2. ROLL CALL/PUBLIC COMMENT

3. APPROVAL OF MINUTES - FEBRUARY 2 MEETING

Commission Recommendation:

Minutes for the February 2 meeting were unanimously approved.

4. WHEATON WOODS PARK DEDICATION

Brokke explained the proposed Wheaton Woods Housing project on the Northwest quadrant of Dale Street and County Road C. The project is for the development of 17 single family homes. The Commission needs to recommend either cash or land purchase for park dedication to the City Council for the project. Cash would be \$3,500 per home, land amount is approximately .58 acres. Gelbach commented that in the housing proposal, the Rice Creek Watershed District is listed. Actually the project would be in the Ramsey-Washington County Watershed District. Commissioners discussed the value of cash vs. land for the project. **Doneen made a motion to request cash, in lieu of land for this project. Second by Becker-Finn. Motion passed unanimously.**

5. REVIEW PROGRESS FOR THE CEDARHOLM GOLF COURSE CLUBHOUSE REPLACEMENT PROCESS

Commissioner Holt said there was a great response from the community for members to serve on the Clubhouse Advisory Team. Twenty-one applications were received. Holt and Gelbach reviewed the applications. In order to not limit involvement, they decided that all applicants would be invited to be on the advisory team. This will bring the total number of persons on the team to thirty-one. O'Brien said she thought recruiting members for the team was well publicized. March 17 will be the first meeting. Letters will be sent soon to applicants, along with a packet of information.

6. REVIEW FINANCIAL STATUS OF THE PARKS AND RECREATION RENEWAL PROGRAM

Brokke reviewed the handout sections for the packages and projects for the renewal program. The general categories listed on the handout are:

Section #1 – Packages: Buildings, Shelters, and Site; Skating Center Repairs, Nature Center, Bridges and Boardwalk, Lighting, Tennis Court Reconstruction/Resurface, Field Improvements, Irrigation Replacements and Upgrades, Natural Resources, Disc Golf Course, County Road B-2 and Victoria Sidewalk/County Road B, Sidewalk/ Pathways at various parks, and Playgrounds Section #2 – Land Acquisition: Rosebrook – Press Gym Site, Property at Hamline/Lydia, SW Acquisition and Development

Section #3 – Administration: Planning and Management, Litigation and Bonding Costs

 Brokke went over details on the renewal funding and expenses. There were a total of 77 projects and this was the largest construction project for the city. The projects are 95% complete and the majority of the work should be done in 2016. Brokke reviewed the original budget, award amount, current spending and the difference. The total amount of funds not spent is \$435,464 under budget. It was noted the ASU estimate of added construction costs due to the litigation was 12%.

Becker-Finn suggested adding handicapped push button access to the new park buildings, if there is funding available. Brokke noted for the new playgrounds, the Community Builds have been very well received and plans are to incorporate them into future playground projects. Brokke thanked the Commission, the Community, the City Council and Staff for all the support on the park renewal projects. Brokke said Jeff Evenson, park superintendent and staff lead on the project did a great job of managing the program and projects.

The Natural Resource program will be continuing in 2016. O'Brien said there were comments on nextdoor.com regarding the resource program in Materion Park. Some neighbors were concerned about the changes taken place. Other neighbors were able to respond and explain the changes were for the benefit of the park. It was good to have their involvement. Brokke said Stantec, the Natural Resource contractor, has received around \$300,000 in grants funding so far.

Stoner commented that the revenues listed for the new park building rentals was very good and over original estimates.

Doneen said he would like to see the city partner with the School District on the SW Roseville area.

Stoner requested that the Commission be made aware of future volunteer opportunities with natural resource projects and community playground builds.

7. ELECTION OF CHAIR AND VICE CHAIR

After discussion, Holt made a motion to elect Terrance Newby chair, second by Gelbach. Motion carried unanimously. Holt also made a motion to elect Gelbach as Vice Chair, second by Doneen. Motion carried unanimously. Commissioners thanked Stoner for serving as chair for the last year. Brokke extended congratulations to Newby and Gelbach on their election.

8. STAFF REPORT

Brokke reported:

- Volunteer Appreciation Night will be this Thursday, March 3 at the Skating Center
- Women's World Bandy Championships were held at the OVAL Feb 17-21
- Brad Tullberg has resigned as Skating Center Superintendent to take a position with the City of Brooklyn Park
- The last date the OVAL will be open for the season will be March 3

9. OTHER

Becker-Finn informed the Commission there is a petition being circulated by residents for adding a sidewalk on Victoria Street, between County Roads C and D. Plans are to present it to the City Council in March.

Stoner asked about the acquisition of the land on Marion Street. Brokke said it will be discussed by the City Council this Monday, March 7.

102 Stoner presented plaques to Commissioners Holt and Doneen for their years of service to the 103 104 Commission. Stoner commended them for their dedication and effort with the Commission. 105 Brokke also thanked Holt and Doneen. He said it's great to have the Commission members to get input on situations that affect the department. 106 107 108 Seven applications have been received for the two openings for the Commission. The City Council will conduct interviews on March 7. 



Orientation:

The Cedarholm Clubhouse Replacement Advisory Team has been put in place to discuss the future of Roseville Cedarholm Golf Course's Clubhouse. Team members introduced themselves by telling a bit about their golf background and relation to Cedarholm

Staff and Facilitator, Dave Holt discussed;

- The primary focus of this committee: To engage the community, identify funding options and opportunities, explore partnerships, create a preliminary building function concept as it relates to the replacement of the clubhouse, and learn more from and about other communities and to provide a report and recommendation to the City Council.
- Committee member's roles: to attend meetings, be actively engaged, engage residents, keep residents informed, keep groups informed, and share progress with others and to help get word out about what is happening, why and how residents can participate.
- The proposed Meeting schedule: Some conflicts were pointed out. It was recommended that 3 dates be changed; June 16th, July 21st and August 18th were changed to June 9th, July 14th and August 11th. The group also talked about meeting locations being changed from the clubhouse to a new park building. Dates are yet to be determined

Background Materials

Parks & Recreation Director, Lonnie Brokke reviewed the City & Department organizational charts, Golf Operations & Clubhouse Replacement Routes discussions to date.

- Cedarholm Golf Course was built in 1959. It was purchased in 1967 by the City of Roseville and was named after former Mayor Emil Cedarholm. The 3,200 sq. ft. clubhouse and 1,800 sq. ft. maintenance building sits on 22 acres of property. Parking is limited to 66 cars and Cedarholm currently operates as an enterprise fund.
- Annual rounds played at Cedarholm Golf Course are not what they once were in the 1990's but continue to be
 near the top year after year among Metro Area par-3 golf courses. Cedarholm offers 12 leagues that host nearly
 850 golfers per week.

- Current trends such as foot-golf and fling-golf have been looked into over the past couple years but have been considered a poor fit for Cedarholm at this time due to current number of rounds of golf played.
- During the winter, Cedarholm is used for cross-country skiing, snowshoeing and sledding while clubhouse rentals are available to public year round.
- Cedarholm has a full time superintendent and a ¾ time clubhouse manager. Salaries may spike year to year based on line items being bulked together.

Review of Preliminary Work done by Commission & Council:

- The Parks and Recreation Commission have been working with the City Council on Capital needs for Cedarholm. They have also done a range of background work on specific Clubhouse needs. The City Council has given the guidance to work with community members to replace the existing clubhouse. Commission & Council work has been provided in today's meeting packet.
 - The Park and Recreation Commissions work to date has been a look at current and future operations, current and future activities at the golf course, current financial position, area surveys, capital improvement needs and renewal program similarities.
- Discussions with Finance Commission representatives have also occurred. The Finance Department has provided information in the meeting packet.
- The time frame of this project is looking to be completed near the end of 2017.

Preliminary Clubhouse Options provided by the Parks & Recreation Commission were reviewed:

Four options for clubhouse replacement were presented to the City Council. The advisory committee will not be limited to these four options. The golf course has been identified as a valuable asset to the City. In sizing a clubhouse replacement, it was the desire of the Commission & City Council to be sure it not only served the needs of today, but also into the future.

Some key features should be considered when looking into replacement of the clubhouse.

- The deck in all cases is considered a valuable amenity.
- A basement could be considered to store carts and other things.
- The maintenance shop is currently functional but should be considered in the future.
- Overall site space is limited. A tour of the 2 facilities will be available before next meeting.

Advisory Committee Members inquired into the new Park Buildings:

Anfang spoke briefly on current Park Building operations.

- The replaced park buildings located around the city have opened with an overwhelming response. City Council recently approved the hire of a ½ time position to coordinate the use of the buildings. The buildings realized approximately \$35,000 in revenue in 2015.
 - o More detailed building usage and rental information will be provided at the next meeting.
 - The City of Roseville also has larger buildings available for use. The Nature Center and Guidant John Rose Minnesota OVAL meet the needs of larger groups.
 - The Arboretum is also available as an outdoor facility to provide a more intimate setting.

Clubhouse Tour

Sean McDonagh, Golf Course Superintendent, provided a verbal tour of the clubhouse.

Advisory Team members suggested extending the meeting times to better address all areas of discussions. Facilitator Dave Holt responded that the schedule appears to be flexible to fit those needs and that opportunity will be addressed throughout the process. It was also suggested that future meeting themes and ideas be combined to save time. This too will be considered as the group works through the process.

Meeting #2 will feature municipal golf professionals from around the metro.




