Item Description: Approve Terms of 2016 – 2018 IUOE Local 49 Maintenance Contract

BACKGROUND

The City of Roseville has four collective bargaining units, the Police Sergeants - Teamsters; Police Officers- LELS; Maintenance Workers - IUOE Local 49, and the Fulltime Firefighters - IAFF. With approval of this contract all contracts are settled through at least 2017.

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This report is for the Local 49 maintenance unit, which has 30 city employees participating in the bargaining unit. They perform a variety of maintenance duties in the Public Works and the Parks and Recreation Departments. The City and the union have a tentative agreement and the contract terms will be implemented upon ratification of this contract.

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The City and union reviewed and compared 10 other maintenance contracts in the metro area to negotiate this contract, as well as making internal comparisons.

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City staff and union members from the Local 49 have met and found common ground through mediation for a settlement on a contract that spans three years. The membership has voted to accept the contract terms with implementation upon City Council approval and effective upon ratification. The following are the highlights of the contract:

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CONTRACT DURATION:

3 years from 1/1/16 - 12/31/18

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WAGES & LONGEVITY:

The City will provide a wage COLA for of the years of the contract as follows:

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- \triangleright 1/1/16 increases all Local 49 union classifications by 2%.
- ➤ 1/1/17 increases all Local 49 union classifications by 2.75%.
- > 1/1/18 increases all Local 49 union classifications by 2.75%.

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For 2018 wages ONLY:

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If the 2018 average of the COLA's for the 10 comparison cities is an averaged COLA amount of 3% or above an adjustment to wages will occur to meet that of the average for the COLA. As an example, if the average comes in at 3% after all settlements are in then all unit members will receive

a 3% cost of living adjustment for 2018 rather than the scheduled 2.75% wage adjustment.

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INSURANCE:

Same as City Council has provided to all other City staff.

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STANDBY:

Increase standby pay by \$3 to \$300 per week assigned and if assigned on a City observed holiday then provide an additional hour pay at the employee's base pay rate for that day.

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UNIFORMS:

Increase uniform allowance by \$50 for all classifications to \$425 annually to include the now required boots and \$175 annually for the mechanics who do not wear full uniforms.

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COMPENSATORY TIME:

Increase compensatory time allowable by 20 hours to accrue up to a 70 hour max.

POLICY OBJECTIVE 50

- Each year the City budgets wage and benefit adjustments for all employees. The adjustments stem 51 from the best information known or anticipated from the metro labor market, labor settlements and 52
- consumer price indexing. 53

BUDGET IMPLICATIONS

The budget as approved is sufficient to meet the 2016 contract terms. However, Council will need to 55 provide adequate funding for the subsequent years. 56

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends approval of the 2016 -2018 Local 49 contract terms. 58

Item Description: Termination of Planned Unit Development (PUD) Agreement 1385,

approved by the Roseville City Council on July 13, 2009.

1 REQUEST AND BACKGROUND

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- 2 Recently Wellington Management has contacted the City seeking a termination of the former
- 3 PUD that is recorded against 2167 Lexington Avenue and 1126 Sandhurst Avenue so that they
- 4 can complete the sale of the Lexington addressed property to the current tenant.
- 5 On July 13, 2009, the City Council approved Roseville Crossings LLC (Wellington
- 6 Management) request for a planned unit development on the former Twin Cities Federal (TCF)
- 7 site at 2167 Lexington Avenue and for the property at 1126 Sandhurst Drive.
- 8 PUD Agreement 1385 was recorded against the property on August 12, 2009 and on July 11,
- 9 2010, the City Council approved an extension to the development deadline established in PUD
- 10 1385 to allow an additional year to commence development. Below are the four conditions
- approved as a component of the PUD amendment:
 - 1. The Developer is hereby given an additional one year to commence the development activity required under the Agreement.
- 2. Section 4.5 of the Agreement is hereby amended to read as follows:
- Failure by the DEVELOPER to commence development activity in accordance with the 15 final development plans or within two years following the final approval of this PUD will 16 necessitate the approval of an extension of the development schedule by the City Council 17 18 prior to the expiration of the two year period. If an extension is not applied for, the Council may instruct the Planning Commission to initiate rezoning to the least intensive 19 zoning district consistent with the land use designation of the Comprehensive Plan. For 20 21 purposes of this provision, development activity shall be defined as obtaining a building 22 permit and beginning construction on the site.
- 3. The parties reaffirm the Agreement as hereby amended, and agree that except as amended, all other terms and conditions of the Agreement shall remain the same.
- 4. The Developer agrees to pay all costs incurred by the City in recording this Agreement with the Ramsey County Recorder and/or Registrar of Titles.
- In the ensuing years after the PUD was approved a number of factors led to the demise of the
- proposed redevelopment project. As such, and since July 13, 2011, the Planning Division has
- 29 considered the existing PUD to be no longer valid.

- 30 On December 13, 2010, the City Council adopted a new Official Zoning Map which changed the
- 31 zoning of the two subject properties of PUD 1385 from Single-Family Residence District (R-1)
- and General Business District (B-3) to Community Business District (CB) and adopted a new
- 33 Zoning Ordinance.
- 34 Given the rezoning and new design standards for the Community Business District, the Planning
- 35 Division concluded (since July 2011) that a rezoning was unnecessary as the existing CB
- designation is a lower business zone classification than the former B-3 district.
- Wellington Management has indicated 2167 Sandhurst is not a part of the sale and therefore theis
- property will need to be rezoned per the approved PUD.

- 40 Based on the fact that the project never came to fruition and the approved project has exceeded

11. Election Costs and Payments

11.1 **Regular Elections**

Payments to cover the costs incurred by the County in the performance of the provisions of this Agreement for regularly scheduled elections will be made by the City in eight equal quarterly amounts for each two-year budget period, for a total of 16 quarterly payments during the Initial Term of the Agreement, based on invoices submitted by the County. Payments will be due on March 31, June 30, September 30 and December 31 of each year.

The cost of election services for Regular Elections for the 2017-2018 calendar years will be \$132,464.

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The County will provide the cost for the 2019-2020 calendar years to the City no later than April 1, 2018. The County will base the cost for the 2019-2020 budget period on the actual cost for the previous similar election years, adjusted as necessary by the County to account for the following factors: 1) estimated voter turnout; 2) labor contracts and agreements for non-represented employees approved by the Ramsey County Board of Commissioners; 3) changes in the Consumer Price Index for the Minneapolis-Saint Paul metropolitan area, as determined by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics for the previous two-year period; 4) changes in state, federal, County or City legal requirements, as applicable; and 5) other factors having a significant impact on election costs.

14. Entire Agreement

This Amendment, together with the parties' original Agreement (attached hereto as "Attachment A"), shall constitute the entire agreement between the parties and shall supersede all other oral and written communications. The provisions of this Amendment shall govern and control over the commensurately numbered paragraphs of the original Agreement. This is an agreement between the County of Ramsey, through the Ramsey County Elections Office, 90 West Plato Boulevard, St. Paul, MN ("County") and the City of Roseville, 2660 Civic Center Drive, Roseville, MN for the provision of election services by the County ("Agreement").

1. Term

This Agreement will be in effect for the four-year period from January 1, 2013 through December 31, 2016 ("Initial Term"), unless earlier terminated pursuant to the provisions of this Agreement.

2. Renewal and Termination

This Agreement may be renewed for one additional four year period by written agreement of the parties, in the form of an amendment to this Agreement. An amendment for renewal of this Agreement must be executed by all parties no later than June 1, 2016.

This Agreement may be terminated by any party by written notice to the other parties no later than June 1 of any year, effective on January 1 of the following year. Upon termination of this Agreement, the City-owned voting equipment, election supplies and related materials will be returned to the City.

3. County Responsibilities

Except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, the County will provide all services, equipment, and supplies as required to perform on behalf of the City and all election-related duties of the City under the Minnesota election law and other relevant state and federal laws. These duties will include but are not limited to:

- Recruitment, training, and supervision of staff to carry out the duties specified in this Agreement;
- Annual inspection of polling places to verify compliance with all state and federal accessibility requirements;
- Recruitment, training, and assignment of election judges;
- Payment of compensation to election judges in an amount determined by the Ramsey County Board of Commissioners;
- Operation, maintenance, testing, demonstration, storage, and technical support for electronic voting systems;

- Maintenance, storage, and replacement of voting stations for each polling place and for absentee voting purposes;
- Preparation and transportation of voting systems, voting stations, and other election materials to and from each polling place;
- Providing election forms, supplies, and other related materials for each polling place;
- Conducting preliminary tests and public accuracy tests of electronic voting systems;
- Programming, layout and printing of ballots for City elections;
- Compilation and reporting of election results and election statistics for dissemination to the appropriate canvassing boards and the public;
- Providing election-related information on the County web site;
- Conducting recounts for City offices and ballot questions;
- Preparing, posting, and publishing election notices;
- Providing information and assistance on election laws and procedures to City officials, candidates, the news media, and the general public;
- Administering absentee voting;
- Administering campaign financial reporting and economic disclosure activities;
- Performing duties of candidate filing officer, including acceptance of affidavits of candidacy and petitions;
- Analyzing proposed state and federal laws on election-related matters to determine impact on the City;
- Maintaining a database and preparing maps of election district and precinct boundaries;
- Providing technical assistance to the city council in redrawing precinct boundaries as required;

- Retaining election records for at least 22 months following each election; and
- Retaining permanent archive of election results.

4. <u>City Responsibilities</u>

The City will perform the following election-related responsibilities:

- Conduct official canvass of election results following each City election;
- Provide the title and text of City questions to be placed on the ballot;
- Accept affidavits of candidacy and filing fees from candidates for City offices;
- Administer Roseville Ordinance 103.105 relevant to campaign finance reporting;
- Provide final approval for polling place locations; and
- Designate a person who will be the principal contact for the City.

5. Office Space and Equipment Storage

The County will provide suitable office and warehouse space to conduct all election-related activities and for storage of election equipment and supplies.

6. <u>Upgrading or Replacing Voting Systems</u>

The County is in the process of acquiring a new voting system for state, County and City elections. The cost of upgrading or replacing voting systems is not included in this Agreement and will be the subject of a separate agreement.

7. Special Elections

- 7.1 The County will conduct all special elections required by law during the term of this contract. The costs of all special elections that are not held concurrently with a regularly scheduled state, County or City election will be paid separately from payments for regularly scheduled elections under this contract.
- 7.2 The City will pay all costs of any City special election that is not conducted on the date of a regularly scheduled City, County or state election. The City will also pay all costs applicable to the City of any state special election that is not conducted on the date of a regularly scheduled City or state election.

8. <u>Insurance</u>

During the term of this Agreement, the County and City will maintain, through commercially available insurance or on a self-insurance basis, property insurance coverage on the voting equipment each owns and for the repair or replacement of the voting equipment if damaged or stolen. Each party shall be responsible for any deductible under its respective policy. Each party hereby waives and releases the other parties, their employees, agents, officials, and officers from all claims, liability, and causes of action for loss, damage to or destruction of the waiving party's property resulting from fire or other perils covered in the standard property insurance coverage maintained by the parties. Furthermore, each party agrees that it will look to its own property insurance for reimbursement for any loss and shall have no rights of subrogation against the other parties.

9. Indemnification

Each party to this Agreement will be responsible for its own acts and omissions, and the acts and omissions of its officials, employees, and agents, and the results thereof, to the extent authorized by law and shall not be responsible for the acts of the other party, its officials, employees, and agents, and the results thereof. Liability shall be governed by applicable law. Without limiting the foregoing, liability of the parties shall be governed by the provisions of Minnesota Statutes Chapter 466 (Tort Liability, Political Subdivisions) or other applicable law. This provision shall not be construed nor operate as a waiver of any applicable limits of or exceptions to liability set by law. This provision will survive the termination of this Agreement.

10. <u>Legal Representation</u>

The Ramsey County Attorney's office will advise and represent the County in all election-related matters except that the Roseville City Attorney will advise the County on any election-related matter applying to the Roseville municipal code.

11. <u>Election Costs and Payments</u>

11.1 Regular Elections

Payments to cover the costs incurred by the County in the performance of the provisions of this Agreement for regularly scheduled elections will be made by the City in eight equal quarterly amounts for each two-year budget period, for a total of 16 quarterly payments during the Initial Term of the Agreement, based on invoices submitted by the County. Payments will be due on March 31, June 30, September 30 and December 31 of each year.

The cost of election services for Regular Elections for the 2013-2014 calendar years will be \$107.500.

The County will provide the cost for the 2015-2016 calendar years to the City no later than April 1, 2014. The County will base the cost for the 2015-2016 budget period on the actual cost for the previous similar election years, adjusted as necessary by the County to account for the following factors: 1) estimated voter turnout; 2) labor contracts and agreements for non-represented employees approved by the Ramsey County Board of Commissioners; 3) changes in the Consumer Price Index for the Minneapolis-Saint Paul metropolitan area, as determined by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics for the previous two-year period; 4) changes in state, federal, County or City legal requirements, as applicable; and 5) other factors having a significant impact on election costs.

11.2 Special Elections

The County will submit an invoice payable within 30 days of receipt to the City for all costs incurred by the County to conduct a special election.

11.3 Costs resulting from changes to election laws

The County will notify the City of additional costs that it will incur as
a result of changes to applicable election laws. The County will
include and separately identify in any invoice for a regular election
or a special election the cost that was incurred as a result of the
enactment of new election laws.

12. <u>Data Practices</u>

All data created, collected, received, maintained, or disseminated for any purpose in the course of this Agreement is governed by the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act, any other applicable statute, or any rules adopted to implement the Act or statute, as well as federal statutes and regulations on data privacy.

13. Alteration

Any alteration, variation, modification, or waiver of the provisions of this Agreement shall be valid only after it has been reduced to writing and duly signed by all parties. Any amendment must be approved no later than June 1 of any year for implementation on January 1 of the following year.

14. Entire Agreement

This Agreement shall constitute the entire agreement between the parties and shall supersede all prior oral and written negotiations.

PLANNING COMMISSION ACTION

The public hearing for this application was held by the Planning Commission on May 4, 2016, and voted 7-0 to recommend approval of the requested subdivision text amendment.

BACKGROUND

- 2 City Code §1103.06 establishes requirements for minimum lot sizes and parameters for how lots
- are shaped. Recent application of these requirements, some established with the original
- 4 Subdivision Code in 1956 and some much more recently, in 2008, has proven challenging, and
- 5 Planning Division staff is presently developing a timeline for working with a consultant to
- 6 rewrite the Subdivision Code. That timeline might realistically extend until late 2016 and even
- 7 into 2017, but Planning Division staff has been receiving a large number of inquiries from
- 8 homeowners who are seriously considering subdividing their parcels and staff hopes to gain
- 9 clarity on the following lot size and shape parameters before a high volume of subdivision
- applications are submitted.

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SUMMARY OF THE PROPOSED TEXT AMENDMENTS

\$1103.06A & B: Minimum Residential Lot Size

- The residential lot size language from 1956 (i.e., 85 feet in width, 11,000 square feet in area, and
- so on) worked well up until the new zoning code was adopted in 2010; under the updated zoning
- code, however, the original lot size parameters have continued to apply to single-family lots in
- LDR-1 zoning district, whereas smaller single-family lots (i.e., 60 feet wide and 6,000 square
- feet) are allowed in the LDR-2 district, and even smaller single-family lots (i.e., 40 feet wide and
- 4,800 square feet) in the MDR district. Since the 2010 zoning standards were adopted, approving
- plats with lots for single-family detached homes has been largely problematic if those single-
- family lots have been less than 85-feet wide and 11,000 square feet in area. The proposed
- amendment deletes the size specifications from this section of the subdivision code, refers the
- reader to the applicable zoning district standards, and re-letters the subsequent code provisions.

23 §1103.06F: Side Lot Lines

- 24 When Ordinance 216 was adopted in April 1956, creating Roseville's Subdivision Code it
- focused on regulating community growth through plats and developments that converted
- agricultural or unused land into residential, commercial, and industrial subdivisions. The
- 27 provision that became §1103.06F (i.e., "Sidelines of lots shall be substantially at right angles or
- radial to the street line.") ensured that lots were designed with regular, predictable shapes. When
- 29 the application of this regulation is in the context of a new plat with new streets, compliance is
- relatively easy to achieve. But this provision is much more difficult to apply—and comply
- with—when minor subdivisions of two or three lots are proposed parcel by parcel.
- Based on some of the recommendations of the 2007 Single-Family Lot Split Study, the
- Subdivision Code was amended in 2008 such that §1103.06F now reads "Side lines of lots shall
- be at right angles or radial to the street line," eliminating the word "substantially," and §1104.05
- specifies that the Variance Board is responsible for acting on subdivision variance requests
- through the same process as zoning variances. Individual minor subdivision applications of
- existing parcels in suburban subdivisions (that frequently are not laid out in a rectangular grid)
- have proven to be increasingly challenging to process as a result of these amendments to an
- outdated Subdivision Code that regulates all subdivisions as though they are large plats of open

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- 41 Strictness of Side Lot Line Requirements
- Having adopted stricter requirements for how new lots are shaped, fewer subdivision proposals
- are able to meet those standards. If Roseville is to continue to allow single-family residential lots
- 44 to be subdivided or split if they meet the standards, as recommended in the lot split study, then
- Roseville should adopt less rigid standards that are more easily met by a variety of parcels.
- The other option is to decide that adhering to the stricter lot-shape standards is more important to
- 47 the community than allowing new parcels to be created that meet or exceed the size and area
- standards. This decision is within the City's legislative authority, but it would mean that some
- 49 potential subdivisions of relatively large parcels would be prohibited if new side lot lines are not
- strictly perpendicular or radial to the street line.

Subdivision Variances

- If the City Council were to decide to maintain strict requirements for the alignment of new side
- lot lines, it would be inappropriate to then encourage subdividers to seek variances from those
- 54 strict requirements. Code requirements should be amended as necessary to fairly reflect what
- Roseville intends to support or prohibit, reserving variances for those instances of actual hardship
- or practical difficulty.

- The variance remains an important tool in certain circumstances, but the existing code provisions 57
- separate the decision-making responsibilities between the Variance Board, which is responsible 58
- for deciding whether to approve a variance request (e.g., for a not-strictly-perpendicular side lot 59
- line), and the City Council, which retains the authority to approve or deny the proposed 60
- subdivision. Under this arrangement, a decision by the Variance Board to deny a subdivision 61
- variance essentially decides that the subdivision cannot be approved, even though the Variance 62
- Board lacks the authority to act on subdivision applications. 63
- Flag Lots 64
- Flag lots are not prohibited, per se, but the strict "right angles or radial" provision is a de facto 65
- prohibition of the deflections in lot lines (or "zigzagging", as the lot split study report calls it) 66
- necessary to create a flag lot. Planning Division staff suggests that if flag lots are effectively 67
- prohibited, the Subdivision Code should state more explicitly that flag lots are not permitted. 68

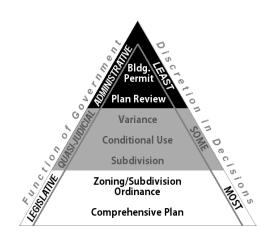

This language from 1956 worked well up until the new zoning code was adopted in 2010, but since that time, the above lot size parameters have continued to apply to single-familylots in LDR-1 zoning district, but smaller single-family lots (i.e., 60 feet wide and 6,000 square feet) are allowed in the LDR-2 district, and even smaller single familylots (i.e., 40 feet wide and 4,800 square feet) in the MDR district. Since these new zoning standards were adopted, approving plats with lots for single-family detached homes has been problematic if those single-family lots have been smaller than 85-feet wide and 11,000 square feet in area. Based on the initial discussion with the Planning Commission on April 6, 2016, the proposed amendment will delete the size specifications, refer the reader to the applicable zoning district standards, and re-letter the

- When Ordinance 216 was adopted in April 1956 and published in The Rose Tribune, §7(f)(7) looked like this:
- •(7) Side lines of lots shall be substantially at right angles or radial to the street line.

Later recodifications of Roseville's City Code changed the numbering of that particular section to §1103.06F, as it is today, but the language was unchanged for 50 years. A current survey of subdivision requirements in Roseville's neighboring communities yielded the following:

- Little Canada §1006.020.D.: Side lines of lots shall be approximately at right angles to street lines or radial to curved street lines.
- Maplewood §34-8.(f)(5): Sidelines of lots shall be substantially at right angles or radial to the street line.
- Arden Hills §1130.07 Subd.4: Side lines of lots shall be substantially at right angles or radial to the street line.

- Shoreview §204.030(C)(4): Side lines of lots shall be substantially at right angles to straight street lines, or radial to curved street lines.
 - New Brighton §26-12(4): Side lines of lots shall be substantially at right angles to the street line.
 - Falcon Heights §109-51(a): The lot size, width, depth, shape and orientation and the minimum building setback lines shall be appropriate for the location of the subdivision and for the type of development and use contemplated.
 - (b): Lot dimensions shall conform to chapter 113, zoning.

Most of these regulations are strikingly similar to Roseville's provision, and in each of those cases, the regulation of lot size and shape followed sections establishing standards for street design, right-of-way configuration, and the size and shape of blocks. Subdivision codes arranged in such a way seem to have focused on regulating new growth of their communities through plats and developments that converted agricultural or unused land into residential, commercial, and industrial subdivisions. Section 1103.06F establishes a requirement that aims to ensure lots are designed with regular, predictable shapes. Lots might be sort of pie-shaped around cul-de-sacs or curves, but they should be more or less rectangular along straight streets. When the application of that regulation is in the context of a new plat with new streets, such regulations are quite sensible and compliance is relatively easy to achieve. But Planning Division staff asserts that this same provision is much less sensible—and compliance is much more difficult—when minor subdivisions of two or three lots are proposed parcel by parcel.

In 2007, the City Council engaged the community in a Single-Family Lot Split Study to evaluate the impact of minor subdivisions on the community and to develop an appropriate course of action for regulating them into the future. The study yielded several recommendations. These recommendations are most germane to the present topic:

- A. General Single-Family Residential Subdivision Policy
 - 1. The City Council should continue to allow single-family residential lots to be subdivided or split if they meet the standards set forward by the City Code. (Consensus Recommendation)

B. Subdivision Code

- 2. The City Council should amend the Subdivision Ordinance to include variance language not currently found in this code by reiterating the variance language found in the Zoning Code. (Consensus Recommendation)
- 3. The City Council should amend the lot line requirement within the Subdivision Ordinance to require that lot lines are perpendicular to the front property line unless a variance is obtained. (Consensus Recommendation)
- 7.a. The City Council should allow the creation of flag lots and continue to hear them through the variance process. (Majority Recommendation—6 votes)
- 7.b. The City Council should prohibit the creation of flag lots within the City. (Minority Recommendation—2 votes)
- Based on the report and the input from public hearings and Planning Commission recommendations, the City Council amended the Subdivision Code in 2008 such that §1103.06F now reads "Side lines of lots shall be at right angles or radial to the street line," eliminating the

word "substantially," and §1104.05 specifies that the Variance Board is responsible for acting on subdivision variance requests through the same process as zoning variances. Individual minor subdivision applications of existing parcels in suburban subdivisions (that typically are not laid out in a rectangular grid) have proven to be increasingly challenging to process as a result of these amendments to an outdated Subdivision Code that regulates all subdivisions as though they are large plats of open land.

What follow are some observations and comments about internal conflicts or unintended consequences of the lot split study recommendations and the subsequent code amendments.

- Having adopted stricter requirements for how new lots are shaped, fewer subdivision proposals will be able to meet those standards. Planning Division staff posits that if Roseville is to "continue to allow single-family residential lots to be subdivided or split if they meet the standards" then Roseville should either adopt standards that are more easily met by a variety of parcels or formalize the fact that adhering to the stricter lot-shape standards is more important to the community than facilitating subdivisions and creating new parcels that meet or exceed the size and area standards. Planning Division staff believes, though, that it is inappropriate to maintain strict requirements and encourage subdividers to seek variances from them.
- The variance remains an important tool in certain circumstances, but the existing code provisions separate the decision-making responsibilities between two bodies. If a minor subdivision application were submitted for approval of a new parcel that, for some reason, had a new side lot line that was not quite radial to the street line, a variance would be required. The existing Subdivision Code makes the Variance Board responsible for deciding whether to approve the variance request, but the City Council retains the authority to approve or deny the proposed subdivision. If the Variance Board were to find that the hypothetical proposal did not meet the test for approving the variance for a non-radial side lot line and denied the variance, that decision would be final. In cases like this, the Variance Board's decisions essentially decide whether a subdivision can be approved even though they don't have the authority to act on subdivision applications.
- Flag lots are not prohibited, *per se*, but the strict "perpendicular or radial" provision is a *de facto* prohibition of the deflections in lot lines (or "zigzagging", as the lot split study calls it) necessary to create a flag lot. Planning Division staff suggests that if flag lots are not supported, the subdivision code should be clear about that, especially since it's difficult to imagine what sort of "hardship" or "practical difficulty" would support a variance to create a flag lot where a more conventional subdivision is not possible.

In light of the problematic Subdivision Code language discussed above and the large number of subdivision applications that could be submitted before a comprehensive revision to the code can be completed, Planning Division staff recommends an amendment that substantially relaxes the "perpendicularity" requirement so that reasonable subdivisions of irregular parcels can be considered and evaluated by staff, the public, and the CityCouncil for whether the proposals conform to the purpose and intent of the provisions governing the shapes of new parcels. Staff recommends the following amendment:

F. Side lines of lots shall be at right angles or radial to the street line. The shapes of new lots shall be appropriate for their location and suitable for residential development. Lots with simple, regular shapes are considered most appropriate and suitable for residential development because the locations of the boundaries of such lots are easier to understand than the boundaries of lots with complex, irregular shapes, and because they ensure greater flexibility in situating and designing homes for the new lots.

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PROJECT FILE 0001, Amendment 4 1 a. Request by the City of Roseville to clarify regulations in City Code, Title 11 2 (Subdivisions) pertaining to configuration of boundaries for new single-family lots 3 and to clarify applicability of specified lot size standards. 4 Chair Boguszewski opened the public hearing for PROJECT FILE 0001 at 7:04 p.m. 5 Senior Planner Bryan Lloyd reviewed the request as detailed in the staff report dated May 6 4, 2016 and rationale for suggested changes and specific to minimum residential lot sizes 7 (Section 1103.06.A and B) and side lot lines (Section 1103.06.F). Mr. Lloyd presented 8 9 some graphical depictions of hypothetical subdivisions, attached hereto and made a 10 part hereof, to illustrate how the existing requirements can produce lot shapes that might not be intended by the code even though the subdivision might conform to the 11 requirements. 12 Mr. Lloyd noted that some Subdivision Code language remained from when Ordinance 13 216 was originally adopted in April of 1956 and compared with today's reality were no 14 long applicable in a nearly-developed first-ring suburb such as Roseville. 15 At the request of Member Daire, Mr. Lloyd provided verbal and illustrative examples of 16 flag lots in Roseville and other metropolitan suburbs that were not within the confines of 17 the code's intention. 18 19 For clarification purposes, Chair Boguszewski noted that the changes outlined and recommended by staff in the report, lines 142 - 164 were mostly directive with 20 21 subsections guiding and defining the basic rationale for the language revisions. Chair Boguszewski noted these provided some flexibility in interpreting general guidelines 22 23 when considering those lots considered suitable and appropriate, while giving some semblance of a parallel or perpendicular nature. 24 25 Mr. Lloyd agreed that was a good characterization, with the intent of the code to provide for regular and predictable lots, but the ability for review on a case by case basis. 26 Chair Boguszewski opined that, with agreement from his colleagues, this language could 27 28 be incorporated with the other recommended language revisions, keyed back to the 29 underlying zoning district, and all within one motion; as confirmed by Mr. Lloyd. Member Daire clarified with Mr. Lloyd that Item 3.F (line 161) categorically forbade flag 30 31 lots, with the exception of if and when a variance was indicated for a specific situation. Mr. Lloyd advised that, as a result of a previous Lot Split Study Task Force undertaking, 32 staff found conflicting situations after enactment of the current subdivision ordinance. 33 While the Task Force hadn't wanted to prohibit flag lots, the majority of the task force 34 35 members indicated if someone came forward to pursue a flag lot, it could be considered if 36 subjected to a variance process, and based upon square footage, and lot width and depth. 37 38 Member Bull stated his issue in keeping city code succinct, and in his interpretation of the initial Item F, and then the following language in lines 147 – 164, it caused flags to go up 39 for him. While understanding staff's clarification, Member Bull sought to ensure the code 40 was not using vague terms, such as "geometric" that could be defined with multiple 41 regular shapes, including circles and cones that would be considered undesirable. 42 Member Bull opined he found the proposed revised language too subjective (e.g. line 43 157) when talking about irregularities, and questioned who was responsible for making 44 45 that call; and suggested something needed to be described to help with that definition. 46 Member Bull reiterated his preference that any code revisions remove vagarities and be 47 more definable for users of the code. Mr. Lloyd advised that, in general he agreed that clear and simple is preferable to 48 convoluted and vague. However, in this case, Mr. Lloyd advised that the attempt was to 49 remove a clear statement (line 142) that in reality was simply not feasible geometrically 50 speaking. Therefore, Mr. Lloyd advised that the intent of the revised language was not to 51 be brief, but address the actual reality of working with simple shapes, whether that meant 52

rectangles, squares, cones or pie shapes, with it being hard to characterize as

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RCA Exhibit A

directionally-linear. As to who decides, Mr. Lloyd noted that ultimately the City Council had that role as the final body reviewing and approving or denying subdivision request. As to what is too irregular, Mr. Lloyd admitted he wasn't sure he could specifically address that, and may have to rely on a lot as it related to other parcels like it in that location or with a more objective review.

In such a situation, Chair Boguszewski asked what recourse an applicant would have if they submitted an application and it was deemed by staff as too irregular, and how they could appeal that decision.

Mr. Lloyd advised that staff can support or not support an application and make a recommendation accordingly to the City Council. However, if that body determined differently from staff's recommendation, Mr. Lloyd opined that the appeal process would be subject to court relief if not applicable for the City Council serving in their role as the Board of Adjustments and Appeals.

At the request of Chair Boguszewski, Mr. Lloyd clarified that the application would not end at the staff level, but the applicant could decide if they wanted to see the application process through to the Planning Commission and City Council even without staff's support; or they could choose to withdraw their application and not spend time and money to ultimately reach a potential similar point later on.

Member Daire opined that it struck him that there were fewer and fewer options for development and subdivisions in Roseville; and if situations developed with enough caveats or ways our for a property owner's development rights to not be unduly limited, as fewer opportunities are available, more qualifiers were needed to address that possibility. Having been part of a planning staff once, Member Daire, expressed his sympathetic recognition of staff's desire to open the door to development but at the same time have the ability to defend the rationale for that development.

Mr. Lloyd agreed that was valid on the city's point for rationale requirements and adherence with them or variance requests; but noted the city didn't need to facilitate an infinite number of subdivisions unless proven acceptable with the intent of the city's code as indicated by the Lot Split Study report supporting continued allowance of parcel subdivisions as appropriate. Mr. Lloyd noted the numerous building permit applications coming through the city for home additions to homes built in the 1950's without enough space unless encroaching on setbacks, it prompted many variance requests in the past. Rather than leaving such over-limiting requirements in place when the city consistently approved those previous variance requests in the past, Mr. Lloyd opined it had prompted the city to now be in this position when a parcel was large enough to accommodate a subdivision. Mr. Lloyd also noted that the easier subdivisions had already been done, leaving those more challenging to remain. Therefore, if the city continues to support those subdivisions, Mr. Lloyd opined that it made sense to have regulations in place rather than requiring an applicant to come forward with a variance request.

Chair Boguszewski closed the public hearing at 7:33 p.m.; no one spoke for or against.

MOTION

Member Cunningham moved, seconded by Member Murphy to recommend to the City Council APPROVAL of the proposed AMENDMENTS (Subdivisions) to Roseville City Code, Section 1103.06, based on the comments and findings of the staff report dated May 4, 2016.

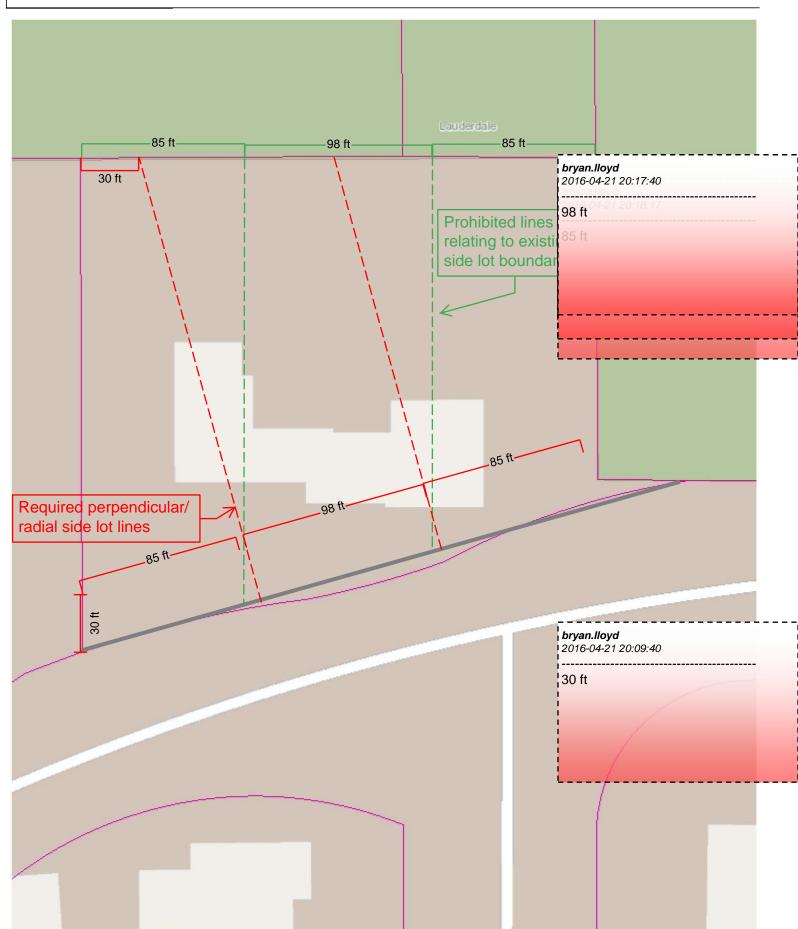
Chair Boguszewski stated his agreement with this revised language and indexing it to underlying zoning. However, Chair Boguszewski also agreed with Member Bull's concerns in not having "wishy-washy" terms, while at the same time he offered his support for paragraphs one and two providing more factors for consideration of and not limiting subdivisions, but outlining a process before seeking a variance. Chair Boguszewski opined that within the philosophy of government, the human element couldn't be completely removed; and spoke in support of the motion.

Member Murphy expressed his appreciation of the concerns expressed by Member Bull; but spoke in support of the motion, based on lines 137-141 specifically. While it may take

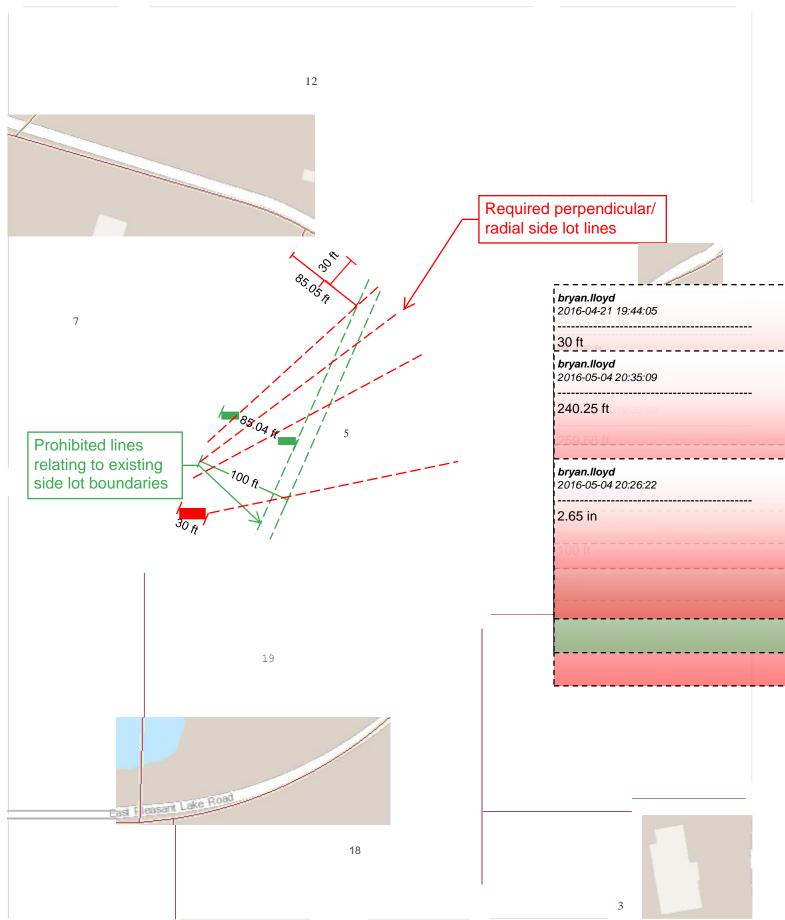
108 109	a few words to accomplish that goal, Member Murphy opined that the language did support the overall goals.

ORDINANCE NO. ____

AN ORDNANCE AMENDING TITLE 11 OF THE CITY CODE CLARIFYING THE INTENT AND APPLICABILITY OF CERTAIN SUBDIVISION REGULATIONS

The City Council of the City of Roseville does ordain:

Section 1. The Roseville City Code is hereby amended as follows.

1103.06: LOT STANDARDS:

- A: The minimum lot dimensions in subdivisions designed for single-family detached dwelling developments shall be: shall be those of the underlying zoning district as defined in Title 10 of this Code, or of the intended zoning district if the subdivision is in conjunction with a zoning change, in addition to any requirements herein defined.
 - 1. Eighty five (85) feet wide at the established building setback line and on outside street curvatures.
 - 2. Not less than one hundred ten (110) feet in minimum depth.
 - 3. Not less than eleven thousand (11,000) square feet in area.
- B: The minimum corner lot dimensions for single-family detached dwelling developments where permitted under the Zoning Code shall be:
 - 1. One hundred (100) feet wide at the established building setback line.
 - 2. Not less than one hundred (100) feet in depth.
 - 3. Not less than twelve thousand five hundred (12,500) square feet.
- C:B: The minimum dimensions at the rear lot line of any lot shall be thirty (30) feet.
- D:C: Butt lots shall be platted at least five (5) feet wider than the average interior lots in the block.
- E:D: Streets.
 - 1. Public Streets: See Section 1103.021.
 - 2. Private Streets: Private streets may be allowed by the Council in its discretion provided they meet the following conditions:
 - a. Are not gated or otherwise restrict the flow of traffic;
 - b. Demonstrate a legal mechanism will be in place to fund seasonal and ongoing maintenance; and
 - c. Meet the minimum design standards for private roadways as set forward in Section 1103.021. (Ord. 1359, 1-282-2008)
- F:E: Side lines of lots shall be at right angles or radial to the street line. (Ord. 1359, 1-28-2008)The shapes of new lots shall be appropriate for their location and suitable for residential development. Lots with simple, regular shapes are considered most appropriate and suitable for residential development because the locations of the boundaries of such lots are easier to understand than the boundaries of lots with complex, irregular shapes, and because they ensure greater flexibility in situating and designing homes for the new lots.

- 1. Lots which are appropriate for their location and suitable for residential development often have:
 - a. side lot lines that are approximately perpendicular or radial to front the lot line(s) of the parcel(s) being subdivided, or
 - b. side lot lines that are approximately parallel to the side lot line(s) of the parcel(s) being subdivided, or

- G:F: Double frontage lots shall not be permitted, except:
 - 1. Where lots back upon a thoroughfare, in which case vehicular and pedestrian access between the lots and the thoroughfare shall be prohibited, and (Ord. 216, 7-5-1956)
 - 2. Where topographic or other conditions render subdividing otherwise unreasonable. Such double frontage lots shall have an additional depth of at least twenty (20) feet greater than the minimum in order to allow space for a protective screen planting along the back lot line and also in such instances vehicular and pedestrian access between lots and the thoroughfare shall be prohibited. (Ord. 245, 5-101958)
- H:G: Lots abutting upon a water course, drainage way, channel or stream shall have an additional depth or width as required to assure house sites that meet shoreland ordinance requirements and that are not subject to flooding.
- **EH:** In the subdividing of any land, due regard shall be shown for all natural features such as tree growth, water courses, historic spots or similar conditions which, if preserved, will add attractiveness and value to the proposed development. (Ord. 216, 7-5-1956; amd. 1995 Code)

- J:I: Where new principal structures are constructed on lots contiguous to roadways designed as major thoroughfares in the City's Comprehensive Plan, driveways servicing such lots shall be designed and constructed so as to provide a vehicle turnaround facility within the lot. (Ord. 993, 2-10-1986)
- Where new single-family residential lots are created on a new street, the driveway cut for the new lot must be placed within the new street. (Ord. 1359, 1-28-2008)

Section 2. Effective Date. This ordinance amendment to the City Code shall take effect upon the passage and publication of this ordinance.

The applicant's proposal to rezone to HDR-2 is predicated on a 62-unit senior housing project

foot-tall building. Under the HDR-1 classification, the 1.79 acre site supports a maximum of 43

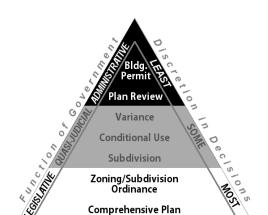
units (24 units/acre x 1.79 acres), while the HDR-2 classification has a minimum density of 24

units per acre and no maximum density limit. The proposal by Good Samaritan Society proposal

calculates at 34.5 units per acre.

Unlike other processes that the City considers, a rezoning request cannot place a condition on the

- rezoning request that limits the future development of the parcel to that which the applicant has
- 40 indicated. In instances where a high density residential development is proposed, the City often
- studies the potential traffic to be generated, because a change in the zoning would allow Good
- Samaritan or another developer the ability to maximize the site's density potential assuming all



- requirements of the City Code can be met. In the case of the Good Samaritan proposal, SRF
 Consulting Group was hired by the Public Works Department to study two scenarios:
 - 1. The proposed 62-unit senior housing project.

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- 2. 250 units, which is deemed the maximum number of units a developer could construct on the site given City design standard limitations.
- According to the traffic study (Attachment C), overall operations at all intersections in the study area will operate under the acceptable level of service A (LOS), and no roadway network improvements are necessary for the 62-unit development. If the higher density residential scenario is developed, Ramsey County would consider adding a right-turn lane at Albert Street for west bound traffic on County Road B since this turning movement increases. A shared access to the existing Rose Mall apartments should also be considered to reduce conflict points.
- HDR-1 and HDR-2 districts were created as two exclusive zoning districts that are compatible with the HR designation in the Comprehensive Plan. Planning Division staff, therefore, finds that the proposed rezoning is consistent with the guidance of the Comprehensive Plan.
- The required open house meeting for this proposal was held by the applicant on January 14, 2016. A summary of the discussion at the meeting is included with this report in Attachment E.

PUBLIC COMMENT AND PLANNING COMMISSION ACTION

- On May 4, 2016, the Roseville Planning Commission held the duly noticed public hearing requested by Good Samaritan Society. At the hearing two citizens addressed the Commission indicating their support for both the rezoning and the proposed affordable senior housing project.
- Planning Commissioners asked several questions of staff pertaining to the difference of HDR-1 to HDR-2, specifically the increase in density, building height, and structure placement on the property. City Planner Paschke indicated that the HDR-2 standards required increased setback for more impactful projects and that the Code also required that the structure be placed near the intersecting streets.
- The Planning Commission voted 7-0 to recommend approval of the rezoning of 1415 County Road B PIN 10-29-23-34-0006 from HDR-1 to HDR-2 based on the comments and findings of the project report dated May 4, 2016. The minutes extract can be found on Attachment F.

RECOMMENDED CITY COUNCIL ACTIONS

- **a.** Adopt an Ordinance rezoning the property addressed at 1415 County Road B from High Density Residential-1 District to High Density Residential-2 District.
- **b.** Pass a motion to table the application for future action. Tabling the rezoning would require extension of the 60-day action deadline established in Minn. Stat. 15.99.
- **c. By motion, recommend denial of the request.** A recommendation to deny the application should be supported by specific findings of fact based on the Planning Commission's review of the application, applicable City Code regulations, and the public record.

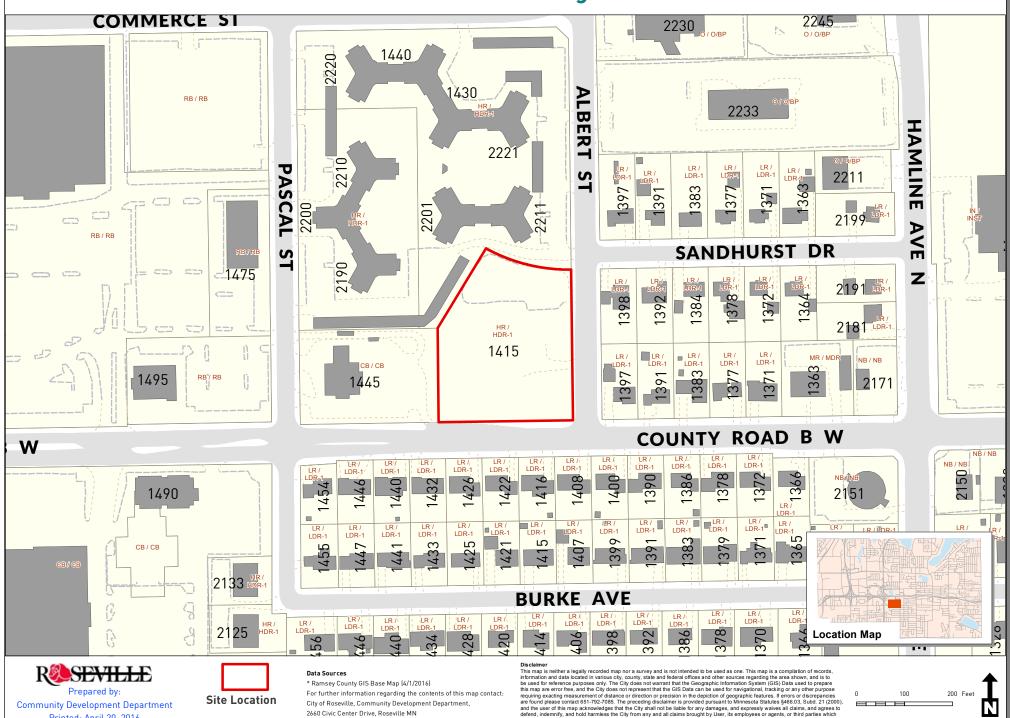

Subject: County Road B Traffic Study

Introduction

As requested, SRF has completed a traffic study for a proposed senior housing development located in the northwest quadrant of the County Road B/Albert Street intersection in the City of Roseville (see Figure 1: Project Location). This study will evaluate the trip generation and traffic impacts associated with two land use scenarios: the proposed senior housing and the maximum allowed for high-density residential. The main objectives of the study are to review existing operations, evaluate potential traffic impacts of the development scenarios, and recommend improvements to ensure safe and efficient operations. The following information provides the assumptions, analysis, and study recommendations offered for consideration.

Existing Conditions

The existing conditions were reviewed to establish a baseline to compare and determine any future impacts associated with the proposed expansion/development. The evaluation of existing conditions includes peak hour intersection turning movement counts, field observations and an intersection capacity analysis.

Data Collection

Weekday a.m. and p.m. peak period intersection turning movement and pedestrian/bicyclist counts were collected at the following study intersections on Tuesday, February 23, 2016 and Wednesday, February 24, 2016.

- County Road B/Albert Street
- Albert Street/Sandhurst Drive *
- Albert Street/Commerce Street *

Note: 30-minute pulse counts were conducted at these locations to understand general travel patterns. Traffic volumes were adjusted to reflect peak hour conditions.





Project Location

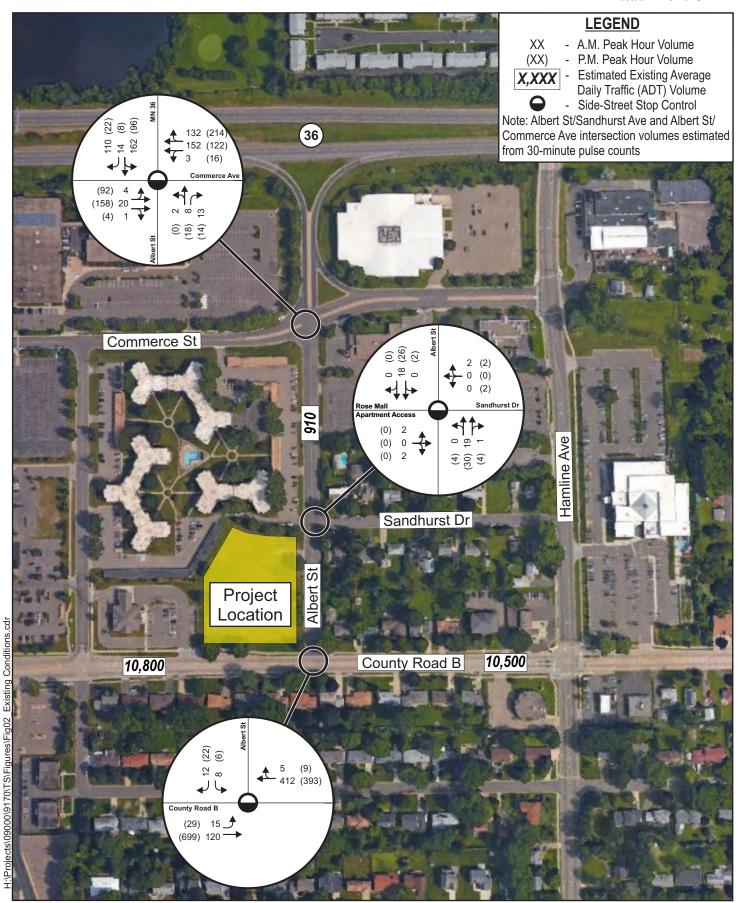
Observations were completed to identify roadway characteristics within the study area (i.e. roadway geometry, posted speed limits, and traffic controls). Currently, County Road B is a three-lane roadway with a two-way left-turn lane (TWLTL) with a posted speed limit of 35 miles per hour (mph). Albert Street is a four lane undivided roadway with a speed limit of 30 mph. Commerce Street is a two lane undivided roadway west of Albert Street and a four lane divided roadway east of Albert Street and has a speed limit of 30 mph. Sandhurst Drive is a two lane undivided roadway with a speed limit of 30 mph. All study intersections are unsignalized with side-street stop control. Existing geometrics traffic controls, and traffic volumes are shown in Figure 2.

Intersection Operations Analysis

An operations analysis was conducted to determine how traffic is currently operating at the study intersections. All intersections were analyzed using Synchro/SimTraffic and the Highway Capacity Manual (HCM). Capacity analysis results identify a Level of Service (LOS) which indicates how well an intersection is operating. Intersections are ranked from LOS A through LOS F. The LOS results are based on average delay per vehicle results from SimTraffic, which correspond to the delay threshold values shown in Table 1. LOS A indicates the best traffic operation and LOS F indicates an intersection where demand exceeds capacity. Overall intersection LOS A through D is generally considered acceptable by drivers in the Twin Cities Metropolitan Area.

For side-street stop controlled intersections, special emphasis is given to providing an estimate for the level of service of the side-street approach. Traffic operations at an unsignalized intersection with side-street stop control can be described in two ways. First, consideration is given to the overall intersection level of service. This takes into account the total number of vehicles entering the intersection and the capability of the intersection to support these volumes.

Second, it is important to consider the delay on the minor approach. Since the mainline does not have to stop, the majority of delay is attributed to the side-street approaches. It is typical of intersections with higher mainline traffic volumes to experience high levels of delay (poor levels of service) on the side-street approaches, but an acceptable overall intersection level of service during peak hour conditions.

Results of the existing operations analysis shown in Table 2 indicate that all study intersections currently operate at an acceptable overall LOS A during the a.m. and p.m. peak hours with the existing traffic control and geometric layout. No significant side-street delays or queuing issues were observed in the field or the traffic simulation at the study intersections. However, it should be noted that eastbound queues from the County Road B/Hamline Avenue intersection were observed to extend beyond Albert Street two times during the p.m. peak hour. This queuing was accounted for as part of the intersection capacity analysis.

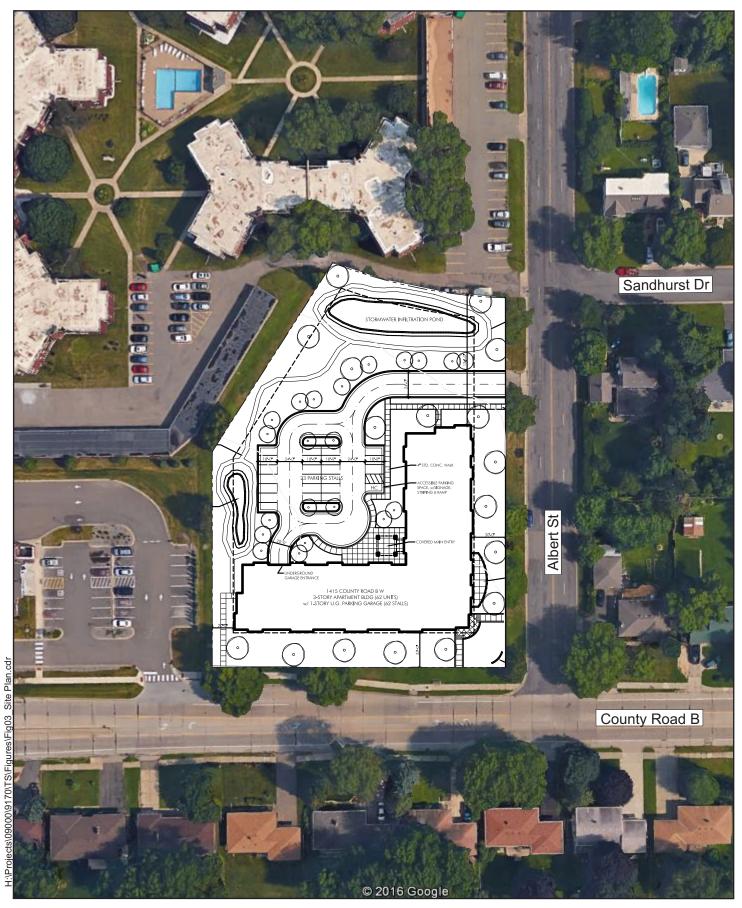

Proposed Development

The proposed development is located in the northwest quadrant of the County Road B/Albert Street intersection. The project area is 1.79 acres and is planning to have direct access to Albert Street approximately 75 feet south of Sandhurst Drive, as shown in Figure 3. As currently proposed, the development includes a 62-unit senior housing apartment complex.

The site was evaluated based on two land use scenarios. Once scenario includes the proposed senior housing development, while the other scenario includes the maximum allowable size based on the high-density residential (HDR-2) zoning. Based on the City of Roseville Comprehensive Plan and discussion with City staff, the maximum number of dwelling units assumed for the property was 250 units.





Traffic Forecasts

The proposed development is expected to be constructed in the year 2017. Therefore, traffic forecasts were developed for year 2018 build conditions (one year after construction). To account for general background growth in the area, an annual growth rate of one-half percent was applied to the existing peak hour traffic volumes to develop year 2018 background traffic forecasts. This growth rate is consistent with historical traffic growth in the area.

Trip generation estimates for the weekday a.m. and p.m. peak hours and a daily basis were developed using the *ITE Trip Generation Manual, 9th Edition* for the two land use scenarios. Results of the trip generation estimates, shown in Table 3, indicate that Scenario 1 (senior housing apartment) is expected to generate 12 a.m. peak hour, 15 p.m. peak hour, and 213 daily trips. Scenario 2 (maximum high-density residential) is expected to generate 128 a.m. peak hour, 155 p.m. peak hour and 1,663 daily trips.

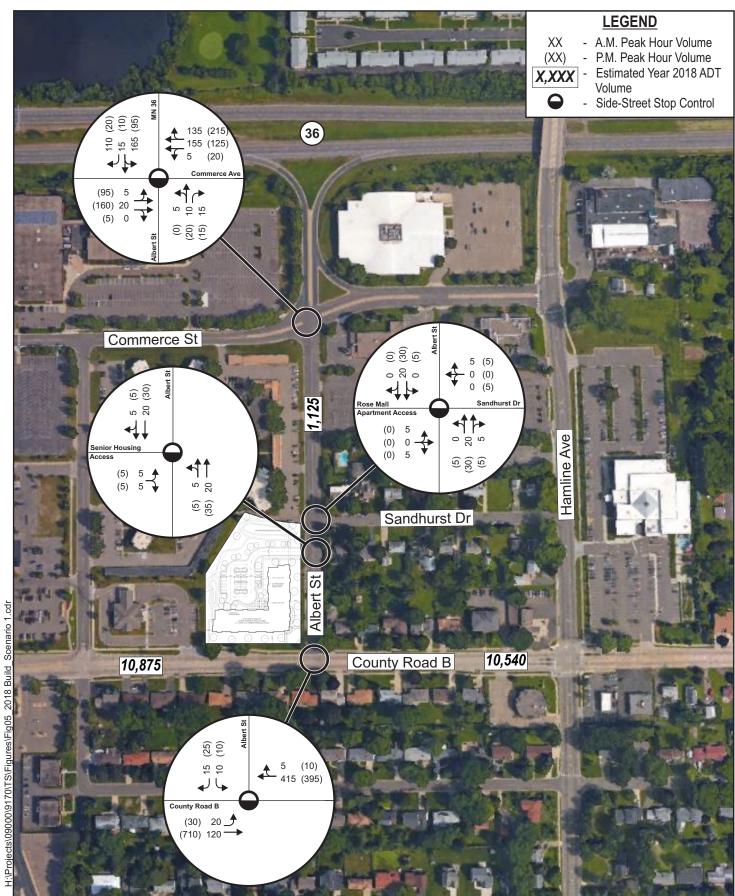

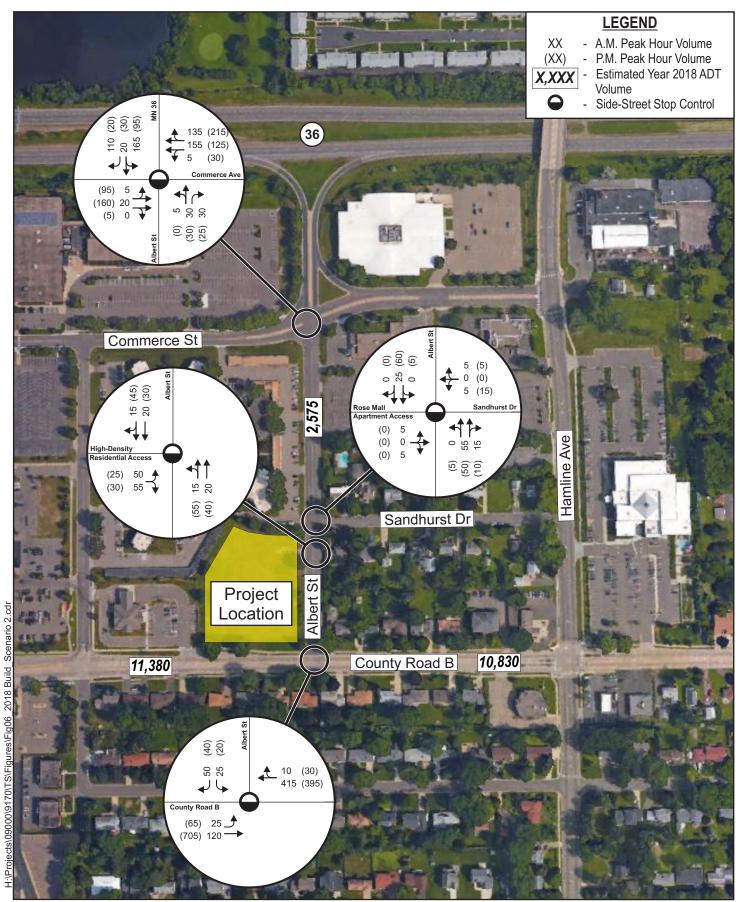
Trips for each scenario were distributed to the adjacent roadway network based on the directional distribution shown in Figure 4. The directional distribution was developed based on a review of existing travel patterns and engineering judgment. The resultant year 2018 traffic volumes for Scenario 1 (Senior Housing Apartments) and Scenario 2 (High Density Residential), which accounts for the general background growth and trips generated by each development, are shown in Figure 5 and Figure 6, respectively.













Year 2018 Build Condition

Intersection Operations Analysis

To determine if the existing roadway network can accommodate year 2018 build traffic forecasts, a detailed traffic operations analysis was completed for the two land use scenarios. The study intersections were once again analyzed using Synchro/SimTraffic.

Results of the year 2018 build operations analysis shown in Table 4 indicate that all study intersections are expected to operate at an acceptable overall LOS A during the a.m. and p.m. peak hours with the existing geometric layout and traffic control under both land use scenarios. While the eastbound queues at the County Road B/Hamline Avenue intersection identified under existing conditions are expected to continue to occur under build conditions, no significant side-street delays or queuing issues are expected at the study intersections. Given the minimal overall impact of the two land use scenarios, roadway network improvements are not anticipated to be needed based on a traffic capacity perspective as a result of newly generated traffic.

Under Scenario 2 (maximum high-density residential), the westbound right-turn volume at the County Road B/Albert Street intersection increases to approximately 30 vehicles during the p.m. peak hour. Based on conversations with County staff, a westbound right-turn lane should be considered at this location. From a traffic capacity perspective (i.e. delays/queuing issues) a westbound right-turn lane is not needed. From a safety perspective, while this corridor is low speed, a right-turn lane could potentially reduce the likelihood for rear-end crashes.

A high-level review of the existing right-of-way and cross-section indicates that there may be opportunity to construct a short (approximately 50-foot) westbound right-turn lane within the County Road B right-of-way line. However, this would require modification to the curb line as well as the sidewalk. The single-family home located on the northwest corner of the County Road B/Albert Street intersection has two driveways (one to County Road B and one to Albert Street). If a westbound right-turn lane were constructed, it would impact the County Road B driveway to this house. Further discussion with project staff should occur to determine the feasibility of constructing a westbound right-turn lane.

It should be noted that based on expected traffic volumes on Albert Street, a two-lane or three-lane facility would provide adequate capacity. Restriping or reconstructing Albert Street, which is currently a four-lane facility, would provide opportunity to improve pedestrian/bicyclist facilities.

Site and Access Review

A review of the proposed senior housing development site plan was completed to identify any issues and recommend potential improvements with regard to site distance, traffic control and circulation. Based on field observations, there is adequate sight distance at the proposed access location on Albert Street to clearly identify approaching vehicles. Special consideration should be made to limit any sight distance impacts from future landscaping and signing. No other traffic control or circulation issues are expected.

It should be noted that the proposed development plans to provide direct access onto Albert Street at an existing approach that is approximately 275 feet north of County Road B and 90 feet south of Sandhurst Drive. Currently the Rose Mall Apartment complex has access on the west leg of the Albert Street/Sandhurst Drive intersection. In order to reduce conflict points and improve safety on Albert Street, a shared access with the existing Rose Mall apartment should be considered.

Summary and Conclusions

Based on the analysis, the following conclusions and recommendations are offered for your consideration:

- Results of the existing operations analysis indicate that all study intersections currently operate at an acceptable overall LOS A during the a.m. and p.m. peak hours. No significant side-street delays or queuing issues were observed.
- The proposed development consists of a 62-unit senior housing apartment. The development is planning direct access to Albert Street.
- To evaluate the trip generation and traffic impacts, two land use scenarios were reviewed:
 - o **Scenario 1:** 62-unit senior housing apartment (proposed condition)
 - o Scenario 2. 250-unit high-density residential (maximum allowable condition)

- Results of the trip generation estimates indicate the following:
 - o Scenario 1: expected to generate 12 a.m. peak hour, 15 p.m. peak hour, and 213 daily trips
 - o Scenario 2: expected to generate 128 a.m. peak hour, 155 p.m. peak hour and 1,663 daily trips
- Results of the year 2018 build operations analysis indicate that all study intersections are expected to operate at an acceptable overall LOS A during the a.m. and p.m. peak hours.
- Given the minimal overall impact of the two land use scenarios, roadway network improvements are not anticipated to be needed based on a traffic capacity perspective as a result of newly generated traffic.
 - o Based on conversations with County staff, a westbound right-turn lane should be considered at the County Road B/Albert Street intersection under Scenario 2 (maximum high-density residential) due to the expected increase in traffic volumes for this movement.
- Special consideration should be made to limit any sight distance impacts from future landscaping and signing.
- In order to reduce conflict points and improve safety on Albert Street, a shared access with the existing Rose Mall apartment should be considered.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION and INTENDED USE:

The intent of this narrative is to serve as a supplement to the rezoning application materials submitted by Kaas Wilson Architects on behalf of the Evangelical Lutheran Good Samaritan Society to Roseville Community Development. The proposed 3-story apartment building for the site located at 1415 County Road B W (at the intersection of County B Road W & Albert Street N) in Roseville, MN will feature 62 units of senior living residences, divided up into a mix of 60% one-bedrooms, and 40% two-bedrooms. The building will be 3-stories tall, with a height of approximately 35' from the first floor elevation to the midpoint of the sloped roof. Our proposed building was also designed to meet the intent of Section 1004.06 of the Roseville City Zoning Code for Multi-Family Design Standards through various means, which includes emphasis towards a corner-lot street-facing façade design, variety through materiality, and offsets in the façade for generating visual interest. Rezoning the site from an HDR-1 district to an HDR-2 will be a slight modification to the Comprehensive Plan for the area, but is required to allow for the proposed density. Having a building over 60 units is more cost effective for property management and staffing as well as the ability to offer more affordable units for seniors to meet the demand.

DENSITY:

The Site at 1415 County Road B W is currently zoned for High-Density Residential (HDR-1, Section 1004.11 of the Roseville Zoning Code/Ordinance, dated January of 2015. The allowable density for a site zoned as an HDR-1 district is 24 units/ acre. For an HDR-2, there is no maximum density. For the building we are proposing to construct, the proposed density, with 62 units on a 1.79 acre site, would be 34 units/acre. Because variances on density are not permissible by the City of Roseville, a rezoning of the site to a district of HDR-2 is required to align with the proposed number of units.

HEIGHT:

The maximum building height for a site zoned as HDR-1 is currently 65'. For an HDR-2, the maximum allowable building height increases to 95'. The proposed height of our building will be approximately 35' from the elevation of the first floor to the midpoint of the sloped roof, and includes three stories of wood frame housing, with floor-to-ceiling heights of 8'. The proposed building height is well below the restrictions set by the current HDR-1 zoning, as well as the proposed HDR-2, and is not a part of our request to rezone this site.

SETBACKS:

The minimum setbacks for a site zoned under HDR- 1 are as follows:

Front (Street)	Side Yard (interior)	Side Yard (corner)	Rear Yard
30 ft	20 ft (when adjacent to an LDR-1 or LDR-2); 10 ft (when adjacent to all other uses)	20 ft	30 ft

For an HDR-2, the required setbacks are as follows:

The setbacks of our proposed building are as follows:

The proposed setbacks are well within the minimums as defined by the current HDR-1 zoning, as well as the proposed HDR-2, and is not a part of our request to rezone this site.

IMPROVEMENT AREAS:

Under the current Roseville Zoning Code, the maximum improvement area allowed throughout the entire site under an HDR-1 is equal to 75% impervious vs. 25% pervious. For an HDR-2, that ratio is adjusted to be 85% impervious vs. 15% pervious. The proposed improvement area is approximately equal to 51%, and includes all impervious surfaces such as driveways, sidewalks, curbs, resident patios, and building footprint. Proposed pervious surfaces, such as sodded areas with grass, trees, and plantings, stormwater infiltration ponds, and crushed gravel walking paths, would encompass about 49% of the site. The proposed improvement area is well below the restrictions set by the current HDR-1 zoning, as well as the proposed HDR-2, and is not a part of our request to rezone this site.

IN SUMMARY:

We view the proposed senior living residential property at 1415 County Road B W as an exciting opportunity to create a quality establishment that future residents and the neighborhood can be proud of. This project will be one of the first local collaborations between the Evangelical Lutheran Good Samaritan Society, Kaas Wilson Architects, and Benson Orth, which, individually, combines a wealth of experience in providing high-quality multifamily and senior living projects. The invitation was mailed or posted to Roseville City Hall, Ramsey County Public Library, Fairview Community and Senior Center, various churches and coffee shops in the neighborhood. In addition an invitation ad was placed in the Roseville Review 12/22/15 edition.

Good Samaritan Society was represented from their development team: Mary Stewart and Aaron Bakker, and Lauren Pahnke locally from Good Samaritan Heritage Place of Roseville. In addition, Good Samaritan's local financing consultant Stephanie Hawkinson and architect Enrico Williams from Kaas Wilson attended the open house.

There were 18 that attended from the neighborhood. General comments were supportive of the project. There were questions on design, accessibility, income levels, timing of project, and traffic. The most concerns that were expressed were related to the impact on traffic in the following areas:

- Increased traffic on County Road B
- Street parking impact
- Pedestrian crossing on County Road B and bus stop
- Increased traffic on the intersection of Albert and Commerce

A traffic study was suggested and we reviewed an intersection with a stoplight just west of the property that was an option for bus riders to cross County Road B. There were a couple of residents that live on County Road B that were opposed to the project due to anticipated increase of traffic. They have difficulty getting on to County Road B from their homes especially during the rush hour time period. They would prefer the site to be a park. One person did not like the design, thought the rents were not affordable, and it was too close to the street.

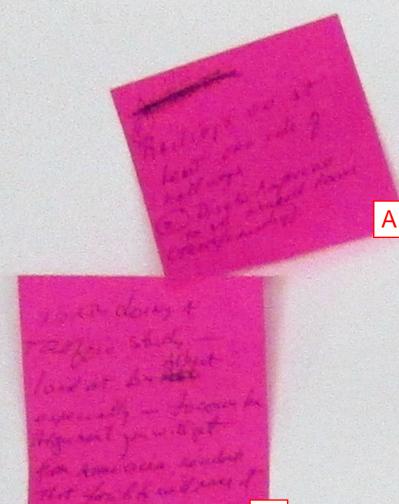
There were 3 phone inquiries that were generated from the mailing. One resident attended the open house. General information was provided and no objections or concerns were expressed by those that called.

c. PLANNING FILE 16-006

Request by Evangelical Lutheran Good Samaritan Society to REZONE 1415 County Road B from High Density Residential-1 District to High Density Residential-2 District to afford more flexible design and an increase in unit density

- 1 Chair Boguszewski opened the public hearing for PLANNING FILE 16-006 at 7:42 p.m.
- 2 City Planner Thomas Paschke reviewed the request as detailed in the staff report and
- attachments dated May 4, 2016 and rationale for suggested changes.
- 4 Mr. Paschke reported that staff had not accepted the initial application for this project
- 5 pending a traffic study, now available and included in meeting packet materials. Mr. Paschke
- 6 noted that the study indicated that this proposed project density for the site and development
- 7 project, as well as maximizing the site for other potential HDR-2 uses that may create a
- 8 greater number of units per acre within code requirements were all possible without creating
- 9 any major impacts to the road network system. From that standpoint, Mr. Paschke advised
- that staff could therefore support the project and recommended its approval, even if a
- development proposal came forward at greater density allowed by code for HDR-2 if and
- when the zoning change is approved. Mr. Paschke advised that if there had been any major
- impacts or concerns as a result of the traffic study or from Ramsey County, staff may have
- changed their recommendation for approval, since once a parcel was rezoned it was difficult
- to undo. Mr. Paschke noted that the requested zoning change was consistent with the
- comprehensive plan for the parcel designated for high density, with the city only having two
- divisions for higher or lower density and different design standards applying to each
- 18 accordingly.
- 19 With Chair Boguszewski noting there was no upper limit on HDR-2, Mr. Paschke clarified
- that those limits would be through the design standards and maximum height allowances
- built into zoning code and thereby limiting how many units based on design standards and lot
- amenities. Mr. Paschke noted that the traffic study considered a maximum scenario of 250
- units, but when other design elements and standards in code are applied, that high of a
- 24 density would be difficult for any project to achieve.
- 25 Chair Boguszewski opined that underlying zoning isn't necessarily tied to this proposed
- project, but if a future or alternate project came forward, with zoning staying with the land,
- there was the potential for a much larger and denser development.
- Mr. Paschke reiterated that there could be more units, but from his perspective, it would be
- 29 difficult to achieve anywhere near 250 units; and clarified that the current project prompting
- this rezoning request was proposed for 62 units.
- Discussion ensued as to the physical location of the proposed project; and zoning and density
- allowances of other multi-family complexes in the immediate area (e.g. Rose Mall
- 33 Apartments).

- Chair Boguszewski asked staff to display an illustrative view of the hypothesized elevation
- of the proposed project for public viewing of the massing that could occur with just 62 units
- as proposed.
- 37 Mr. Paschke noted that the proposed project site plan was predicated on and incorporated
- zoning for placement of the building under the city's urban design and green space code
- requirements seeking a greater separation from adjacent residential uses and moving the
- 40 building footprint closer to a busy road. Mr. Paschke noted that the elevations as displayed
- were for a three-story structure with underground parking.
- 42 Member Murphy pointed out, as recognized by Chair Boguszewski, that the zoning request
- was separate and distinct from this project.
- However, Chair Boguszewski noted that this zoning change would allow this mass to
- develop, as well as theoretically an even denser mass than this proposal, with Mr. Paschke
- agreeing with that statement.
- 47 Member Daire clarified, with staff's concurrence, that directly across the street from this site,
- with single-family uses, it would be similar to the past conversation for the project at
- Cleveland Avenue and County Road B, where that request had been for HDR with MDR
- preferred as a transition between those land uses.
- 51 Mr. Paschke agreed that in that situation, the request had been for up-zoning to a level far
- greater than it was currently zoned; while this one was already zoned HDR, and simply
- sought rezoning to slightly increase the density from HDR-1 to HDR-2, opining that didn't
- create as distinct of a difference as the previous example.

- In addition to those questions already raised, Mr. Bakker expressed the team's willingness to
- answer any questions related to the project.
- Regarding the concern raise regarding the proposed project developing into a denser project,
- Mr. Bakker stated the history of Good Samaritan Society in not overdeveloping their project
- sites. Having maintained some of their properties for 40-50 years, Mr. Bakker stated that he
- didn't see any higher density on this site than that proposed, with the development team
- interested in providing more green space. Mr. Bakker noted this resulted in proposing
- of underground parking versus above ground parking; with the intent to make this site a
- friendly, walkable site, including a walkway across the parcel.
- At the request of Member Gitzen, Mr. Bakker confirmed that Good Samaritan owned the
- property when it was previously a nursing home prior to demolition.
- At the request of Member Kimble, Mr. Bakker confirmed that tax credits were part of the
- financing for the project's development, anticipating application for credits for the fall 2016
- 73 round.
- At the request of Member Daire, Mr. Bakker advised that, while unsure of the property's
- long-term history, he was aware that Good Samaritan had owned the property when the

- former nursing home use had been demolished; and throughout the seven-year vacant period following to-date.
- Member Daire asked if the changing market for housing had made this particular development seem attractive at this time.
- Mr. Bakker responded that it had, and following a recent market study that indicated senior
- 81 housing was needed in Roseville, this seemed to be a good location since it was already
- owned by the applicant, and provided nearby and walkable amenities. Mr. Bakker noted that
- the adjacent bus line also made this site attractive for affordable housing as well. At the
- request of Member Daire, Mr. Bakker confirmed that the building would be all independent
- living units, with no assisted living units included.
- At the request of Chair Boguszewski as to what "affordable" indicated, Mr. Bakker
- 87 responded that it made some funding through tax credits possible, with the guidelines for
- those applicable for affordable housing based on low income, total assets and other resources
- 89 of those applying.
- While not knowing all aspects of this property, Chair Boguszewski noted his initial reaction
- 91 to the projected elevations for the property caused him to be concerned with the massing
- shown in provisional drawings, especially to the south and east, and abutting single-family
- homes. Chair Boguszewski asked if there were alternatives to flip the footprint, or if this was
- 94 the only workable placement.
- Mr. Bakker responded that current city zoning code required the frontage of a building closer
- to the street corner versus farther back with more green space up front.
- 97 At the request of Chair Boguszewski, Mr. Paschke stated that the applicant could apply for a
- variance to move the building footprint that would not meet current design standards to
- 99 determine its merit for such a variable.
- 100 Chair Boguszewski asked, if this application moves forward, that the development team
- continue working with the neighborhood to address their concerns.
- Recognizing that the process in applying for tax credits could take multiple years, Member
- Kimble noted that if rezoning to a greater density was approved and the value of the land
- increased, what guarantees were there that would prevent this developer from flipping the
- property and selling to another developer intending a higher density, should this developer
- tire of waiting to confirm financing for this project.
- Mr. Bakker noted Good Samaritan had been sitting on this property for some time, and
- avoiding interested firms from acquiring it, therefore proving their strong commitment to
- developer the site.
- 110 If the Planning Commission and/or City Council ultimately denies the requested zoning
- change, Chair Boguszewski asked the developer what was their Plan B: a lower unit count or
- no project.
- Mr. Bakker responded that, in analyzing operational costs, a 60-unit facility was the
- minimum that can be developed on this site to make it financially feasible. If this rezoning
- application is denied, Mr. Bakker advised that they would need to postpone the proposed
- project to review other possible options, but at this point, he was unable to answer that or
- define what that would mean.

- In terms of the city's commitment to affordable housing credits, Chair Boguszewski asked city staff if the City of Roseville was in line with, ahead of or behind Metropolitan Council and/or other agency guidelines; and whether or not this project would help the city achieve their housing goals.
- Interim Community Development Director Collins noted the recent presentation provided by former Community Development Director Paul Bilotta several months ago related to this data, and from her recollection, the City of Roseville was currently in a satisfactory position for affordable housing options, reminding all that those guidelines that these were recommendations, not requirements. Ms. Collins stated she would get this additional
- information to the Commission.
- Member Daire asked staff to provide a worst case scenario from a density standpoint for this site if rezoned to HDR-2 as requested; and if negative economic or market issues repeated before this project could develop. In other words, Member Daire asked what could be developed (e.g. height of building(s) and maximum number of units) and what that might look like on this site.
- 133 First prefacing his response on his belief that this site could not feasibly support 250 units on this site based on current city code, Mr. Paschke advised that a maximum worst case scenario 134 could be for a roughly 9-story, 95' building with a maximum of 250 units could be built, 135 even though he could not accurately determine the maximum density, but this was 136 presupposed on current city code. Mr. Paschke also noted that the actual number of stories at 137 138 that maximum height of 95' would be dependent on the project itself and height of floors. However, Mr. Paschke questioned the actual market for a nine-story building in Roseville, 139 even in a booming economy, or a market for tall buildings throughout the metropolitan area. 140
- 141 If so, Mr. Paschke suggested the community would have multiple high-rise buildings.

 However, Mr. Paschke stated he was unable to predict what may happen if and when this parcel is rezoned; but opined he found it highly unlikely that a nine-story building would be

constructed on this or any other site in Roseville.

- Member Daire clarified that the rationale for his question was based on a maximum 95'
 height limit and discussion of parking and the traffic study for a 250 maximum unit
 development and traffic generation accordingly. While this is fairly hypothetical on one
 hand, Member Daire stated he was attempting to get a handle on what the site could possible
 look like; and what his perception may be if he lived across the street from this development
 and concerns he may have with horror stories for possible height and density development
 that could occur.
- Member Kimble asked if the tax credits were the only funding gap for the capital project, or if others were being considered.
- Mr. Bakker responded that the developer was applying for tax credit funding, as well as other sources depending on if and when the application deadlines would impact the project itself, some of which had already been eliminated due to timing. While unable to identify all funding sources under consideration at this point, Mr. Bakker confirmed that they were considering additional funding beyond tax credit funding.
- Member Kimble stated the reason for her question was as it related to feasibility and readiness for this specific development proposal.

161 **Public Comment** Amanda Kappes, 10761 Smetana Road, Apt. #111, Minnetonka, MN; Metro Interfaith 162 **Council on Affordable Housing (MICAH)** 163 Ms. Kappes advised that their organization, MICAH, had been in discussion with the Good 164 Samaritan Society and their proposal for senior housing gin Roseville for approximately nine 165 166 months now. Ms. Kappes noted that initially they had been asked to get involved with the community engagement process and what the community would most like to see. Ms. 167 Kappes noted that MICAH's first response had been whether or not Good Samaritan had 168 spoken to community members themselves, which prompted working on an open house with 169 MICAH staff available to help answer questions. 170 One of the questions at the open house, as well as brought forward tonight was whether there 171 was a market demand for senior housing at this time. Ms. Kappes stated there was a huge 172 focus on that option, and was asked for much more often than indicated by the Governor's 173 request and currently pending legislative action by the house and senate. Ms. Kappes noted 174 that, at this time in MN, the state's senior population is the fastest growing homeless 175 population; and as well as looking at affordable units, across the state there were 25,000 176 units, with an additional 150,000 senior households who could qualify for those affordable 177 units. Ms. Kappes clarified what "affordable" housing actually indicated, not housing units 178 for the lowest income residents, but based on 60% of the area median, identified for a 179 household with typically only 1-2 persons/unit, an annual income of roughly \$24,000 to 180 \$30,000 annually. Ms. Kappes noted that this income usually applied to retirement and/or 181 disability benefits; with 54% of renters in MN over 55 years old, and currently paying over 182 30% of their household income. Ms. Kappes reiterated the great need for affordable senior 183 housing that would continue to grow. 184 Ms. Kappes referenced the City of Roseville's comprehensive plan numbers and 185 Metropolitan Council guidelines at or below 30% of area income at 72 units; and when 186 looking at 31% to 50% of median income, Roseville could add an additional 50 units; and if 187 looking at 51% to 80% of median income, Roseville could add an additional 20 units; for a 188 189 total of 142 units. In looking at the 60% median income level, Ms. Kappes opined that 62 units would go a long way in reaching that total number of units. 190 Given the fact the Metropolitan Council supports this effort, and the state may help fund it, 191 Chair Boguszewski asked if this was the right site for this project. 192 Ms. Kappes responded that, based on the traffic study indicating the project would only add a 193 delay of a matter of seconds during peak times, and given the previous nursing home use 194 with more traffic than this development would indicate given those previous employees and 195 shift change traffic, Ms. Kappes opined that there should be no noticeable impact from the 196 proposed development. Ms. Kappes opined that as an affordable housing advocacy group 197 working in the region since 1986, MICAH strongly supported this project. 198 Gary Kwong, 1700 Fry Street, Falcon Heights, MN 199 Mr. Kwong reviewed his residencies near the Midway Park area for some time, and his 200 father's history of nursing home living on this site, noting the changes he'd observed in 201 Roseville over the years. Mr. Kwong noted the changes in the schools, more diversity in the 202 population, and new transportation available soon along Snelling Avenue, as well as the 203 204 proximity of this proposed development close to the Ramsey County Library – Roseville

Branch. Ms. Kwong opined that there were a lot of amenities for potential residents, with the proximity to shopping, and other walkable areas for seniors in the community, and allowing them to remain Roseville residents to retain their sense of community versus relocating elsewhere. At this time, Mr. Kwong noted the limited housing available from independent to full assisted living, with this development providing a good option to maintain that independent living as an alternative housing option for those unable to afford a more expensive location or housing options. Mr. Kwong spoke in support of this requested rezoning and the proposed project; opining it allowed the City to meet Metropolitan Council suggested guidelines, while allowing residents to retain their sense of community, and was far beyond meeting legal requirements.

Member Daire asked staff how this proposed project would compare in character to Rose Pointe as an example.

Mr. Paschke advised he could not address the type of housing units involved in Rose Pointe as far as market rate or subsidized; but design-wise, was not sure they were much different in their massing, with 3-4 stories. Mr. Paschke noted that most senior projects were at least 3 stories, partly due to economics and making them work based on a certain number of units. Regarding how the building itself was situated, Mr. Paschke noted that topography between the parcels notwithstanding, a number of past projects were also built under a different city code and ordinances, with different design standards than those applicable today, including setback requirements and proximity to other uses. Mr. Paschke advised that, if staff felt it was appropriate when this particular development came forward in the application process, staff and/or the developer could suggest increasing the setback on Albert Street or County Road B if appropriate to the project. However, Mr. Paschke questioned whether or not their proposal, when presented, would actually suggested that, since today's code had built-ins for protecting adjacent lower density uses.

Member Kimble noted the unknowns and risks in acting on rezoning without looking at an actual project, especially when a proposed project such as this one isn't fully funded and that funding could be months away. Member Kimble opined that ideally, action would be taken on rezoning when there was a better comfort level for a project fully funded and ready to go.

Mr. Paschke recognized the risks involved; however, he noted that part of a development's ability to proceed was predicated on having things in place (e.g. rezoning) to help them get through that financial process with lenders looking to ensure proper zoning was in place for a proposed development seeking funding, and impacting their project's funding score. From staff's perspective, Mr. Paschke stated that the intent was to be somewhat accommodating to this proposal, thus staff's recommendation to the Commission and City Council for their determination based on staff's analysis to-date. Mr. Paschke recognized the concerns expressed by Member Kimble and other commissioners, but clarified that zoning drives funding as well and was part of the process. While it wasn't the city's task to help that funding along, Mr. Paschke advised it was part of staff's analysis to accept the proposal before them and, in consideration of the traffic study completed, to base their decision on the information currently before them. Under that scenario, Mr. Paschke stated that staff believed that the proposed development was an appropriate use of this site and the requested zoning from HDR-1 to HDR-2 was consistent with the comprehensive plan's guidance for future use of the site.

- Recognizing the need to separate the project from the rezoning request, and the desire to
- increase this type of housing in Roseville, Chair Boguszewski opined that his impression was
- 251 that not many parcels within the community could support this type of development.
- Mr. Paschke noted there were a few, but they were limited for multi-family or affordable
- units of any sort, with some of them perhaps in better locations than others; but opined that
- 254 this is a nice location for this type of project.
- 255 Chair Boguszewski closed the public hearing at 8:24 p.m., with no additional comment.

Commission Deliberation

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- Member Kimble stated her support of the project, opining it made sense in this location based on the walking distance to amenities and bus transportation. Member Kimble reiterated the difficulty in separating the zoning request from the proposed use, and difficulty in that distinction when both are included in the same packet. Member Kimble expressed her hope that this develop would have the staying power needed to see this project through to actual development, even if funding proves challenging.
- 263 With the city's goal to avoid or mitigate development adjacent to existing neighborhoods, based on prior document and comments from those attending tonight and giving public 264 testimony, Chair Boguszewski noted that, if no overwhelming support heard from the 265 neighborhood, there also appeared to be no perception that neighbors would find the rezoning 266 to be detrimental to them or their property values. Chair Boguszewski noted the goal of 267 affordable housing is good for Roseville and allows current residents to remain, he agreed 268 269 with Member Kimble in the separation of the zoning decision and proposed project and difficulties in differentiating the two. Chair Boguszewski suggested it may be easier to 270 support the project through the city accepting the risk to achieve its goals in retaining 271 residents because that's the right thing to do versus any guidance from the Metropolitan 272 Council. 273
- Member Gitzen expressed agreement with the comments of Chair Boguszewski and Member Kimble. Member Gitzen expressed his appreciation for the site and its suitability for this type of development, with proximity to the library, Har Mar Mall, bus lines and other amenities, creating lots of pluses for it. Member Gitzen opined that affordable senior housing was another plus for the city.
- Member Murphy agreed with the comments of his colleagues.
- Member Cunningham noted her strong belief in separating the project from zoning; but in this case, admitted she loved the proposed project, opining it was fantastic; even though on many occasions she would say the opposite. In this case, Member Cunningham stated she would be comfortable even with a larger development on the site, opining she would still support that higher density. Member Cunningham noted there was not a lot of outpouring from the community about any objections; and expressed her support of the rezoning request, and her excitement about the proposed project at this location.
- As the city continues to look at its code and areas of it that cause areas of consternation in decision-making, Member Bull noted this was one example when proposed projects and zoning decisions came before the body at the same time, whether informally or formally. If there was some way to tie those decisions, Member Bull noted it would make everyone's job easier, and to know the standards of a project and hoe it would fit on a particular property

292 under that particular zoning designation versus looking at "what ifs" or worst case scenarios 293 of the highest allowable density. In this case, knowing the traffic study supported the higher zoning designation, Member Bull stated he found helpful. However, with LDR across the 294 295 street and the potential of looking at a massive wall potentially 95' high starting back at me, Member Bull questioned if he'd even want that across a 4-lane road. For him, Member Bull 296 noted his options were to take a leap of faith that zoning for a project like this would come in 297 and move forward accordingly; or the more cautionary option of not knowing what project 298 might develop under this zoning designation, but not supporting up to 250 units. Member 299 Bull opined he felt he was on the side of taking a leap of faith form this investment company 300 based on the research they'd put into the proposed project, and their architectural renderings. 301 Therefore, Member Bull spoke in support of the rezoning request. 302

Member Murphy spoke in support of the rezoning, noting minimal traffic indicated form the proposed project even under the worst case scenario. Member Murphy also noted the walking distance to area amenities; as well as the good reputation of Good Samaritan Society for this type of development. Member Murphy stated he was willing to accept the risk that another project may occur on the site, but under design standards as per city code.

MOTION

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- Member Murphy moved, seconded by Member Cunningham to recommend to the City Council, APPROVAL of the proposed REZONING of Ramsey County PIN 10-29-23-34-0006 from HDR-1 to HDR-2, based on the comments and findings of the staff report dated May 4, 2016.
- Chair Boguszewski encouraged the development team, with the support of city staff, to continue their community engagement efforts to hear any ideas that neighbors have a preference for in citing the building footprint on the parcel; including any necessary variance processes if appropriate.

Receive Update on Marion St. Park Proposal and Southeast Roseville Visioning

BACKGROUND

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Policy Priority: Housing and Economic Development **Strategic Initiative:** Focus on Southeast Roseville

The purpose of this discussion is to receive an update on the 1716 Marion St. Park proposal and to discuss current efforts with Southeast Roseville visioning.

1716 Marion St. Update and Next Steps

On January 25, the City Council adopted a resolution authorizing staff to apply for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding and to support the Marion St. Park Collaborative with their application for a \$50,000 U.S. Bank grant (through U. S. Bank's "Places to Play" Initiative). The funding sought was to acquire 1716 Marion Street and to develop it as a public park and play space.

The negotiated price for the sale of the property was \$68,000, with a total cost to develop the site into a park (including financing costs, site work, and amenities) estimated to be \$215,700. The City was awarded \$117,400 of CDBG funds (Attachment A), however, it was announced at the beginning of May that the Marion St. Park Collaborative did not receive the \$50,000 U.S. Bank grant. Without the \$50,000 from U.S. Bank, staff estimates that the City's share will be roughly \$98,000 for site acquisition, development, and maintenance. See Attachment B for the memo previously provided by Parks & Recreation Director Lonnie Brokke detailing the costs to develop the site. An updated summary of sources and uses can be found as Attachment C.

Staff is seeking direction as to whether to move ahead with satisfying the terms of the purchase agreement as outlined below:

Purchase Agreement Contingencies (Attachment D)

- The City must pay the Seller \$500.00 by June 1 (June 2 for receipt of payment) to satisfy the Financial Contingency Date.
- The City must satisfy all other contingencies by August 1.
- Closing date is scheduled for August 12.

Southeast Roseville Visioning Update

On April 11, the City Council received a presentation by staff regarding visioning and redevelopment opportunities in Southeast Roseville. The discussion confirmed that reinvestment/
redevelopment/visioning efforts should be concentrated along the development swells of the Rice and Larpenteur corridor. The City Council also recognized the importance of having all impacted jurisdictions – including St. Paul, Maplewood, and Ramsey County – at the table to provide collaborative leadership in this area.

The April 11 discussion served two purposes. The first purpose was to receive direction from the City Council regarding the level of interest to acquire available sites for redevelopment. A closed session discussion is currently scheduled to review appraisal information at the next Economic Development Authority meeting scheduled on May 25. The other purpose of the discussion was to gauge the level of interest in visioning for the area and to receive feedback on what type of visioning was desired. Staff provided the City Council with a Corridor Development Initiative (CDI) proposal that included purposeful engagement and benchmarking, a smaller scale CDI process, and a charette process that explored long-term planning for design/streetscaping. The City Council approved a hybrid of the larger CDI process and the charrette as was proposed in the April 11 report. The anticipated cost of the hybrid plan would range from \$30,000 - \$50,000, depending on the level of staff dedicated to the plan by each participating jurisdiction.

On May 12, St. Paul Councilperson Amy Brendmoen hosted a meeting at the St. Paul Regional Water Services located along Rice St., with various staff and elected officials to discuss next steps for the area. Jonathan Weinhagen, Vice President of the St. Paul Area Chamber of Commerce, agreed to facilitate the meeting. What grew out of the discussion was a commitment to work together to improve the area. Councilperson Brendmoen created a Facebook page, *Let's Revitalize Rice/Larpenteur*, to help communicate what is happening in the corridor, to let people know how to get involved, and to publicize when meetings would occur to solicit input from the community.

Next steps include an additional meeting among elected officials and staff for the purpose of planning a larger multi-jurisdictional community meeting in July. The purpose of the July meeting will be to talk through concerns, opportunities, and revitalization efforts for the area with all interested stakeholders.

Unless the City Council desires a smaller Southeast Roseville visioning plan that is not centered on corridor reinvestment, Community Development Staff will defer entering into a contract for visioning until all stakeholders identify a level of commitment to the Rice/Larpenteur area.

POLICY OBJECTIVE

Southeast Roseville has been identified as a priority in the 2016 Policy Priority Plan.

BUDGET IMPLICATIONS

As mentioned in the narrative above, the City's obligation is estimated to be roughly \$98,000 for the 1716 Marion St Park.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Receive update on 1716 Marion St. Park Proposal and Southeast Roseville visioning efforts. Staff is also recommending the City Council provide direction to staff on whether to move forward with site acquisition of 1716 Marion St. without the total award of grant dollars requested.

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REQUESTED COUNCIL ACTION

Receive update on Southeast Roseville visioning and 1716 Marion St. Park Proposal and:

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Make a motion authorizing staff to pay \$500 earnest money as outlined in the terms of the purchase agreement by June 1 (to be received by June 2);

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or

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Make a motion to terminate the purchase agreement due to insufficient grant funding.

The Ramsey County Housing and Redevelopment Authority (HRA) Commissioners approved the CDBG/HOME Action Plan for FY 2016 on April 26, 2016. Competition for funding was stronger than anticipated; however, we were fortunate to access loan program income and unspent administrative funds. Without the repayment of loans we would not have been able to fund as many projects as we have this year.

The Ramsey County HRA approved an award of \$117,400.00 toward acquisition of property at 1716 Marion Street that will be used as a pocket park and to assist with installation of playground infrastructure. The park will primarily serve residents of the 300 unit apartment complex, Marion-Brittany Apartments, which are home to a substantial population of Karen immigrants.

You can expect to receive agreements/amendments from the Ramsey County Attorney's office in mid - July. Funds are not expected to be available until after August 1, 2016, and possibly even later. Any project costs that you incur prior to receiving the fully executed agreement are at your own risk and cannot be reimbursed unless you have received prior approval from our agency in writing. Any funds used for construction will trigger labor standards compliance. Please contact our office prior to issuing any bids.

<u>Documentation of Beneficiaries</u>. A list of racial/ethnic categories that must be used for reporting participation in programs is attached. We are also including current income and rent limits. Annual participation reports are generally due at the end of June each year. Please let us know if you'd like to receive the report via email.

On January 5, 2016 the Parks and Recreation Commission heard a presentation on a concept park proposal at 1716 Marion Street and made the following recommendation:

Commissioner Doneen moved that the Parks and Recreation Commission recommend the City Council support the proposal that includes the acquisition of the Marion Street property and the development of a playground on the site using grant funding. The Commission also recommends using the Parks and Recreation model for community involvement and engagement to include input on both the Marion Street project and proposed renewal work at Tamarack Park. Second by Commissioner Gelbach. Passed Unanimously.

A full inspection of the property has not occurred.

If acquired, the following are estimated costs:

- Ongoing general maintenance costs are estimated to be \$1550 annually. This includes mowing, trimming, inspections, general repair and replacements.
- Ongoing capital improvement costs are estimated to be \$5,200 annually. This includes playground and signage replacement and general site amenities.
- A comprehensive community planning process to create a master plan for each park and the area may cost up to \$15,000.
- o Programming costs are yet to be determined depending on the extent.

PURCHASE AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is made between Marion Street/The Brittanys, L.L.P., a Minnesota limited liability partnership ("Seller"), and the City of Roseville, a Minnesota municipal corporation ("Buyer").

In consideration of this Agreement, Seller and Buyer agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Sale of Property</u>. Seller agrees to sell to Buyer, and Buyer agrees to buy from Seller, the real property located in Ramsey County, Minnesota, described in Exhibit A attached hereto (the "Property").
- 2. <u>Purchase Price and Manner of Payment</u>. The total purchase price ("Purchase Price") to be paid by Buyer to Seller for the Property shall be SIXTY-EIGHT THOUSAND AND NO/100 DOLLARS (\$68,000.00) which shall be payable as follows
 - A. \$500.00 as earnest money ("Earnest Money") which Earnest Money shall become due and shall be delivered to Seller on June 2, 2016. The Earnest Money shall be applied to the Purchase Price at Closing if the parties close hereunder, or if this Agreement is terminated by either party shall be retained by the Seller so long as the Seller is not in default under this Agreement.
 - B. The balance of the Purchase Price shall be paid by Buyer's check, in cash or by wire transfer of U.S. federal funds upon Closing.
- 3. <u>Contingencies</u>. The obligations of Buyer under this Agreement are contingent upon each of the following:
 - A. <u>Financing</u>. The Buyer is able to secure financing in an amount and upon such terms and conditions as Buyer deems necessary for it to purchase the Property.
 - B. <u>Inspections and Testing</u>. Buyer shall have determined, on or before the Contingency Date (as defined below), that it is satisfied with the results of all matters disclosed by physical inspections, soil tests, engineering inspections, hazardous waste and environmental reviews of the Property, and all other tests and inspections which Buyer deems necessary.
 - C. <u>Survey</u>. Buyer shall have determined, on or before the Contingency Date, that all matters (including but not limited to the acreage of the Property, the location of wetlands and easements and the location of the property boundaries) shown in the Survey and by boundary markers to be obtained and placed on the Property in accordance with Section 6B below, are satisfactory to the Buyer.

- D. <u>Physical Condition of Property</u>. The Buyer shall have determined, on or before the Contingency Date, that it is satisfied with the physical condition of the Property, and with the zoning, access, drainage, wetland areas, size and dimensions, and all other features and conditions of the Property which Buyer deems necessary for Buyer to purchase the Property.
- E. <u>Appraisal</u>. Buyer shall have obtained an appraisal of the Property which is satisfactory to Buyer.

The "Contingency Date" shall be as follows: (1) June 1, 2016, for the Financing Contingency provided in Section 3A (the "Financing Contingency Date"); and (2) August 1, 2016, for all other contingencies (the "Final Contingency Date"). If any of the foregoing contingencies have not been satisfied (which determination shall be within the Buyer's exclusive discretion) on or before the applicable Contingency Date, then this Agreement may be terminated, at Buyer's option, by written notice from Buyer to Seller. Such notice of termination may be given at any time on or before the applicable Contingency Date. Upon such termination, the Earnest Money shall be retained by Seller, and neither party shall thereafter have any rights against or obligations to the other hereunder, except as expressly stated otherwise herein. All the contingencies set forth in this Agreement are specifically stated and agreed to be for the sole and exclusive benefit of the Buyer and the Buyer shall have the right to unilaterally waive any contingency by written notice to Seller. The costs incurred by the Buyer to determine whether the contingencies have been satisfied shall be paid by the Buyer.

- 4. <u>Closing</u>. The closing on the purchase and sale contemplated by this Agreement (the "Closing") shall occur on August 12, 2016. The Closing shall take place at Land Title, Inc. ("Title Company"), 2200 West County Road C, Roseville, Minnesota 55113, or such other location as is mutually agreeable to the parties. The Seller agrees to deliver possession of the Property to the Buyer immediately following the Closing.
 - A. <u>Seller's Closing Documents</u>. Upon Closing the Seller shall execute and deliver to Buyer the following (collectively the "Seller's Closing Documents"):
 - i. <u>Deed.</u> A Warranty Deed, in form reasonably satisfactory to Buyer, conveying the Property to Buyer, free and clear of all encumbrances, except for the Permitted Encumbrances hereafter defined.
 - ii. <u>Seller's Affidavit</u>. An Affidavit indicating that on the date of actual Closing there are no outstanding, unsatisfied judgments, tax liens or bankruptcies against or involving Seller or the Property; that there has been no skill, labor or material furnished to the Property for which payment has not been made or for which mechanics' liens could be filed; and that there are no unrecorded contracts, leases, easements, or other agreements or interests relating to the Property; together with whatever standard owner's affidavit and/or indemnity which may be required by the Title Company to issue an Owner's Policy of Title Insurance showing the

- condition of title required by this Agreement with the standard exceptions waived.
- iii. <u>Non-Foreign Transferor Certificate</u>. A non-foreign certificate, properly executed and in recordable form, containing such information as is required by IRC Section 1445 (b) (2) and its regulations.
- iv. Other Documents. Such other documents reasonably determined by the Title Company or the Buyer to be necessary to transfer the Property to Buyer in compliance with this Agreement or which are to be entered into by, or given to, the parties upon Closing pursuant to the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
- B. <u>Buyer's Closing Documents</u>. Upon Closing the Buyer will deliver to the Seller the balance of the Purchase Price, by cash, by wire transfer of U.S. federal funds or by Buyer's check.
- 5. <u>Prorations</u>. Seller and Buyer agree to the following prorations and allocation of costs regarding this Agreement:
 - A. <u>Title Insurance, Survey and Closing Fee.</u> Seller will pay all costs of providing the Title Evidence designated in Section 6A below. Buyer will pay all premiums for any Title Insurance Policy required by Buyer. Seller and Buyer will each pay half of the cost of any closing fee charged by the Title Company. The Buyer will pay the cost of the Survey to be obtained by Buyer and boundary markers to be placed upon the Property pursuant to Section 6B below.
 - B. <u>Deed Tax</u>. Seller shall pay all state deed tax and the conservation fee payable to record the Warranty Deed to be delivered by Seller under this Agreement.
 - C. Real Estate Taxes and Special Assessments,
 - i. Real estate taxes and installments of special assessments due and payable in and for the year of Closing shall be prorated between Seller and Buyer on a calendar year basis to the actual date of Closing.
 - ii. Buyer shall assume all other special assessments levied as of the date of this Purchase Agreement.
 - iii. Buyer shall assume special assessments pending as of the date of this Purchase Agreement for improvements that have been ordered by the City Council or other governmental assessing authorities as of the date of this Purchase Agreement.
 - iv. Seller represents that Seller has not received a Notice of Hearing of a new public improvement project, whether levied, pending, or outstanding, from

- any governmental assessing authority, the costs of which project may be assessed against the Property.
- v. If a special assessment becomes pending after the date of this Purchase Agreement and before the Date of Closing, Buyer may, at Buyer's option:
 - a. Assume payment of the pending special assessment without adjustment to the purchase price of the real Property; or
 - b. Require Seller to pay the pending special assessment (or escrow for payment of same as provided above) and Buyer shall pay a commensurate increase in the purchase price of the real Property, which increase shall be the same as the estimated amount of the assessment; or
 - c. Terminate this Purchase Agreement by notice to Seller.
- vi. Seller shall pay any deferred real estate taxes payment of which is required as a result of the closing of this sale.
- vii. Buyer shall assume on date of Closing any special assessments payment of which is required as a result of the closing of this sale.
- viii. Buyer shall pay real estate taxes due and payable in the year following closing and thereafter and any unpaid special assessments payable therewith and thereafter, the payment of which is not otherwise provided herein. Seller makes no representation concerning the amount of future real estate taxes or of future special assessments.
- D. <u>Recording Costs.</u> Buyer will pay the recording fee imposed to record the Warranty Deed. Seller will provide and pay the cost of recording any other documents required by the Title Company to convey title of the Property to the Buyer as specified in Provision 4Ai above.
- E. Operating Costs. All utilities and other operating costs of the Property not designated above shall be allocated between Seller and Buyer as of the date of actual closing, so that Seller pays that part of such utilities and other operating costs attributable to the period on and before the date of actual Closing, and the Buyer pays that part of such operating costs attributable to the period after the date of actual Closing.
- F. <u>Attorney's Fees</u>. Each of the parties will pay its own attorney's fees pertaining to the negotiation, performance and enforcement of this Purchase Agreement.

- 6. <u>Title Examination</u>. The Title Examination will be conducted as follows:
 - A. <u>Seller's Title Evidence</u>. Seller shall within 15 days after Buyer notifies Seller that the Financing Contingency has been satisfied or waived, furnish to the Buyer a commitment ("Title Commitment") for an ALTA Owner's Policy of Title Insurance (accompanied by legible copies of all documents described therein) issued by the Title Company committing to insure title to the Property, in the amount of the Purchase Price, subject only to the exceptions stated therein.
 - B. <u>Survey</u>. Following the delivery of the Title Commitment by the Seller to the Buyer as provided in Section 6A above, the Buyer shall, if Buyer so elects, retain a surveyor to prepare a survey of the Property (the "Survey") showing such matters as the Buyer deems necessary and to place boundary markers on the Property. The Survey shall be prepared and the boundary markers placed upon the Property at Buyer's sole expense.
 - C. <u>Buyer's Objections</u>. Within thirty (30) days after receiving the Title Commitment, Buyer will examine the condition of title to the Property and make written objections ("Objections") to the form and/or contents of the Title Commitment and/or to any items shown on the Survey if a Survey is obtained. Any matter shown in the Title Commitment and on the Survey (if a Survey is obtained) not objected to by the Buyer within said 30-day period shall be a "Permitted Encumbrance." If Buyer delivers to Seller any Objections, Seller will use Seller's best efforts to cure or satisfy the Objections on or before the Closing Date. If the Objections are not cured on or before the Closing Date, the Buyer will have the option to do the following:
 - i. Terminate this Agreement; or
 - ii. Waive the Objections and proceed to Closing.
- 7. Operation Prior to Closing. During the period from the date of Seller's acceptance of this Agreement to the date of actual Closing (the "Executory Period"), the Seller shall not execute any contracts, easements, leases or other agreements regarding the Property without the prior written consent of Buyer.

Seller will give Buyer written notice of any citation or other notice which Seller receives subsequent to the Effective Date of this Agreement, from any governmental authority concerning any alleged violation of any law, ordinance, code, rule, regulation or order regulating the Property or the use thereof.

The Seller shall not take any action, or cause to be recorded against the Property any documents, which changes the condition of title to the Property from that shown in the Title Commitment without the prior written consent of the Buyer.

- 8. Representations and Warranties by Seller. The Seller represents and warrants to Buyer as follows (which representations and warranties shall be true and correct as of the date hereof and as of the date of actual closing):
 - A. <u>Unrecorded Documents</u>. To the best of Seller's knowledge there are no unrecorded leases, contracts, easements, agreements or other documents affecting title to the Property.
 - B. <u>Hazardous Substances</u>. To the best of Seller's knowledge, no Hazardous Substances (as defined by federal and state law), asbestos, urea formaldehyde, polychlorinated biphenyls, radon gas or petroleum products (including gasoline, fuel oil, crude oil and various constituents of such products) exist in or on, have been placed or stored in or on, or have been released from, the Property by any person or entity in violation of any law.
 - C. <u>Mechanic's Lien</u>. To the best of Seller's knowledge there are no unpaid charges, debts, liabilities, claims or obligations arising from the construction, occupancy, ownership, use or operation of the Property which could give rise to any mechanic's or materialmen's or other statutory liens against any of the Property, or for which Buyer will be responsible.
 - D. <u>Wells.</u> Seller does not know of any "Wells" on the described Property within the meaning of Minnesota law, except as have been previously disclosed to the Buyer pursuant to a Well Disclosure Statement.
 - E. <u>Storage Tanks</u>. To the best of Seller's knowledge there are no "above ground storage tanks" or "underground tanks" (within the meaning of Minnesota law) located in or on the Property, or have been located, in or on the Property and have subsequently been removed or filled.
 - F. <u>Individual Sewage Treatment Systems</u>. There is no existing or abandoned "individual sewage treatment system" (within the meaning of Minnesota law) in, on or serving the Property, except as have been previously disclosed to the Buyer pursuant to a Septic System Disclosure Statement.
 - G. <u>Methamphetamine Production</u>. No Methamphetamine Production has occurred at or on the Property.
 - H. <u>Litigation</u>. To the best of Seller's knowledge there is: (i) no actual or pending litigation or proceeding by any organization, person, individual or governmental agency against Seller or against the Property, and (ii) no pending or threatened condemnation proceeding that would affect the Property.
 - I. <u>Boundary Lines</u>. To the best of Seller's knowledge there are no disputes or encroachments pertaining to the location of the boundary lines of the Property.

- J. <u>Seller Authority</u>. Seller has the requisite power and authority to enter into, perform and execute this Agreement and the Seller's Closing Documents.
- K. <u>Diseased Trees</u>. Seller has not received any notice from any governmental authority as to the existence of, nor does the Seller have any knowledge of, any Dutch elm disease, oak wilt, emerald borer infestation or other disease of any trees or vegetation on the Property.
- L. <u>Protected Sites.</u> Seller has no knowledge that the Property has any conditions that are protected by federal or state law (such as American Indian burial grounds, other human burial grounds, ceremonial earthworks, historical structures or materials, or archeological sites).
- M. Relocation Benefits. That the Property was vacant and unoccupied before the initiation of negotiations between the parties for the Buyer's acquisition of the Property and the Property has been continuously vacant and unoccupied since that time.

Each of the representations and warranties made herein shall survive Closing. Seller will indemnify Buyer and its successors and assigns, against, and will hold Buyer, and its successors and assigns, harmless from, any expenses or damages, including reasonable attorney's fees, that Buyer incurs because of the breach of any of the above representations and warranties.

- 9. Condemnation. If, prior to the Closing, eminent domain proceedings are commenced against all or any part of the Property, Seller will immediately give notice to Buyer of such fact, and at Buyer's option (to be exercised within 20 days after Seller's notice), this Agreement will terminate, in which event neither party will have further obligations under this Agreement except as expressly stated otherwise herein, and the Earnest Money will be retained by Seller. If Buyer fails to give such notice then there will be no reduction in the Purchase Price, and Seller will assign to Buyer at the Closing all of Seller's right, title and interest in and to any award made or to be made in the condemnation proceedings. Prior to the Closing, Seller will not designate counsel, appear in, or otherwise take any action with respect to the condemnation proceedings without Buyer's prior written consents.
- 10. <u>Broker's Commission</u>. Seller and Buyer represent to each other that they have not dealt with any brokers, real estate agents or the like in connection with this transaction, and will indemnify each other and hold each other harmless against all claims, damages, costs or expenses for any broker and/or realtor fees or commissions resulting from the actions or agreements of the indemnitor regarding this Agreement, and will pay all costs of defending any action or lawsuit brought to recover any such fees or commissions incurred by the other party, including reasonable attorney's fees.
- 11. Survival. The warranties and representations contained herein shall survive Closing.

12. Notices. Any notice required or permitted to be given by any party upon the other is given in accordance with this Agreement if it is: (i) delivered personally upon Patrick J. Bradley, if such delivery is upon Seller, or delivered personally upon Patrick J. Trudgeon, Roseville City Manager, if such delivery is upon Buyer, (ii) mailed in a sealed wrapper by United States registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, postage prepaid, addressed as designated below, or (iii) delivered by a reputable express courier service which provides confirmation of delivery, properly addressed as follows:

Notices shall be deemed effective on the date of receipt if delivered personally, upon the date of delivery to the reputable express courier if delivered to the courier for overnight delivery, or on the date of deposit in the U.S. Mail, if mailed; provided, however, if notice is given by deposit in the U.S. mails or by delivery to a courier for overnight delivery, the time for response to any notice by the other party shall commence to run one business day after the date of mailing or delivery to the courier. Any party may change its address for the service of notice by giving written notice of such change to the other party, in any of the manners specified above, 10 days prior to the effective date of such change.

- 13. <u>Defaults and Remedies.</u> In the event of a default on the part of either party under this Agreement which continues for three (3) business days after receipt of written notice from the other party, the following shall apply:
 - A. If the Buyer is the defaulting party the Seller may, as its sole remedy, terminate this Agreement in accordance with Minnesota Statutes §559.21, whereupon the Earnest Money shall be delivered to Seller as liquidated damages.
 - B. If the Seller is the defaulting party, the Buyer may as its sole remedies either: (i) terminate this Agreement whereupon the Earnest money shall be returned to Buyer, or (ii) seek specific performance provided that such action shall be commenced within 90 days after such right of action shall arise.

Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained herein, the parties acknowledge and agree that any liability of the parties to the other under the covenants and

indemnifications contained in Sections 10 and 14 shall not be limited or affected by the foregoing provisions of this Section.

- 14. Access to Property. Buyer and its agents shall have the right and permission from and after the date hereof and until the Final Contingency Date to conduct such studies, analyses, and reports as Buyer may desire as to the Property, its title, boundaries, zoning, physical condition, and other characteristics ("Inspection"). If any invasive Inspection is conducted, Buyer or its agent shall return the Property to reasonably the same condition as existed before the Inspection. Seller shall permit Buyer and its agents reasonable access to the Property at reasonable times and on reasonable notice, for purposes of inspecting and determining the physical conditions of such Property, provided that such inspections shall not materially interfere with any use of the Property by Seller or its tenants. Before being allowed access to the Property, each company whose agents or employees are to enter upon the Property for the purposes described herein will provide evidence that it has insurance in the form of a Certificate of Insurance issued by a company authorized to do business in the State of Minnesota, with general liability coverage limits no less than \$2,000,000. Buyer shall (a) indemnify and defend Seller against any loss, liability, and expense arising out of, or having to do with, the activity of Buyer or its agents on the Property, including any mechanics' lien claim, any claim for personal injury, death or property damage, and any attorneys' or other professional fees or costs incurred by Seller as to the foregoing, except for any such loss, liability or expense arising from Seller's negligence or willful misconduct and (b) promptly restore any property affected or injured by the activities of Buyer or its agents to the condition it was in prior to such activities.

- Agreement, upon notice from Buyer to Seller, will cease and terminate, and the Earnest Money will be retained by Seller.
- 16. <u>Property Condition Disclosure</u>. THE SELLER AND BUYER EXPRESSLY WAIVE THE WRITTEN DISCLOSURE REQUIRED UNDER MINNESOTA STATUTES SECTIONS 513.52 TO 513.60.
- 17. <u>Airport Zoning Regulations</u>. If airport zoning regulations affect the Property, a copy of those airport zoning regulations as adopted can be viewed or obtained at the office of the County recorder where the zoned area is located.
- 18. Predatory Offenders. Information about the predatory offender registry and persons registered with the registry may be obtained by contacting the local law enforcement agency or by contacting the Minnesota Department of Corrections at 651-367-7200 or at http://www.doc.state.mn.us.
- 19. <u>Studies and Other Materials</u>. Within ten (10) days after the Effective Date, the Seller shall provide the Buyer with copies of all soil reports, surveys, engineering studies and reports, environmental studies and reports and other documents that Buyer may request pertaining to the Property, if Seller has such documents in Seller's possession. If the foregoing would work an inconvenience on the Seller, the Seller shall permit the Buyer to examine and make copies of such items during normal business hours, and shall provide facilities for these purposes.

The public hearing for this application was held by the Planning Commission on May 4, 2016, and voted 5-2 to recommend approval of the requested zoning text amendment.

1 SUMMARY OF THE PROPOSED TEXT AMENDMENT

2 The applicant requests an increase in the allowance of building footprint and pavement area in

the LDR-2 district from 30% of the parcel area to 50%. In reviewing the application, Planning

Division staff found that the current 30% restriction was incorporated into the zoning code in

1998 as part of Ordinance 1214, which was a collection of amendments intended to prevent

6 "excessively large" detached garages; in staff's experience, however, the lot coverage limit has

complicated moderate garage expansion plans, but it has not generally been a parameter that is

most limiting for especially large garages. The 30% limit was carried over into the updated

zoning code in 2010, despite the smaller minimum lot size the updated zoning code allowed in

the LDR-2 district. An unintended effect of carrying-over the 30% limit was to constrain building

footprints and paved surfaces for single-family detached homes on LDR-2 lots to far lower levels

than single-family detached homes in LDR-1 and MDR districts. The following table illustrates

the imbalance of the 2010 zoning revisions on the development potential for LDR-2 parcels.

LDR-1	11,000 sq. ft.	30%	3,300 sq. ft.

- The proposed amendment would allow 3,000 square feet of building footprint and paved surface
- on a minimum-sized LDR-2 lot, which is comparable to the allowance of the same improvements
- on minimum-sized LDR-1 and MDR lots. The detailed staff analysis of the application, as

- included with this RCA as Exhibit A.

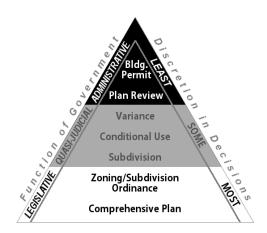

LEVEL OF CITY DISCRETION IN DECISION-MAKING

Action taken on a proposed zoning change is **legislative** in nature; the City has broad discretion in making land use decisions based on advancing the health, safety, and general welfare of the community.



ZONING AMENDMENT ANALYSIS

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- In the Low- and Medium-Density residential zoning districts, building footprints and paved 2
- surfaces are limited to 30% of the overall area of parcels used for development of single-family
- detached homes. The purpose of such a limit is to manage storm water runoff that is generated by 4
- buildings and other "hard surfaces." Since the adoption of Roseville's original zoning code in 5
- 1959, buildings and paved surfaces on R-1 properties (equivalent to today's LDR-1 district) have 6
- been limited to 30% of the parcel area, but such improvements were allowed on up to 40% of R-7
- 2 parcels (equivalent to the current LDR-2 district). When the zoning code was updated in 2010,
- however, that differentiation was inadvertently lost, and LDR-2 parcels were restricted to the 9
- same 30% limit as LDR-1 parcels, even though LDR-2 parcels were assigned smaller minimum 10
- parcel sizes. The following table illustrates the effect of the 2010 zoning revisions on the 11
- development potential for LDR-2 parcels. 12

- In 1959, parcels in the R-1 district were subject to 11,000 square-foot minimum area 13
- requirements and, with a 30% allowance of building footprints and paved surfaces, permitted at 14
- least 3,300 square feet of building and pavement area (depending on the actual parcel size). In

- 16 1959, R-2 parcels had the same minimum area requirement but, with a 40% allowance of
- building footprints and paved surfaces, were permitted more (i.e., at least 4,400 square feet) of
- the same building and pavement area. The 2010 update of the zoning code introduced greater
- diversity in the size of lots for development of single-family homes, but while such lots in the
- LDR-1 and MDR districts were each allowed to be developed with somewhat more than 3,000
- square feet of building and pavement area, lots in the LDR-2 district were unintentionally limited
- to only 1,800 square feet.
- This artificially low limit on building footprint and paved area in the LDR-2 district has generally
- 24 not been an issue since its creation in 2010 because Roseville has not approved any LDR-2
- development until 2016. The applicant requesting the zoning amendment has recently gained
- approval of the Wheaton Woods plat, which includes several LDR-2 parcels. The builder
- engaged to develop homes on these parcels has been attempting to design modestly-sized homes
- that adhere to the existing 30% limit and that are viable in the market. But, by the time a parcel is
- developed with a 10-foot wide driveway that reaches to the required 30-foot minimum, front yard
- building setback (300 square feet), and a 20-foot by 10-foot (200 square feet) place to park or
- turn a vehicle around, 1,300 square feet of building and hard surface remains to be built. Even
- with a *very* minimal two-car garage (400 square feet), only a 900-square-foot house footprint
- (which is the size of a 1920s bungalow or a 1950s Cape Cod or small rambler) could be
- developed with the remnants of the 1,800 square-foot total allowance, which doesn't even
- include a sidewalk—let alone a patio or a place to store a lawnmower and other household
- equipment that wouldn't fit in the garage unless the homeowner had compact vehicles.
- 37 The applicant's written narrative, included with this RPCA as Attachment A, also demonstrates
- how the hard surface allowance is quickly exhausted. Clearly, even a very modest residential
- property is difficult to develop with building footprint and paved area that doesn't exceed 1,800
- square feet, and it is easy to imagine that market demand for such a restricted property is very
- limited. Of course, an LDR-2 parcel that has more than the minimum required area will allow for
- a greater amount of building and pavement area, but it remains true that the 1,800 square-foot
- allowance is dramatically and artificially lower than what is allowed for single-family homes in
- the LDR-1 and MDR districts.
- 45 Because of this, Planning Division staff recommends increasing the percentage of building
- 46 footprint and paved surfaces allowed on parcels in the LDR-2 district. The applicant suggests a
- limit of 50% for the LDR-2 district; as a percentage figure, it is a little greater than the average of
- 48 30% (allowed in LDR-1) and 65% (allowed in MDR), but the 3,000 square feet of building
- footprints and paved surfaces it would allow on a 6,000 square-foot parcel remains less than the
- 3,120 square feet and 3,300 square feet permitted on MDR and LDR-1 parcels, respectively.
- While people may discuss whether a greater or lesser allowance is most appropriate, Planning
- 52 Division staff believes a 50% limit is a reasonable place to begin that discussion. Attachment B
- comprises a draft zoning text amendment that would incorporate the proposed 50% limit.
- The proposed zoning text amendment was discussed by the Development Review Committee
- (DRC) on April 7 and April 21, 2016. The members of the DRC were generally supportive of the
- 56 greater parity among zoning districts that would be achieved by the proposed amendment. Public
- Works staff also observed that the impacts on storm water runoff would be minimal because
- existing LDR-2 parcels are few in number and broadly spaced as individuals or small groups
- across the community (moreover, of those that are grouped together, most are governed by
- Planned Unit Development agreements which will constrain additional development of those

- parcels), and because storm water in new LDR-2 developments will be fully mitigated according

WHEATON WOODS, ROSEVILLE TEXT AMENDMENT NARRATIVE 3/30/16

Golden Valley Land Company has recently received preliminary plat and rezoning approval for a 17 lot residential land development project for the 5.82 ac. vacant land site that is located at Wheaton Ave. and Dale St. N. (in the NW quadrant of County Road C and Dale St. .).

The project will be for 17 single family homes (eleven zoned LDR-1 Low Density Residential and six zoned LDR-2 Low Density Residential). A portion of the site along Dale St. N. has been rezoned from LDR-1 Low Density Residential to LDR-2 Low Density Residential with 60-70' wide lots.

Based on our discussions with local builders and City staff, we are requesting a text amendment to section 1004.09C of the City Code, that applies to LDR-2 lot requirements. The current City Code limit's the area of the "paved surfaces and building footprints" on LDR-2 lots to 30%. We are requesting that the City Code change this minimum area to 50%.

Based on an allowable single family lot in the LDR-2 district of 6000 sf, the maximum area of "paved surfaces and building footprints" would be only 1800 sf. Assuming a narrow 18' wide driveway within the 30' front setback area (540 st); a small sized two car garage that is 22' x 22' (484 st); and 150 sf for a sidewalk and front porch; that leaves only 626 sf of area for the home's 1st floor living area. This 1st floor living area limit is too small for even a modestly sized and affordable new single family home.

For example, the 1st floor living area of the newly approved (modestly sized) townhomes at Garden Station are 1850 sf.

Based on the current zoning code, the allowable area for "paved surfaces and building footprints" is as follows for the three single-family zoning districts:

LDR-1: 30% of an 11,000 sf lot is 3300 sf LDR-2: 30% of a 6000 sflot is 1800 sf MDR: 65% of a 4800 sf lot is 3120 sf

We believe that this is an unbalanced set of requirements, and that this was not intended when the LDR-2 district was established. If the LDR-2 requirement was changed to 50%, the allowable area would be 3000 sf, which is more practical and is more appropriate given the above calculations for the other two residential zoning districts.

The 3000 sf area would still meet the spirit and intent of smaller homes on the smaller LDR-2 single family lots, since it is still less than both the LDR-1 and MDR size allowances. This still provides a appropriate size limitation so reasonable single family homes can be constructed.

In summary, we believe that changing the LDR-2 limit for the area of the "paved surfaces and building footprints" from 30% to 50%, is appropriate and reasonable; and would not have an adverse impact on health, welfare or safety.

C. Improvement Area: Improvement area, including paved surfaces, the footprints of principal and accessory buildings, and other structures like decks, pergolas, pools, etc., shall be limited to 70% of the parcel area. d. **PLANNING FILE 16-010** 1 2 Request by Golden Valley Land Company to AMEND Roseville City Code, Section 3 1004.09.C (Improvement Area) to allow greater development of building footprints and paved surfaces on parcels in the LDR-2 Zoning District 4 Chair Boguszewski opened the public hearing for PLANNING FILE 16-010 at 8:32 p.m. 5 Senior Planner Bryan Lloyd reviewed the request as detailed in the staff report and 6 attachments dated May 4, 2016 and rationale for suggested changes. 7 8 In Lines 12 – 13 of the staff report, Chair Boguszewski noted reference in the table to 9 "gradual hard surface allowances," and questioned if this language was intentional. 10 Mr. Lloyd suggested that may be an oversight, since there were not many R-2 zoned 11 parcels in the old zoning code, and therefore not many LDR-2 zoned parcels in the 12 current zoning code. Mr. Lloyd opined that it was typical to routinely think of the 30% limit and that had been inadvertently carried over without considering distinction with lot sizes. 13 Member Daire asked if the old R-2 was comparable with the LDR-2 zoning. 14 Mr. Lloyd responded that, in some ways they were comparable, but the old version was 15 more conventional in nature and set up with categories of zoning districts, distinctly R-1 16 and R-2 with R-2 allowing not only single-family uses, but duplexes and/or twin homes as 17 well, or smaller multi-family uses. However, both required the same minimum lot sizes for 18 either R-1 or R-2 as with LDR-2; with the new code allowing for smaller lot sizes. 19 Chair Boguszewski closed the public hearing at 8:42 p.m.; no one spoke for or against. 20 21 **Commission Deliberation** Member Daire reviewed potential ratios to apply and calculations between 40% to 60% 22 23 and how impervious surface would be impacted and their variables and results. Member Daire opined that from his perspective and calculations, he'd consider 40% as a 24 reasonable impervious surface allowance on a 3,300 square foot or larger lot based on 25 26 proportionality. In that case, if the developer could put a larger building footprint on the lot and a 2-car wide driveway with double garage, Member Daire opined that this wouldn't 27 leave much remaining square footage for a house. If he were a developer, Member Daire 28 29 further opined that he could do that it would be nice, but in terms of equality, opined 40% was sufficient and questioned whether it actually 30 Chair Boguszewski stated he had considered the 40% ratio, but was actually more 31 comfortable with the 50% in line with other categories; and would support a motion at 32 33 50% as recommended by staff. In looking at density differences among zoning designations, Member Bull stated he 34 35 considered more density per unit and the number of units versus density of paved areas, especially with lot sizes at a minimum versus maximum or absolute. If they have 30% 36 37 capability, Member Bull noted it stayed proportional with LDR-1 and LDR-2. Member Bull 38 stated he took some exception to calculations for a 2-car driveway and 18' by 30' given city code driveway requirements, especially if the goal is to look at move-up housing and 39 opportunities to add to main floor footprints and maximum deductions taken for a 40 driveway, porch, sidewalk and garage. Under that scenario, Member Bull opined he could 41 envision move-up housing with no available green space at all with a 50% paved area 42 installed, and not allowing for any sheds or other outbuildings since the impervious 43 surface would already be maxed out. 44 45 While that may be hypothetically true, Chair Boguszewski stated his concern was that it may effectively preclude development close to minimum areas or make it impossible to 46 develop. Chair Boguszewski opined that his argument was that since not all lot sizes for 47 LDR-2 are much bigger, it provides more flexibility for a developer to increase impervious 48 somewhat, further opining that 40% to 50% shouldn't make that noticeable of a 49 50 difference. 51 When considering LDR-1 or LDR-2, especially with unintended structures such as twin

homes or duplexes, Member Bull opined that the argument was not practical with only

30% building space on the lot, and further opining that he found this a way to circumvent

that situation. Since this is the first time anything has been done with LDR-2 since rezoning rewrites in 2010, Member Bull suggested caution, making him lean toward not supporting the staff requested language rewrite or anything lower than the 50% as recommended.

Member Murphy asked Member Bull to clarify his comments on move-up housing, opining that his comments didn't fit with his personal recollection for this, and whether Member Bull considered these properties suitable for move-up or first-time homeowners.

Member Bull clarified that he considered them move-up housing from HDR apartment living for those wanting to stay in their same neighborhood but also moving to single-family versus multi-family housing stock versus from one home to a larger home, but in this case into a starter home.

Member Gitzen stated his support for changing as per staff's recommendation to a higher percentage; opining that he could support 40% or 50%, either which could be arbitrary depending on your particular reasoning; but reiterated his support for either or.

Member Murphy opined that, from his perspective, the different in LDR-1 and LDR2 was that LDR-2 allowed smaller lots. While the staff report suggested 550% as a good starting discussion point, Member Murphy opined he could feel comfortable with 50%. Member Murphy stated that part of the situation was that you were buying into that percentage; you had the choice of more green space or more hard surface for the home's footprint. Particularly today, Member Murphy noted that it was common for at least a two-car garage and 2-stall car width driveway and garage space. If a prospective homeowner wanted something closer to 50% versus 30%, Member Murphy noted it would impact that first floor footprint accordingly.

Member Bull asked staff if they had researched any comparables to communities around Roseville.

Mr. Lloyd responded that staff hadn't actually looked at surrounding communities; but in terms of provision, advised it would be difficult to find anyway as lot size requirements were typically much smaller in other communities, especially for single-family zoning designations. Therefore, Mr. Lloyd opined it would be hard to make direct comparisons in that regard.

MOTION

ORDINANCE NO. ____

AN ORDNANCE AMENDING TITLE 10 OF THE CITY CODE PERTAINING TO THE QUANTITY OF BUILDING FOOTPRINT AND PAVED SURFACE ALLOWED ON PROPERTY IN THE LDR-2 DISTRICT

The City Council of the City of Roseville does ordain:

Section 1. The Roseville City Code is hereby amended as follows.

1004.09 Low Density Residential - 2 (LDR-2) District

C. Improvement Area: Improvement area, including paved surfaces, the footprints of principal and accessory buildings, and other structures like decks, pergolas, pools, etc., shall be limited to 70% of the parcel area. The purpose of this overall improvement area limit is to allow for rather liberal construction on a residential property while preventing overbuilding. Within this improvement area limit, paved surfaces and building footprints shall be limited to 30% 50% of a parcel; for parcels within a Shoreland or Wetland Management District, paved surfaces and building footprints shall be further limited to 25% of the parcel area. The purpose of these further limits on paved surfaces and building footprints within the overall improvement area allowance is to prevent problems caused by excess storm water runoff.

Section 2. Effective Date. This ordinance amendment to the City Code shall take effect upon the passage and publication of this ordinance.
