7. Master Plan Implementation Discussion

This is continued discussion about the Master Plan Implementation.

Commission representatives and staff will plan to review progress to date. This is a time to gather continued guidance/direction from the entire commission.

After a public hearing session at the October 24th City Council meeting, the Council approved moving forward with the issuance of bonds in the total amount of \$10M with the suggested allocation by City Administration of \$8M for the fire Station and \$2M for Park Improvements. The allocation is not final and is still being discussed.

Following is the timeline for the remaining bond sale amounts:

- April/May 2012 \$10M
- December 2012/January 2013 - \$7M

There will be a public hearing prior to each issuance.

Included in your packet are notes from the September 29, 2011 Citizen Organizing Team meeting.

Requested Action: Discuss progress on the implementation process and provide continued guidance

8. **Park Dedication Rates Discussion**

The Commissions role is to review and recommend park dedication rates.

The last increase for residential rates was in 2007 when the rates were increased from \$2,000 to \$3,000 per unit. Land in lieu of cash dedication remained at 10%. Based upon the survey of other communities while considering the overall parks and recreation system needs such as the Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) and the Master Plan Implementation, it may be appropriate to recommend an increase in the per unit dedication at this time. It appears like that the 10% land dedication may be appropriate.

The Commercial/Industrial Park Dedication has remained at 5% of FMV for several years. Translating the % into dollars using the recent Meritex development as an example converts into approximately \$15,000 per acre ($\$91,000/6 \text{ acres} = \$15,166$). Based upon the survey results, system needs, CIP and the outlined Master Plan, it may be appropriate to recommend the Commercial dedication remain at 5%.

This item is included on your agenda to discuss the current rate and to consider a recommendation.

Enclosed is a survey of rates in surrounding metropolitan communities.

1. INTRODUCTIONS/ROLL CALL/PUBLIC COMMENT

Chloe Boehm was introduced as Roseville Area High School Sophomore interested in the youth commissioner position on the Parks and Recreation Commission.

Chloe has a long background of involvement in parks and recreation programs and community volunteerism. Chloe credited her involvement in Parks and Recreation soccer programs for sparking her interest in soccer. Chloe has always had an appreciation for parks and sees an opportunity to be involved with the Parks and Recreation Commission as a way of giving back to the community.

2. APPROVAL OF MINUTES – September 6, 2011 MEETING

Commission Recommendation:

Minutes for the September 6, 2011 meeting were approved unanimously.

3. STAFF INTRODUCTIONS

Brokke provided a brief overview of the parks and recreation department structure. Parks and recreation currently has 23 full time equivalency positions in four divisions – recreation, skating center, golf course and maintenance. Following Brokke's introduction, department managers introduced themselves and talked about their individual job responsibilities, providing a breadth and scope of Roseville's Parks and Recreation operations and answered commissioner questions.

Commissioner Etten thanked the parks and recreation staff for all they do to provide quality programs, events and facilities to the community.

Other commissioner comments included;

- o Its easy to take Parks and Recreation for granted because of the work done by the staff to make sure facilities are safe and well maintained, programs and events are interesting, fun and meeting community wants and needs. It takes significant resources and a strong commitment to maintain a system like we have in Roseville.

Three staff members were unable to attend the October meeting and will attend the November meeting to talk about youth recreation programs, Nature Center and Skating Center facilities.

4. COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT TASK FORCE REPORT

Greg Simbeck and Randall Doneen updated the Commission on the status of the Community Engagement Task Force. Recently, the Community Engagement Task Force held a Community Forum to get input as to how people are currently involved in the community and how our community communicates.

The next steps for the Task Force include a second Community Forum to review information and recommendations compiled from the first forum and continue the dialogue on community involvement and communications. The Task Force is also looking into a more interactive website that would encourage connections between community members and exploring best practices for

civic engagement in other similar communities as well as how the various departments in Roseville promote civic engagement.

5. **2012 COMMISSION MEETING CALENDAR**

A number of 2012 Commission Meetings need consideration for alternate meeting dates.

Commissioners discussed the options for moving the meeting dates. Commissioners suggested that every effort be made to keep alternate dates as close to the original meeting date as possible.

- o Commissioners recommended moving the February 7 meeting to February 9 to accommodate Caucus'
- o Commissioners recommended June 18 as the joint Commission/Council meeting date
- o Commissioners recommended keeping the August 7 meeting date, but change the starting time to 8pm to accommodate annual Night to Unite neighborhood activities
- o Commissioners recommended moving the November 6 meeting to November 8 to accommodate General Elections

Staff will check on the availability of these recommended dates and follow up with the Commission at a future meeting.

6. **MASTER PLAN IMPLEMENTATION DISCUSSION**

Brokke informed Commission members of recent changes in the funding process for the Parks and Recreation renewal program.

City Manager Malinen and Finance Director Chris Miller, with the guidance of the Bond Counsel are recommending the use of general obligation bonds issued through the Roseville Port Authority to finance the building of a new fire station and the parks and recreation renewal program for system-wide maintenance and renovation.

This type of general obligation bond has limitations on the maximum amount of funding released annually. This form of bonding does have some additional flexibility in how the funding is spent and has the potential to be easier to administer and have a possible interest payment savings.

The general obligations bond process will be taken to the Planning Commission on October 5th for their recommendation to the City Council to enable the Port Authority for Bonds to build the Fire Station and implement the first step of the Parks and Recreation Master Plan for system-wide renewal and maintenance. The Planning Commission recommendation will go to the Council on October 10th for their official action to enable the Port Authority. A public hearing is tentatively scheduled for October 24th to enable the Roseville Port Authority.

Commissioners discussed the most recent timeline for the renewal program, master plan priorities and the need to act on time sensitive opportunities related to the Master Plan Implementation. The Commissioners also spoke of their appreciation for those Council Members who have supported the Master Plan Implementation.

Randall Doneen shared information on the work of the Natural Resources and Trails Work Group. This Implementation Work Group has spent a significant amount of time talking with local officials, reviewing trail plans and Natural Resource Management Plans to acquire a high level of understanding of community needs and interests. In addition to traditional natural resources and trailways projects the Natural Resources and Trails Work Group recommends considering looking into investing in deer management as part of the natural resources management funding.

7. **TREE INVENTORY**

Brokke briefed the Commission on the latest tree inventory findings. Roseville has 10,685 public trees, public trees are defined as trees that can be mowed around and are located at City facilities.

Volunteers with a background in forestry began the tree inventory process, with DNR grant funding these volunteers were able to be hired as seasonal employees to expedite the inventory process. Jeff Evenson helped the Commissioners better understand the information collected through the survey and explained the Public Tree Master Plan.

8. **DIRECTORS REPORT**

- o The fishing pier in Lake Bennett is being replaced through a joint project with the DNR and the City of Roseville. Parks maintenance staff will be removing the existing pier shortly and installing a new pier yet this fall.
- o The Crosswalk on Victoria, adjacent to the softball fields and the Lions Shelter will be marked by a permanent crosswalk light this fall.
- o The Reservoir Woods trail will get the first layer of asphalt this fall and the 2nd lift will be put down in 2012. Those involved with this project are working to clean up the area.
- o Fire Station 1 is being vacated. Parks and Recreation staff are relocating its storage area to the Hagen building off Fairview.
- o Roseville has been fortunate to have minimal vandalism and graffiti in the parks. Recently Villa Park has been hit repeatedly with graffiti and vandalism to park benches and features.

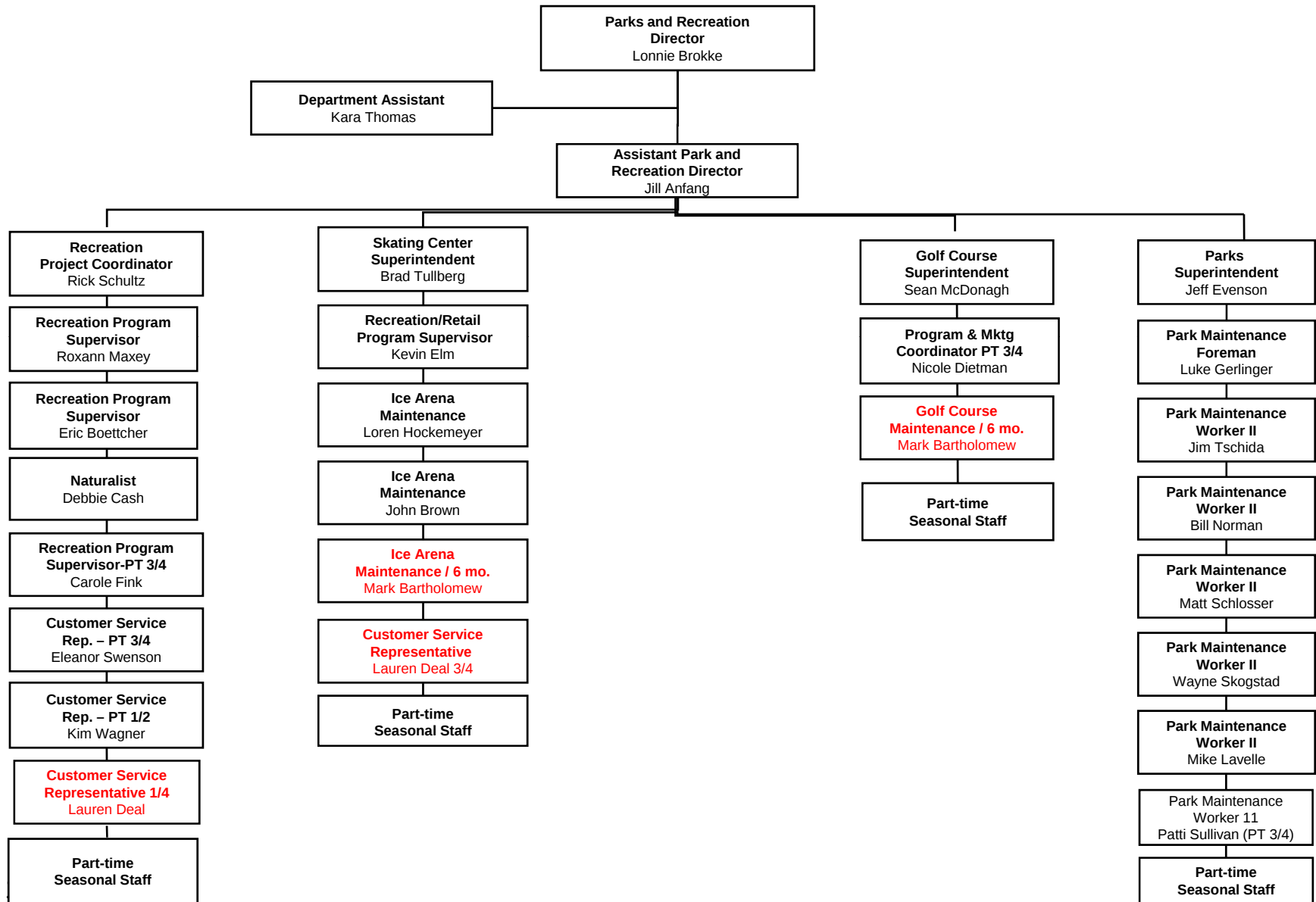
9. **OTHER**

1. Work Group Updates/Reports

- Constellations Work Group – No Report
- Community Facilities Work Group – No Report
- Community Partners Work Group – No Report
- Finance and Communications – No Report
- Natural Resources – Handout of recommended projects
 - There was some discussion about the amount proposed for County Road B2 portion. There was discussion about lowering that cost by finding partners (Ramsey County, etc.) to share in the cost of improvements and using saved dollars to make smaller trail connections throughout the system.
 - It was mentioned that group should be conscious of the amount dedicated to SW Roseville when including other areas of the implementation plan.
 - The SW Roseville project refers to a potential project in the area of Fairview Community Center and Corpus Christi church.
 - The question was raised as to whether there is enough room on County Road B2 for bike lanes on both sides. Randall reiterated that this is a proposed list of potential projects without getting too deep in to the details, but doing a fair amount of initial research.
 - Since proposed trail projects on County Road B (from Estes to Cleveland) and the stormwater project in SW Roseville are dependent on a number of other items in the master plan and that a contingency should be developed.
 - Discussion about buckthorn removal led to the discussion about the need to communicate the need for a commitment to on-going maintenance. The committee recognizes that this is not a one-time cost. Volunteer and service organizations should be considered for labor resources in buckthorn and purple loosestrife removal projects.
 - The HANC boardwalk and facility improvements are listed, but not part of the \$3.5M estimated for Natural Resource and Trail improvements.
 - There was discussion about the location of the leaf site and the possibility of a study of its impact on water quality.

2. Renewal Program Updates

- Lonnie informed the group that many of the maps and lists distributed in the past have been updated and to be sure they have the current information.
- Lonnie discussed the park by park listing handout for the Park & Recreation Renewal Program.
- Lonnie informed the Org. Team that it is possible the funding mechanism will shift from abatement bonds to bonds issued by a Port Authority. A shift to the Port authority would save money in the cost of issuing bonds. Roseville Finance Director Chris Miller is working with the bond council to determine the feasibility.
- A few Org. team members shared their thoughts on how this may impact public perception regarding the transparency of the process.

3. Upcoming Time Frame

- The current plan is to move forward with a request to set a public hearing at the October 17 City Council meeting. The public hearing date would be November 14, 2011.
- This timeline may change if the Port Authority process is used.

4. Function & Role of Organizing Team and Work Groups

- It will be important for the Org. Team to continue to the momentum established
- The Org. Team and work groups need to keep alive the concept of the future phases of the Master Plan regarding topics such as local option sales tax, community center, and other identified projects.
- The group should continue to work to identify other resources like grants or labor assistance. Find people to lead those grant applications.
- Randall brought up the idea of closing out the Org. Team as we know it. It may be beneficial to provide closure to the successful completion of the current stage of the implementation process. Members interested in continuing would certainly be welcome, but may provide a way to bring new people in to the process. Planning should begin for the next phase of citizen involvement. Parks and Recreation Commission may take on some of the existing Org. Team responsibilities, but the need still exists for active community involvement. It was suggested that another community meeting be scheduled with all of the work groups to provide closure to the existing work groups.

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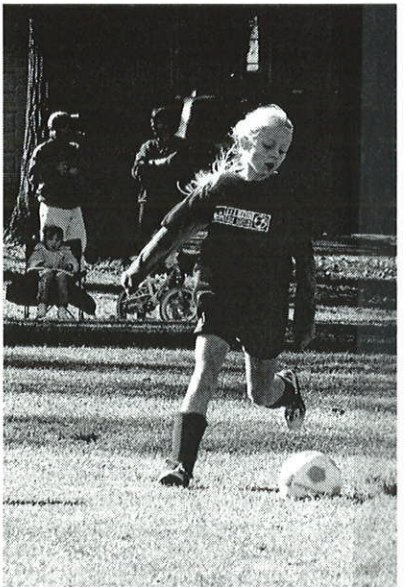
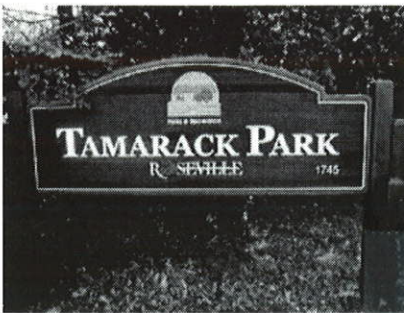
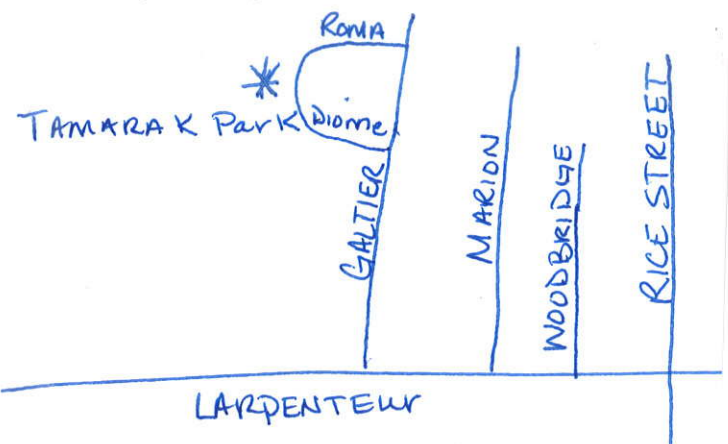
