Commissioner Bolton asked if unused funds roll over to the next year. Staff relayed that any donations would roll over and remain in the account.

Commissioner Baggenstoss asked about the discrepancy between the awarded and used amounts. Staff responded that many participants were awarded the \$100 amount but did not participate in enough programs throughout the year to use the full \$100 amount. There were a few people who were awarded the fee assistance but did not use any of the \$100. Staff acknowledged that those scenarios present an opportunity to understand what barriers were in place that caused the funds to not be utilized.

The Commission discussed the award amount and ways to assess if it is sufficient. They also discussed the sports equipment needs of activity participants and suggested the potential idea of donating equipment.

o More than 50% of people who participated in the Fee Assistance Program reported that they were a person of color.

Commissioners requested racial demographic information of Roseville. Staff agreed to send out statistical information to the Commission.

Fee Assistance Program – 2022 Takeaways
 Roseville has an estimated 2,500 residents below the poverty line and 8,000 low income.
 The scholarship program is likely an effective tool to ensure that traditionally underrepresented individuals are represented in our programs.
 Still heavily skewed toward children.
 More than half of the people who used scholarship dollars used all \$100.

Commissioner Matts-Benson suggested adding an opportunity for people to donate to the scholarship fund when they register for Parks and Recreation activities.

- Commissioner Baggenstoss suggested that putting a cap on the scholarship dollar award amount may be an impediment to potential participants.
- Commissioner Lenhart asked about collecting racial information from all activity registrants. Staff relayed that there are potential privacy issues with collecting this information. In addition, the current registration database is not able to collect this information.

Commissioner Arneson suggested having a two-tier scholarship amount for individuals who would like to participate in more expensive activities.

5) PREPARE FOR JOINT MEETING WITH CITY COUNCIL

The Commission and staff reviewed the draft Request for Council Action (RCA) for the joint meeting with the City Council.

Commissioner Lenhart suggested adding to the RCA bullet titled "Ultimately, the name Keya was supported by the Commission for several reasons" to include that the name Keya was suggested by a resident who lives near the park to honor the Dakota people and as turtles are sometimes seen in the park.

Commissioner Matts-Benson asked who would write the land acknowledgment. Staff relayed that staff members and potentially Commissioners outside of Parks and Recreation would write the land acknowledgement.

Chair Dahlstrom suggested adding the potential loss of Veterans Park as a discussion item to address with the City Council.

Commissioner Lenhart volunteered to discuss the renaming of Pocahontas Park with the City Council. Commissioner Matts-Benson agreed to be the overall presenter for the meeting with the City Council.

Background:

The city has been contacted by a perspective donor who is interested in making a substantial contribution for an art piece to the Harriet Alexander Nature Center. Specifically, the donor is interested in contributing an art piece that highlights the Nature Center and draws more people into the facility. The donor is interested in commissioning a piece by Lori Greene, a mosaic artist who identifies as a community and public artist. Lori has completed several successful pieces in Roseville including work with Arts Roseville, the Roseville Library and Roseville Area Schools.

As a multiracial (African American, Native American - Mississippi band of Choctaw, and Caucasian) woman, Lori brings a unique voice and perspective to public art that has not always been represented. Lori Greene


Mosaic artist and sculptor, Lori Greene, identifies as a community and public artist. She works with and for the community, and has over twenty years of experience making outdoor public art mosaics. Lori is well-known for creating pieces about healing and recovering from trauma. She believes the process of making art is healing, and she believes there is power in working together to create a work of art and see it through to the finished piece. She works with intention, with an open heart, and with love. Her process involves listening, feeling, researching, and of course the building of the mosaic. It is a long process, but it is a labor of love.

As a multiracial (African American, Native American- Mississippi band of Choctaw, and Caucasian) woman, Lori brings a unique voice and perspective to public art that has not always been represented. Her identity as a woman of color is very visible in her work, as demonstrated through the narratives of her pieces and the people who are represented in them. Lori's work is bold, colorful, and unapologetic. Patterns, symbols, and motifs reflecting her intersecting cultural identities interweave themselves throughout her works like a visual language. 





Center

Background:

On January 30, 2023 the Parks and Recreation Commission met with the City Council to discuss their work from 2022, their name recommendation for Pocahontas Park and some priorities for 2023. As part of the meeting, the Council passed a motion to change the name of Pocahontas Park to Keya Park, develop a land acknowledgment and implement educational elements in the park. At the time of packet publication, minutes are not available. If minutes from the joint meeting are available prior to the Commission meeting, they will be emailed to the Commission and attached as a bench handout.

Requested Commission Action:

Discuss the joint meeting and any possible next steps related to items that were discussed at the meeting.

404 Councilmember Strahan asked if there will be street parking restrictions in this area 405 during the time of the project. 406 407 Mr. Samuel indicated there will be traffic control with some lanes closed with some 408 restriction to street parking. He indicated Xcel will be working with the Public 409 Works Department on this project. 410 411 Mayor Roe assumed this is a rolling project from one end to the other. 412 413 Mr. Samuel explained replacing these types of structures is kind of new concept and is different than replacing wood structures. He thought the end name for the park was excellent and he sup-443 ported that for all of the reasons given by the Commission. 444 445 Councilmember Etten concurred and thanked the Commission for all the work and 446 staff for the last couple of years work. He would be in absolute support of signage 447 with an educational piece around the history of Dakota land and peoples as a part

448 of this name change and an opportunity for the City to do a little bit more. He 449 encouraged that to be a piece of this long term. 450 451 Councilmember Schroeder echoed the feedback and indicated she actually has 452 watched some of the meetings and how frankly the Commissioners engage with 453 each other, noting there was some great dialogue with tough questions. She stated 454 it was engaging with the community and getting some advice on people who could 455 really shed some light on this, as well as looking in on their own group and talking 456 through what was learned. She thought the process was well done and she would 457 support the suggestions of the Commission. 458 459 Councilmember Strahan indicated she was impressed with the length and hard work 460 being done on this project. She would defer to the Native communities to see what would be most appropriate for the acknowledgement on site so it acknowledges 461 462 how they relate to the land. She was fully supportive of the proposed name. 463 464 Mayor Roe concurred and thought the City might even think about more broadly 465 throughout the park system acknowledgement both of the history of the Dakota 466 presence on all of the land in Roseville that ties into the natural spaces and entire 467 park system. He noted it might be a natural thing to have everywhere as well as the 468 opportunity for a consistent theme of education. He indicated it is easy to support 469 a recommendation when the Council knows what has gone into it and sees all of 470 the work that has been done as well as the superb engagement by the Parks and 471 Recreation staff and department in terms of making sure that decisions are fully 472 informed by and influenced by the people involved. 473 474 Strahan made, Etten seconded, approving the Pocahontas Park name change to 475 Keya Park as well as the recommendation related to education and looking at a land 476 acknowledgement. 477 478 Roll Call 479 Aves: Etten, Schroeder, Groff, Strahan, and Roe. 480 Navs: None. 481 482 Commissioner Matts-Benson reviewed the 2023 Parks and Recreation priorities 483 with the City Council. 484 485 Mayor Roe thanked the Parks Commission for the presentations and looked forward 486 to future projects coming forward to the City Council. 487 488 Vice-Chair Hoag indicated he will be terming out at the end of March and thanked 489 the City Council for his time on the Parks and Recreation Commission. 490 491 d. We will start our day at the Landmark Center in St. Paul and meet our costumed Gangster Tour Guide for a 90-minute tour. Imagine that you're living in St. Paul's tumultuous era of prohibition and gangsters. Your Gangster Guide will enhance the experience as they adopt the personae of the infamous gangsters who resided in St. Paul during the 1930s and whose path took them (perhaps unwillingly) into the Federal Court House (now Landmark Center). Guides tell of their "lives as gangsters" and how the criminal justice system functioned during that era. Told with humor, accuracy and liveliness, this tour educates about the life and times of people like "Ma" Barker, Alvin "Creepy" Karpis, John Dillinger and his moll Evelyn Freschette, and more. Many of them were held in the third floor Detention Room, they were tried in Courtroom 317, or faced down J. Edgar Hoover's G-men on the front steps.

Our next stop is a guided tour of the St. Paul Cathedral. The Cathedral is recognized as a historical landmark. The prominent building sits on Cathedral Hill overlooking downtown St. Paul and features a distinctive copper-clad dome. It is the third largest completed church in the United States, and the fourth tallest. It is dedicated to Paul the Apostle, who is also the namesake of the City of St. Paul. The current building opened in 1915 as the fourth cathedral of the archdiocese to bear this name. The interior is illuminated by twenty-four stained glass windows featuring angelic choirs. The building was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1974. After the tour, we can visit the space at own pace, and stop by gift Kiosks to purchase a memento of your visit.

GUIDELINES TO ROSEVILLE'S COMMUNITY GARDENS AT OASIS PARK

Roseville Parks and Recreation provides the Oasis Park Community Gardens for the pleasure of the gardening public. Plots are reserved first for returning Roseville residents, after whom all remaining garden plots will be available to any adult, resident or non-resident, on a first come, first served basis.

To ensure a quality experience for all, the following guidelines have been established:

- 1) The gardening season runs from approximately May 1st October 31st. The exact opening dates and tilling schedule depend upon weather conditions.
- 2) Plots are available in two sizes: single plot is 15' x 20', and a double plot is 15' x 40'. Plots will be marked prior to the start of the gardening season. Maximum of one double plot per household, please.
- 3) Keep your plot as weed free as possible, utilizing cultivation and mulching methods. **This includes the borders of your plot!** A supply of compost will be provided by the city, for use in the gardens. Use of human waste, chemical herbicides and pesticides is strictly prohibited. **Planting on the compost piles is also completely prohibited!**
- 4) Growing illegal plant materials, or produce intended for sale, is NOT permitted.
- 5) Please use designated walkways to access plots. Walkways may be mulched with grass, leaves, straw..
- 6) Non-organic waste (cans, bottles and plastic containers) should be placed in the trash barrels provided. Organic waste and rocks should be placed in the designated area.
- 7) Four watering stations are provided. Please limit watering to one hour, per plot, per day. **Do not** leave plots unattended while watering.
- 8) All produce, plant materials, weeds, stakes, wires, etc. must be removed by November 1st to allow for fall cultivation. Any materials left after November 1st will be removed by City staff and disposed of. Water is shut off approximately Oct 15th weather dependent.
- 9) Cars must be kept on the paved parking area. Pets must be leashed at all times, as in all other city parks.
- 10) The city assumes no responsibility for personal injury, vandalism or loss of produce from the gardens
- 11) Please be courteous and helpful to your fellow gardeners.
- 12) If you decide you cannot use your produce, please contact the Community Gardens Coordinator and we will attempt to make arrangements for it (i.e., food shelf).
- 13) If you decide you will not be planting, or are unable to continue with your plot, please call the Community Gardens Coordinator to let us know. Garden plots that are not planted by June 1st each year will be considered forfeited, and will be made available to another gardener. Any exceptions to this rule must be approved by the Community Gardens Coordinator.
- Failure to comply with these guidelines will result in the forfeiture of the garden plot, and the inability to reserve future garden plots.
