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2018 Budget Adopted

Roseville's annual round of budget discussions has produced a final adopted city budget of \$54,239,230 for 2018. The budget passed on a 4-0 vote at the City Council's final meeting of the year on December 11.

The 2018 property tax levy approved by the council is \$20,680,505. It is an increase of \$1,167,445 or 5.98 percent compared to the 2017 levy. However, due to the overall growth of the city's tax base and a shift in the tax burden toward commercial properties, the portion of the increase realized by homeowners will be less than previous years.

The impact on residents will vary depending on a property's value and change in value relative to other properties in the city. Based on an expected property value increases, the median-valued Roseville home of \$236,900 can expect to pay approximately \$77.79 per month in 2018, an increase of \$1.83 or 2.4 percent.

The City's share of total residential property taxes in 2017 were 27 cents out of every tax dollar paid for Roseville School District homes and 26 cents out of every tax dollar paid for homes located in the Mounds View School District. The city expects those figures to be somewhat lower in 2018. The remaining portion of a property owner's tax bill goes to the county, school districts and other taxing districts.

Comp Plan Update Heads into Home Stretch

Roseville's 2040 Comprehensive Plan Update is heading into the home stretch.

The updated comp plan is due to Metropolitan Council no later than December 31, 2018. However, the real deadline is much earlier. A six-month evaluation by Roseville's surrounding communities is a mandated part of the review process prior to final submission to the Met Council.

This moves the city's technical deadline up to early June. And between now and then there's a lot to accomplish.

Staff and the city's consultant on the project are scheduled to complete the initial plan update draft in February. Residents will then have an opportunity to weigh in on the revised draft plan at a public engagement session later in the month before the Planning Commission conducts its review of the draft plan at its late February special meeting.

The City Council will then review the comp plan update draft at its March work session, with the Planning Commission holding its final public hearing on the at its April 4 meeting.

The City Council's final action on the Comprehensive Plan Update will take place in May.

Know the Code – Getting Rid of Stuff

You’re driving down the street and notice a piece of furniture on the side of the road with a “free” sign on it. Someone’s trash might be a treasure, but it is against city code to put items curbside for others to pick up. If the city gets a complaint and has to arrange removal of items, the property owner could be responsible for removal costs plus an administrative fee.

There are several options to dispose of items you no longer want or need. Useable items can be donated to Bridging, Goodwill or other charitable organizations. Items to give away or sell can be listed on Nextdoor, Facebook or Craigslist. Items can also be sold on ebay or other web-based sites. Your trash hauler may haul it away, but they can charge a fee.

If none of those options works for you, for a small fee, residents can dispose of large items at Roseville’s Clean-up Day in April. Look for more information about Clean-Up Day in the next Roseville City News.

Blooming in Roseville

Roseville experienced another strong year of development in 2017. The local economy continued to show strength, with the city approving more than \$80 million in construction permits during the first 10 months of the year alone.

The lion’s share of the big-ticket development occurred at Rosedale Center, which recently completed a major remodel. In addition to the mall itself, spectacular new anchor store Von Maur began construction on a 140,000-square-foot, two-level store, while Herberger’s, Macy’s and JC Penny all completed major renovations.

The west side of Roseville also saw its fair share of new development, with the completion of food store Aldi and Denny’s restaurant at the corner of County Road C and Cleveland Ave and the construction of Calyxt’s new Twin Lakes corporate headquarters.

On the residential side of the ledger, Wheaton Woods, a new development at County Road C and Dale St., brought 17 new homes to the community. Senior Living facilities Cherrywood and Applewood on Woodhill Dr completed construction, while Dignicare on B2 just west of Dale St recently broke ground.

The **recycling fee** includes cost of collecting and processing recycling materials, recycling education and the city’s share of Cleanup Day. The **storm drainage** fee pays for managing storm water runoff to prevent flooding and control pollution and for street sweeping. The **state fee** pays for testing the water supply and aquifers. The **sanitary sewer** fee covers costs associated with treating used water. Roseville’s used water goes to the St. Paul Treatment Facility. The **water fee** ensures the city has safe, potable water and on-demand water pressure sufficient to meet fire protection needs.

Public Works Foreman Receives Award

Congratulations to Joshua Dix, Working Foreman for Roseville’s Public Works Department. On November 17, the American Public Works Association-Minnesota Chapter (APWA-MN) awarded Dix with the 2017 APWA-MN Maintenance Person of the Year.

Dix started working for Roseville in 2009 and was promoted to Working Foreman in 2015. Among his accomplishments, was leading Roseville to become one of the first Level 2 certified cities in the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency Smart Salt Training program.

Dix built a sprayer from scratch to reduce the amount of salt being used during a snowstorm. For this work, he received an Environmental Leadership Award from the Freshwater Society for reducing the amount of chlorides applied to city streets. Dix has embraced new technologies and has pushed the city to use its asset management system to do so.

Protect Against Identity Theft

It's tax season. Mail thieves will be looking for opportunities to grab your personal information.

W-2s and other tax forms are delivered to homes in late January or early February. W-2s include names, Social Security numbers and salary. That's all the information needed for someone to steal your identity, open up credit cards in your name, and tap into your bank or other accounts. Take steps to lower your risk of being a victim of identity theft.

- Pick up the mail as soon as it is delivered. If you can't pick it up immediately, consider purchasing a locking mailbox, where mail can be dropped in but requires a key to be removed.
- Talk with your neighbors or your neighborhood watch program. Watch each other's mailboxes (as well as homes). Have a trusted friend or neighbor pick up your mail when expecting delivery of your tax forms.
- If you see suspicious behavior or a mail thief at work, or if you believe your mail has been stolen, call the police immediately at 651-767-0640.
- Report suspected mail theft to the police and to the Postal Service at 1-877-876-2455 or visit usps.com/postalinspectors.
- Talk with your employer about picking up your W-2 form in person or ask them to send an electronic W-2 statement through a secure system rather than through the mail.

City Connections

This summer the city added several sections of sidewalks to connect pedestrian pathways. The new sidewalks will improve public safety and give pedestrians easier access to major intersections, bus stops and street crossings.

- Adding a sidewalk on the west side of Victoria St. from County Road C north to the Owasso Ballfields. The new Applewood Pointe development just north of the ballfields installed a sidewalk. This installation connects their property to County Road C.
- Adding a sidewalk on the east side of Lexington Ave., between Burke Ave. and Ryan Ave., completing the connection between County Road B and Roselawn Ave.
- Adding a sidewalk on the north side of County Road B from Dale St. to Sandhurst Dr.
- Adding a trail from Farrington Ave. to Tamarack Park, providing a walking connection from the new playground to the street, which will be the main access to the park.



Sewer Improvements

Metropolitan Council Environmental Services will be making improvements to aging and deteriorating sewer facilities that serve Roseville homes and businesses. The work will take place from March 2018 to June 2019. Crews will stage and operate at three work sites in Roseville and one in St. Paul (just south of Larpenteur Ave).

Even though residents will mostly notice equipment like pumps, temporary conveyance pipes and large construction equipment above ground, much of the work will actually take place below the surface. Crews will create trenches or use existing manholes to access the underground infrastructure, replace and repair manholes and meters, and line sewer pipes.

Fire Department Transition Continues

Roseville has changed quite a bit since the city's first fire department began serving the community in 1944. Population, density, demographics and service expectation are radically different today by comparison.

In order to manage the complexities of a modern fire and emergency management service and continue meeting the community's needs, the department began implementing Phase I of a plan to transition from a part-time firefighter model to a full-time professional staff in 2015.

This year, Roseville's full-time ranks will increase to 17, up from just three in 2014, with the goal of eventually employing a full-time staff of 24. Previously, the department relied on as many as 70 part-time and volunteer personnel.

The transition to a full-time service has already met a number of goals set by the department, providing full-time supervision across all shifts, improving staffing consistency and readiness while stabilizing turnover and increasing training effectiveness. This has provided residents with improved service, increased proficiencies and faster response times. The changes have also been economically efficient, with the transition steps under Phase I proving to be revenue neutral.

Roseville's fire department is one of the busiest in the metro with more than 5,000 calls for service annually. These steps will help insure that the Roseville Fire Department is positioned to serve the community well into the future.

There are currently six businesses in the Design District and other nearby businesses are considering joining forces to build a stronger business community.

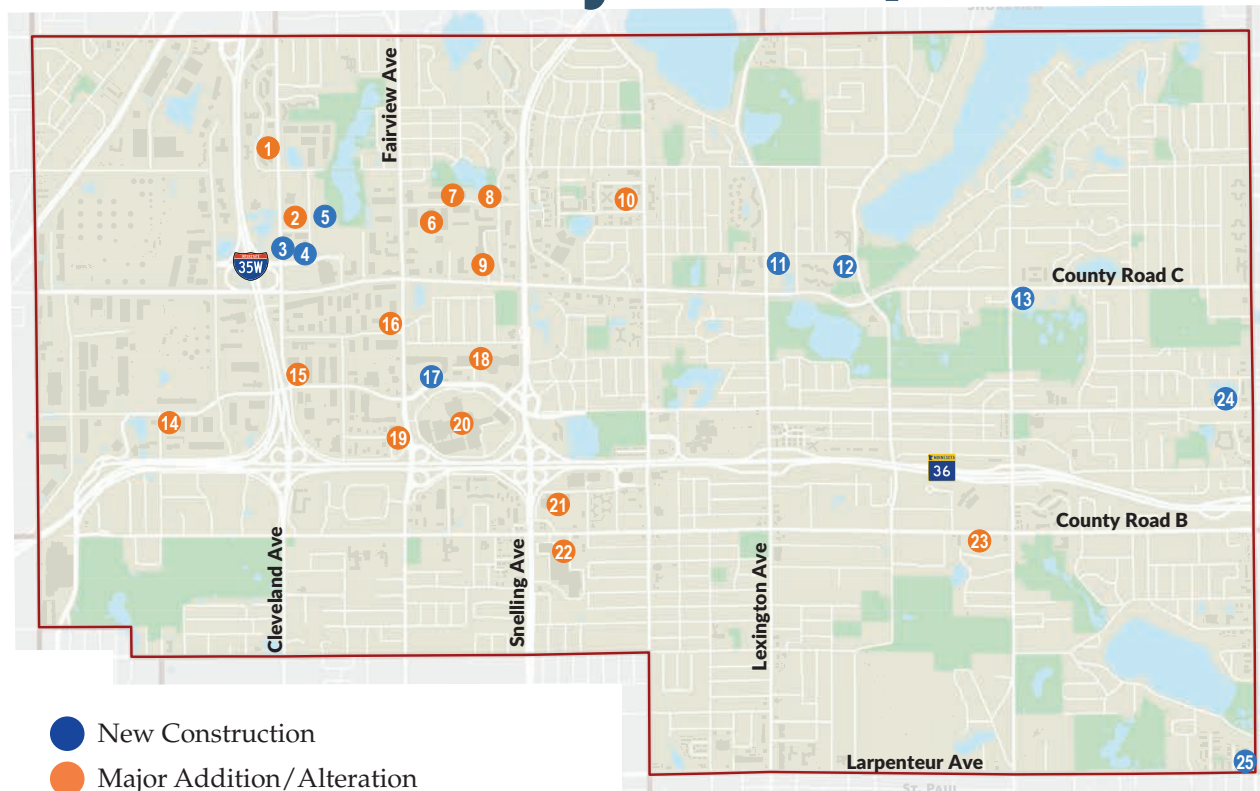
