## WHAT'S WRONG WITH THIS PICTURE?

A State employee in the Capitol complex habitually parked in the free customer parking lot of a nearby retail establishment (which had "customers only" signs in full view.) After some months, he found a letter from the business on his windshield, notifying him that his car would be towed if it were found there again. In a fit of anger, he dashed off an emotional and profane response to the company manager, using his department's letterhead and envelope.

In this instance, a public employee thought that his government job entitled him to certain "perks" or status.

- Was this ethical?
- When can you explicitly use your job with the City to wield influence in a public forum?

Certainly you have First Amendment rights to voice your opinion, engage in political activity, or to give testimony on issues of public concern. But in any of these ventures, unless the City Council or other legitimate authority has expressly appointed you as a spokesperson, you must declare that you speak **only** as a private citizen, making it crystal clear that you do **not** represent any elected or appointed government official, any agency or commission.
