#### Elijah Sailer-Haugland, 1st Place Grade 8, Gary Schwingle/Jeff Bibeau Roseville Area Middle School

People encounter many different kinds of stereotypes. It does not matter who you are or where you are from, you probably have been stereotyped or have stereotyped others at one point in your life. Many stereotypes can impact one person, or a group of people like a family. One way to examine how stereotypes impact families is through personal stories. By sharing mine, I will demonstrate a real life example of stereotypes and their negative impact on peoples lives. For example, stereotypes involving disabilities, sexual orientation, and race can influence the way families are treated, and even damage their human rights.

I know first hand how it can feel to be stereotyped because of a disability. Often people make assumptions about disabilities that are not true. When people see that someone has a disability such as Cerebral Palsy, they often think the differently abled person can not walk and talk correctly or possibly not at all. I know that is not true. I have a disability called Cerebral Palsy which affects the way I walk and talk. Cerebral Palsy is condition that affects thousands of babies and children. The word "cerebral" means having to do with the brain. The word "palsy" means a weakness in the way someone moves their body. Because someone can not walk or talk the same way as others, sometimes they are perceived as slow, dumb, or stupid, but physical disability is not the same as cognitive disability. This is similar to how some people talk louder to blind people, when blindness doesn't affect hearing. The disabled person is made to feel less than normal.

Human rights violations can sometimes be hidden. This is often true with Article 1: Right to Equality from the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR). Often people with disabilities are denied the "Right to Equality" because someone else assumes we are "less important". For example, when I am trying join in with my friends and they are running off, I can not keep up with them because I run a little slower. My friends assume that I am not interested in participating because they think the activity will be too hard for me, they think I am too slow to be involved. This is often a stereotype of all people with disabilities. This violates Article 1 of the UDHR. It might not be obvious, but my human rights are being

restricted because my friends are not treating me in the same way and are acting in an unfriendly manner.

Families like mine around the world are being treated unfairly just because someone in the family is gay. My family has two gay parents, and they are often judged for being gay and having a family. Some people think that gay couples should not be able to have a family. These people are believing a "gay is unhealthy" stereotype. They think gay people should not be allowed to have kids because it may make the kids gay. The stereotype somehow assumes that 2 gay parents could not possibly be as good as two straight parents. I personally know this to be false. My parents care deeply about my brother and I and are very loving and sometimes strict, just like other parents. In other words, our family is pretty similar to all the other families in the neighborhood. We are similar even when we are unfairly teased.

Even though gay families are very similar to other families they are often denied the same human rights. For example, until this summer, my dads were not allowed to get married. This violates Article 16: Right to Marriage and Family from the UDHR. It states that everyone has the right to marry and have a family. Now that my dads are married, and federal laws have been changed by the Supreme Court, our family is protected by over 1,100 laws. The purpose of the constitution is to protect human rights. The government should never use the Bill of Rights to deny our freedom. In the Bill of Rights, Amendment IX states that "certain rights shall not be construed to deny or disparage others". Fortunately, my family is protected by the Minnesota

Human Rights Act (MHRA) and new marriage laws. However, many of my friends and their families who live in other states still do not have the same Human Rights as we do.

Stereotypes are often linked to race. People make an assumption about an entire group of people just based on their skin color. Sometimes people who have never met me or my family judge us by our race. This happens to many families and can limit their rights. My brother and I are Asian; we were born in China. My parents are caucasian. Some people do not like to see mixed race families as they think it is wrong simply due to stereotypes. This can lead to misunderstandings or inappropriate questions about our

family. There are many stereotypes about Asians. People think Asians are good at math. This sounds positive, but sometimes it can create unreasonable expectations for an Asian person that is not good at math. Each of us performs differently at math because of our brain differences, and our education not race.

Stereotypes can have a huge impact on people of color. Often we get lumped together as a group instead of being seen as an individual. This can result in people making negative assumptions about us based on their misunderstanding of an entire race. The result of this can be seen when groups of people are harassed or discriminated against in schools, jobs, and housing. Thankfully the (MHRA) protects people that have specific characteristics such as race. There are 13 protected classes in the MHRA. Under MHRA, Asians are protected against discrimination in employment, housing, education, and business.

As you can see through the stories I have shared, my family has experienced first hand the issues of stereotyping and their impact on human rights. Even though our family sometimes faces misunderstanding because of stereotypes involving race, disabilities, and sexual orientation, we are fortunate to live in a country where we are protected by the Bill of Rights, as well as many Human Rights Laws and Declarations. These are just three of the many stereotypes in the world. We can eliminate them by speaking up and sharing our stories. By doing so, we break down misunderstandings of each other and start to protect each others human rights.

#### Beyond the Law

In our society there are great divides, both of socio-economic class and race. Both inequalities and tensions between different groups of people spring from and are reinforced by our own stereotypes and prejudices. By making stereotypes and forming prejudices towards groups of people, we create and perpetuate cycles of violence and poverty, as well as prevent ourselves from developing nondiscriminatory and effective attitudes to fix these problems in our community.

We see one example of this when looking at the treatment of African Americans in our legal system. It has now been 150 years since Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation and 48 since Jim Crow was abolished, but discrimination against African Americans lives on. According to the Bureau of Justice Statistics, one in three black men can expect to go to prison in their lifetime. Because 11 states have laws saying that people with past felony convictions are not allowed to vote, 13% of African American men can't vote in America. Through discrimination in the justice system, the USA violates articles six, seven and twenty-one of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. These articles state that everyone should be treated equally before the law everywhere, and everyone should have the right to engage in politics by voting or running for office. When we disproportionately lock up African-American men and prevent them from being involved in local, statewide and national government, we cripple black communities, and without stable role models we can trap youth in the cycle of poverty.

This prejudice against people of color arises from discomfort. Difference is scary to people; humans don't like for their beliefs about society to be challenged. For many people it is easier to think that all African American young men wear their pants down and their sweatshirt hoods up. This

appearance, this fraction of an identity, is associated with crime and fear and inner-city grime, and society doesn't want to think that our life could be like that. Judging people on our false preconceptions has tragic consequences. A recent reminder of this was the death of Trayvon Martin and the subsequent trial of George Zimmerman, when a teenager was killed just because he looked "suspicious".

The instinctual reaction to what we perceive as "dangerous" has not taken rights away from African Americans only, though. The terrorist bombings of the World Trade Centers in I2001 sparked widespread distrust of Middle-Eastern Americans and people of Islam faith. Many people believe the stereotype that all Muslims or all Middle Eastern-Americans are terrorists. Twelve years later we have built our memorials and mourned our dead, but we have no more resolved our aggression towards Muslim people than we have brought back our beloved friends and family.

In the aftermath of 9/11, airline security was tighter than ever, and this spawned a new era of racial profiling. Innocent citizens of the United States were pulled over, tracked, searched and frisked just because they looked Arab, and this degrading treatment continues. My family sponsors a Syrian student, Farah, who attends Macalester College, and she has told me stories of her experience traveling across the border to Mexico while attending United World College last year. As the teacher presented the students' passports, from countries all over the world, the border guard asked for "the Syrian".

Farah was questioned for an hour, because of her homeland. We may like to imagine this type of discrimination is in our past, but this American assumption of guilt by association is a fact of life for some people and scares them out of their Right to Free Movement in and out of the Country (UDHR, Article 13).

This persecution is not compatible with human dignity. By listening in on phone calls, frisking people on the streets and interrogations without legitimate cause for suspicion, we use fear as a tool to

control travel, international communication, public assembly, standards of education and the demographics in certain occupational fields. This blatant discrimination has been decreed as unjust on a state, national and international scale, being denounced in the core of the Minnesota Human Rights Act, Amendment IV of the Bill of Rights, and Article 30 of the UDHR, which says "...no society, no human being, should act in such a way as to destroy the hrights which you have just been reading about". Even though our law and policy is no longer blatantly discriminatory, the public attitude often overrules and our mindset is prejudiced.

This discrimination and fear is overwhelming our society and controlling our behaviors. In order to fix our mistakes we must change the instinctual reactions, and lead people to recognize the similarities between "them" and "us". When we impose stereotypes on people we deny them their right of individuality, and limit their ability to develop into a full and complete member of society. As Article 29 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights states, "The law should guarantee human rights. It should allow everyone to respect others and be respected." In Minnesota the people that enforce these laws prevent us from moving forward. Only when all people can see one another as an individuals, free of stereotypes and group prejudices, will we achieve equality under the law and the society that all people deserve.

#### Humans Rights Essay

Stereotypes have turned our society into an oppressing, horrifying monster. It is pulling our country apart and disrupting human rights. The voices of the victims are not being heard and because of that they are becoming afraid, when they shouldn't be. Americans are only those who are White, the poor are less valuable than the rich, and Mexican illegal immigrants are villainous are only some of the stereotypes, though, they play an important role, that have turned the society into what it is today.

If you are American, you are expected to have an appearance similar to White people and speak English just like them. If not, you are most likely to not receive the same services as those who do look or speak like "Americans". It sounds ridiculous that this kind of discrimination is still going on today, even after all the laws that have been made to stop it. But there are many people who experience this daily at work, stores, and through phone calls with businesses. Last year, during World of Cultures class, we saw a video in which a person was investigating this topic. He called a company who sold houses and using a different accent each time and asked if one of the houses on their list was still available. The lady on the other side of the phone said yes only when he spoke fluent English.

Another example, is my personal experiences. Although, my mother has lived in the United States for several years, she still has an accent when she speaks English. My mother comes from Mexico, and she does not look like a White person at all. My father is the same, although, his English is a bit better. When we need assistance at a store, once in a while there are employees who deny their help to us just because of the way we look and speak. They usually don't let us finish asking for their help, instead they act very rude and make up excuses and leave right away. Then, later, we see them helping other customers who just happen to look "American".

Everyone makes the stereotype that Americans are only those who look and speak like White people. It is discriminating those who do not look or speak like that. It is also offending their race, skin color, and national origin, which is against the Human Rights Article 2 and the Minnesota Human Rights Act.

Another stereotype made frequently is that the poor are less valuable as a person than those who are rich. I will tell you they are completely wrong. How much money you have or how much you own will never determine how valuable you are as a person. I strongly believe we are all important and special in our own way. Though, there are people like those who make this stereotype that think differently than I do. I agree with Article 19 of the Human Rights and Amendment I of the Bill of Rights, that it is their right to opinion and to say what they'd like and not be stopped. But it is not their right to treat them as if they weren't as good as others. We see many examples of this on the news where people in desperate need of money, whom are usually poor, are being taken advantage of and paid very little for their job.

As long as they have a job, some may say that it's not a big deal. Unless you ever listen and connect with those below the poverty line or are below it yourself, you won't know what really goes on. People below the poverty line have the same needs as the rest of us. They need to pay for where they live, they need to buy food for their families, and they also need clothes. They have to work harder than others to afford all their necessities and support their whole family. For them, having to work hard and not getting paid enough is extremely a big deal. Even though there are many organizations that benefit the poor in the United States, because of The stereotype that the poor are less valuable as a person than the rich, most of the society is still turning their backs to those who are poor. Article 1 in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights says that when children are born they are free and each should be treated in the same way:

they have reason and conscience and should act towards one another in a friendly manner. Rather than helping them, the society is ignoring and not treating them equally. This stereotype is also going against Article 2 in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights because it is discriminating those who own less.

The final stereotype is that Mexican illegal immigrants are villainous. They sneak into the United States and hide from the law to not get caught. Their intentions are misunderstood by the society so they are thought to be bad. But I think that the people of this country are forgetting that we are all immigrants from other places who came for the similar reasons. We need to remember how and why we are here, and have empathy for these people who are just like us. Mexican illegal immigrants are very hard working people. The United States takes advantage of this by taking a certain percentage of their paychecks because they do not have citizenship. Their hard work is helping the economy raise, which is what the country needs right now. Even though the government knows this, they are still trying to kick them all out because of the stereotype that is made about them. Police officers make up excuses to be able to stop Mexicans to find out if they are illegally here or not. Most of the Mexican illegal immigrants have no license, so if they are stopped they can be sent to the police station and straight to U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services.

Although, there are illegal immigrants who are caught because of crimes they committed, it does not include all of them. Some are send back to Mexico because of police officers who make up excuses. For the government, it may be marked as one less illegal immigrant they have to take care of, but it only adds to the list of children in the United States without their parent. More and more children of Mexican illegal immigrants who are taken away and send back to Mexico are being left with uncles, aunts, or friends of the family. These children are Americans that are part

of our communities; still the government is not considering the struggles they have to go through when their families are separated.

A year ago, my younger brother and I almost became like these children. My father was a Mexican illegal immigrant; three days before Christmas Day at 6:40 a.m. the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services came to our home and arrested my father. Twenty-four hours passed before we got to talk to him through a phone call. He told us that they were apparently reinvestigating the car accident he was responsible for 12 years ago, but that they would release him and not send him to Mexico if we paid a fee of 10,000 dollars. Though, we knew that my father had already completed all his penalties for the accident, we still paid. My family isn't rich so it took us a few days to collect all that money. But since it was the holidays, it took a whole week before my father was released. By then Christmas had passed, not having my whole family together during that time was one of the worst things I have ever experienced. I had to make myself strong, though, inside I felt like I was going to burst into tears any moment, and help my mother with everything that had to be done so my father could come home. I can't imagine how children who don't have their parents right now are able to keep going to school and continue with their lives.

This stereotype is causing Mexican illegal immigrants to not be able to become citizens of the United States. When in Article 15 of the Human Rights it clearly states that you have the right to belong to a country and nobody can prevent you, without a good reason, from belonging to a country if you wish. It is also causing families to be separated from one another. Human Rights Article 16 includes the government of your country should protect your family and its members. Even though, Mexican illegal immigrants are not Citizens of the United States, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights still apply to

them.

As you can see, stereotypes have already turned our society into an oppressing horrifying monster. It is shown through the three stereotypes of Americans are only White people, the poor are less valuable as a person than the rich, and all Mexican illegal immigrants are villainous. The society does not realize that the stereotypes we make are causing actions that are destroying the Human Rights. More importantly, the act of destroying the Human Rights is violating Article 30 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. That is how stereotypes affect our society and how they damage human rights.

#### Human Rights Essay

When I was in first grade I was pulled aside and asked if I could speak English and if my parents had gone to school. Just because of my last name and I was a minority, I was picked out of among other kids in my class and was asked that question. Now think for a moment and put yourself in my shoes; how would you feel being stereotyped and profiled by another people because they think you are different you are not capable of doing anything. As you reflect on this thought, the rest of my paper talks about how, many people get racially profiled and they just don't know about it. What is the definition of stereotyping? A stereotype is a widely held but fixed and oversimplified image or idea of a particular type of person or thing. Why do people stereotype? Well there are any answers to that question but for me I still can't answer that question to you if you asked me today. But many people are constantly stereotyping others for much reason that is what causes racial discrimination and false information. Stereotyping hurts us as human being and deprives us of our human rights.

But many people have been stereotyped because of their race or accent. It always happens to my mom when she meets new people; when she starts talking them start asking her where she comes, what her nationality. Sometimes people ask if she is able speak English and if need to go to an ELL class (English language learning). That is just because of her Kenyan accent, she always tells people that English is her third language, (you should give credit for learning knowing three languages fluently). I have to admit that I have stereotyped people, but now I realize that I am going against their Human Rights (Article 2: Freedom from discrimination). Many people encounter this issue every single day and

that's wrong.

My mom told that being black women will always be hard because I would have to work 2 times harder because I am a women and 3 times harder because I am black. Another thing my mother told me is there will always be people that will bring you down and say because you are black you will always be a static. Time after time I came across the discrimination from other peers and adults. The way they treated me and put me down it made it harder to do my work and have a good life. These people made it harder for me to be recognized as a person this hurt, Human Rights Article 6: Right to recognition as a person before the law. Now I felt like I was worthless, I felt like nobody cared about me and nobody really liked me for me. But I came to find me asking myself did my life really have any meaning. But the two things my mother told always went through my mind.

I had a teacher that didn't really like me, I don't know why but she didn't like me. Throughout the first half of school she would never answer my question she would always say, "Ask your partner" but when my partner would come up to her with the same question, she would answer the question. When we had to do a paper I would never get 100% on a paper there would have to be one mistake I made, this damaged my Human Right (Article 1: Right to Equality). This kept on going; I got so stress and it started to affect my grades. My parents started noticing the effects of what was happening at school and they didn't like what there were seeing. My parents had to tackle this issue and they had to tackle it fast; it started to affect my life outside of school. My mom talk to me about how people will tell you things to make you feel bad and you just have to prove them wrong. You got to kill them with kindness; ignore there discrimination just show them that you are just like them, HUMAN!

The things my mom told stuck with until I went back to after Christmas break. So throughout

the rest of the school year I proved that teacher that even though I am black I am capable of doing work as hard and as good as everyone else. So let's go back to the beginning paragraph and let's picture our self in first grade now. How do you think would handle the situation now after to reading this paper? Well I could answer this question for you but that won't help you. But one I can tell you stereotypes is everywhere and we as people should prove others who stereotype that they are wrong by our actions. There is quote that always a stick with me every day I go to school; whatever is popular is not always right and whatever is right is popular-Albert Einstein.

#### Our Imperfect Society

There are problems everywhere. Problems with poverty or the economy. People know about those and they care about those but they often overlook the biggest problems that are sitting right in front of us. These kinds of issues are harder to see and easier to ignore just because some people don't see the harm in them; stereotypes and prejudice. Judging people before you even know their first names. Damaging the Human Rights has become some Americans first nature because most of the time they don't even know they are doing it. Stereotypes have been wired into their brain by society and they don't know a way around it. Everyday I see stereotypes everywhere I go, some people wouldn't give it a second glance but I notice.

I wake up in the morning to my mom shaking me awake.

"It's time for school honey." she says "I've made you your breakfast."

Mom makes me breakfast every morning along with all the other house work she does. She doesn't work to make money in the city like dad. The house is always tidy and clean thanks to her constantly cleaning it. Mom tells me all the time how she wished she could contribute to the family financially and not make dad do all the work, but she also knows how much we need her here. Personally I think that if mom wants to work she should, it doesn't matter that she's not the man of the house. At school we learned that the Minnesota Human Rights Act says that employment is open to all genders so I don't know what's keeping mom from going out and getting a job. She's a really hard worker so I guess she must just feel it's her job to stay home and be bored all day. I don't understand why.

I'm now on my way walking to school. It's not very eventful until I see a car way up ahead of me speeding super fast! Thankfully a policeman pulls them over, my curiosity gets the best of me and I run up to see what's going on. There are two people in the car probably friends one is a white man and one's black. The white one was driving however the cop seems more interested in the other guy. Shouldn't the one breaking the law get in trouble? The policeman is asking the black man to get out of the car he sounds angry to, I don't remember seeing the black man do anything wrong. He seems to know this to because he starts telling the police officer that he doesn't have to get out of the car. I wouldn't do that if I were him, why would you want to make a police officer mad? He could arrest you! I'm not very smart though the man must know more than me because he starts saying stuff about how he has rights and that the 4th amendment says he doesn't have to let the officer check anything on him unless it was him who broke the law. In that case he made the right choice to stand up for himself, the police officer had no reason to think he had done anything wrong. He is the same as everyone else.

Oops! I stayed and watched that scene for too long I barely made it to school on time.

Article 19 in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights says they have the right to express themselves how they want. Sure that goes for the bullies too but the right shouldn't be used to hurt others, just to show people what you like. I hope the people who stand outside the school don't take the mean words to heart because I know what good people they are.

We all see people in our own way and that's what makes the world so great. Different ideas and purposes with each new person you meet makes life really interesting. Getting to know them is even more fun hearing their stories, celebrating their accomplishments, and learning from their mistakes. When you start to think something about someone before you take the chance to listen to them, then that's where the problem starts. Every person on the planet has something they can contribute to us. Women all around the world are great scientist, lawyers, and doctors. People of all races are volunteering and helping our community. People everywhere are expressing themselves to show what they care about and work for. Society is beautiful when you look at all the great things happening in it and as long as we stop telling people what's right and wrong about them, it can stay a wonderful place. People everywhere need to take a second to see that they are only responsible for themselves. ### **Human Rights Essay**

Next time really think about whether you'll be the person that others want you to be or will you be what the world needs.

# **Stereotyping Women**

"A women is the full circle. Within her is the power to create, nurture and transform."

- Diane Mariechild.

Women have empowered and persevered since the beginning of time. Females have been treated as 2<sup>nd</sup> class citizens since the beginning of time. Women have been stereotyped as uneducated, not powerful and not able to hold their own since the beginning of time. No female discrimination breakthrough has been made since the beginning of time. Due to the social construction of reality men have not let women reach their full potential and break through the glass ceiling.

"You have the right to profess your religion freely, to change it, and to practice it either on your own or with other people." – Human Right Article 18.

In religion female discrimination is opprobrious. Catholic women cannot become priests, Muslim women are not eligible to lead prayers in numberless mosques. Scarcely any female rabbis are top of class A synagogues. Tibetan Buddhism has yet to thoroughly appoint a female to their branch. It is highly disappointing knowing how many people stereotype women as not powerful leaders. It is also disconsolate to know the uttermost of humanity has yet to comprehend the great deal of religious female discrimination and to recognize their violation of Human Right Article 18.

"You have the right to take part in your country's political affairs by either belonging

to the government yourself or by choosing politicians who have the same ideas as you. You should get a vote and all votes should be equal." - Human Right Article 21.

Female politicians have been treated in various degrading ways throughout the years. Of course the most recognizable discrimination shown in politics is that there has yet to be a female president of the United States of America. Some might say that the argument for this would be that only two women have ever run for President of the United States of America. If only two women have ever had enough courage to endeavor to take the occupation of this highly exceptional job, that means men are just running the female society farther and farther away from success. Women only hold twenty percent of the Senate seats, eighteen percent of seats in the house and twenty three percent of state level offices. If women could be more involved in politics they would, yet we are still resented those opportunities and resented to be treated as Human Right Article 21 states.

"You have the right to work, to be free to choose your work, to get a salary which allows you to support your family. If a man and a woman do the same work, they should get the same pay." - Human Right Article 23.

There are numerous ways that females are discriminated against financially. Only sixteen percent of U.S companies have paid maternity leave for women, the United States is the only developed country where paid maternity leave is not enforced by law. Out of the 500 CEO's on CEO's of Fortune 500 companies list, only four percent are women. Women could not even obtain credit cards in their own name until 1974 when the Equal Credit Opportunity Act was passed, 26 years after the Universal Declaration of Human Rights was declared by the United Nations. These discriminatory actions clearly show how humanity stereotypes women as not being responsible and not being as capable of leadership as men. The majority of our society has yet to realize the discriminatory actions they possess and their

violation of Human Right Article 23.

Through carrying on listening and watching these degrading treatment towards women it's time for someone to put their foot down. Since the beginning of time we have unfortunately lived in this community where stereotyping one another and treating women and each other poorly has become acceptable. Its now time for that to be over, we have carried on with our past too long, its time we start learning from our past instead of living with it. Our Human Rights are here to protect us from all of these things that now are supposedly acceptable in today's world, millions are people around the world are not even aware they have Human Rights or what they are. I am here to change that, I am here to help educate others, I am here to stop the violations and the stereotypes, are you with me?

#### Race, Homosexuality, and Immigrants

Article one of the <u>Universal Declaration of Human Rights</u> states that you should have the right to equality. Yet in the United States, one of the founding countries of the United Nations, you can still get stopped by the police because of your race, and denied housing, healthcare or an education because of your sexual orientation or your national origin. There is never a reason to violate someone else's human rights, so why do things like this happen?

Many ignorant people think all blacks are criminals, and unfortunately some segments of our society have acted on that stereotype. According to a 2003 University of Minnesota report to the state legislature, blacks are more likely to be stopped for racial profiling, which means a police officer can pull you over because you have the same race as the person they think committed a crime. And in states with the death penalty, if the victim is white, black defendants are three times more likely to be put to death than if the defendant is white. The Minnesota Human Rights Act should protect blacks from this, but it still happens. Stereotypes may be harmless if you never act upon them, but when you do they can create racial discrimination which violates article two of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights.

Many people believe in harmful stereotypes about homosexuals. For example, they might believe gay men carry diseases or that homosexuals are nefarious. Because of these stereotypes, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services will not allow blood banks to accept any blood from gay men, even though most medical experts are open to it. Sometimes people don't want to house homosexuals thinking that it would be immoral and disgusting, which would imply homosexuals are below humans -- like pets banned from apartments. But homosexuals are entitled to their right for

equality before law. Remember that just because you believe in something, doesn't make it true.

Finally, despite a common stereotype, not all immigrants come to the U.S. illegally to steal our jobs. If they get jobs here, they are often the ones that we don't want to do, and they can't get very good jobs because some states have laws that make it difficult for them to receive an education. In the Fourth Amendment of the Bill of Rights, it claims that someone cannot search you without a good reason, and yet in some southern states police can ask someone for proof that they are a U.S. citizen based on their skin color. If they don't have an ID, the U.S. can send them back to where they came from, even if that means sending them back to a place with a raging drug war. That doesn't sound like the land of the free. So before you act on a preconceived idea, look at it through your victim's eyes first.

As for the blacks who have been discriminated against for their race, the homosexuals who still aren't completely accepted in our society, and the other thousands of immigrants like me who came here legally, don't stereotype us for who we are. We are all still human and we have our rights. And you never know, the blacks, homosexuals and immigrants might create the laws in the future.

#### Human Rights Essay

Do you embrace your diversity? Your gender? Your race? Religion? Culture? You should. You should be able to take pride in in all those things. Those things that make you who you are. You should be able to stand up tall and say who you are with confidence, without fear of someone stripping you of that pride or questioning your equality. But you can't. Not right now, in this society. Because there are, unfortunately, vast amounts of prejudice holding you down, burdening you. Stereotypes defy our human rights and injure and damage our mental being and pride of who we are. All Middle-Eastern people are terrorists, people who are smart are nerds, women can't play sports, these particular stereotypes just isn't right to society, and therefore, I would like to elaborate in them, so you, the reader, can understand and see from the victim's perspective.

It's true that Middle- Eastern people have done acts of harm against us, and we feel constantly threatened, I understand, but the entire race shouldn't be blamed for a certain group's doing. Middle- Eastern people can't even go out in public without someone being suspicious of them for terrorist acts. And if they want to travel somewhere or has their presence at an airport, the security take unnecessary safety precautions that doesn't apply to other civilians. And Middle-Eastern people can't help but feel insulted for their race. They can't help but feel that we are criticizing them for their skin color. They can't help but feel disgrace upon their own blood and family. No one should ever experience that, as human beings, we have to look out for each other. We should never make someone feel that way and judge someone just by his/her skin color.

If we do, we are violating *Human Rights Article #12: No one shall be subjected to attacks* on his honor and reputation. We have no right to discriminate someone just by his or her exterior appearance. Including Middle-Eastern people, because they have as much reason and right to be anywhere as you.

Being intelligent and successful in school is good. Good grades. Good education, Good future. So, why are we calling those who are exceedingly smart, such hurtful names, such as "nerd" or "loser"? Is it jealousy? Or delight of being cruel? Whatever it is, bright students are under assumption that they are "nerds" and that they are "uncool". without even knowing them. In school, they are avoided and shunned. They were rejected in society before they could even get a chance to prove themselves friend-worthy or normal. They didn't have a say in any of these assumptions. Instead, they stay quiet and accept the fact that because they are clever and too sharp-witted, the school community has turned their backs on them for no good reason and that they are labeled as the "geeks" of the school". This damages several human rights. Like *Human Rights Article* #29: Everyone has duties to the community in which alone the free and full development of his/her own personality... purpose of securing due recognition and respect for the rights and freedoms of others and of meeting the just requirements of morality, public order and the general welfare in a democratic society. If someone were to be exceedingly intelligent, shouldn't we praise him/her, instead of labeling him or her such low names?

In the past, women have overcome many struggles and earned themselves rights and freedom, but even now, they aren't treated very equally. The stereotype of how "women are no good at sports" is a perfect example of modern sexism. Half of our entire populations are women. We gained our rights and now we are close to standing on equal

footing as men. Though, this false stereotype has been degrading our confidence in physical ability. True is the fact that women are less famous at sports than men (opinion), but that doesn't mean that we absolutely have no ability to be able to do so. But since we live in a society where certain sports are unisex and certain sports are expected to be "men only", we do not have the courage to do something that society has commented to be "odd" and "out of place". If we do, we will be teased and insulted until we prove to be just as physically talented as men. This lowers our self-esteem and strips us of our conviction of our physical ability, and therefore will leave us embarrassed of doing the sports or activities that we want to do and stick to the make-up and princesses. Anyone who discriminates women for playing in sports is damaging her human rights. Human Rights Article #27: Everyone has the right freely to participate in the cultural life of the community, to enjoy the arts and to share in scientific advancement and its benefits. And to deprive women of their confidence in sports and athletic ability is an act of sexism.

Stereotypes diminish our rights as humans. But we can't really stop them. They're like an inevitable plague. And no one really has a cure. But, there are organizations out there that try their best to preserve our rights and try to prevent them from being absolutely broken. Such as the Minnesota Human Rights Act (MHRA) who enforces the Bill of Rights (BOR) and the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR) and follows their written text, which was all establish to ensure humanity and it's success. Though the fact that the stereotypes that all Middle-Eastern people are terrorists, intelligent students are "nerds", and women aren't good at sports is quickly diminishing my hope for a prejudice-free society where all human rights are respected and obeyed. And you, the reader who has read my point of view as a victim, have something to think

about. How do stereotypes affect our society and how do they damage human rights? I think that stereotypes are really hurtful and they negatively affect our society and human rights by damaging it and giving the impression of doubt in our government. But I also think that there are a lot of people out there who are trying their utmost best to protect our human rights and cease stereotypes and hopefully, someday we'll eventually reach our dream society.

#### AGREEMENT

This Agreement is made this \_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_\_, 2014, between City of Roseville, Ramsey County, Minnesota, ("City") and Pyrotechnic Display, Inc, 9405 River Road SE, Clear Lake, Minnesota, ("Contractor").

#### WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the City desires to provide a fireworks display for the 4<sup>th</sup> of July; and

WHEREAS, the Contractor is capable of fulfilling this need by rendering pyrotechnic expertise;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the terms and conditions expressed herein, the parties agree as follows:

#### I. DUTIES OF THE CONTRACTOR

- 1. The Contractor for and in consideration of the sum of Thirteen Thousand Dollars (\$13,000.00), including tax, to be paid hereinafter set forth, agrees to furnish the City one fireworks display, and by this reference made a part hereof, including the services of the Contractor's expert operators to be in full charge and to fire said display to be given on the evening of July 4, 2014, at Central Park, located in Roseville, Ramsey County, Minnesota, weather permitting.
- 2. Upon arrival at the shoot site on July 4, 2014, the Contractor must furnish the City with a shell inventory form outlining the specific quantities and sizes of each shell type that have been brought to the site. The Contractor must comply with the City requests to verify the sizes and counts of shells brought by the contractor.
- 3. Following the shoot, a shell count shall be conducted and any unused shells shall remain the property of the City to be stored by the Contractor. The Contractor agrees to furnish all equipment and all personnel necessary to set-up and shoot the fireworks display. The Contractor agrees to scan the designated shoot site for paper or garbage left from the display or its operators before departing the site.
- 4. The Contractor agrees to abide by safety standards and procedures as required by the City and as established by the American Pyrotechnic Association and the State of Minnesota.
- 5. The Contractor agrees to provide safety equipment for the crew including, but not limited to fire extinguishers, hearing plugs, hard hats, eye goggles, cotton coverings and First Aid supplies.
- 6. The Contractor shall obtain Fire Marshal permit from the City of Roseville for the fireworks display, complying with all additional requirements set forth by the City Fire Marshal.

- 7. The Contractor shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws, ordinances, rules and regulations.
- 8. The Contractor agrees that in order to protect itself and the City under the indemnity provision set forth herein, it will at all times during the term of this Agreement, keep in force policies of insurance as indicated in this contract.

The insurance protection will have the following limits:

- A. Comprehensive Casualty General Liability;
  - (1) Bodily Injury (including completed operations and products liability);
  - (2) Property Damage Liability Insurance will provide explosion, Collapse and Underground coverages where applicable;
  - (3) Personal Injury, with employment exclusion deleted: \$5,000,000.00 Combined Single Limits
- B. Comprehensive Automobile Liability:
  - (1) Bodily Injury

\$500,000.00 Each Person \$1,000,000.00 Each Occurrence

(2) Property Damage

\$100,000.00 Each Occurrence

C. Workers' Compensation coverage:

The Contractor further agrees to name the City as additional insured in said insurance policies and to provide a certificate of said insurance to the City prior to commencing work. The Contractor agrees to notify the City twenty-five (25) days prior to cancellation or a change in any if the aforementioned insurance policies.

#### II. DUTIES OF THE CITY

- 1. The City agrees to furnish, at its cost, to the Contractor, sufficient space for the same and proper presentation of the fireworks display and all necessary Police protection, to provide the necessary perimeters for restricting the public from gaining access to the shoot site.
- 2. Upon execution of the terms of this Agreement, following the fireworks display on the night of July 4, 2014, payment shall be made in full by the City within two weeks.

#### III. MISCELLANEOUS

- 1. The parties agree that should inclement weather prevent the fireworks display from occurring on July 4, 2014, the Contractor shall be entitled to a fee charge of \$\_\_\_\_\_. In the event of a cancellation for inclement weather, the fireworks display will be rescheduled to \_\_\_\_\_\_, a mutually agreed upon date within twelve (12) months.
- 2. It is agreed that nothing herein contained is intended or should be construed in any manner as creating or establishing the relationship of co-partners between the parties hereto or as constituting the Contractor staff as the agents, representatives or employees of the City for any purpose in any manner whatsoever. The contractor and its staff are to be and shall remain an independent contractor with respect to all services performed under this Agreement. The Contractor represents that it has, or will secure at its own expense, any and all personnel required in performing services under this Agreement. Personnel, while engaged in the performance of any work or services required by the Contractor under this Agreement, shall not be considered employees of the City, and any and all claims that might arise under the Workers' Compensation Act of the State of Minnesota on behalf of said personnel or other persons while so engaged, and any and all claims whatsoever on behalf of any such person or personnel arising out of employment or alleged employment including, without limitation, claims of discrimination against the Contractor, its officers, agents, contractors or employees shall in no way be the responsibility of the City, and the Contractor shall defend, indemnify and hold the City, its officers, agents and employees harmless from any and all such claims regardless of nay determination of any pertinent tribunal, agency, board, commissions or court. Such personnel or other persons shall not require nor be entitled to any compensation, rights or benefits of any kind whatsoever from the City, including, without limitation, tenure rights, medical and hospital care, sick leave, Workers' Compensation, Unemployment Compensation, disability, severance pay and PERA.
- 3. The Contractor shall defend, indemnify and old harmless the City, its officials, employees and agents, from any and all claims causes of actions, lawsuits, damages, losses or expenses, including attorney's fees, arising out of or resulting from the contractor's (including its officials, employees or agents) performance of the duties under this Agreement.
- 4. Any amendments to this Agreement shall be in writing and executed by the parties in the same manner as this Agreement.
- 5. This Agreement shall be interpreted under the laws of the State of Minnesota.
- 6. The parties mutually and severally guarantee the terms, conditions, and payments of the Agreement which shall be binding upon the parties, heirs executors, administrators, successors and assigns.

- 7. This Agreement shall not be assignable except at the written consent of the City.
- 8. This Agreement represents the entire agreement between the City and the Contractor and supersedes and cancels any and all prior agreements or proposals, written or oral, between the parties relating to the subject matter hereof, and amendments, addenda, alterations or modifications to the terms and conditions of this Agreement shall be in writing and signed by both parties. Should any provision of this Agreement be deemed null, void, or unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this Agreement shall continue in full form and effect.



THIS AGREEMENT is effective March 15, 2014, by and between the City of Lauderdale, 1891 Walnut Street ~ Lauderdale, MN 55113, and the City of Roseville, 2660 Civic Center Drive ~ Roseville, Minnesota 55113. The City of Roseville agrees to provide recreation program services within the City of Lauderdale between June 23 and August 15, 2014.

The City of Lauderdale and the City of Roseville agree to the following obligations:

- 1. The City of Roseville agrees to:
  - Provide recreation programs and experiences to Lauderdale residents for the same fee as paid by Roseville residents.
  - Coordinate registration, supervision, and program curriculum appropriate for the recreation programs.
  - Provide the following summer recreation programs at Lauderdale Community Park (subject to change based upon demand).
    - o Kick and Slugger Sports ~ June 23 August 9
    - o Teen Improv Group ~ June 23 August 15
    - o Preschool Play Pals ~ June 23 August 15
    - o Puppet Wagon Shows ~ June 24 August 7
  - Provide program staff, program supplies and equipment, and program maintenance support for all agreed upon and contracted recreation services. The City of Roseville agrees to provide field prep for programmatic needs such as lining of the soccer field.

#### 2. The City of Lauderdale agrees to:

- Provide maintained program locations at Lauderdale Community Park. The City of Lauderdale agrees to provide regular maintenance such as mowing of the grass, dragging the ball field, and sanitation services.
- Provide facilities access and keys to Roseville Park and Recreation Staff.
- Compensate the City of Roseville as agreed upon and outlined below.

#### **Payment**

- 1. The City of Lauderdale agrees to pay the City of Roseville the difference between resident and non-resident fees for all recreation program registrations made by Lauderdale residents (excluding facility rentals). Payment for programs shall be made no later than 30 days after receipt of invoice from Roseville.
- 2. The City of Lauderdale agrees to pay the City of Roseville for Puppet Wagon Performances at Lauderdale Community Park. The agreed upon rate is \$90 for staffing and \$10 for supplies and materials (\$100 per week).
  - Day in the Park event charged at \$39/hour.

• Payment for Puppet Wagon Performances shall be made no later than 30 days after receipt of invoice from Roseville.

#### Liability

Roseville shall defend and indemnify Lauderdale and it employees, officers, volunteers and agents for any claims against Lauderdale arising from Roseville's performance or failure to perform its duties under this Agreement.

Lauderdale shall defend and indemnify Roseville and it employees, officers, volunteers and agents for any claims against Roseville arising from Lauderdale's performance or failure to perform its duties under this Agreement.

Under no circumstances, however, shall a party be required to pay on behalf of itself and the other party, any amounts in excess of the limits on liability established in Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 466 applicable to any one party. The limits of liability for the parties may not be added together to determine the maximum amount of liability for any party.

Employees of Roseville and Lauderdale shall remain employees of their respective cities regardless of where services are provided under this Agreement. Each party shall be responsible for injuries to or death of its own personnel. Each party will maintain workers' compensation insurance or self-insurance coverage, covering its own personnel while they are providing services pursuant to this Agreement. Each party waives the right to sue the other party for any workers' compensation benefits paid to its own employees or their dependants, even if the injuries were caused wholly or partially by the negligence of the other party.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the parties have duly executed this Agreement effective as of the date first above written.

## CHAPTER 207 FINANCE COMMISSION

#### **SECTION:**

207.01: Establishment of Commission

207.02: Organization

207.03: Meetings and Reports

207.04: Scope, Duties and Functions

#### **207.01:** ESTABLISHMENT AND MEMBERSHIP:

There is established a Finance Commission of the City which shall consist of seven members appointed by the City Council. Members shall be residents of the City and appointed for three year staggered terms. A minimum of three members shall have financial management experience or training. Terms of the initial members will be established by the council at the time of their appointment. No member shall serve more than two full consecutive terms.

#### 207.02: ORGANIZATION:

The Commission shall annually elect one member to serve as chairperson and one member to serve as vice chairperson.

#### **207.03:** MEETINGS AND REPORTS:

The Commission shall annually adopt a regular meeting schedule and may hold other meetings, as it deems necessary. The Commission may adopt rules for the transaction of business and shall keep a record of its meetings and actions. The commission shall request a joint meeting with the City Council when deemed necessary and at a minimum of once a year.

#### **207.04:** SCOPE, DUTIES AND FUNCTIONS:

The City Council has created the Finance Commission to serve in an advisory capacity regarding the City's financial matters to make recommendations that will provide clarity, transparency and accessibility of financial information, to review policies and offer strategies for improved budgeting and funding for present-day operations and future needs, and to review the city's financial affairs.

The duties and functions of the Commission may include:

- A. Advise on short and long-term financial policy matters, including but not limited to cash reserve funds, budgets, financing, and capital replacement policies.
- B. Review and recommend funding strategies for the Capital Improvement Plan.
- C. Recommend budget goals, including but not limited to local tax rate and tax levy targets, management of enterprise funds, and spending levels.

- D. Review and recommend standardized budget and financial reporting methods and tools to make financial communications and budget information more transparent, comprehensible, and accessible to the public.
- E. Review and recommend the annual timeline and process for creating City budgets.
- F. Review the annual financial information, the annual audit report and management letter, the adequacy and effectiveness of financial controls, and the city's investment policy and portfolio.

#### **POLICY OBJECTIVE**

Property maintenance through City abatement activities is a key tool to preserving high-quality residential neighborhoods. Both Imagine Roseville 2025 and the City's 2030 Comprehensive Plan support property maintenance as a means by which to achieve neighborhood stability. The Housing section of Imagine Roseville suggests that the City "implement programs to ensure safe and well-maintained properties." In addition, the Land Use chapter (Chapter 3) and the Housing and Neighborhoods chapter (Chapter 6) of the Comprehensive Plan support the City's efforts to maintain livability of the City's neighborhoods with specific policies related to property maintenance and code compliance. Policy 6.1 of Chapter 3 states that the City should promote maintenance and reinvestment and Policy 2.6 of Chapter 6 guides the City to use codecompliance activities as one method to prevent neighborhood decline.

# Land-Use Code Enforcement Program 2013 Year End Report











#### **Background:**

- The Community Development Department is responsible for enforcement of most of the public nuisance provisions of the City Code.
- Land-use enforcement primarily addresses public nuisance violations reported to staff by the public, such as: junk/debris, outside storage, long grass, junk vehicles, building maintenance, noise complaints, unshoveled public sidewalks, etc.

### **Goals of the Program:**

- Greater public awareness and compliance with city codes and ordinances through education, cooperation and enforcement.
- Enhanced property values and enhanced livability of neighborhoods.
- Minimize the negative effects of public nuisance violations upon surrounding neighborhoods.
- Maintenance of the city's tax base.

#### **Public Nuisance Violations (2013):**

#### • Resolution of cases:

- o 18 5% of cases resolved over 60 days.
- o 29 7% of cases pending resolution.

#### **Accomplishments:**

- To date have closed 93% of the 376 cases opened in 2013:
  - o Cooperation from the public on correcting public nuisances remains very positive.
  - o 89 % of residents have complied with simple letter requests for compliance.
- Staff includes with initial notices an informational brochure to educate residents about common public nuisance violations; an effort to minimize violations through education and cooperation. Also, when a violation is a building maintenance issue, staff includes additional HRA and HRC Program information.
- Fewer public nuisance complaints from the public were received in 2013 (376 in 2013 versus 487 in 2012). Also, fewer Accelerated Abatements and Council Approved Abatements occurred in 2013 (9 in 2013 versus 37 in 2012). This appears to indicate the Land Use Enforcement Program (complaints) and the Neighborhood Enhancement Program are having a positive effect in reducing the numbers of public nuisances negatively affecting the City. Hopefully this trend continues.
- Staff improves procedures each year through realignment of staff duties and streamlining staff procedures.

#### **Observations:**

- Still observing where one public nuisance tends to promote more of the same a clustering effect.
- Still observing more violations in neighborhoods of older homes; this is to be expected due to typically smaller lots, smaller garages and older construction.
- Some property maintenance cases remain difficult to resolve due to financial/physical hardship by the property owner. Many of the unresolved 'pending' cases are of this type.

# Business Property Enhancement Program 2013 Year End Report

#### **Background:**

Roseville's City Council and Roseville's Housing and Redevelopment Authority (HRA) have been exploring ways to maintain the prosperity, livability, and property values of our Business and Multi-Family residential properties. To help achieve this goal the Council instituted a Business Property Enhancement Program that is funded by the Roseville HRA. This program raises awareness of the importance of keeping business and multi-family properties in good repair. This in turn, helps maintain the prosperity of our businesses and multi-family properties, maintains our quality neighborhoods, and, protects property values throughout our community.

This program involves exterior only inspections of all commercial, industrial, public, and multi-family properties to identify if there are any exterior maintenance or public nuisance violations of City Code. Staff then works with property owners to remedy any violations that exist. The program encourages property owners to perform routine maintenance on their property before a problem becomes severe and more costly to fix.

#### Goals:

- Maintain the appeal of Roseville's commercial areas.
- Maintain the livability of Roseville's multi-family neighborhoods.
- Maintain and enhance commercial and multi-family property values.
- Educate property owners of the benefits realized by eliminating visual nuisances.

### **Accomplishments:**

- During the period of May-November 2013, staff inspected 534 properties.
- Before inspecting these properties, staff sent letters to property owners informing them of the program, its goals and benefits, and, common maintenance and nuisance violations. Staff included brochures specific to the type of property, and, a graffiti handout to assist property owners with removal.
- Over 800 building maintenance and public nuisance conditions, visually detracting from our multi-family and business areas, were eliminated. The majority of these were basic building maintenance and outside storage/debris removal, which are easily resolved at minimal cost.
- Staff was able to implement the program without alienating the business community. Overwhelmingly, property owners corrected violations on a timely basis, and, many voiced support for the program.

#### **Property Management Comments:**

- Dana: '...thank you for this program starting up...it is reassuring that the City takes pride in the properties and communities in this area".
- Linda: looking for help in getting rid of trailers, very happy with the program.
- Todd: knew of the problem and glad the City nudged him to get the work done.
- Joe: appreciated being notified of the issues and was very appreciative of the program.
- Dave: understood and agreed with the program. The notice will help get needed funding from corporate.
- Largest negative comment was that the responsible person did not receive the initial letter.
- A few were upset at receiving violation notices, but most then stated they understand the purpose of the program.

#### **Future Program Schedule:**

• Continue with the Neighborhood Enhancement Program (NEP) and the Business Property Enhance Program (BPEP) alternating over a 3 year cycle: Residential areas – year one and year two; commercial areas – year three.

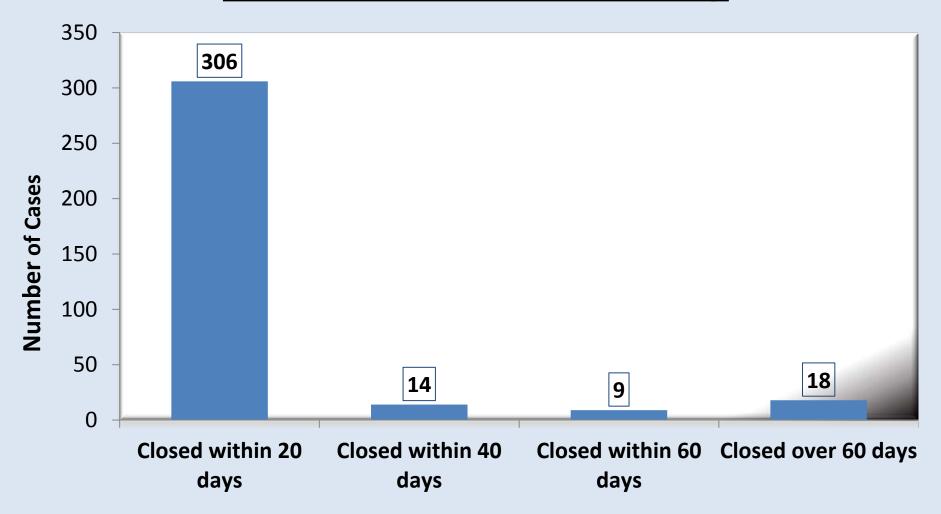

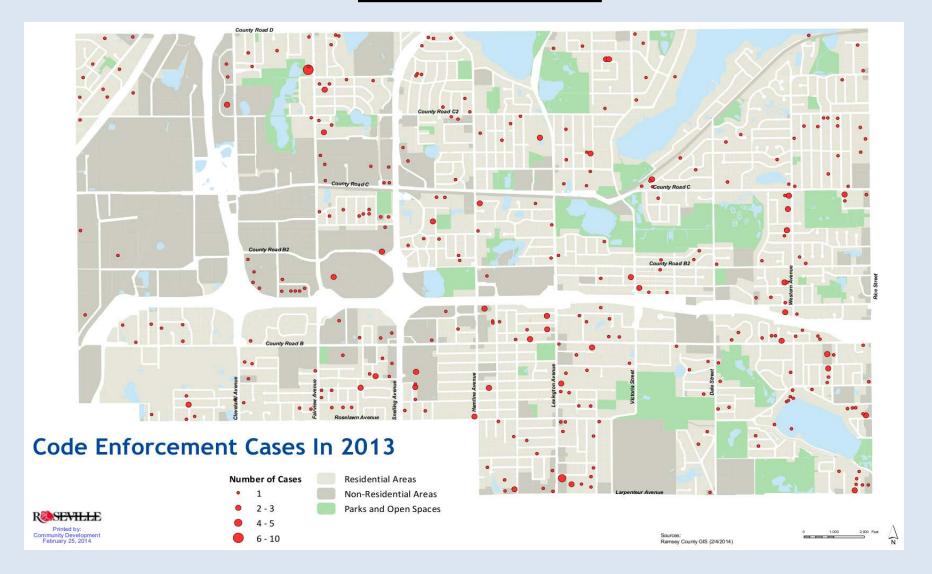

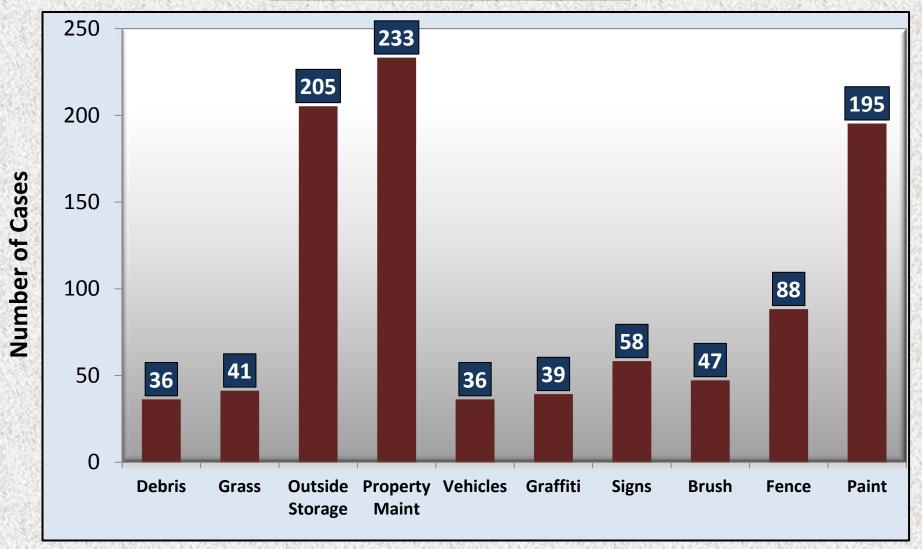

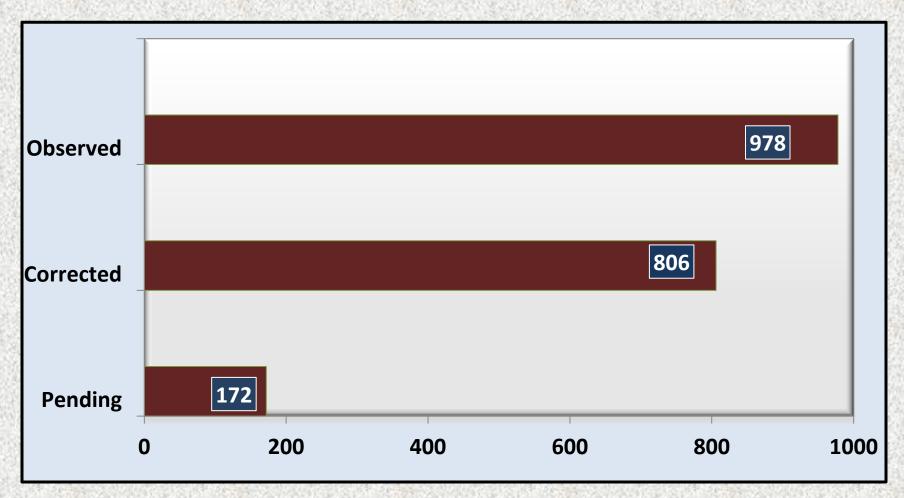

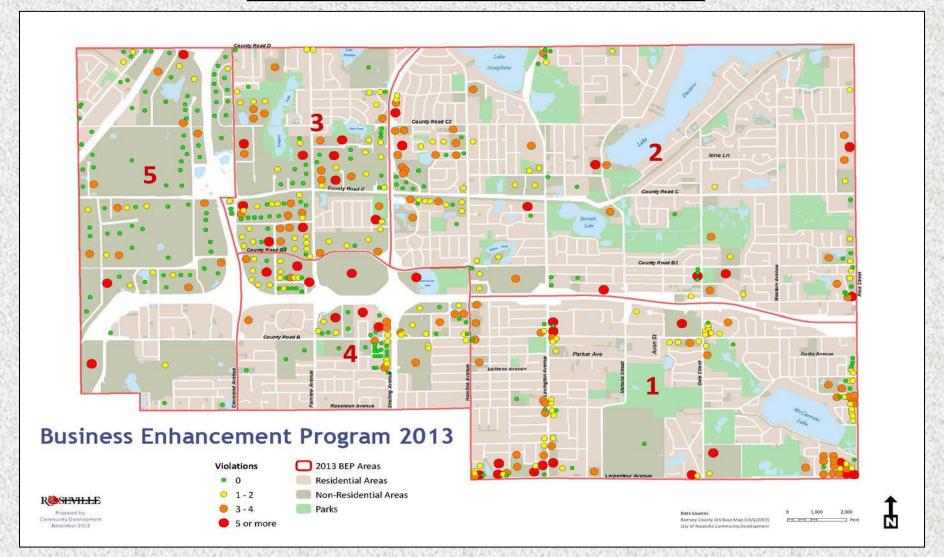

### **2013 Business Enhancement Program Recap**

### 1 BACKGROUND

The Fire Department first started a staffing program in 1947, utilizing a one person "watchman" model program at what would later become Fire Station #1.

In 1966 the program expanded to include the newly built Fairview station which would be called Fire Station #2.

Beginning in 1972, the Watchman model staffing program was expanded from one firefighter per station to two firefighters per station working nights and Sunday days.

In 1976, with the completion of the Dale St. Fire Station the staffing program was altered to staff stations #2 & 3 with two watchman and station #1 with one watchman, the coverage period stayed the same.

In 2001, the fire department started an experimental daytime staffing program in an attempt to address response issues during daytime hours.

The experimental daytime staffing program was made permanent beginning in 2005, resulting in a Paid-on-Call 24/7/365 staffing model.

The Fire Department is currently requesting to change its staffing model from a paid-on-call model to a "combination full-time/part-time staffing model". Converting to this new staffing model will bring many advantages both short and long term to the department and our ability to serve the community. Some of the advantages of this new program include stabilization of the on-duty shift program, reduce hiring costs, promote firefighter longevity, will increase our level of proficiency, and we feel is the best long term finical option available.

The request for the change is based on an ever changing environment of staffing needs, employee hiring, training, costs, retention, an increased volume of calls, complexity of work, and the overall positioning of the Fire Department for future service to the community. As part of our presentation, more detailed information will be provided by staff about why the change in staffing model is needed and how the new staffing model arrangement would work.

### 31 FINANCIAL IMPACTS

- The financial impacts will vary over time based on the number and balance of full-time & parttime firefighters, along with other factors affecting wages and benefits.
- The finical impacts for the first step of the transitioning of staffing models will be built into and vetted using the 2015 budget approval process.

### PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO TABLE 1005-1

- Table 1005-1 lists all permitted and conditional uses in the commercial and mixed use districts.
  - A. Uses marked as "P" are permitted in the districts where designated.
  - B. Uses marked with a "C" are allowed as conditional uses in the districts where designated, in compliance with all applicable standards.
  - C. Uses marked as "NP" are not permitted in the districts where designated.
  - D. A "Y" in the "Standards" column indicates that specific standards must be complied with, whether the use is permitted or conditional. Standards for permitted uses are included in Chapter 1011 of this Title; standards for conditional uses are included in Section 1009.02 of this Title.
  - E. **Combined Uses:** Allowed uses may be combined within a single building when meeting the following standards:
    - 1. Residential units in mixed-use buildings shall be located above the ground floor or on the ground floor to the rear of nonresidential uses;

- 2. Retail and service uses in mixed-use buildings shall be located at ground floor or lower levels of the building; and
- 3. Nonresidential uses are not permitted above residential uses.

### PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT AND DESIGN STANDARDS

The City Council also sought elimination of the Regulating Plan as the design requirement document for Twin Lakes and directed the Planning Division to develop something more consistent with other similar commercial districts.

The City Planner has reviewed the guiding documents and the existing Regulating Plan to glean the more valid goals and/or requirements and has crafted new language in support of these goals and objectives into the proposed Design Standards for the CMU District, which are provided below:

### 1005.07 Community Mixed-Use (CMU) District

- **A. Statement of Purpose:** The **Community Mixed-Use District** is designed to encourage the development or redevelopment of mixed-use centers that may include housing, residential, office, commercial, civic and institutional, utility and transportation, park, and open space uses. Complementary uses should be organized into cohesive districts in which mixed- or single-use buildings are connected by streets, sidewalks and trails, and open space to create a pedestrian-oriented environment. The CMU District is intended to be applied to areas of the City guided for redevelopment or intensification.
- B. Regulating Plan: The CMU District must be guided by a regulating plan for each location here it is applied. A regulating plan uses graphics and text to establish requirements pertaining to the following kinds of parameters. Where the requirements for an area governed by a regulating plan are in conflict with the design standards established in Section 1005.02 of this Title, the requirements of the regulating plan shall supersede, and where the requirements for an area governed by a regulating plan are silent, Section 1005.02 shall control.
- 1. Street and Block Layout: The regulating plan defines blocks and streets based on existing and proposed street alignments. New street alignments, where indicated, are intended to identify general locations and required connections but not to constitute preliminary or final engineering.
- 2. Street Types: The regulating plan may include specific street design standards to illustrate typical configurations for streets within the district, or it may use existing City street standards. Private streets may be utilized within the CMU District where defined as an element of a regulating plan.

### 3. Parking

- a. Locations: Locations where surface parking may be located are specified by block or block face. Structured parking is treated as a building type.
- b. Shared Parking or District Parking: A district-wide approach to off-street parking for nonresidential or mixed uses is preferred within the CMU district. Off-street surface parking for these uses may be located up to 300 feet away from the use. Off-street structured parking may be located up to 500 feet away from the use.
- c. Parking Reduction and Cap: Minimum off—street parking requirements for uses within the CMU district may be reduced to 75% of the parking requirements in Chapter 1019 of this Title. Maximum off—street parking shall not exceed the minimum requirement unless the additional parking above the cap is structured parking.
- 4. Building and Frontage Types: Building and frontage types are designated by block or block face. Some blocks are coded for several potential building types; others for one building type on one or more block faces.
- 5. Build To Areas: Build To Areas indicate the placement of buildings in relation to the street.
  6. Uses: permitted and conditional uses may occur within each building type as specified in Table 1005-1, but the vertical arrangement of uses in a mixed use building may be further regulated in a regulating plan.

C. Regulating Plan Approval Process: A regulating plan may be developed by the City as part of a zoning amendment following the procedures of Section 1009.06 of this Title and thus approved by City Council.

- D. Amendments to Regulating Plan: Minor extensions, alterations or modifications of proposed or existing buildings or structures, and changes in street alignment may be authorized pursuant to Section 1009.05 of this Title.
- 97 **B.** Environmental Review Requirement: Each development/redevelopment proposal within 98 the Twin Lakes Redevelopment area will be required to complete a voluntary Environmental 99 Assessment Worksheet (EAW) or seek a waiver from the City Council, per Resolution 100 11015.
- 101 C. Park Buffers and Pedestrian Connections: For those developments proposed adjacent to a 102 park there will be a minimum 10-foot-wide natural buffer required. Similarly, developments 103 adjacent to the park may be required to provide a 20-foot-wide pedestrian connection 104 complete with an 8-foot-wide path.
- 105 **D. Design Standards:** The standards in Section 1005.02 shall apply except that ground floor 106 facades that face or abut public streets shall incorporate one or more of the following features 107 along at least 60% of their horizontal length:
  - 1. Windows and doors with clear or slightly tinted glass including the use of spandrel (translucent) glass.
  - 2. Customer entrances;
  - 3. Awnings, canopies, or porticoes; and/or
  - 4. Outdoor patios or eating areas.
- **E.** Frontage Requirement: A development must utilize one or more of the three options below 114 for placement of buildings and parking relative to the primary street regardless of whether 115 the street is public or private (access roadway interior to development):
  - 1. At least 50% of the street frontage shall be occupied by the building façade placed within 20 feet of the front lot line. No off-street parking shall be located between the facades meeting this requirement and the street.
  - 2. At least 60% of the street frontage shall be occupied by the building façade placed within 65 feet of the front lot line. Only 1 row of parking and a drive aisle may be placed within this setback area.
  - 3. At least 70% of the street frontage shall be occupied by the building façade placed within 85 feet of the front lot line. Only 2 rows of parking and a drive aisle may be placed within this setback area.
  - **F.** Blank Walls: Blank lengths of wall fronting public or private street, access roadway, or pedestrian connection shall not exceed 30 feet in length.
  - **G. Primary Façade:** The primary façade, that which fronts the primary street, public or private (interior to development) or fronts a pedestrian corridor shall be articulated into distinct increments such as stepping back or extending forward, through the use of

storefronts with separate windows and entrances, arcade awnings, bays and balconies; through a variation in roof lines or through the use of different but compatible materials and textures.

- **I. Improvement Area:** The total improved area, including paved surfaces and footprints of principal and accessory buildings or structures, shall not exceed 85% of the total parcel area.
- **J.** Access and Circulation: Within large development sites, vehicular circulation shall be designed to minimize conflicts with pedestrians.
- **K. Surface Parking:** Surface parking on large development sites shall be divided into smaller parking areas with a maximum of 100 spaces in each area, separated by landscaped areas at least 10 feet in width. Landscaped areas shall include pedestrian walkways leading to building entrances.
- **L. Standards for Nighttime Activities:** Uses that involve deliveries or other activities between the hours of 10:00 P.M. and 7:00 A.M. (referred to as "nighttime hours") shall meet the following standards:
  - 1. Off-street loading and unloading during nighttime hours shall take place within a completely enclosed and roofed structure with the exterior doors shut at all times.
  - 2. Movement of sweeping vehicles, garbage trucks, maintenance trucks, shopping carts, and other service vehicles and equipment is prohibited during nighttime hours within 300 feet of a residential district, except for emergency vehicles and emergency utility or maintenance activities.

3. Snow removal within 300 feet of a residential district shall be minimized during nighttime hours, consistent with the required snow management plan.

Item Description: Discuss Frozen Water Service Line Survey Information

#### BACKGROUND

Staff discussed the severe winter impacts on water service laterals with the Council most

- recently at the March 24, 2014 city council meeting. At that time 124 properties had
- 4 experienced frozen water service lines. As of Wednesday April 2, 2014, 130 properties have
- 5 notified staff regarding frozen water service lines. They are summarized in the following table:

Staff discussed the status of the frozen lines with the Council and how we might manage the additional 100 plus new freeze accounts that were not on the historic freeze list and notification program. Staff also discussed the cost of thawing frozen service lines based on information we had received as feedback from residents who had contracted thawing their service lines. The Council requested additional information on what other cities were doing with the freeze issues and whether they were participating financially in the thawing of the lines. Staff sent out a survey to other communities and had a fairly good response in the short timeframe. The results are attached (Attachment A).

Staff is requesting the City Council discuss their interest in providing any additional assistance to the property owners that have incurred contractor costs for thawing frozen lines. Staff has received feedback from residents that have contracted thawing services that the cost to thaw the lines averages \$300-\$600. There have been difficult to thaw lines that have incurred higher

- charges. A high percentage of the lines have been frozen under the roadway. This is where frost is driven deeper by traffic as it is uninsulated by snow.
- 22 Ownership of service laterals
- The current policy has been in place since the 1960's. Ownership of laterals has been the
- property owner from the building to the city main. Many properties have replaced or repaired
- 25 their service laterals as part of our road reconstruction projects over the past 25 years at their
- 26 cost. We also have a number of property owners who have corrected deficiencies at their own
- cost outside of our pavement program annually. The Council should consider equity to property
- owners when considering revision of this policy. Another issue is total liability and impact on
- capital improvement programs and utility rates. Long term liability would be in the millions of
- dollars over time if the city were to assume ownership to the property line. There may be some
- middle ground to study on the ownership issue that could result from additional study and

### POLICY OBJECTIVE

- The City operates and maintains a water system to provide a continuous supply of safe drinking
- water to its residents. Current city code establishes ownership of the utility service lines with the
- 36 property owner.

#### 37 FINANCIAL IMPACTS

- The city established the water utility to ensure safe, clean drinking water availability to all
- properties in Roseville. The water enterprise is funded through user fees to cover the cost of
- this service. All costs associated with assisting residents with frozen water service lines are
- funded through the water enterprise fund.
- Changing policy on service lateral ownership would be a long term financial liability and
