentially ask and provide information on the following items:

- Why rehabilitate laterals?
- Administratively, how do other communities do it?
- What tools are they using?
- How much do the tools cost to use?

Mr. Pasko reviewed some points to consider, including those communities where I & I were drivers and the various options used in communities for rehabilitation of those laterals up to street reconstruction lines via assessment, including some of that work done by the City's contractor or a private owner's contractor, but still allowed to be applied as an assessment to property taxes.

Mr. Pasko reviewed the variables in the upper and lower laterals and options and challenges in both. If I & I is the driver, and the attempt is to hit the upper lateral, Mr. Pasko advised that many East Coast communities in the United States insist they have a right to make sure those lines are in compliance with code and that private property owners meet that code

Mr. Pasko noted that care was needed to ensure clear ordinance language that protected a citizen's Fourth Amendment Rights as it relates to unjust or arbitrary inspections of private property, frequently debated by courts, but able to be sufficiently addressed with a comprehensive ordinance in place prior to inspections and to protect municipalities. Mr. Pasko noted that this involved access to private property and parameters for that access, since there was obviously a potential liability for the city accessing private property and/or laterals (considered private property) through main manholes, especially when dealing with mishaps in using robotics. Mr. Pasko noted that if an unanticipated problem occurred with the robotics, there was always the possibility that the lateral line would need to be dug up to rescue the equipment; and suggested that would not be a good first test of a city ordinance.

Mr. Pasko also noted the need for an ordinance addressing expenditure of public money to rehabilitate private property and clearly defining those parameters or potential circumstances, such as the municipality subsidizing a portion of the rehabilitation of longer laterals. Mr. Pasko emphasized the need to make sure the ordinance was very clear about how, when and why public monies would be expended. Other than in several instances in the State of WI, Mr. Pasko advised that those Fourth Amendment questions were being sufficiently addressed from his perspective as long as the ordinances were enacted before rehabilitation was undertaken.

Specific to options used by other communities, Mr. Pasko reported on one who applied a \$50/month surcharge for private property owners choosing not to rehabilitate those private laterals as an incentive to encourage them to do so; while others used a subsidy for rehabilitation; and others chose not to provide any subsidy. Another community, for those property owners choosing not to rehabilitate their private laterals, chose to install an

- 124 inflatable ball where the city's line met the private lateral to prevent use of the main line
- 125 beyond their lateral until the property owner chose to correct problem areas.
- 126 Mr. Pasko reported other variables among communities: total subsidy for rehabilitation
- 127 borne by the city, options for lower lateral rehabilitation by a city contractor only, and
- 128 some of those done up to the wye, some to the edge of the road, and some up to the
- 129 rights-of-way. Mr. Pasko noted that upper lateral lining was done by either using private

130 or city contractors.

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Specific to Minnesota communities, Mr. Pasko provided a matrix of the options used by the Cities of Edina, Golden Valley, Shakopee, Hastings, and Rockford; and for comparison purposes, he included the City of Hampton Roads, VA in that matrix.

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Overall, Mr. Pasko opined that the most successful option he observed around the country was real estate transaction based, such as used by the City of Golden Valley, MN with point-of-sale inspections performed from within the home allowing a holistic viewpoint for both the upper and lower laterals. Mr. Pasko reported that some communities choose a dye or smoke test when possible. On the east coast, Mr. Pasko reported that over the last four years, they had experienced a turnover of homes at 10% to 15%, making those inspections a sustainable program, with the same home inspected periodically over a fifteen year period, and thereby compiling a database of information for the City's GIS system for comparison purposes. Mr. Pasko noted this was also possible for inspecting new homes being constructed annually and adding that data for future comparison purposes as well.

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Lower Lateral Tools Being Used:

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"Top-hat" style liner with the potential that it may be unable to fully wrap the trunk sewer main and only able to extend <18" into the lateral pipe. Mr. Pasko noted further problems with this tool include the brim not always being wide enough to find its way through or around tree roots, causing communities to shy away from using it.

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• "Shorty" style liner that does fully wrap the trunk sewer main, and extends 1-2' into the lateral pipe.

156 157 158 • "Longer" style liner that fully wraps the trunk sewer main and extends >2' into the lateral pipe and can be done with or without installing cleanouts. Mr. Pasko reported that the City of Shakopee, MN currently uses this tool.

Mr. Pasko noted that again, these choices are based on individual community ordinances and their specific issues.

How Much Do the Tools Cost to Use?

Mr. Pasko again provided a matrix comparing the cost for various options, and limits of the lateral rehabilitation, including:

- Up to the wye: estimated at \$2,000;
- Up to the edge of the road: estimated at \$3,000 to 7,000;
- Up to the rights-of-way (same as above)
- With the upper lateral, Mr. Pasko opined that most of the cost was the contractor's mobilization to get to the site; with the actual length of the lining not that problematic beyond the cost of the base project itself; estimating it at \$1,000 to \$2,000 based on his very schematic level opinion of construction costs.

As an example, in the City of Edina, with most of their single-family homes built pre- or post-World War II, they may experience 60% to 70% of those homeowners using private contractors.

If the City had cast iron laterals, Mr. Pasko suggested the city not bother and just leave them along. However, if the majority of the city's pipes were clay or orange bird piping, Mr. Pasko suggested that the city seriously consider a lateral lining initiative.

Based on his experience, Mr. Pasko briefly addressed lateral insurance or warranty programs, and reported on various communities throughout the country.

Mr. Pasko provided one example of the city forces undertaking that private lateral work themselves rather than hiring an outside contractor, essentially using city labor and equipment. Mr. Pasko advised that part of their rationale was that it provided them another opportunity to interact with customers in a positive way, and whether or not the lateral rehabilitation program is also subsidized or not, they claim they've been successful in their endeavors.

Mr. Pasko provided other examples, such as in the Philadelphia area where the municipality chose a for-profit warranty program at reasonable rates. However, Mr. Pasko noted that this created some significant increases in utility rates of up to a \$1 increase in one year; and some communities were limited in the number of contractors serving in this capacity. Mr. Pasko noted that most of the warranty program agreements allow the municipality to build in a clause for choosing contractors or only quotes from local contractors. Mr. Pasko cautioned that there were pros and cons with this type of warranty program, one of which was whether or not the municipality may be endorsing certain plumbers above others. Mr. Pasko noted that he had found with municipalities partnering with these warranty programs, their residents had been engulfed with mass mailings from the plumbing industry.

Again, Mr. Pasko emphasized the need for appropriate ordinance language to protect the municipality and its residents.

218 Q&A

219 During and after the presentation, Mr. Pasko responded to questions of the PWETC.

Chair Stenlund noted that, overall, the lower laterals in Roseville were not typically a problem for I & I.

Given the age of the community and its infrastructure, Mr. Pasko opined that this was most likely due to backfilling of pipes in rights-of-way done to a higher standard with inspection staff on-site than may be found in current construction efforts. Mr. Pasko noted that the other side of the laterals were usually more problematic outside that right-or-way line with private contractors being less diligent in packing soils. Mr. Pasko noted that this was problematic nationwide, with findings that the lower lateral is better compacted than the upper lateral as it related to I & I.

Chair Stenlund noted that some mains were not under the road in Roseville, but may be located on one side or the right-of-way or the other, and affected homeowners accordingly for rehabilitation costs. Member Stenlund questioned if those situations would be redlined as good candidates to consider for lining sooner than later.

Mr. Pasko responded that lining was paid for by the foot; and as an example, there were many situations where whether or not that lateral was on the short or long side, those homeowners on the short side got more of a bargain than those on the long side. Mr. Pasko noted that some communities stipulate that all property owners pay the same to equalize factors; but if not a lot of those situations, that was not taken into consideration beyond a unique situation. Mr. Pasko noted that there were many different ways for a community to approach that inequity.

Chair Stenlund questioned problems with flows coming toward the lining and creating a plug.

Mr. Pasko responded that there were not, and as an engineer, a pre-lining television inspection (after cleaning the line) was performed and if active I & I was found, it may be addressed with a plug, while tree roots were removed. After that, Mr. Pasko noted that the end cap was cut off and then inspected again, and if the problem or indication of a problem during installation was observed, it was removed and the process done again. Mr. Pasko advised that he uses a two-year inspection clause for lining contractors, requiring them to re-inspect and correct any problems on their own dime. While it varies with contractors, Mr. Pasko advised that the best lining contractors average 2% or less with problem areas.

At the request of Chair Stenlund, Mr. Pasko advised that the liner has a built-in taper, with minimal identification loss, and while there may many roots and problems within the pipes, there was little problem or evidence of problems from flushable items getting

caught in the laterals with the smaller and smoother liner applications now available with improved technologies.

Member Wozniak asked if there was a limit to the pipe condition in which lining would work (e.g. broken, disjointed or disconnected) that determined if and when the liner tool would still prove effective.

Mr. Pasko advised that the only problem was a pipe was a pipe with 50% or more missing; and even then if technicians were gentle in the lining, they could still blow right through that broken or missing area, essentially creating a pipe within the pipe. Mr. Pasko noted that the only problematic situations he'd observed were if a pipe had been crushed or offset and became oval or teardrop shaped. At that point, Mr. Pasko suggested it may be better to dig and replace that spot, or in areas with a sag. Again, Mr. Pasko noted the need to address that clearly in ordinance language to address rights and responsibilities for laterals for homeowners and the municipality.

At the request of Chair Stenlund, Mr. Pasko estimated the typical cost for each cleanout would be \$1,500 to \$2,500 each, and perhaps up to \$3,000 for vacuuming.

Based on his experience, Member Seigler asked Mr. Pasko if those communities offering a warranty program were happy with it.

Mr. Pasko opined that it varied: with older communities getting more than new communities; along with some property owners pushing back or not wanting to participate based on their preference for less government intervention.

Chair Stenlund asked staff to report on the percentage overall in Roseville of PVC, clay or cast iron laterals.

Mr. Culver noted that, with the majority of the Roseville sewer system installed in the late 1950's, and primarily in the 1960's, most lines were clay, but he wasn't able to identify how much if any were cast iron. Mr. Culver noted that, obviously, new lines were of PVC construction, but those were few and far between unless in new construction situations.

Mr. Pasko noted that this would fit in with most of the upper Midwest and national averages, with clay popular at the turn of the century through the 1970's until use of cast iron, then trending to PVC once that technology became available.

Given the age of most of the homes in Roseville, Member Seigler asked when a large amount of lateral failures could be anticipated.

Mr. Pasko advised that it had a lot to do with soil type and trees in their vicinity. Based on the amount of Roseville's tree cover, Mr. Pasko opined that there was probably a lot of root damage that had already occurred or was occurring right now. Mr. Pasko noted that the sub-grade soils around Roseville varied; and if you had heavy clay soils, any

defect in joints when the laterals were put together were probably leaking water. If those soils were sandy, Mr. Pasko opined that most of the surrounding trees were drinking water out of those laterals and had been doing so for some time.

Mr. Culver referenced the permit information previously supplied to the PWETC for sewer services (September 2015) and advised that those numbers continued to increase. When televising city mains, Mr. Culver reported that they looked the short distance available into laterals, and when seeing an obvious root intrusion, those property owners were sent a standard courtesy letter alerting them to that observation.

Mr. Pasko briefly reviewed some of the new inspection tools available in that everchanging technology and ability for television inspections that can pan and tilt about 1' into the lateral. Also, if no root intrusions are observed, Mr. Pasko advised that a small crawler attached to the main robot can be deployed to move up the lateral into the home carried by a tether.

If there are too many roots present or a sag, Mr. Pasko noted there is also technology for a mobile probe through the home's inside cleanout consisting of a low voltage probe to hit the pipe, then another section grounded to a sign post or fire hydrant to ground it and complete the circuit. Mr. Pasko advised that this allows the operator to measure how much current arrives at that ground from the probe and from the amount of current back estimate or calculate the amount of I & I that can go in. Mr. Pasko noted that this also provided a nice and repeatable measure from one year to the next. However, Mr. Pasko noted that it also depended on the operators on those cameras and their skill levels; again requiring ordinance parameters that clearly define potential problem areas and variables.

At the request of Member Cihacek, Mr. Pasko confirmed that the contractors performing lining of mains and those lining laterals were two separate specialties with their equipment also radically different at this time. Mr. Pasko noted that lining of mains was becoming more common and specialized, and those contractors didn't want to stop that process to deal with laterals. Mr. Pasko advised that he had yet to see any contractor make lining laterals part of lining main lines. Mr. Pasko noted that it was more common to line the mains one year and return the next year to line laterals.

In the City of Edina, Mr. Pasko reported that when they do street reconstruction, they will also rehabilitate or line laterals, but that is typically done by a different contractor while still allowing private owners to take advantage of a better rate for that contractor to do multiple linings once mobilized. In other words, as suggested by Member Cihacek, if the City of Roseville bid street reconstruction, and chose to bid laterals while the street was torn up, it made sense to do so, but otherwise there was no benefit to bidding them together. Mr. Pasko reiterated that he didn't see those technologies merging anytime soon; since those operating the joysticks differ. Mr. Pasko advised that the skill sets of most of those operators were amazing; with some of the best he'd observed having previously been drone pilots, and transferring those skills to this technique.

- From his perspective, Chair Stenlund asked Mr. Pasko for his opinion on why or how a homeowner could be responsible for a portion of the line under the street and beyond his right-of-way; and without any power on their part to control what occurs around or near
- 355 that line, such as compaction or traffic vibrations. Chair Stenlund also sought Mr.
- 356 Pasko's observations of other communities and their practice.

Based on his experience across the country, Mr. Pasko advised that he was only personally aware of one community that stops ownership at the property line or right-of-way. Mr. Pasko advised that the responsibility of the owner usually went to the main and includes the wye, with the private property owner responsible for the lateral and wye connection that comes into the main to make it a complete pipe. Furthermore, Mr. Pasko noted that it was common on the east coast for ownership of the wye and lateral up to the main. Mr. Pasko recognized that the wye was generally the first part to break.

Mr. Pasko noted that the State of MN was actually progressive in that a private property owner didn't own water service to the main or half or all of the curb stop box; and advised that many communities across the nation do so.

Mr. Pasko opined that depending on the situations and technology to employ them, he suspected that the use of cleanouts was coming to an end. Mr. Pasko noted that it wasn't unusual for private plumbers to carry liners into home basements or install cleanouts next to the foundation wall but not in a right-of-way.

Member Seigler asked if water laterals and linings had the same issues as that of sanitary sewer lines as far as deterioration.

While water mains were similar in terms of trouble spots and many can be rehabilitated using similar technology, Mr. Pasko noted that it depended on the community and its type of soil. Mr. Pasko advised that 30% to 60% of pipe wall loss was being experienced in communities with 1920's era infrastructure. Mr. Pasko anticipated that in the next ten years, technologies will be available allowing for water service pipes of ½" diameter to be lined, once the materials used are certified; with some being experimented with now.

Mr. Culver reported that S.E.H., Inc. will be designing and administering a Roseville project lining the water main on Heinel Drive due to it being a long dead-end street and creating difficulties for those residents if an open cut process was used. Mr. Culver advised that this new technology for water main lining was different than the previous pilot program using 3M spray-on material.

On behalf of the PWETC, Chair Stenlund thanked Mr. Pasko for his informative presentation and discussion.

6. Roseville Recycling Request for Proposals (RFP) – continued from January Mr. Culver referenced the staff report and attachments; highlighting specific items remaining for PWETC recommendation. Mr. Culver also provided a summary of the 60 comments and questions received via the Speak Up! Roseville website.
