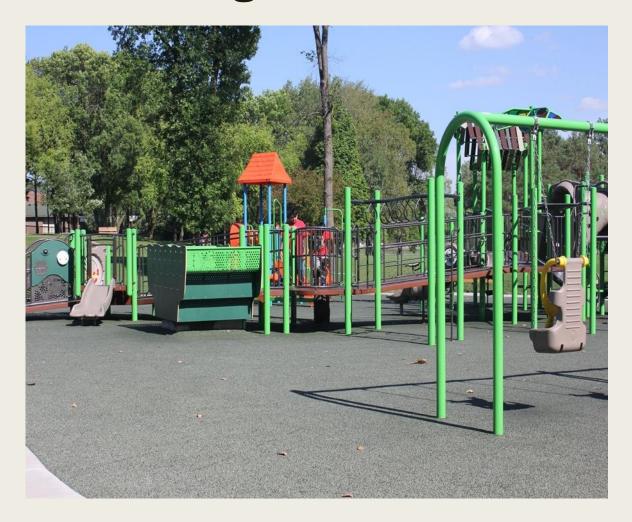
Background

The ADA was enacted into law in 1990 to prohibit discrimination against people with disabilities in areas including transportation, communications and access to state and local government programs and services.

The Department of Justice set revisions labeled Titles II and III in 2010 to solve problems that had risen since its inception.

A person with a disability is defined as a person who has a physical or mental impairment that limits life activities.

Regulations are extensive and specific.





The ADA and the League of Women Voters

Collaboration with other organizations on lobbying and in the legal system.

Voter registration

Opposing voter ID measures that disproportionately affect people with disabilities

Serving as poll watchers checking on accessibility requirements.

Study Goal: Do the LWV Roseville Area cities comply with ADA requirements?

- Look at compliance policy.
- Look at administration.
- Physical accessibility to government buildings, polling locations and city recreational venues.
- Determine compliance with ADA requirements and considerations to improve non-compliancy.

- The study was limited to residents with mobility challenges.
- Other limitations such as blindness and hearing can be studied at some other time.
- Entered data gathered into a shared Google Drive folder.

Cities view compliancy plans in different ways.

- Maplewood, Roseville and Falcon Heights had a formal *Transition Plan for Facilities Within the Public Right-of-Way* which included streets, sidewalks, transportation, trails but not things like access to city buildings, polling locations or civic participation options.
- Transition Plan for Parks and Recreation (Roseville).
- Statements in Maplewood and Roseville employee handbooks state adherence to ADA requirements.
- References to Capital Improvement Plans (CIP) which incorporated ADA compliance.
- Transition intentions were also included in the 2040 Comprehensive Plans for Falcon Heights, Lauderdale, Little Canada, and Roseville.

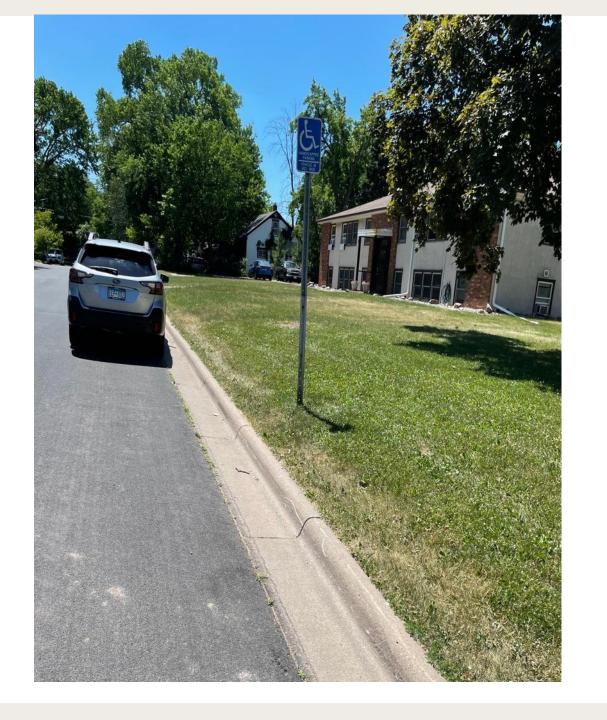
Part Two: Access to Civic Buildings

City Halls are mainly ADA compliant or provide access accommodations for City Council and commission meetings, city departments, and community functions. Examples are:

- Falcon Heights has a ramp to the speakers' podium so residents in wheelchairs can serve.
- Roseville has a table for seated residents to address the council.
- Little Canada and Lauderdale make handheld microphones available for residents who cannot stand to address the council.
- Maplewood and Roseville have ADA compliant elevators because they have meeting rooms on multiple floors.

Civic Building non-compliancy was mainly in parking and restrooms.

- There was no parking lot correct signage for van accessibility.
- Lauderdale's building entrance does not open automatically, and restrooms are not ADA compliant.
- Falcon Heights restrooms have minimal stall size making it difficult for a resident with mobility equipment to use.
- Roseville's restroom soap and towel dispensers are unreachable from a scooter/wheelchair.
- Little Canada's restroom is not accessible automatically.







Part Three: Access To Voting

- The Minnesota Secretary of State designates cities as responsible for choosing polling sites and accessibility.
- Ramsey County Elections Administrator and staff coordinate with the cities using a 75-point ADA-compliance survey to inspect and address accessibility issues.
- The study committee surveyed each polling site for accessible parking spaces, building access and accessible restrooms.
- Polling sites generally met ADA compliance with noncompliancy centering on parking.



Faded lines, lack of accessibility aisles, incorrect signage.



Ramp is too steep.

Part Four: Access to Parks and Recreation

- Cities are aware of ADA compliancy when renovating parks and have made positive changes over time.
- Newest playgrounds and park buildings are fully ADA compliant.
- Oldest parks are non-compliant.
- Older playgrounds use wood chip surfaces which break down. If not replaced, low level removes accessibility to equipment.
- Signage, faded lines and lack of accessibility aisles are also problems in parking lots.



Lack of updating leaves playgrounds inaccessible and sometimes dangerous.





Individual City Analyses

- We found cities overall met most ADA requirements.
- Most areas of non-compliancy can be improved with modifications; most with limited financial investment.
- Most non-compliancy areas were in parking lots and in parks.
- Compliancy plans should include residents with disabilities in oversight, planning, and visionary groups in order to better understand their needs.
- If cities had ADA policies, contact coordinators and grievance forms, they were not easily located on websites.

Falcon Heights

Falcon Heights' geographic boundaries include portions of the University of Minnesota's Twin Cities campus and the Minnesota State Fairgrounds, making 66% of the city's land area tax-exempt and statutorily out of the city's land use control. Only one of the city parks is owned by the city.

- Continue to enforce ADA requirements as pedestrian walkways are upgraded.
- Include residents with disabilities in the development of pedestrian safe network transit connections.
- Include residents with disabilities in developing a trail plan that connects residents to parks and open spaces.

- Regularly restripe parking lots, adding ADA compliant signage and striping for access aisles for handicapped parking.
- Update restrooms in City Hall improving their accessibility and usage.
- Proceed on Capital Improvement Plan for remodeling/rebuilding Community Park building following ADA compliance.
- Include playground updates in the Community Park rebuild.
- Review the 2014 safety and compliant audit of playgrounds and include updates in Capital Improvement Plan.

Lauderdale

Lauderdale is the smallest city in our League area. It's 2040 Comprehensive Plan sets goals and strategies for renewal and redevelopment that will need to incorporate ADA requirements.

- Include residents with disabilities in the development of pedestrian safe network transit connections.
- Include residents with disabilities in developing a trail plan that connects residents to parks and open spaces.
- Include residents with disabilities when soliciting information about resident current and expected park needs and wants.

- Ensure there are access aisles for parking when striping parking lots and for street parking. Community Park playground is non-compliant with a marked accessible parking area that does not have a hard surface access aisle on Pleasant Avenue. It needs to have a paved access that connects to the hard surface walkway.
- Evaluate the Community Park playground on a regular basis and replace the wood chips as needed or consider the addition of a rubberized solid surface or artificial turf in park development plans.
- Provide an ADA compliant parking stall in front of City Hall or in some location convenient for citizens.
- Update restrooms in City Hall improving their handicap accessibility and usage.

Little Canada

Little Canada employs only 21 full time staff, therefore is not required to have a compliancy policy but covers ADA goals in its 2040 Comprehensive Plan.

Spooner Park has a new totally ADA compliant playground and Pioneer Park is in Phase 1 of a Master Plan to enhance/replace its playground.

- Continue to implement ADA requirements as pedestrian walkways are upgraded.
- Regularly restripe parking lots, adding ADA compliant signage, and striping for access aisles.
- Evaluate the parks on a regular basis and replace the wood chips as needed.
- Proceed on plan to enhance/replace Pioneer Park playground following ADA compliance.
- Include paved surfaces for residents with mobility challenges when upgrading playgrounds.

Maplewood

Maplewood is the second largest city in Ramsey County. Rather than a single compliancy policy, each city department is responsible for their area of work.

- Review and enforce an ADA compliance audit of all public buildings, playgrounds, and parks.
- Adopt a written position description for a designated ADA Coordinator and post completed and ongoing compliance requirements with progress dates.
- Update online park information with correct addresses, photos, and parking information.
- Maintain depth on playgrounds loose fill (wood chip) surfaces.
- Identify accessible parking spaces by painting the lines with correct size and access aisles and providing signage.

Roseville

Roseville has an aging population with twenty-one percent over the age of 65. Of those under the age of 65, 6.8% have a disability.

- Include residents with disabilities on planning groups for transit, trail plans and development of parks and open spaces.
- Update the ADA grievance form to include issues with building access, voting and parks and make it easily located on the city website.
- Continue to implement ADA requirements as pedestrian walkways are upgraded.

- Regularly restripe parking lots, adding ADA compliant signage, and striping for access aisles including signing van accessible parking stalls.
- Proceed on a plan for remodeling/rebuilding City Parks and buildings following ADA compliance including making playgrounds accessible with level access to and into the play areas.
- Evaluate the parks on a regular basis and replace the wood chips as needed.

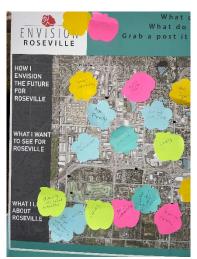

The following includes a summary of the project status and next steps as of January 4, 2023. Fall/early-winter 2022 has been a big time for the Envision Roseville project! We successfully launched our Hello Lamp Post campaign and the project survey, we've continued meeting with community organizations, done several events, and are now gearing up to begin business engagement. Looking forward, things will slow down over the winter as we wrap up phase 1, before beginning phase 2 engagement activities in the spring.

Project Committees

There are two standing project advisory committees – the Project Management Team (PMT) and the Community Advisory Group (CAG).

PMT

We anticipate at least three PMT workshops. The first workshop is complete. The next workshop is tentatively planned for late January 2023. The final workshop will happen in summer 2023. PMT discussion topics are shown below.

Community Partnerships

A key component of this work is to foster relationships with community-based organizations, community leaders, and other culturally specific organizations – based on the stakeholder analysis included in the communications and engagement plan – to connect with people who otherwise might not participate in the process.

Our initial intent was to participate in at least 10 meetings or events with community partner groups over the course of the project. As part of Phase 1, we engaged 10 community organizations and have had initial communications with more than 20 additional organizations. Engagement has included information sharing, phone interviews, and presentations at organization meetings. Virtual Engagement

Virtual engagement activities are a great way to expand the reach of our project. Virtual engagement options to-date have included a project engagement platform (website) with a project overview page, survey (multiple languages), wiki map to leave location specific comments, and an ideas wall to post free form comments. In addition, Hello Lamp Post objects (e.g., yard signs, posters, etc.) were placed in over 65 throughout the community and shared virtually through city communication channels to all people to engage using text messages. The engagement platform and Hello Lamp Post objects were promoted using multiple city communication channels including the citywide newsletter, email updates, and social media.

Business Engagement

The final category of engagement is with key Roseville businesses and industry groups. This task is just getting started and will include a business survey and up to 15 interviews or listening sessions with stakeholders. We have prepared an initial contact list and launched the survey in December 2022. We anticipate conducting the listening sessions in spring 2023, in conjunction with Phase 2 engagement activities.

Results Sample

We are just beginning to tabulate results from Phase 1 engagement activities, and we have a lot to work with, which is great! The following is a sample of some of the themes and outcomes emerging. Approve Public Works 2023 Work Plan

BACKGROUND

2 Each year, Public Works staff monitors and evaluates the condition of City infrastructure for

development of ongoing maintenance and replacement needs. We use this information to develop

- 4 capital improvement plans and in the development of the annual budget request in these areas. We
- also work closely with Ramsey County and MnDOT on improvements to City infrastructure as a
- 6 part of their road improvement projects within Roseville. The following are the improvements that
- we are recommending for the 2023 construction season within the city. The attached map
- 8 (Attachment A) shows both pavement improvements as well as utility improvements. The map also
- shows projects that are managed by Ramsey County, MnDOT, Met Council Environmental Services,
- watersheds and other utilities as some of these projects have impacts on City projects. The proposed
- work plan is consistent with the 20-year capital improvement plan and pavement management
- 12 program policies.
- The overall cost of the Public Works 2023 Work Plan is approximately \$6.5 million.
- Staff presented the Public Works 2023 Work Plan to the Public Works, Environment and
- 15 Transportation Commission on November 22, 2022. The meeting minutes are included in
- 16 Attachment G.

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- 1. Pavement Management Program Projects: Each year, the Public Works Department evaluates infrastructure needs based on the City's Pavement Management Program and assessment of utility infrastructure. Streets in marginal condition are recommended for major maintenance by mill and overlay. Streets in poor condition that do not meet the City standard for street construction are recommended for reconstruction. The streets shown in Attachment A will be included in this year's Pavement Management Project (PMP). The 6.9 miles of roads are proposed to be milled and overlaid. Spot curb replacements are also done at this time, but only where there are significant structural issues with the in-place curb or significant settling.
- These pavement-resurfacing projects are proposed to be financed through our street infrastructure fund. No Municipal State Aid (MSA) roads will be resurfaced in 2023. After receiving bids for these projects, we will request that the City Council award the bid to the lowest responsible bidder.
 - **Reconstruction:** No roads are proposed to be reconstructed in 2023.
- 2. <u>Pathways</u>: A new pathway will be constructed along the east side of Lexington Avenue between TH 36 and County Road B2. The new pathway will be an 8-foot wide bituminous trail.
- A new sidewalk will be installed on the east side of Cleveland Avenue from Iona Lane, extending 600 feet north. This sidewalk will complete a gap in the sidewalk network that was

- created when Colder Product Corporation built a sidewalk as part of their new construction a few years ago.
 - A new pathway, Twin Lakes Trail 2, will be constructed from Terrace Drive into Oasis Park.
- A new pathway, Marion Street Phase 2, will be constructed on the west side of Marion Street from Larpenteur Avenue to the cul-de-sac. The new pathway will connect to the first phase, which was completed this past fall, in conjunction with the Enclave development and make a connection to Unity Park. This will complete the pathway envisioned in the Rice-Larpenteur Visioning Plan. Funding for this project is from Community Development Block Grant Funds through Ramsey County.
 - Pathways in Lexington Park and along County Road B will be resurfaced.
 - The parking lot at Lexington Park will be resurfaced.

3. Utility Infrastructure:

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- **Sanitary Sewer Lining:** There will be no sewer lining project in 2023. City staff will be utilizing this year to develop a specialized lining project in 2024 to address high risk crossings under major county or state highways such as TH 36, I35W and Snelling Avenue.
- **Pipe Replacements/Repairs**: Staff evaluates sanitary and water main replacement needs in our pavement replacement areas as well as utility infrastructure needs in County and State project areas. To date, City staff has no projects planned for 2023.
- **Miscellaneous Upgrades**: Staff will be doing some upgrades to the SCADA system to provide additional resiliency to the system. Shallow water services within the PMP project will be insulated.
- Water Tower: The interior of the water tower will be re-painted to extend the life of the tower.
- **Lift Stations**: The Long Lake Lift Station, located on Long Lake Road south of County Road D, will be replaced in 2023 with a grinder pump lift station. The new lift station will be relocated further from the road to protect the lift station and to make it safer to maintain. It also places the lift station on higher ground as it is currently subject to street flooding.
- Staff will begin work with our design consultant on the Dale/Owasso Lift Station located at Dale Street and South Owasso Boulevard for future replacement in 2024. The lift station will be rehabbed and a new backup emergency generator will be installed.
- **Storm Sewer System Improvements:** Staff continues to analyze the existing drainage systems and localized flooding issues and is identifying mitigation projects. Staff is now working on developing a 2023 drainage improvement project to alleviate some of these flooding concerns. Staff has already identified several projects for 2023. Some of the projects include:
 - Pavement Management Storm Water Upgrades: Miscellaneous storm sewer upgrades.
 - Villa Park Sediment Pond improvements and dredging
 - Concordia Meadows Pond Improvements
 - County Road D Outlet Repair.
- **4.** <u>Sustainability/Recycling:</u> City staff plans to work on the following programs and initiatives over the next year to help support sustainability and increase recycling:
 - Energy Action Plan continued implementation post-Partners in Energy "graduation"
 - o Focus on faith organization outreach
 - Less Mow May education & outreach

 TH 36 Ramp and Fairview Avenue Improvements Improvements to reduce queuing onto TH 36. Some ramp closures are anticipated during the project. Work will begin in June 2023.

 County Road D Resurfacing Highcrest Avenue – Old Hwy 8.

Xcel Gas

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• Xcel Gas will be replacing power poles along the large transmission line between the substation by the water tower. They will use existing footings and the poles will be the same height. Work would start in late February and be completed by the Fall 2023.

POLICY OBJECTIVE

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It is City policy to keep City-owned infrastructure in good operating condition and to keep systems operating in a safe condition.

BUDGET IMPLICATIONS

- Staff is developing preliminary cost estimates for the projects at this time. We anticipate the total work plan cost to be approximately \$6.5 million with City cost around \$6 million.
- The Street Infrastructure Fund supports the local street Mill and Overlay program.
 - The following projects will be funded from the City's MSA account:
 - TH 36/Fairview Ramp project
 - TH 36/Hamline Ramp project
 - McCarrons Retaining Wall
 - Cleveland Pathway
 - Lexington Pathway
 - Utility improvements are funded from the respective Utility enterprise funds.
- The Marion Pathway project will be funded using grant funds.
- The Twin Lakes Trail Phase 2 project will be funded with developer funds, pathway funds and storm sewer utility funds.
- 129 Crack sealing and major patching are funded from the street maintenance budget. This budget is 130 supported by the general fund tax levy and MSA maintenance allocation. Staff recommends funding 131 a program consistent with our pavement maintenance policies.
- By taking action now, the Council will be authorizing staff to work on plans for the projects as
- described and to advertise for bids once plans are finished. As project bids are opened, staff will
- bring individual contracts to the City Council for approval. A detailed cost breakdown will be
- included with those Council Actions.

RACIAL EQUITY IMPACT SUMMARY

- The overall projects and programs identified in the 2023 Public Works Work Plan should benefit the
 City as a whole with no negative impacts to historically disadvantaged communities. All street
 projects include improvements to curb ramps within the project area to latest standards which should
 provide better access for individuals with disabilities.
 - The four new pathway projects proposed were all chosen to enhance walkability in areas with the most need. These projects should be an overall benefit to historically disadvantaged communities who a more likely to use these pathways:
 - Marion Street Pathway Provides new pedestrian connection to multi-family housing that serves the highest minority census block (62%) within the city. The new pathway will make connections to the existing sidewalk network and provide safer access to two parks and better connections to transit on Larpenteur Avenue.
 - Twin Lakes Trail Phase 2 The second phase of the trail project will connect two low income multi-family housing units with better access to Oasis Park.
 - The Lexington Pathway project will provide better access to transit and for high school students accessing Roseville Area High School.

• The Cleveland Pathway project completes a gap in the sidewalk network. The sidewalk will now better connect nearby transit to local jobs.

154 STAFF RECOMMENDATION

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These improvements are recommended for construction in 2023. Additional utility improvements may be identified at a later date and brought to the Council for authorization. All projects will come back to the City Council for further action.

Roseville Public Works, Environment and Transportation Commission Excerpt of Meeting Minutes

Tuesday, November 22, 2022, at 6:30 p.m. City Council Chambers, 2660 Civic Center Drive Roseville, Minnesota 55113

1 1. Public Works 2023 Work Plan 2 Public Works Director Jesse Freihammer explained that each year Public Works 3 staff monitor and evaluate the condition of City infrastructure for development of 4 ongoing maintenance and replacement needs plans. He presented the 2023 Work 5 Plan to the Commission and asked for comments. 6 Member Hodder asked how the City's pavement management reserves look like as 7 far as the budget over the next few years. 8 Mr. Freihammer indicated short term it is doing okay. Long term, it will still need 9 to be a discussion item, but the City Council does keep putting little chunks of 10 money into it and the department has been consistent on what is being spent. He 11 noted the City is good for the next ten years, longer term than that, certainly 12 depending on which way inflation goes with costs like that the reserves may need to be re-evaluated. 13 14 Chair Ficek inquired, for the Hamline/36 replacement he assumed this is trying to 15 be done before work starts on Fairview so that, if traffic diverts, it can go through 16 and he wondered if this will be turned into an all-way stop for the school when lots 17 of people are going through there. 18 Mr. Freihammer explained that project was supposed to happen this fall; both are 19 MnDOT projects and there is a chance for delay, but he did know MnDOT wanted 20 to start that early and he knew it would be before school. The County was confident 21 that the all-way stop may work pretty solid and were not concerned about it being 22 delayed for vehicles. A temporary signal was not justified for that. 23 Chair Ficek indicated Mr. Freihammer mentioned about doing services for Falcon Heights as well and might get up to one thousand hours or half a full-time staff 24 25 person and he wondered what the City's agreement is with Falcon Heights and how 26 that works.

27 Mr. Freihammer reviewed the Falcon Heights agreement and services being 28 performed for them. Chair Ficek indicated there are a lot of funding opportunities out there and he 29 30 wondered if the City is applying for any of them. 31 Mr. Freihammer explained a lot of the big stuff, Roseville, as an individual project is a little more difficult to fund for. Staff is looking for opportunities where 32 available and the City has been working with the County on some of the different 33 34 funding options. He noted the City just got funding from Ramsey County and will 35 be doing a study of critical corridors.

424A.04 VOLUNTEER RELIEF ASSOCIATIONS: BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

Subdivision 1. **Membership.** (a) A relief association that is directly associated with a municipal fire department must be managed by a board of trustees consisting of nine members. Six trustees must be elected from the membership of the relief association and three trustees must be drawn from the officials of the municipalities served by the fire department to which the relief association is directly associated. The bylaws of a relief association which provides a monthly benefit service pension may provide that one of the six trustees elected from the relief association membership may be a retired member receiving a monthly pension who is elected by the membership of the relief association. The three municipal trustees must be one elected municipal official and one elected or appointed municipal official who are designated as municipal representatives by the municipal governing board annually and the chief of the municipal fire department.

- (b) A relief association that is a subsidiary of an independent nonprofit firefighting corporation must be managed by a board of trustees consisting of nine members. Six trustees must be elected from the membership of the relief association, two trustees must be drawn from the officials of the municipalities served by the fire department to which the relief association is directly associated, and one trustee must be the fire chief serving with the independent nonprofit firefighting corporation. The bylaws of a relief association may provide that one of the six trustees elected from the relief association membership may be a retired member receiving a monthly pension who is elected by the membership of the relief association. The two municipal trustees must be elected or appointed municipal officials, selected as follows:
- (1) if only one municipality contracts with the independent nonprofit firefighting corporation, the municipal trustees must be two officials of the contracting municipality who are designated annually by the governing body of the municipality; or
- (2) if two or more municipalities contract with the independent nonprofit corporation, the municipal trustees must be one official from each of the two largest municipalities in population who are designated annually by the governing bodies of the applicable municipalities.
- (c) The municipal trustees for a relief association that is directly associated with a fire department operated as or by a joint powers entity must be the fire chief of the fire department and two trustees designated annually by the joint powers board. The municipal trustees for a relief association that is directly associated with a fire department service area township must be the fire chief of the fire department and two trustees designated by the township board.
- (d) If a relief association lacks the municipal board members provided for in paragraph (a), (b), or (c) because the fire department is not located in or associated with a municipality or joint powers entity, the municipal board members must be the fire chief of the fire department and two board members appointed from the fire department service area by the board of commissioners of the applicable county.
- (e) The term of the appointed municipal board members is one year or until the person's successor is qualified, whichever is later.
- (f) A municipal trustee under paragraph (a), (b), (c), or (d) has all the rights and duties accorded to any other trustee, except the right to be an officer of the relief association board of trustees.
- (g) A board must have at least three officers, who are a president, a secretary and a treasurer. These officers must be elected from among the elected trustees by either the full board of trustees or by the relief association membership, as specified in the bylaws. In no event may any trustee hold more than one officer position at any one time. The terms of the elected trustees and of the officers of the board must be specified in the bylaws of the relief association, but may not exceed three years. If the term of the elected trustees

exceeds one year, the election of the various trustees elected from the membership must be staggered on as equal a basis as is practicable.

- Subd. 2. **Fiduciary duty.** The board of trustees of a relief association shall undertake their activities consistent with chapter 356A.
- Subd. 2a. **Fiduciary responsibility.** In the discharge of their respective duties, the officers and trustees shall be held to the standard of care specified in section 11A.09. In addition, the trustees shall act in accordance with chapter 356A. Each member of the board is a fiduciary and shall undertake all fiduciary activities in accordance with the standard of care of section 11A.09, and in a manner consistent with chapter 356A. No fiduciary of a relief association shall cause a relief association to engage in a transaction if the fiduciary knows or should know that the transaction constitutes one of the following direct or indirect transactions:
 - (1) sale or exchange or leasing of any real property between the relief association and a board member;
- (2) lending of money or other extension of credit between the relief association and a board member or member of the relief association;
 - (3) furnishing of goods, services, or facilities between the relief association and a board member; or
- (4) transfer to a board member, or use by or for the benefit of a board member, of any assets of the relief association. A transfer of assets does not mean the payment of relief association benefits or administrative expenses permitted by law.
- Subd. 3. **Conditions on relief association consultants.** (a) If a volunteer firefighter relief association employs or contracts with a consultant to provide legal or financial advice, the secretary of the relief association shall obtain and the consultant shall provide to the secretary of the relief association a copy of the consultant's certificate of insurance.
- (b) A consultant is any person who is employed under contract to provide legal or financial advice and who is or who represents to the volunteer firefighters relief association that the person is:
 - (1) an actuary;
 - (2) a certified public accountant;
 - (3) an attorney;
 - (4) an investment advisor or manager, or an investment counselor;
 - (5) an investment advisor or manager selection consultant;
 - (6) a pension benefit design advisor or consultant; or
 - (7) any other financial consultant.

CITY OF ROSEVILLE

APPOINTMENT AND REAPPOINTMENT POLICY ROSEVILLE CITIZEN ADVISORY COMMISSIONS

BACKGROUND

The City of Roseville has seven standing Advisory Commissions: Ethics, Finance, Human Rights, Inclusion and Engagement, Parks and Recreation, Planning, Police Civil Service and Public Works, Environment and Transportation; the City also establishes other advisory groups as needed.

POLICY STATEMENT

It is the intent of this policy to establish a fair and open notification and selection process that encourages all Roseville residents to apply for appointments.

I. PROCEDURE STATEMENT – APPOINTMENTS

If a vacancy occurs because of resignation, death, moving from the City, removal from office, ineligibility for reappointment, etc. on any standing Advisory Commission, the following procedure will be used.

- A. Regular commission appointments and reappointments will occur each spring in March. If vacancies occur, the council will consider appointments to fill those vacancies in March or September. .
- B. Annually, the City Council will establish dates to conduct interviews twice a year, and application deadlines to fill any commission vacancies. The time between the application deadline and interviews will be no more than 30 days.
- C. Commission vacancies will be advertised using the most relevant, effective and efficient method to reach as many residents as possible. These methods may include but are not limited to: social media, newspaper or print, electronic newsletter, cable television, city hall bulletin board.
- D. Applications received after the deadline will be held for the next round of appointments. Should a vacancy occur, any applicants on file will be notified by their preferred method listed in the application and given the date of the next round of interviews. After the next round, should an applicant not be appointed but remain interested, they will be invited to submit a new application.
- E. Names of applicants and applications will be provided to the City Council and the public after the application deadline.
- F. If fewer applications are received than twice the number of openings, the City Council may establish a new application deadline and Council meeting for interviews. If a new deadline is adopted, the vacancy will be re-advertised as

- described in 'C' above. Applicants whose applications were received before the original deadline will remain under consideration and need not reapply.
- G. Applicants will be interviewed by the City Council. The Chair, or the Chair's designee, of the Commission to which the applicant is seeking appointment will be invited to attend and participate in the interview process. Interviews are open to the public.
- H. The Council may fill a vacancy outside of the biannual basis should the need arise.

II. PROCEDURE STATEMENT - REAPPOINTMENTS

If a current Commission member's term is expiring and is eligible for reappointment, the following procedure will be used.

- A. No later than sixty days prior to the expiration of a term, each commission member whose term is expiring will be contacted in writing to determine their interest in reappointment. For persons seeking reappointment, if they have an application on file 3 years old or less, that application will be provided to Council. Should their most recent application be older than 3 years, they will be asked to submit a new application.
- B. Council will be advised of the attendance record of the individual whose term is expiring. The Council will also be provided with written comments from the Chairperson of the Commission regarding the reappointment of the individual. Chair recommendations are not public data. At that time, Council will consider whether to interview the commissioner. If two councilmembers request it, a commissioner seeking reappointment will be scheduled to attend an interview before the entire council.
- C. Should the Council determine that the individual merits reappointment, that person will be reappointed.
- D. Should the incumbent not wish to be reappointed or should the Council determine that the individual does not merit reappointment, the Council will follow the procedure for filling vacancies as described above.

III. APPOINTMENT TO OTHER CITY ADVISORY GROUPS

The Council may use the procedure outlined in Section I. and II. above for making appointments to other advisory groups, committees, task forces, etc.

Item Description: Consider Adopting a Resolution supporting the creation of a local sales tax in Roseville

BACKGROUND

Last year, the City Council adopted a resolution supporting the creation of a 0.5% local option sales

- tax in Roseville. Under state law, the Minnesota Legislature first has to approve the request and then
- 4 Roseville voters would need to approve the implementation of the local option sales tax. In the last
 - legislative session, Roseville's local sales tax request was included in the House and Senate omnibus

tax bills, but the Legislature adjourned without taking action on the bills.

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The City Council has expressed a desire to pursue approval of 0.5% local option sales for Roseville in the 2023 Legislative Session. Below is the process the City must follow for the Minnesota Legislature to consider approving a local option sales tax for Roseville:

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- 1. City must pass a resolution that includes:
 - a. Proposed tax rate
 - b. Detailed description of up to five capital projects to be funded with the tax
 - c. Documentation of how each project will provide an economic benefit to residents, businesses, and visitors from outside their jurisdiction
 - d. Amount of revenue to be raised for each project and the estimated time needed to raise funds
 - e. Total amount of revenue to be raised for all projects
 - f. Estimated length of time the tax will be in effect if all proposed projects are approved
- 2. City must submit the approved resolution and supporting documentation to the senate and house tax committee chairs by January 31
- 3. Once legislative approval is given, the City shall revise and reaffirm its resolution. The resolution must be passed at least 90 days before a general election
- 4. The City shall hold a referendum vote at a general election within two years of legislative approval. If there are multiple projects, each project must have a separate question for approval
- 5. If sales tax referendum is approved, the City shall create and pass an ordinance imposing the tax
- 6. Once ordinance is passed, file a certificate of approval and copy of the ordinance with the Minnesota Secretary of State and inform the Minnesota Department of Revenue in writing of the new local sales tax

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Staff is proposing that two projects totaling \$76,900,000 to be funded by a local sales tax:

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1) City Maintenance Facility at a cost of \$64,200,000

2) City License and Passport Center at a cost of \$12,7000

Last year, the City also requested sales tax funding for a pedestrian Bridge over Hwy. 36 west of Snelling Ave. The pedestrian bridge has been dropped as part of this request due to the higher costs for the Maintenance Facility and License Center.

To fund these project improvements as well as the debt issuance and interest costs, staff is proposing the City request the Legislature approve a 0.5% local option sales tax subject to approval by voter referendum approval for a period of 20 years in Roseville. According the Minnesota Department of Revenue, it is estimated that a 0.5% sales tax in Roseville will generate \$5.4 million annually based on 2019 sales figures. Over 20 years, the sales tax will raise an estimated \$108 million dollars which will be sufficient to cover all of the two projects and debt issuance and interest costs. If the project costs come in lower and/or sale tax revenue exceeds our projections, the debt and sale tax authority will expire earlier.

For the City Council's information, Attachment A shows a listing of the local sales tax rates within the Twin Cities metro area and selected cities in Minnesota.

Staff has included a draft resolution (Attachment B) based off of the League of Minnesota Cities model resolution that has been updated with the current projects and the amount of sales tax proposed to be collected. Attachment C contains documentation of regional significance for each project that the City is proposing to be funded via the sales tax. This documentation will be included with the resolution sent to Legislators.

POLICY OBJECTIVE

The creation of a local sales tax for Roseville will more closely distribute the cost borne by Roseville taxpayers for regional transportation infrastructure supporting Roseville's business community.

BUDGET IMPLICATIONS

Not directly applicable at this time. Approval of a local sales tax will lead to additional dollars being available for city capital projects.

RACIAL EQUITY IMPACT SUMMARY

A sales tax is generally considered one of the most regressive taxes, meaning that people of lower incomes pay a larger percentage of their income for sales taxes. The Institute on Taxation and Economic Policy's report "Taxes and Racial Equity – An Overview of State and Local Policy Impacts" states the following regarding the impact of sales taxes:

Consumption taxes, most notably general sales taxes, are the most regressive type of taxes relied on by state and local governments and the most significant drivers of racial inequity in state and local tax codes. Low- and middle-income families pay a larger share of their incomes in consumption taxes than the rich. While most low-income taxpayers are white because they remain a majority of the U.S. population, a disproportionate share of Black, Hispanic, Indigenous and other households of color are in lower-income groups due to the legacy of racist public policies and ongoing discrimination. So, policies that disadvantage low-income individuals and families—like heavy reliance on sales and excise taxes—have a disproportionately negative effect on people of color.

The Executive Summary of the report is included as Attachment C.

While still acknowledging that sales tax disproportionally impact lower income groups and people of color, it should be noted that Minnesota does not apply sales tax to food bought in grocery stores and clothing. This is an important distinction since the exemption helps individuals meet their basic needs around food and clothing without paying an additional tax. However, it is clear that sales taxes, along with property taxes, and income taxes continue to disproportionally affect lower income groups and persons of color. Changes on the state and federal level regarding tax policies will be needed to fully address these inequities.

RESOLUTION SUPPORTING THE AUTHORITY TO IMPOSE A LOCAL SALES TAX TO FUND SPECIFIC CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS PROVIDING REGIONAL BENEFIT, TO ESTABLISH THE DURATION OF THE TAX AND THE REVENUE TO BE RAISED BY THE TAX, AND TO AUTHORIZE THE CITY TO ISSUE BONDS SUPPORTED BY THE SALES TAX REVENUE

WHEREAS, the City of Roseville has engaged community residents and businesses and identified two projects to be funded through a local sales tax:

- Maintenance Facility: This project involves the construction of a new facility which houses the equipment, materials and staff which maintain parks, roadways, trails, storm water infrastructure, water distribution infrastructure, sanitary sewer infrastructure as well as maintains public safety equipment and vehicles, much of which serves a regional population as it visits and conducts business within the City of Roseville. The new facility replaces a facility which was originally constructed in 1957 and has been expanded and remodeled several times since then resulting in a facility that is undersized and lacking in safety and efficiency standards. The total cost of \$64,200,000 includes planning, design, property acquisition, building construction and utility infrastructure to support the new facility.
- License and Passport Center: This project includes the construction of a new facility which will house mandated separate spaces for licensing and passports. It will be a larger, more useable space that will be designed to provide better waiting areas and better support customers with scheduled appointments. The current building is a retail center that the City previously leased space in and then purchased it in 2018 as part of an expansion of the overall City Campus. This building is not well suited for an

expansion of the current use and is in need of significant maintenance and rehabilitation. The new facility will also include a 5,000 square foot space for recreational programming. The total estimated cost is \$12,700,000 and includes planning, design, phased construction, and infrastructure to support the new facility.

WHEREAS, the projects will result in benefits to both the residents and businesses of the City of Roseville and to non-resident visitors and businesses and documentation of the regional significance of each project, including the share of the economic benefit to or use of each project by persons residing, or businesses located, outside of the jurisdiction are set forth in the Case Report prepared for this resolution and are incorporated herein by reference; and,

WHEREAS, the projects are estimated to cost approximately \$76,900,000_; and,

WHEREAS, the city estimates that a local sales tax of 0.5 (one-half) percent would generate approximately \$108 million over 20 years which is sufficient to cover the project costs plus interest and other associated debt costs; and,

WHEREAS, the estimated local sales tax revenue and estimated time needed to raise that amount of revenue for each project is as follows:

- Maintenance Facility: The city will collect \$64,200,000, plus interest and other associated debt issuance costs, over 20 years
- License Center: The city will collect \$12,700,000 plus interest and other associated debt issuance costs, over 20 years

WHEREAS, funding the project with a local sales tax will most closely distribute the cost borne by Roseville taxpayers for supporting the Roseville business community; and

WHEREAS, Minn. Stat. § 297A.99 authorizes the imposition of a general sales tax if permitted by special law of the Minnesota Legislature; and

WHEREAS, the City of Roseville agrees to comply with Minn. Stat. § 297A.99 relating to the process of enacting, implementing, and collecting the local tax; and

WHEREAS, Minn. Stat. § 297A.99 requires the city to pass a resolution authorizing such a local tax and to obtain Legislative approval prior to approval by the local voters to enact the local tax.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED;

- 1. The Roseville City Council supports the authority to impose a general local sales tax of 0.50% for a period of the lesser of 20 years or the retirement of the debt (and all related issuance and interest costs) to fund the aforementioned projects.
- 2. Upon approval of this resolution, the city will submit the adopted resolution and documentation of regional significance to the chairs and ranking minority members of the

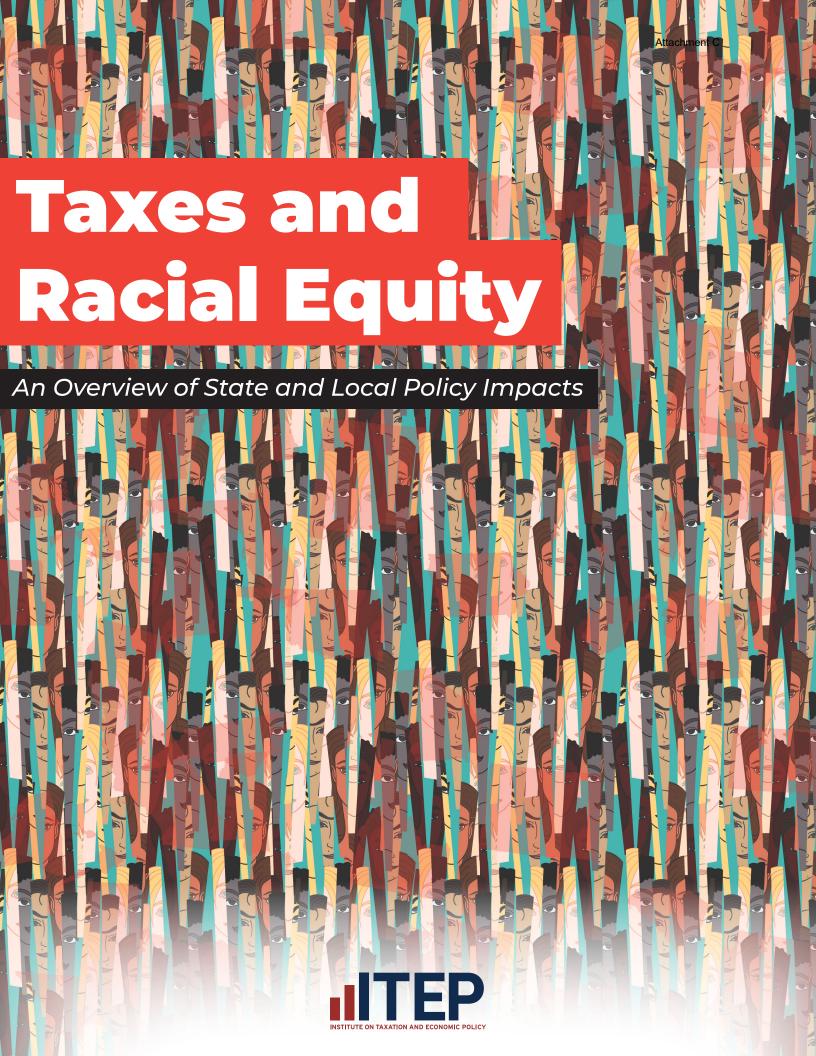
- House and Senate Tax committees for approval and passage of a special law authorizing the tax, by January 31 of the year that it is seeking the special law.
- 3. Upon Legislative approval and passage of the special law authorizing the tax, the city will adopt a resolution accepting the new law, which will be filed with the local approval certificate to the Office of the Secretary of State before the following Legislative session.
- 4. The city will put a detailed ballot question which includes separate questions for each project on a general election ballot for local voter approval. This will be done within two years of receiving legislative authority.
- 5. If one or more ballot questions pass, the city will also pass an ordinance imposing the tax and notify the commissioner of Revenue at least 90 days before the first of the calendar quarter that the tax will be imposed.
- 6. Upon completion of the aforementioned requirements, the local sales tax will commence and run for a duration of 20 years or until a sum sufficient to fund the voter approved projects, including related issuance and interest costs, is raised, whichever comes first.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Historic and current injustices, both in public policy and in broader society, have resulted in vast disparities in income and wealth across race and ethnicity. Employment discrimination has denied good job opportunities to people of color. An uneven system of public education funding advantages wealthier white people and produces unequal educational outcomes. Racist policies such as redlining and discrimination in lending practices have denied countless Black families the opportunity to become homeowners or business owners, creating extraordinary differences in intergenerational wealth. These inequities have long-lasting effects that compound over time.

State and local tax policies interact with this severe inequality in important ways. Revenues raised through taxes are vital to funding public investments in education, health, and the safety net, all of which can help combat inequality. But some state tax systems exacerbate racial income inequality by taxing low-income people, a disproportionate share of whom are people of color, at higher rates than other families. Such regressive tax structures can make racial income inequality worse as incomes become more unequal after state and local taxes. A progressive system for raising revenue, however, can narrow racial income gaps by asking more of families with the highest incomes, who are predominately white. When state policymakers leave immense racial and ethnic income inequality unaddressed in state tax codes, they solidify that inequality.

It is difficult for policymakers and the public to fully understand the impact of tax laws across race and ethnicity in part because tax return data do not include information on taxpayers' races. To fill this void, we have merged tax and survey data within our microsimulation tax model to allow for race and ethnicity-specific tax estimates. We use this new capacity in this report to illuminate how state and local tax policies have differential impacts across race.

Consumption taxes, most notably general sales taxes, are the most regressive type of taxes relied on by state and local governments and the most significant drivers of racial inequity in state and local tax codes. Low- and middle-income families pay a larger share of their incomes in consumption taxes than the rich. While most low-income taxpayers are white because they remain a majority of the U.S. population, a disproportionate share of Black, Hispanic, Indigenous and other households of color are in lower-income groups due to the legacy of racist public policies and ongoing discrimination. So, policies that disadvantage low-income individuals and families—like heavy reliance on sales and excise taxes—have a disproportionately negative effect on people of color. Wealthier white families, who enjoy systemic advantages that have positioned them to save and build their wealth, tend to pay lower sales and excise tax rates since the portion of income set aside into savings is only taxed after a lengthy delay, if at all.

Income taxes can help to address income inequality by asking more of families with higher incomes, thus narrowing post-tax income gaps between high and low-income taxpayers. Flat-rate income taxes, or those littered with carveouts for investors or other high-income families, have limited potential to reduce yawning racial income gaps. Robust, progressive personal income taxes—which include meaningfully graduated tax rates, broad bases, and significant refundable low-income tax credits—are more effective at narrowing the racial income gap. Income taxes are, of course, just one part of a much larger package of policies needed to address inequality as evidenced by the fact that





states with robust income taxes continue to experience severe racial income inequality even after those taxes are applied.

The effect of real estate property taxes across race and ethnicity is nuanced and complex. Vast differences in intergenerational wealth and a long history of racist housing policy have allowed white households to achieve homeownership rates far beyond those in communities of color. Those forces, together with white homebuyers' aversion to living in areas with large nonwhite populations, have also led to significantly higher market values for white-owned homes relative to those owned by people of color. These factors can lead to higher property tax payments and, as a result, better-funded schools in majority white areas. But renters, a disproportionate share of whom are people of color, also pay the property tax indirectly through their rent payments. Compounding the challenges in property tax payments, housing segregation and assessment discrimination can result in higher tax bills for people of color relative to what white homeowners in similarly valued homes pay.

The overall tax level also has important consequences for racial equity, as states need robust revenues to fund deep investments in services and institutions that can advance racial and economic equity. Adequate funding for education, health, childcare, affordable housing, and other priorities is essential for moving toward broadly shared prosperity. A regressive tax code that asks the least of high-income families will struggle to raise adequate revenues during times when affluent, predominately white families, are enjoying an outsized share of all new income growth.

One way this report illustrates the disparate impact of various tax policies is by comparing and contrasting taxes in Tennessee and Minnesota, two states with dramatically different tax codes. Tennessee does not levy a personal income tax, relies very heavily on sales taxes to fund public services and institutions, and does not offer any refundable credits to low-income families. As a result of these policy choices, Tennessee's tax code is worsening racial income gaps. Hispanic and Black families are taxed at higher average rates than higher-income white residents. Relative to the statewide average, Black families tend to pay an additional 1 percent of their income in Tennessee state and local taxes while Hispanic families pay an additional 0.9 percent.

Minnesota, by contrast, levies a robust personal income tax with refundable credits for low-income families and higher rates for top earners, thereby allowing the state to rely less heavily on regressive sales taxes. Minnesota appropriately taxes lower-income groups at rates slightly below the statewide average. Black families, for instance, pay a rate 0.4 percentage points below average while Indigenous families pay an average rate 0.5 percent below average, and Hispanic families' average rate is 0.7 percent below average. White families, by contrast, pay slightly more on average because they have higher average incomes. Overall, by tending to tax people of color at slightly lower rates than white families with higher incomes, Minnesota's tax system slightly mitigates racial income inequality. Of course, high-income households of color pay taxes above the state average and poor white families pay tax rates below the state average. And to be clear, racial income inequality remains intact post tax in Minnesota.

Different tax types have varying impacts on the racial income divide, which has significant implications for reformers seeking to overhaul their tax codes. Centuries



пl

of policy advantage and privilege have led to a significant overconcentration of white families among the nation's top earners. Because of this, tax policies designed to benefit high-income or high-wealth taxpayers—like cutting top income tax rates, affording preferential tax treatment to investors, neglecting to levy estate taxes and other forms of wealth taxation, and funding government mainly through regressive consumption taxes—primarily benefit an affluent group of families that is overwhelmingly white. Similarly, increasing sales and excise taxes to buy down income tax or property tax rates, as many states have done in recent years, tends to redistribute income away from moderate-income families of all races and mostly toward wealthier white families instead.

Raising income taxes to lessen reliance on regressive sales and excise taxes can help state tax systems move toward easing the racial income divide, or at least not worsening

it. Taxing the rich at higher rates is arguably the most important thing state and local government can do to improve racial equity in their tax codes both because of the direct effect of the tax on narrowing income divides and because of the public investments made possible by the revenue that such a reform can raise. Higher taxes on top earners, a group that is disproportionately white, allow states to use their tax codes to reduce racial inequity.

Policymakers can generate more economic and racial equity with better decisions about state and local taxes.

Socioeconomic disparities by race and ethnicity extend beyond current income levels, and it is important to account for those differences when assessing the impact of taxes on racial equity. Years of racism and discrimination across all segments of society—the housing market, labor market, financial industry, education systems, criminal justice, and other areas—have prevented people of color from building wealth on the same level as white families. Policies that advantage wealth, such as tax subsidies for investment or business income, therefore disproportionately favor white households even if income is held constant. Similarly, Black and Hispanic households are much less likely than white households of the same income level to own their homes, and this tilts certain tax policies such as the mortgage interest deduction, property tax deduction, exclusion of gains on home sales, and other homeowner-only tax breaks heavily in favor of white households.

Policymakers can generate more economic and racial equity with better decisions about state and local taxes. By enacting progressive income taxes with more brackets at the top, restoring estate or inheritance taxes, taxing earnings from wealth at least as much as earnings from work, and taxing wealth itself, policymakers can meaningfully address economic and racial inequality and create a more equitable nation.

THE REGIONAL SIGNIFICANCE OF THE ROSEVILLE MAINTENANCE FACILITY



The City of Roseville, located in Ramsey County, is a first ring suburb of St. Paul and Minneapolis. Roseville is home to 36,254 residents, 15,554 households, and over 34,000 jobs within the community. Roseville shares borders with 10 different communities including St. Paul and Minneapolis and has the principal arterials of Hwy. 36 and I-35W corridors as well County Road minor arterials that traverse through the city. As a result of its location and amenities, Roseville is a regional destination for jobs, shopping, and recreation.

The Roseville Maintenance Facility is a 60,000 square foot facility sitting on approximately 3.75 acres on the City's Civic Campus. It houses vehicles, equipment, materials and staff responsible for the maintenance of public works infrastructure and parks and recreational facilities across the City such as:

- Local, collector and arterial roadways
- Water distribution system serving Roseville and providing water connection to the City of Arden Hills
- Sanitary Sewer system
- Storm water system including regional waterbodies such as Lake Owasso and McCarrons Lake
- Regional Park facilities including the Guidant John Rose Minnesota Oval outdoor skating facility and the Cedarholm Golf Course
- Over 100 miles of pathways many of which are located along regional transportation corridors such as Lexington Ave (CSAH 50), Snelling Ave (TH 51), Fairview Ave (CSAH 48) and Rice Street (CSAH 49)

The facility also houses the City's vehicle maintenance operations which maintains over 200 vehicles including police and fire vehicles.

Parks and Recreation

Roseville's Parks Maintenance staff, housed in the Maintenance Facility, maintains 32 award winning parks, seven rentable buildings and picnic shelters, an arboretum, skating center, nature center and more. All of these facilities are available and used by individuals outside of the City of Roseville. Further, the Roseville Area School District, which serves Roseville, Little Canada, Falcon Heights, and portions of Shoreview and Maplewood, make use of Roseville Park facilities for educational programming and sports events. Youth sports associations that serve this and additional surrounding communities also make use of Roseville park facilities.

Regional Transportation Systems

Roseville maintenance staff, by agreement, are required to maintain trails, sidewalks and other pathway facilities along the regional roadway system within Roseville. This includes clearing snow off of major regional corridor trails such as County Road C, Fairview Ave and Lexington Ave. Staff is also responsible for maintaining lighting and other amenities along these same corridors. The staff, equipment and vehicles used to maintain this infrastructure is housed at the Roseville Maintenance Facility.

FACILITY DEFICINCIES

This facility, originally constructed on this site in 1957, has been expanded and remodeled numerous times over the past 65 years. However, City operations have outgrown the space and there is no room to expand on the current site.

The City has conducted two major space needs studies over the past 6 years including a thorough Space Needs Study and a follow up Civic Campus Master Plan study. Both studies indicated that given current operations and expected growth that the Maintenance Facility should be approximately 100,000 square feet in size, nearly 40% larger than the current size of the facility.

This need for simple space is highlighted by the fact the City is forced to store trailers, castings, replacement poles and other materials outside year round, reducing the serviceable life of much of the material. The City is also currently leasing seasonal storage space offsite to house equipment and vehicles that don't fit in the current facility. Some of this space is actually located outside the City of Roseville at the State Fair grounds. Staff is then forced to rotate equipment and vehicles seasonally. Also, the City is currently paying over \$60,000 per year for this lease space, which will of course increase over time.

As well as being too small, much of the facility is outdated and behind modern standards and requirements. A prime example of this is the vehicle wash bay. It is undersized for the City's large vehicles such as snow plows and the jetter, forcing maintenance staff to wash off vehicles

outside, often times in freezing conditions which creates a hazard for the maintenance worker. It also lacks proper drainage for the wash out material; a new wash bay would allow the City to meet current standards and regulations.

The City is also delaying needed maintenance on its fuel islands and fuel tanks not wanting to make a large investment in components of an aging facility.

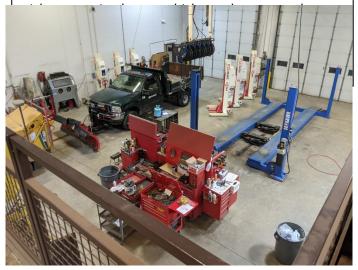
Additionally, the space that we do have is largely too small for larger vehicles, lacks proper clearances and work space, and requires rotating vehicles and equipment to provide work space for the maintenance staff. In short, it is extremely inefficient for the variety of maintenance activities that occur inside and around the current facility.

The Parks shop and vehicle storage area, was originally the Police garage. It is not designed for larger maintenance equipment and the space serves as both vehicle storage and workshop space.

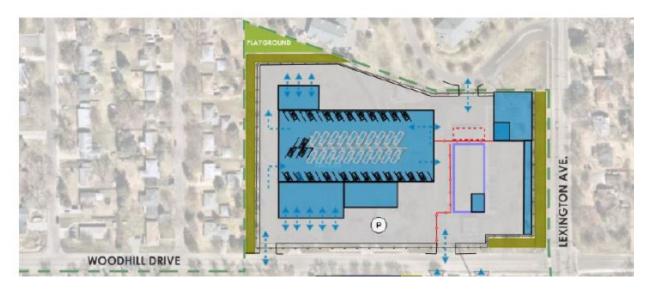
The vehicle maintenance area has three vehicle bays; one of which doubles as a welding workshop area. Given the size of the City's fleet additional bays and at least one more full-length bay would make the operation much more efficient.



With just over one acre of actual yard space, and the deficient space inside, the yard area of the current maintenance facility is overcrowded and has trailers, castings and other equipment and materials stored outside limiting space for other materials like water break spoils, sand, gravel and topsoil.

PROPOSED FACILITY

A new facility will provide a much more efficient, modern, safe and sustainable facility for the future. It will provide space to expand and be flexible enough to reconfigure as maintenance equipment needs evolve and grow. The new facility is estimated to cost \$64.2 million including planning and design, right-of-way acquisition and business relocation, construction and infrastructure required to serve the new facility.

Rosedale Center alone has 1.3 million square feet of retail uses and has over 14 million visitors annually. There are 1.5 million people within fifteen miles of Roseville. Based on all of these factors, non-residents generate significant activity across all retail sectors and therefore Roseville has to provide infrastructure (utilities, local roads, traffic control, and pathways) and service for these businesses that serve non-city residents with city resources.

Employment in Roseville

US Census Data from 2019 shows that Roseville's nearly 1,500 businesses creates 34,803 jobs in Roseville. Of that number, 33,246 (or 95%) were not residents of Roseville. This data shows that Roseville is a major regional employment center, and that Roseville serves over 65,000 persons when combining daytime and nighttime populations.



Due to the high concentration of jobs in Roseville, there is heavier use of the city's infrastructure by the non-taxpayer. As a result, the costs to maintain the local infrastructure is borne by the Roseville taxpayer.

Regional Transportation Network in Roseville

Roseville is home to 36,254 residents, 15,554 households, and over 34,000 jobs within the community. Roseville shares borders with 10 different communities including St. Paul and Minneapolis and has the principal arterials of Hwy. 36 and I-35W corridors as well County Road minor arterials that traverse through the city. As a result of its location and amenities, Roseville is a regional destination for jobs, shopping, and recreation.

The Roseville License and Passport Center, located in along Lexington Ave in the City of Roseville, provides driver's licenses, vehicle tabs, hunting and fishing licenses, passports, and other services to residents of Roseville and much of Ramsey County and the Twin Cities metro area. The facility is extremely busy and has over 200,000 transactions annually per year. Also,

many people from throughout the Twin Cities metro have utilized the Roseville Passport Center in preparation for their international trips.

The License and Passport Center has been in its current space since 2000 in leased space from the Lexington Shops retail center. As time went on, the License and Passport Center served more and more customers and changes were required by the federal government to separate the general license operation space from the passport service area. This required more space. Ultimately the City decided to purchase the retail center in order to provide more space for long term growth of the Civic Campus.

The City anticipated that the popular License and Passport Center needed to grow if it was to remain a convenient and efficient location for its customers to meet their needs. Therefore, in 2017 the City conducted a space needs analysis which identified several space and operational deficiencies of the current space. This was followed up with a Civic Campus Master Plan which analyzed the needs of the overall campus and provided concepts to meet the many needs of the City well into the future.

Primarily the studies identified that the current 5,000 square foot space should be nearly 10,000 square feet in size. This would provide sufficient separation of the operations as required by federal regulations, as well as efficient circulation, allow room for growth and provide staff support spaces and an expanded waiting area.

The new facility will also provide additional recreational space for the City's Parks and Recreation programs. Currently, the City operates a dance studio program out of open space in the retail center. This space is too small for the size of the program and limits potential growth of the popular recreational program. A new Dance and Wellness Studio, a 5,000 square foot open recreational space with restroom and other support amenities, will be the home of the Roseville School of Dance, various adult wellness classes such as yoga and mindfulness and could be available to community and non-community users when not in use for City programs.

The cost of the new facility is estimated to be around \$12.7 million and would include costs for design, construction, relocation and required infrastructure to support the new facility.

Roseville License and Passport Center serves the region

In 2019, the Roseville License and Passport Center processed 204,912 transactions which included tab renewals, drivers' license renewals, title transfers, DNR permits, Auto Dealer title transfers, and the processing of passport applications.

BACKGROUND

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At the November 28 and December 5, 2022 meetings, the City Council discussed 2023 Legislative Priorities. As a result of the discussion, the draft 2023 Legislative Priorities are listed below:

<u>High Priority Items (Items that City of Roseville will directly advocate for passage by the Legislature)</u>

- Seek financial support for capital improvements for the state and regional asset of the Guidant John Rose Minnesota OVAL and support facilities through the State Bonding Bill
- Allow Municipal Hotel Licensing
- Regulate the sale of catalytic convertors
- Increased funding to local governments to address emerald ash borer
- Allowing a Taproom and Cocktail Room on the same premise
- Enact statewide Licensing of Massage Therapists
- Enact Local Option Sales Tax for Roseville

Other Priorities (Items the City of Roseville supports but will let other organizations directly advocate for passage by the Legislature)

- Amend state law to provide for the opportunity for city officials to participate virtually at city meetings from a remote location without having to open the remote location to the public as long as at least one publically accessible location is offered when not in pandemic emergency

The last bullet item under Other Priorities was added as a result of discussion at the December 5, 2022 meeting. The City Council should review the wording in the new priority to make sure it captures the intent expressed at the December meeting.

Finally, Mayor Roe has suggested one additional addition to the City's 2023 Legislative Priorities centered around support of Ramsey County's Youth Violence Response Proposal. Information about Ramsey County's request is in included at Attachment B.

POLICY OBJECTIVE

Advocating for Roseville's Legislative Priorities will provide a voice to the Minnesota Legislature and Governor on items and issues that are important to the community and city operations.

BUDGET IMPLICATIONS

Not directly applicable to the Legislative Priorities. However individual items may have a cost impact to the City, either negatively or positively, depending on the topic and outcome.

RACIAL EQUITY IMPACT SUMMARY

While the racial equity toolkit was not utilized to analyze the equity impact for each legislative priority, it is important to acknowledge that each priority has racial equity impacts. As the City's legislative policies are mostly centered around state laws and policies, a broader state-wide equity lens is needed to ensure that racial equity disparities are addressed. As the Legislature considers the City's legislative priorities, the City will advocate that racial equity impacts are considered in the drafting and consideration of the legislation. In addition, as part of future City legislative priority consideration, staff will conduct a racial equity impact analysis for items when appropriate.

 advanced energy standard as part of the State Building Code and other legislative efforts to
 support zoning and financial incentives at the local level to encourage sustainable building
 design, construction, and operation strategies that aim to lower overall greenhouse gas
 emissions.

Ramsey County Youth Violence Response Proposal

HF 4624 (Rep. Her)/SF 4286 (Sen. Murphy)

Recent increases in violent behavior by young people, particularly carjackings, has brought more attention to a longstanding problem. A lack of culturally appropriate, community-based out of home placement options and other interventions for youth who engage in serious delinquent behavior has been a broadly recognized problem for years.

Subdivision 1 funds Ramsey County to create up to 25 community-based and culturally specific placements in up to 7 secure intensive treatment homes. Youth placed in these residential settings will receive intensive wraparound therapeutic and social services.

Placement at the State's juvenile correctional facility in Redwing, other secure facilities, and adult certification will still be an option for those who commit the most severe offenses; but for others, more supportive and sometimes secure placements in the community close to family and community, and other interventions, can prevent behavior from reaching the most serious level in the first place.

These homes will further Ramsey County's goal of keeping youth closer to family, community, and natural supports, in culturally appropriate, community-based, and family-engaged sites, services, and activities.

These homes will be developed in collaboration with community and will include continuous learning with and from these youth and their families and service providers to improve the treatment and services we can provide to these young people.

Subdivision 2 funds grants that will be used for youth violence prevention and family support to boost the effectiveness of these treatment homes.

Community based grantees will be required to:

- Create family support groups and resources to support families during the time a young person is placed out-of-home and support the family through the period of postplacement reentry. This can be peer-to-peer support for families, as well as mental health and other community support.
- Create community-based sites for conflict or crisis de-escalation to prevent incarceration or further systems involvement. Law enforcement can bring youth to these sites for short-term stays to de-escalate a situation and get families to needed support services.
- Establish additional meaningful employment opportunities for systemsinvolved youth.

This project is to replace #518 a Holder Snow Removal Machine. These machines are necessary to plow sidewalks and pathways. The heavy use of these machines during the winter months in our plowing operation leads to breakdowns and failures as they age. This machine has begun to show significant signs of wear and tear and is essential to our snow removal operation. The current machine will be traded in to offset the deficit of the budgeted amount and actual cost of the new machine. The trade in value is projected to be roughly \$30,000.

This project is to replace #509 and #513 which are Toro 4000 mowers. These mowers are essential to our mowing operation. These mowers run non-stop during the growing season. The mowers are both 10 years old and showing signs of the end of their useful life. The current mowers will be traded in to offsetting some of the cost for a projected amount of \$10,500 each. If ordered now, we hope to have the new machinese delivered prior to the end of the summer of 2023.

Subdivision 1. **Designation**; **delegation**. (a) The governing body of each government entity shall designate, as a depository of its funds, one or more financial institutions.

- (b) The governing body may authorize the treasurer or chief financial officer to:
- (1) designate depositories of the funds;
- (2) make investments of funds under sections 118A.01 to 118A.06 or other applicable law; or
- (3) both designate depositories and make investments as provided in this subdivision.
- Subd. 2. **Sale; proceeds; immunity, if loss.** (a) The treasurer or chief financial officer of a government entity may at any time sell obligations purchased pursuant to this section and the money received from such sale, and the interest and profits or loss on such investment shall be credited or charged, as the case may be, to the fund from which the investment was made.
- (b) Neither such official nor government entity, nor any other official responsible for the custody of such funds, shall be personally liable for any loss sustained from the deposit or investment of funds in accordance with the provisions of sections 118A.04 and 118A.05.

471.38 CLAIMS.

Subdivision 1. **Itemization; declaration.** Except as provided in subdivision 2, if an account, claim, or demand against a local government for any property or services can be itemized in the ordinary course of business, the board or officer authorized by law to audit and allow claims shall not audit or allow the claim until the person claiming payment, or the person's agent, provides to the board or officer an itemized list in writing or in an electronic transaction record. By making the claim for payment, the person making the claim is declaring that the account, claim, or demand is just and correct and that no part of it has been paid. The board or officer may in its discretion allow a claim prepared by the clerk or secretary of the board or officer prior to the declaration by the claimant if the declaration is made on the check or order-check by which the claim is paid, as provided in section 471.391, subdivision 2. For the purposes of this section, "local government" means any county, local social services agency, school district, town, or home rule charter city of the second, third, or fourth class, or any park district.

- Subd. 2. **Application.** The provisions of this section do not apply to any claim or demand for an annual salary or fees of jurors or witnesses, fixed by law, nor to the salary or wages of any employee whose salary or wages have been fixed on an hourly, daily, weekly or monthly basis, by the governing board of the municipality, and which is now authorized by law to be paid on a payroll basis.
- Subd. 3. **Electronic funds transfer.** Electronic funds transfer is the process of value exchange via mechanical means without the use of checks, drafts, or similar negotiable instruments. A local government may make an electronic funds transfer for the following:
 - (1) for a claim for a payment from an imprest payroll bank account or investment of excess money;
 - (2) for a payment of tax or aid anticipation certificates;
 - (3) for a payment of contributions to pension or retirement fund;
 - (4) for vendor payments; and
- (5) for payment of bond principal, bond interest and a fiscal agent service charge from the debt redemption fund.
- Subd. 3a. **Eligibility.** The authorization in subdivision 3 extends only to a local government that has enacted all of the following policy controls:
- (a) the governing body shall annually delegate the authority to make electronic funds transfers to a designated business administrator or chief financial officer or the officer's designee;
 - (b) the disbursing bank shall keep on file a certified copy of the delegation of authority;
 - (c) the initiator of the electronic transfer shall be identified;
- (d) the initiator shall document the request and obtain an approval from the designated business administrator, or chief financial officer or the officer's designee, before initiating the transfer as required by internal control policies;
- (e) a written confirmation of the transaction shall be made no later than one business day after the transaction and shall be used in lieu of a check, order check or warrant required to support the transaction:

(f) a list of all transactions made by electronic funds transfer shall be submitted to the governing body at its next regular meeting after the transaction.

18.80 INSPECTORS.

Subdivision 1. County agricultural inspectors and county-designated employees. The county board shall either appoint at least one county agricultural inspector to carry out the duties specified under section 18.81, subdivisions 1a and 1b, or a county-designated employee to carry out the duties specified under section 18.81, subdivision 1a. A notice of the appointment of either a county agricultural inspector or county-designated employee must be delivered to the commissioner within 30 days.

- Subd. 2. Local weed inspectors. The supervisors of each town board and the mayor of each city shall act as local weed inspectors within their respective municipalities.
- Subd. 3. **Assistant weed inspectors.** A municipality may appoint one or more assistants to act on behalf of the appointing authority as a weed inspector for the municipality. The appointed assistant or assistants have the power, authority, and responsibility of the town board members or the city mayor in the capacity of weed inspector.

BACKGROUND

On June 17, 2021 President Biden signed legislation declaring June 19 a federal holiday in acknowledgement of Juneteenth Day. Juneteenth Day commemorates June 19, 1865, when Union

soldiers brought news of freedom to enslaved Black people in Galveston, Texas. Juneteenth Day

celebrations have occurred ever since 1866, mostly by Black Americans, yet it is a day worthy of

6 commemoration as it represents a critical turning point in American history, not just Black history.

On November 7, 2022 the Roseville City Council declared June 19 an official city recognized

9 holiday. As part of the negotiation process with the various collective bargaining units in the city,

several of the 2022 union contracts had provisions that would recognize Juneteenth as a holiday in

the collective bargaining agreement if the City Council approved it as an official holiday. The

collective bargaining unit represented by the International Association of Firefighters (IAFF), Local

5051 did not have this clause as part of their contract when it was approved.

Staff and representatives from the union have met and agreed to the attached Memorandum of

Understanding recognizing Juneteenth as an official holiday and increasing the bank of holiday

17 hours for each employee accordingly.

POLICY OBJECTIVE

As part of the City of Roseville's Community Aspirations, Roseville aspires to be "Welcoming,

inclusive, and respectful" and "Engaged in our community's success as citizens, neighbors,

volunteers, leaders, and businesspeople". Declaring Juneteenth Day as a City holiday is consistent

22 with those aspirations as it will provide an important recognition within the community regarding to

the ending of slavery and its continuing impact in American society.

BUDGET IMPLICATIONS

25 The increase in holiday hours (16 hours/employee) for union members is consistent with the

26 additional holiday hours granted to other union and non-union members. An exact cost impact

cannot be calculated at this time due to variables of who is working and who may be called in for

emergency work. However, based on union contract, union employees who work on Juneteenth Day

29 holiday would be paid as dictated by their contract (e.g. time and one half).

RACIAL EQUITY IMPACT SUMMARY

According to the 2020 American Community Survey produced by the U.S. Census Bureau, 8% of

Roseville's population (2,886 residents) identify as Black. An additional 6.6% identify as two races.

However, the recognition of Juneteenth Day is not merely an opportunity to celebrate a milestone event in Black history, but an opportunity to recognize a critical turning point in American history. It provides context as a considerable and formative part of American history that still informs debates, policies and practices we have today. Juneteenth serves as a celebration of progress made toward freedom and rights, and a reminder of the work still necessary to ensure and equitable future for all.

Juneteenth Day has been celebrated since 1866, however it has not been recognized by Federal, State, and Local governments until recently. The legacy and trauma of slavery continue to directly impact Black individuals and the Black community. The Federal Government, States (including Minnesota), and local governments (including Roseville) have for many years maintained laws, policies, programs, and systems that directly discriminated against black, indigenous, and persons of color (BIPOC) which resulted in significant barriers for members of BIPOC communities to succeed. As an organization, the City of Roseville is on a journey to rectify those wrongs through the creation of a Strategic Racial Equity Action Plan and undertaking tangible efforts. Declaring Juneteenth Day as a City holiday, will provide an opportunity for the community, city employees, and policy makers to reflect on the legacy of slavery and strengthen their commitment to eliminate the continuing systemic inequities in government and society.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends authorizing the City Manager to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding with IAFF Local 5051 recognizing Juneteenth as an official holiday and increasing the bank of holiday hours for employees recognized under the collective bargaining agreement.

IMPLEMENTATION OF JUNETEENTH IN 2023

The parties hereby agree to the following modification of the collective bargaining agreement between the City of Roseville and Roseville Firefighters, Local 5051, International Association of Firefighters ("IAFF") dated January 1, 2022- December 31, 2023. In recognition of the City Council's action at the November 7, 2022 meeting declaring Junteenth a City recognized holiday beginning in 2023.

The parties agree that beginning January 1, 2023, Article 24 is amended to read:

24.1 Twenty-four (24) hour shift scheduled employees assigned to work 2912 hours annually will receive a bank of two hundred and sixteen (216) holiday hours during the first pay period of each calendar year to be used at the discretion of the employee with the approval of the supervisor. For SHIFT EMPLOYEES hired or terminated throughout the calendar year, the number of paid holidays accrued shall be on a prorated basis of 16.66 hours of regular pay for each completed month worked during the calendar year.

STATE OF MINNESOTA AGENCY AGREEMENT

for

FEDERAL PARTICIPATION IN CONSTRUCTION

This Agreement is entered into by and between City of Roseville ("Local Government") and the State of Minnesota acting through its Commissioner of Transportation ("MnDOT").

RECITALS

- 1. Pursuant to Minnesota Statutes Section 161.36, the Local Government desires MnDOT to act as the Local Government's agent in accepting federal funds on the Local Government's behalf for the construction, improvement, or enhancement of transportation financed either in whole or in part by Federal Highway Administration ("FHWA") federal funds, hereinafter referred to as the "Project(s)"; and
 - 2. This Agreement is intended to cover all federal aid projects initiated by the Local Government and therefore has no specific State Project number associated with it, and
 - 2.1. The Assistance Listing Number (ALN) is 20.205, 20.224, 20.933 or another Department of Transportation ALN as listed on SAM.gov and
 - 2.2. This project is for construction, not research and development.
 - 2.3. MnDOT requires that the terms and conditions of this agency be set forth in an agreement.

AGREEMENT TERMS

1. Term of Agreement; Prior Agreement

- 1.1. **Effective Date.** This Agreement will be effective on the date that MnDOT obtains all required signatures under Minn. Stat. §16C.05, Subd. 2. This Agreement will remain effective until it is superseded or terminated pursuant to section 14.
- 1.2. **Prior Agreement.** This Agreement supersedes the prior agreement between the parties, MnDOT Contract Number 1029999.

2. Local Government's Duties

2.1. **Designation.** The Local Government designates MnDOT to act as its agent in accepting federal funds on its behalf made available for the Project(s). Details on the required processes and procedures are available on the State Aid Website.

2.2. Staffing.

2.2.1. The Local Government will furnish and assign a publicly employed and licensed engineer, ("Project Engineer"), to be in responsible charge of the Project(s) and to supervise and direct the work to be performed under any construction contract let for the Project(s). In the alternative, where the Local Government elects to use a private consultant for construction engineering services, the Local Government will provide a qualified, full-time public employee of the Local Government to be in responsible charge of the Project(s). The services of the Local Government to be performed hereunder may not be assigned, sublet, or transferred unless the Local Government is notified in writing by MnDOT that such action is permitted under 23 CFR 1.33 and 23 CFR 635.105 and state law. This

- written consent will in no way relieve the Local Government from its primary responsibility for performance of the work.
- 2.2.2. During the progress of the work on the Project(s), the Local Government authorizes its Project Engineer to request in writing specific engineering and/or technical services from MnDOT, pursuant to Minnesota Statutes Section 161.39. Such services may be covered by other technical service agreements. If MnDOT furnishes the services requested, and if MnDOT requests reimbursement, then the Local Government will promptly pay MnDOT to reimburse the state trunk highway fund for the full cost and expense of furnishing such services. The costs and expenses will include the current MnDOT labor additives and overhead rates, subject to adjustment based on actual direct costs that have been verified by audit. Provision of such services will not be deemed to make MnDOT a principal or coprincipal with respect to the Project(s).
- 2.3. **Pre-letting.** The Local Government will prepare construction contracts in accordance with Minnesota law and applicable Federal laws and regulations.
 - 2.3.1. The Local Government will solicit bids after obtaining written notification from MnDOT that the FHWA has authorized the Project(s). Any Project(s) advertised prior to authorization **without permission** will not be eligible for federal reimbursement.
 - 2.3.2. The Local Government will prepare the Proposal for Highway Construction for the construction contract, which will include all federal-aid provisions supplied by MnDOT.
 - 2.3.3. The Local Government will prepare and publish the bid solicitation for the Project(s) as required by state and federal laws. The Local Government will include in the solicitation the required language for federal-aid construction contracts as supplied by MnDOT. The solicitation will state where the proposals, plans, and specifications are available for the inspection of prospective bidders and where the Local Government will receive the sealed bids.
 - 2.3.4. The Local Government may not include other work in the construction contract for the authorized Project(s) without obtaining prior notification from MnDOT that such work is allowed by FHWA. Failure to obtain such notification may result in the loss of some or all of the federal funds for the Project(s). All work included in a federal contract is subject to the same federal requirements as the federal project.
 - 2.3.5. The Local Government will prepare and sell the plan and proposal packages and prepare and distribute any addenda, if needed.
 - 2.3.6. The Local Government will receive and open bids.
 - 2.3.7. After the bids are opened, the Local Government will consider the bids and will award the bid to the lowest responsible bidder or reject all bids. If the construction contract contains a goal for Disadvantaged Business Enterprises (DBEs), the Local Government will not award the bid until it has received certification of the Disadvantaged Business Enterprise participation from the MnDOT Office of Civil Rights.
 - 2.3.8. The Local Government must disclose in writing any potential conflict of interest to the Federal awarding agency or MnDOT in accordance with applicable FHWA policy.

2.4. Contract Administration.

2.4.1. The Local Government will prepare and execute a construction contract with the lowest responsible bidder, hereinafter referred to as the "Contractor," in accordance with the special provisions and the latest edition of MnDOT's Standard Specifications for Construction when the contract is awarded and all amendments thereto. All contracts between the Local Government and third parties or subcontractors must contain all applicable provisions of this Agreement, including the applicable

- federal contract clauses, which are identified in Appendix II of 2 CFR 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards, and as identified in Section 18 of this Agreement.
- 2.4.2. The Project(s) will be constructed in accordance with the plans, special provisions, and standard specifications of each Project. The standard specifications will be the latest edition of MnDOT Standard Specifications for Highway Construction and all amendments thereto. The plans, special provisions, and standard specifications will be on file at the Local Government Engineer's Office. The plans, special provisions, and specifications are incorporated into this Agreement by reference as though fully set forth herein.
- 2.4.3. The Local Government will furnish the personnel, services, supplies, and equipment necessary to properly supervise, inspect, and document the work for the Project(s). The services of the Local Government to be performed hereunder may not be assigned, sublet, or transferred unless the Local Government is notified in writing by MnDOT that such action is permitted under 23 CFR 1.33 and 23 CFR 635.105 and state law. This written consent will in no way relieve the Local Government from its primary responsibility for performance of the work.
- 2.4.4. The Local Government will document quantities in accordance with the guidelines set forth in the Construction Section of the Electronic State Aid Manual that are in effect at the time the work was performed.
- 2.4.5. The Local Government will test materials in accordance with the Schedule of Materials Control in effect at the time each Project was let. The Local Government will notify MnDOT when work is in progress on the Project(s) that requires observation by the Independent Assurance Inspector, as required by the Independent Assurance Schedule.
- 2.4.6. The Local Government may make changes in the plans or the character of the work, as may be necessary to complete the Project(s), and may enter into Change Order(s) with the Contractor. The Local Government will not be reimbursed for any costs of any work performed under a change order unless MnDOT has notified the Local Government that the subject work is eligible for federal funds and sufficient federal funds are available.
- 2.4.7. The Local Government will request approval from MnDOT for all costs in excess of the amount of federal funds previously approved for the Project(s) prior to incurring such costs. Failure to obtain such approval may result in such costs being disallowed for reimbursement.
- 2.4.8. The Local Government will prepare reports, keep records, and perform work so as to meet federal requirements and to enable MnDOT to collect the federal aid sought by the Local Government.

 Required reports are listed in the MnDOT State Aid Manual, Delegated Contract Process Checklist, available from MnDOT's authorized representative. The Local Government will retain all records and reports and allow MnDOT or the FHWA access to such records and reports for six years.
- 2.4.9. Upon completion of the Project(s), the Project Engineer will determine whether the work will be accepted.

2.5. Limitations.

- 2.5.1. The Local Government will comply with all applicable Federal, State, and local laws, ordinances, and regulations.
- 2.5.2. **Nondiscrimination.** It is the policy of the Federal Highway Administration and the State of Minnesota that no person in the United States will, on the grounds of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance (42 U.S.C. 2000d). Through expansion of the mandate

for nondiscrimination in Title VI and through parallel legislation, the proscribed bases of discrimination include race, color, sex, national origin, age, and disability. In addition, the Title VI program has been extended to cover all programs, activities and services of an entity receiving Federal financial assistance, whether such programs and activities are Federally assisted or not. Even in the absence of prior discriminatory practice or usage, a recipient in administering a program or activity to which this part applies is expected to take affirmative action to assure that no person is excluded from participation in, or is denied the benefits of, the program or activity on the grounds of race, color, national origin, sex, age, or disability. It is the responsibility of the Local Government to carry out the above requirements.

- 2.5.3. **Utilities.** The Local Government will treat all public, private or cooperatively owned utility facilities which directly or indirectly serve the public and which occupy highway rights of way in conformance with 23 CFR 645 "Utilities", which is incorporated herein by reference.
- 2.6. **Maintenance.** The Local Government assumes full responsibility for the operation and maintenance of any facility constructed or improved under this Agreement.

3. MnDOT's Duties

3.1. **Acceptance.** MnDOT accepts designation as Agent of the Local Government for the receipt and disbursement of federal funds and will act in accordance herewith.

3.2. Project Activities.

- 3.2.1. MnDOT will make the necessary requests to the FHWA for authorization to use federal funds for the Project(s) and for reimbursement of eligible costs pursuant to the terms of this Agreement.
- 3.2.2. MnDOT will provide to the Local Government copies of the required Federal-aid clauses to be included in the bid solicitation and will provide the required Federal-aid provisions to be included in the Proposal for Highway Construction.
- 3.2.3. MnDOT will review and certify the DBE participation and notify the Local Government when certification is complete. If certification of DBE participation (or good faith efforts to achieve such participation) cannot be obtained, then Local Government must decide whether to proceed with awarding the contract. Failure to obtain such certification will result in the Project becoming ineligible for federal assistance, and the Local Government must make up any shortfall.
- 3.2.4. MnDOT will provide the required labor postings.
- 3.3. **Authority.** MnDOT may withhold federal funds, where MnDOT or the FHWA determines that the Project(s) was not completed in compliance with federal requirements.
- 3.4. **Inspection.** MnDOT, the FHWA, or duly authorized representatives of the state and federal government will have the right to audit, evaluate and monitor the work performed under this Agreement. The Local Government will make all books, records, and documents pertaining to the work hereunder available for a minimum of six years following the closing of the construction contract.

4. Time

- 4.1. The Local Government must comply with all time requirements described in this Agreement. In the performance of this Agreement, time is of the essence.
- 4.2. The period of performance is defined as beginning on the date of federal authorization and ending on the date defined in the federal financial system or federal agreement ("end date"). **No work completed** after the **end date** will be eligible for federal funding. Local Government must submit all contract close out paperwork to MnDOT at least twenty-four months prior to the **end date**.

5. Payment

- 5.1. **Cost.** The entire cost of the Project(s) is to be paid from federal funds made available by the FHWA and by other funds provided by the Local Government. The Local Government will pay any part of the cost or expense of the Project(s) that is not paid by federal funds. MnDOT will receive the federal funds to be paid by the FHWA for the Project(s), pursuant to Minnesota Statutes § 161.36, Subdivision 2. MnDOT will reimburse the Local Government, from said federal funds made available to each Project, for each partial payment request, subject to the availability and limits of those funds.
- 5.2. **Indirect Cost Rate Proposal/Cost Allocation Plan.** If the Local Government seeks reimbursement for indirect costs and has submitted to MnDOT an indirect cost rate proposal or a cost allocation plan, the rate proposed will be used on a provisional basis. At any time during the period of performance or the final audit of a Project, MnDOT may audit and adjust the indirect cost rate according to the cost principles in 2 CFR Part 200. MnDOT may adjust associated reimbursements accordingly.
- 5.3. **Reimbursement.** The Local Government will prepare partial estimates in accordance with the terms of the construction contract for the Project(s). The Project Engineer will certify each partial estimate. Following certification of the partial estimate, the Local Government will make partial payments to the Contractor in accordance with the terms of the construction contract for the Project(s).
 - 5.3.1. Following certification of the partial estimate, the Local Government may request reimbursement for costs eligible for federal funds. The Local Government's request will be made to MnDOT and will include a copy of the certified partial estimate.
 - 5.3.2. Upon completion of the Project(s), the Local Government will prepare a final estimate in accordance with the terms of the construction contract for the Project(s). The Project Engineer will certify the final estimate. Following certification of the final estimate, the Local Government will make the final payment to the Contractor in accordance with the terms of the construction contract for the Project(s).
 - 5.3.3. Following certification of the final estimate, the Local Government may request reimbursement for costs eligible for federal funds. The Local Government's request will be made to MnDOT and will include a copy of the certified final estimate along with the required records.
 - 5.3.4. Upon completion of the Project(s), MnDOT will perform a final inspection and verify the federal and state eligibility of all payment requests. If the Project is found to have been completed in accordance with the plans and specifications, MnDOT will promptly release any remaining federal funds due the Local Government for the Project(s). If MnDOT finds that the Local Government has been overpaid, the Local Government must promptly return any excess funds.
 - 5.3.5. In the event MnDOT does not obtain funding from the Minnesota Legislature or other funding source, or funding cannot be continued at a sufficient level to allow for the processing of the federal aid reimbursement requests, the Local Government may continue the work with local funds only, until such time as MnDOT is able to process the federal aid reimbursement requests.
- 5.4. **Matching Funds.** Any cost sharing or matching funds required of the Local Government in this Agreement must comply with 2 CFR 200.306.
- 5.5. **Federal Funds.** Payments under this Agreement will be made from federal funds. The Local Government is responsible for compliance with all federal requirements imposed on these funds and accepts full financial responsibility for failure to comply with any federal requirements including, but not limited to, 2 CFR Part 200. If, for any reason, the federal government fails to pay part of the cost or expense incurred by the Local Government, or in the event the total amount of federal funds is not available, the Local Government will be responsible for any and all costs or expenses incurred under this Agreement. The Local Government further

agrees to pay any and all lawful claims arising out of or incidental to the performance of the work covered by this Agreement in the event the federal government does not pay the same.

- 5.6. **Closeout.** The Local Government must liquidate all obligations incurred under this Agreement for each Project and submit all financial, performance, and other reports as required by the terms of this Agreement and the Federal award at least twenty-four months prior to the **end date** of the period of performance for each Project. MnDOT will determine, at its sole discretion, whether a closeout audit is required prior to final payment approval. If a closeout audit is required, final payment will be held until the audit has been completed. Monitoring of any capital assets acquired with funds will continue following project closeout.
- 6. Conditions of Payment. All services provided by Local Government under this Agreement must be performed to MnDOT's satisfaction, as determined at the sole discretion of MnDOT's Authorized Representative, and in accordance with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, ordinances, rules, and regulations. The Local Government will not receive payment for work found by MnDOT to be unsatisfactory or performed in violation of federal, state, or local law.

MnDOT's Authorized Representative has the responsibility to monitor Local Government's performance and the authority to accept the services provided under this Agreement. If the services are satisfactory, MnDOT's Authorized Representative will certify acceptance on each invoice submitted for payment.

If the Local Government's Authorized Representative changes at any time during this Agreement, the Local Government will immediately notify MnDOT.

8. Assignment Amendments, Waiver, and Agreement Complete

- 8.1. **Assignment.** The Local Government may neither assign nor transfer any rights or obligations under this Agreement without the prior written consent of MnDOT and a fully executed Assignment Agreement, executed and approved by the same parties who executed and approved this Agreement, or their successors in office.
- 8.2. **Amendments.** Any amendment to this Agreement must be in writing and will not be effective until it has been executed and approved by the same parties who executed and approved the original agreement, or their successors in office.
- 8.3. **Waiver.** If MnDOT fails to enforce any provision of this Agreement, that failure does not waive the provision or MnDOT's right to subsequently enforce it.
- 8.4. Agreement Complete. This Agreement contains all negotiations and agreements between MnDOT and the

- Local Government. No other understanding regarding this Agreement, whether written or oral, may be used to bind either party.
- 8.5. **Severability.** If any provision of this Agreement, or the application thereof, is found to be invalid or unenforceable to any extent, the remainder of the Agreement, including all material provisions and the application of such provisions, will not be affected and will be enforceable to the greatest extent permitted by the law.
- 8.6. **Electronic Records and Signatures.** The parties agree to contract by electronic means. This includes using electronic signatures and converting original documents to electronic records.
- 8.7. **Certification.** By signing this Agreement, the Local Government certifies that it is not suspended or debarred from receiving federal or state awards.

9. Liability and Claims

- 9.1. **Tort Liability.** Each party is responsible for its own acts and omissions and the results thereof to the extent authorized by law and will not be responsible for the acts and omissions of any others and the results thereof. The Minnesota Tort Claims Act, Minnesota Statutes Section 3.736, governs MnDOT liability.
- 9.2. Claims. The Local Government acknowledges that MnDOT is acting only as the Local Government's agent for acceptance and disbursement of federal funds, and not as a principal or co-principal with respect to the Project. The Local Government will pay any and all lawful claims arising out of or incidental to the Project including, without limitation, claims related to contractor selection (including the solicitation, evaluation, and acceptance or rejection of bids or proposals), acts or omissions in performing the Project work, and any *ultra vires* acts. To the extent permitted by law, the Local Government will indemnify, defend (to the extent permitted by the Minnesota Attorney General), and hold MnDOT harmless from any claims or costs arising out of or incidental to the Project(s), including reasonable attorney fees incurred by MnDOT. The Local Government's indemnification obligation extends to any actions related to the certification of DBE participation, even if such actions are recommended by MnDOT.

10. Audits

- 10.1. Under Minn. Stat. § 16C.05, Subd.5, the books, records, documents, and accounting procedures and practices of the Local Government, or any other party relevant to this Agreement or transaction, are subject to examination by MnDOT and/or the State Auditor or Legislative Auditor, as appropriate, for a minimum of six years from the end of this Agreement, receipt and approval of all final reports, or the required period of time to satisfy all state and program retention requirements, whichever is later. The Local Government will take timely and appropriate action on all deficiencies identified by an audit.
- 10.2. All requests for reimbursement are subject to audit, at MnDOT's discretion. The cost principles outlined in 2 CFR 200.400-.476 will be used to determine whether costs are eligible for reimbursement under this Agreement.
- 10.3. If Local Government expends \$750,000 or more in Federal Funds during the Local Government's fiscal year, the Local Government must have a single audit or program specific audit conducted in accordance with 2 CFR Part 200.
- 11. Government Data Practices. The Local Government and MnDOT must comply with the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act, Minn. Stat. Ch. 13, as it applies to all data provided by MnDOT under this Agreement, and as it applies to all data created, collected, received, stored, used, maintained, or disseminated by the Local Government under this Agreement. The civil remedies of Minn. Stat. §13.08 apply to the release of the data referred to in this clause by either the Local Government or MnDOT.
- **12. Workers Compensation.** The Local Government certifies that it is in compliance with Minn. Stat. §176.181, Subd. 2, pertaining to workers' compensation insurance coverage. The Local Government's employees and agents will

- not be considered MnDOT employees. Any claims that may arise under the Minnesota Workers' Compensation Act on behalf of these employees and any claims made by any third party as a consequence of any act or omission on the part of these employees are in no way MnDOT's obligation or responsibility.
- **13. Governing Law, Jurisdiction, and Venue.** Minnesota law, without regard to its choice-of-law provisions, governs this Agreement. Venue for all legal proceedings out of this Agreement, or its breach, must be in the appropriate state or federal court with competent jurisdiction in Ramsey County, Minnesota.

14. Termination; Suspension

- 14.1. **Termination by MnDOT.** MnDOT may terminate this Agreement with or without cause, upon 30 days written notice to the Local Government. Upon termination, the Local Government will be entitled to payment, determined on a pro rata basis, for services satisfactorily performed.
- 14.2. **Termination for Cause.** MnDOT may immediately terminate this Agreement if MnDOT finds that there has been a failure to comply with the provisions of this Agreement, that reasonable progress has not been made, that fraudulent or wasteful activity has occurred, that the Local Government has been convicted of a criminal offense relating to a state agreement, or that the purposes for which the funds were granted have not been or will not be fulfilled. MnDOT may take action to protect the interests of MnDOT of Minnesota, including the refusal to disburse additional funds and/or requiring the return of all or part of the funds already disbursed.
- 14.3. Termination for Insufficient Funding. MnDOT may immediately terminate this Agreement if:
 - 14.3.1. It does not obtain funding from the Minnesota Legislature; or
 - 14.3.2. If funding cannot be continued at a level sufficient to allow for the payment of the services covered here. Termination must be by written or fax notice to the Local Government. MnDOT is not obligated to pay for any services that are provided after notice and effective date of termination. However, the Local Government will be entitled to payment, determined on a pro rata basis, for services satisfactorily performed to the extent that funds are available. MnDOT will not be assessed any penalty if the Agreement is terminated because of the decision of the Minnesota Legislature, or other funding source, not to appropriate funds. MnDOT will provide the Local Government notice of the lack of funding within a reasonable time of MnDOT's receiving that notice.
- 14.4. **Suspension.** MnDOT may immediately suspend this Agreement in the event of a total or partial government shutdown due to the failure to have an approved budget by the legal deadline. Work performed by the Local Government during a period of suspension will be deemed unauthorized and undertaken at risk of non-payment.
- 15. Data Disclosure. Under Minn. Stat. § 270C.65, Subd. 3, and other applicable law, the Local Government consents to disclosure of its social security number, federal employer tax identification number, and/or Minnesota tax identification number, already provided to MnDOT, to federal and state tax agencies and state personnel involved in the payment of state obligations. These identification numbers may be used in the enforcement of federal and state tax laws which could result in action requiring the Local Government to file state tax returns and pay delinquent state tax liabilities, if any.
- 16. Fund Use Prohibited. The Local Government will not utilize any funds received pursuant to this Agreement to compensate, either directly or indirectly, any contractor, corporation, partnership, or business, however organized, which is disqualified or debarred from entering into or receiving a State contract. This restriction applies regardless of whether the disqualified or debarred party acts in the capacity of a general contractor, a subcontractor, or as an equipment or material supplier. This restriction does not prevent the Local Government from utilizing these funds to pay any party who might be disqualified or debarred after the Local Government's contract award on this Project.

17. Discrimination Prohibited by Minnesota Statutes §181.59. The Local Government will comply with the provisions of Minnesota Statutes §181.59 which requires that every contract for or on behalf of the State of Minnesota, or any county, city, town, township, school, school district or any other district in the state, for materials, supplies or construction will contain provisions by which Contractor agrees: 1) That, in the hiring of common or skilled labor for the performance of any work under any contract, or any subcontract, no Contractor, material supplier or vendor, will, by reason of race, creed or color, discriminate against the person or persons who are citizens of the United States or resident aliens who are qualified and available to perform the work to which the employment relates; 2) That no Contractor, material supplier, or vendor, will, in any manner, discriminate against, or intimidate, or prevent the employment of any person or persons identified in clause 1 of this section, or on being hired, prevent or conspire to prevent, the person or persons from the performance of work under any contract on account of race, creed or color; 3) That a violation of this section is a misdemeanor; and 4) That this contract may be canceled or terminated by the state of Minnesota, or any county, city, town, township, school, school district or any other person authorized to contracts for employment, and all money due, or to become due under the contract, may be forfeited for a second or any subsequent violation of the terms or conditions of this Agreement.

18. Federal Contract Clauses

- 18.1. **Appendix II 2 CFR Part 200.** The Local Government agrees to comply with the following federal requirements as identified in 2 CFR 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards, and agrees to pass through these requirements to its subcontractors and third-party contractors, as applicable. In addition, the Local Government shall have the same meaning as "Contractor" in the federal requirements listed below.
 - 18.1.1. Contracts for more than the simplified acquisition threshold, which is the inflation adjusted amount determined by the Civilian Agency Acquisition Council and the Defense Acquisition Regulations Council (Councils) as authorized by 41 U.S.C. 1908, must address administrative, contractual, or legal remedies in instances where contractors violate or breach contract terms, and provide for such sanctions and penalties as appropriate.
 - 18.1.2. All contracts in excess of \$10,000 must address termination for cause and for convenience by the non-Federal entity including the manner by which it will be effected and the basis for settlement.
 - 18.1.3. Equal Employment Opportunity. Except as otherwise provided under 41 CFR Part 60, all contracts that meet the definition of "federally assisted construction contract" in 41 CFR Part 60-1.3 must include the equal opportunity clause provided under 41 CFR 60-1.4(b), in accordance with Executive Order 11246, "Equal Employment Opportunity" (30 FR 12319, 12935, 3 CFR Part, 1964-1965 Comp., p. 339), as amended by Executive Order 11375, "Amending Executive Order 11246 Relating to Equal Employment Opportunity," and implementing regulations at 41 CFR part 60, "Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs, Equal Employment Opportunity, Department of Labor."
 - 18.1.4. Davis-Bacon Act, as amended (40 U.S.C. 3141-3148). When required by Federal program legislation, all prime construction contracts in excess of \$2,000 awarded by non-Federal entities must include a provision for compliance with the Davis-Bacon Act (40 U.S.C. 3141-3144, and 3146-3148) as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 CFR Part 5, "Labor Standards Provisions Applicable to Contracts Covering Federally Financed and Assisted Construction"). In accordance with the statute, contractors must be required to pay wages to laborers and mechanics at a rate not less than the prevailing wages specified in a wage determination made by the Secretary of Labor. In addition, contractors must be required to pay wages not less than once a week. The non-Federal entity must place a copy of the current prevailing wage determination issued by the Department of Labor in each solicitation. The decision to award a contract or subcontract must be conditioned upon the acceptance of the wage determination. The non-Federal entity must report all suspected or reported violations to the Federal awarding agency. The contracts must also include a provision

- for compliance with the Copeland "Anti-Kickback" Act (40 U.S.C. 3145), as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 CFR Part 3, "Contractors and Subcontractors on Public Building or Public Work Financed in Whole or in Part by Loans or Grants from the United States"). The Act provides that each contractor or subrecipient must be prohibited from inducing, by any means, any person employed in the construction, completion, or repair of public work, to give up any part of the compensation to which he or she is otherwise entitled. The non-Federal entity must report all suspected or reported violations to the Federal awarding agency.
- 18.1.5. Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act (40 U.S.C. 3701-3708). Where applicable, all contracts awarded by the non-Federal entity in excess of \$100,000 that involve the employment of mechanics or laborers must include a provision for compliance with 40 U.S.C. 3702 and 3704, as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 CFR Part 5). Under 40 U.S.C. 3702 of the Act, each contractor must be required to compute the wages of every mechanic and laborer on the basis of a standard work week of 40 hours. Work in excess of the standard work week is permissible provided that the worker is compensated at a rate of not less than one and a half times the basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of 40 hours in the work week. The requirements of 40 U.S.C. 3704 are applicable to construction work and provide that no laborer or mechanic must be required to work in surroundings or under working conditions which are unsanitary, hazardous or dangerous. These requirements do not apply to the purchases of supplies or materials or articles ordinarily available on the open market, or contracts for transportation or transmission of intelligence.
- 18.1.6. Rights to Inventions Made Under a Contract or Agreement. If the Federal award meets the definition of "funding agreement" under 37 CFR § 401.2 (a) and the recipient or subrecipient wishes to enter into a contract with a small business firm or nonprofit organization regarding the substitution of parties, assignment or performance of experimental, developmental, or research work under that "funding agreement," the recipient or subrecipient must comply with the requirements of 37 CFR Part 401, "Rights to Inventions Made by Nonprofit Organizations and Small Business Firms Under Government Grants, Contracts and Cooperative Agreements," and any implementing regulations issued by the awarding agency.
- 18.1.7. Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. 7401-7671q.) and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (33 U.S.C. 1251-1387), as amended Contracts and subgrants of amounts in excess of \$150,000 must contain a provision that requires the non-Federal award to agree to comply with all applicable standards, orders or regulations issued pursuant to the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. 7401-7671q) and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251-1387). Violations must be reported to the Federal awarding agency and the Regional Office of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).
- 18.1.8. Debarment and Suspension (Executive Orders 12549 and 12689) A contract award (see 2 CFR 180.220) must not be made to parties listed on the governmentwide exclusions in the System for Award Management (SAM), in accordance with the OMB guidelines at 2 CFR 180 that implement Executive Orders 12549 (3 CFR part 1986 Comp., p. 189) and 12689 (3 CFR part 1989 Comp., p. 235), "Debarment and Suspension." SAM Exclusions contains the names of parties debarred, suspended, or otherwise excluded by agencies, as well as parties declared ineligible under statutory or regulatory authority other than Executive Order 12549.
- 18.1.9. Byrd Anti-Lobbying Amendment (31 U.S.C. 1352) Contractors that apply or bid for an award exceeding \$100,000 must file the required certification. Each tier certifies to the tier above that it will not and has not used Federal appropriated funds to pay any person or organization for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a member of Congress, officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a member of Congress in connection with obtaining any Federal contract, grant or any other award covered by 31 U.S.C. 1352. Each tier must

also disclose any lobbying with non-Federal funds that takes place in connection with obtaining any Federal award. Such disclosures are forwarded from tier to tier up to the non-Federal award.

- 18.1.10. Local Government will comply with 2 CFR § 200.323.
- 18.1.11. Local Government will comply with 2 CFR § 200.216.
- 18.1.12. Local Government will comply with 2 CFR § 200.322.
- 18.2. **Drug-Free Workplace.** The Local Government will comply with the Drug-Free Workplace requirements under subpart B of 49 C.F.R. Part 32.
- 18.3. **Title VI/Non-discrimination Assurances.** The Local Government hereby agrees that, as a condition of receiving any Federal financial assistance under this Agreement, it will comply with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (78 Stat. 252, 42 U.S.C. § 2000d), related nondiscrimination statutes (i.e., 23 U.S.C. § 324, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 as amended, and the Age Discrimination Act of 1975), and applicable regulatory requirements to the end that no person in the United States shall, on the grounds of race, color, national origin, sex, disability, or age be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or otherwise be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity for which the Local Government receives Federal financial assistance.

The Local Government hereby agrees to comply with all applicable US DOT Standard Title VI/Non-Discrimination Assurances contained in DOT Order No. 1050.2A, and in particular Appendices A and E, which can be found at: https://edocs-public.dot.state.mn.us/edocs-public/DMResultSet/download?docId=11149035. If federal funds are included in any contract, the Local Government will ensure the appendices and solicitation language within the assurances are inserted into contracts as required. State may conduct a review of the Local Government's compliance with this provision. The Local Government must cooperate with State throughout the review process by supplying all requested information and documentation to State, making Local Government staff and officials available for meetings as requested, and correcting any areas of non-

- 18.4. **Buy America.** The Local Government must comply with the Buy America domestic preferences contained in the Build America, Buy America Act (Sections 70901-52 of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, Public Law 117-58) and as implemented by US DOT operating agencies.
- 18.5. Federal Funding Accountability and Transparency Act (FFATA)

compliance as determined by State.

- 18.5.1. This Agreement requires the Local Government to provide supplies and/or services that are funded in whole or in part by federal funds that are subject to FFATA. The Local Government is responsible for ensuring that all applicable requirements, including but not limited to those set forth herein, of FFATA are met and that the Local Government provides information to the MnDOT as required.
 - a. Reporting of Total Compensation of the Local Government's Executives.
 - b. The Local Government shall report the names and total compensation of each of its five most highly compensated executives for the Local Government's preceding completed fiscal year, if in the Local Government's preceding fiscal year it received:
 - 80 percent or more of the Local Government's annual gross revenues from Federal procurement contracts and Federal financial assistance subject to the Transparency Act, as defined at 2 CFR 170.320 (and subawards); and
 - ii. \$25,000,000 or more in annual gross revenues from Federal procurement contracts (and subcontracts), and Federal financial assistance subject to the Transparency Act (and subawards); and

iii. The public does not have access to information about the compensation of the executives through periodic reports filed under section 13(a) or 15(d) of the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 (15 U.S.C. 78m(a), 78o(d)) or section 6104 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986. (To determine if the public has access to the compensation information, see the U.S. Security and Exchange Commission total compensation filings at https://www.sec.gov/answers/execomp.htm).

Executive means officers, managing partners, or any other employees in management positions.

- c. Total compensation means the cash and noncash dollar value earned by the executive during the Local Government's preceding fiscal year and includes the following (for more information see 17 CFR 229.402(c)(2)):
 - i. Salary and bonus.
 - ii. Awards of stock, stock options, and stock appreciation rights. Use the dollar amount recognized for financial statement reporting purposes with respect to the fiscal year in accordance with the Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 123 (Revised 2004) (FAS 123R), Shared Based Payments.
 - iii. Earnings for services under non-equity incentive plans. This does not include group life, health, hospitalization or medical reimbursement plans that do not discriminate in favor of executives, and are available generally to all salaried employees.
 - iv. Change in pension value. This is the change in present value of defined benefit and actuarial pension plans.
 - v. Above-market earnings on deferred compensation which is not tax qualified.
- 18.5.2. Other compensation, if the aggregate value of all such other compensation (e.g. severance, termination payments, value of life insurance paid on behalf of the employee, perquisites or property) for the executive exceeds \$10,000.
- 18.5.3. The Local Government must report executive total compensation described above to the MnDOT by the end of the month during which this Agreement is awarded.
- 18.5.4. The Local Government will obtain a Unique Entity Identifier number and maintain this number for the term of this Agreement. This number shall be provided to MnDOT on the plan review checklist submitted with the plans for each Project.
- 18.5.5. The Local Government's failure to comply with the above requirements is a material breach of this Agreement for which the MnDOT may terminate this Agreement for cause. The MnDOT will not be obligated to pay any outstanding invoice received from the Local Government unless and until the Local Government is in full compliance with the above requirements.

- 2 Whenever the legal description of property changes, it is necessary to reassign previously levied
- assessments remaining on the property to the proper frontage or area of the new lot or lots. This is
- 4 called "Reapportionment of Assessments." This typically happens when a property is subdivided or
- an easement is recorded on the property. The City Council must approve all reapportionments.
- 6 Until 1993, each reapportionment was done with a separate Council Action request and Resolution.
- 7 The need to process separate reapportionments was very costly and time consuming. In the past,
- 8 there have been as many as 30 reapportionments in a single year. By adopting one resolution
- authorizing the Public Works Director to reapportion the assessments, the overall process is
- streamlined and saves time for the City Council and staff.

- The City Council must approve the reapportionment of levied assessments for property subdivisions.
- The Engineering staff does the calculations to reapportion the assessments and processes all
- supporting documentation for each request.

Adopt Resolution in Support of Less Mow May

BACKGROUND

- At the November 28, 2022 City Council meeting, City staff presented information to the Council
- about supporting No Mow May again, similar to 2022. In April 2022, the City Council supported a
- 4 council member-initiated item to support residents who wish to participate in No Mow May. Local
- ordinances pertaining to lawn maintenance were temporarily suspended until June 1, 2022. City
- 6 Council also approved a resolution declaring Roseville as a Pollinator-Friendly Community on
- 7 June 19, 2017.

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- 8 Some of the items discussed at the meeting included the following:
 - No Mow May is a conservation initiative first popularized by Plantlife, an organization based in the United Kingdom, but which is gaining traction across North America. The goal of No Mow May is to allow grass to grow unmown for the month of May, creating habitat and forage for early season pollinators.
 - Benefits of not moving in May:
 - Lets early spring wildflowers bloom to provide food for emerging and migrating pollinators. Most wildflower seed mixes don't flower early enough to provide early season nectar and pollen resources.
 - Yards not treated by herbicides are more likely to foster "spontaneous growth" of common flowers like dandelion and white clover.
 - o Reduces usage and emissions of gas lawn care equipment.
 - Turf grass grows deeper roots and becomes more drought-resistant when mowed less frequently.
- With the environmental benefits of not mowing in May, Community Development staff saw an increase in lawn driven complaints. A few of the issues they faced from No Mow May 2022:
 - Complaints about yards not being mowed, and weeds spreading to neighboring properties.
 - Increased costs to mow properties in late June that were non-responsive after the end of No Mow May.

Council discussed the program and was in support of the No Mow May concept, but recommended staff update the resolution to reflect the less mow May concept that was presented. Council agreed that the mowing ordinance should only be exempted during the month of May. Discussion was also held on educating the public on best practices that can be used to support this initiative.

- Protection. The goal for Environmental Protection is to protect, preserve, and enhance Roseville's

- property owners, residents, businesses, institutions and neighborhoods the importance of creating
- and maintaining pollinator-friendly habitat, and will encourage residents and businesses to use the
