Budget Process Nearing Conclusion



Roseville's 2019 budget process is entering the home stretch. The City Council adopted the 2019 preliminary budget and tax levy in September. November and December will see the Council bring the process to a close with review and adoption of utility rates as well as adoption of the final budget and tax levy.

Additional meetings featuring 2019 budget items include a review of proposed 2019 utility rates on November 5 and the final 2019 budget (truth-in-taxation) hearing on November 26. The City Council will vote on adopting Roseville's final 2019 budget, tax levy and utility rates on December 3.

In September, City Council unanimously approved a preliminary property tax levy increase of 4.2 percent for 2019. The 4.2 percent increase is now the maximum amount the City Council can raise the 2019 property tax levy. Once the preliminary levy is adopted it can be lowered, but not increased.

Based on the adopted preliminary levy and expected property value growth of about 7.6 percent, the median-valued Roseville home, valued at \$254,900, will see a monthly property tax increase of \$5.03 to a new average of \$80.40 per month in 2019.

The property tax levy will fund \$21,551,650 of the \$55,707,140 preliminary budget adopted by the Council, with approximately \$11.86 million coming from residential properties. Fee-based revenue sources such as license and permit fees, recreation program fees, user charges for water and sewers, intergovernmental sources, court fees, interest earnings and reserves will fund the remaining \$34,269,090 or 62 percent of the budget.

The City Council encourages residents to review budget documents, attend future meetings and participate in the budget process.

Know the Code

Roseville's code enforcement office often receives complaints about a code violation. Unfortunately, some presumed "code violations" are actually not violations. Some of the most common misconceptions are:

- Raking leaves Roseville does not require residents to rake their leaves.
- Bushes Roseville does not require residents to trim their bushes.
- Trimming overhanging trees The city does not requires residents to trim the boughs of trees that overhang into their neighbor's property. The Minnesota Department of Agriculture offers guidelines when considering trimming a neighbor's tree. Call 651-792-7082 to discuss the guidelines.
- Cars in driveway The city does not limit the number of cars that can be parked legally on a driveway or public street. Vehicles must be licensed and operable and parked on a paved surface.
- Cars parked on streets If a street is not posted as restricted parking, cars may park there 24 hours a day, seven days a week, unless it snows two or more inches.
- Boats and trailers can be parked on the street. City Code prohibits parking a boat or trailer on a public street for more than four days per month.

Some common complaints that ARE code violations include:

- Trash, tires, household items, lumber or debris cannot be stored outdoors, behind the garage, under a tarp or piled in a yard.
- Trash cans and recycling bins must have lids closed and be placed out of sight or behind the front line of the home, except on the day of pickup.
- Firewood on residential properties must be maintained in a safe and orderly fashion. Store logs in secure stacks six inches off the ground. Stacks can be no more than six feet high. Store firewood in a side or rear yard.
- Commercial property owners or managers (including multi-family buildings) must remove snow and ice from pathways and boulevard sidewalks within 12 hours after a snowfall ends.
- Snow may not be shoveled or blown onto city streets. It delays plowing and causes traffic hazards for the driving public.

Snow Kidding

Guidelines for a Safe Snow Season

The city makes every effort to clear snow as quickly as possible after a snow event, but after a four-inch snowfall, it takes approximately eight hours to plow and apply ice control. Over the years, we've offered a lot of advice and recommendations about road safety in the snow. In this issue, we're highlighting some of the most essential advice for efficient snow plowing.

- Don't park your car on the street after a 2" snowfall until the street has been plowed curb to curb. Once 2" of snow has accumulated, on-street parking is banned and vehicles could be ticketed and/or towed. The City Council is considering changes. Watch for more information in upcoming newsletters, visit the city's website or sign up to receive updates.
- Yield to snowplows. A snowplow can weigh 17 times more than a car and once they get moving they are hard to stop.
- Stay at least five car lengths back from a snowplow so the driver can see you.
- Do not pass a snowplow on the right. Plows push snow and spread ice control to the right.
- Keep garbage and recycling bins away from the end of the driveway to avoid being struck by a plow.
- Call 651-792-7004 to report hazardous conditions or to get information related to snow plowing including visibility problems at intersections.
- To reduce the chances of having to shovel more than once, wait to clear the end of your driveway until your street has been plowed from curb to curb. Snowplows may plow snow from the road into driveways that have already been shoveled.
- Mailboxes should not extend past the curb and should have sturdy posts. The bottom of the mailbox should be no less than 45 inches off the ground.
- Shovel in front of your mailbox. The post office will not deliver mail if they cannot get close enough to reach the mailbox from their vehicle.
- Assist the Fire Department by cleaning snow away from hydrants.

Winter is Coming

There's no way to avoid it. Winter in Minnesota means snow – some years more than others. The city takes pride in the snowplowing service it provides. Snowplowing Alerts

Sign up to receive alerts when Roseville's snowplows are about to roll. When two inches of snow has accumulated, a parking ban immediately goes into effect and parking is prohibited on all city streets. Your vehicle could be ticketed and towed. We send snowplow alerts via text and/or email in advance of every plow. Sign up at www.cityofroseville.com/receiveupdates and click the Alert - Snow Plows link.

Time for a Tune Up

Quick, before the weather turns cold, get your furnace tuned up and ready for winter. Your furnace will run more efficiently, and you may avoid costly repairs.

The Roseville Fire Department recommends getting your furnace inspected annually, preferably in the fall before you need the furnace. Most carbon monoxide poisoning accidents happen in late fall, when a person turns the heat on for the winter.

A service person tests for carbon monoxide. They also check and clean belts and pulleys. They check the combustion air inlet and burner performance and clean the flue, chimney and heat exchanger, among other tasks.

Roseville's Award Winning Staff

Congratulations to the Roseville Community Development Department. In September, the department received a Saint Paul Area Chamber of Commerce Leaders in Local Government Award.

The Community Development Department's Economic Development Authority (EDA) was recognized for its business retention and expansion efforts. Roseville's EDA was created in 2016 to encourage impactful economic development. The EDA works with businesses on their employment and growth needs to ensure a vibrant local economy. Wipes Clog Pipes

The packaging might say "flushable" but don't believe it. Baby wipes, disinfecting wipes, paper towels or anything other than toilet paper does not go down your toilet. Roseville's Utility crew knows firsthand what a mess they can leave behind.

When the utility crew gets a call about backed up sewers, they often find balls of baby wipes, toilet cleaning pads, hygiene products or other products matted together. It turns out that those flushable products shouldn't be flushed. They don't break down like toilet paper. They can collect in the sewer lines, especially in older pipes that may have cracks, roots or other obstructions that can cause backups. And even though the city does regular maintenance on the city's sewer lines every three years with a high-pressure water jet, blockages can occur.

Before calling a private plumber, call the Utility Department at 651-792-7004 during regular business hours or 651-767-0640 after business hours if you have trouble with your toilets or drains. A worker will check the main sewer to see if it is working properly and notify you of its condition.

The city is responsible for repairs on the main sewer line. The homeowner is responsible for sewer repairs from the home to the main sewer line. If you call a plumber and later find the problem is in the main sewer line, you will still be responsible to pay the plumber for visiting your property.

Does your homeowner insurance cover sewer backups?

Most homeowner insurance policies do not cover sewer backup unless your policy has a special rider. The city does not cover damages unless it is proven the city was negligent in maintaining its system. We recommend property owners get a rider that would cover sewer backup damage.

Introducing Midland Gardens Park and Unity Park

In September, the City Council named Roseville's two newest parks. The park at 2134 Cleveland Ave. was named Midland Gardens Park, and the park at 1716 Marion St. was named Unity Park.

In 2016, the city purchased a 0.79 acre parcel of land located at the corner of County Road B and Cleveland Ave. and a 0.68 acre parcel of land at 1716 Marion St. to be used for parklands.

The Park and Recreation Commission received 84 name suggestions for the two parks. They narrowed the choices to the top five for each park and recommended the names to the City Council for a final decision.

Midland Gardens Park includes a variety of landscape elements, including pollinator gardens, a play area, a picnic area and park trails. The name reflects the mid-land (45th parallel) location of the park and the various gardens.



On September 15, 60+ volunteers helped plant 3,500 pollinator-friendly plants, shrubs and trees at the Midland Gardens Park.

Unity Park features a playground and trails. It sits in the midst of several apartment buildings, which are often the first home for refugees to the United States. Several businesses and community members worked together to support building the new park. The name celebrates what this park represents, honors the partners who made the park possible and gives a nod to the future direction of the parkland.

Comprehensive Plan Update

The two-year process of updating Roseville's 2040 Comprehensive Plan is nearing an end. Earlier this spring, the City Council adopted the draft Comp Plan Update and authorized distribution of the document to neighboring communities for a required six-month review.

With that review now complete, the City Council will evaluate the recommendations and any further community input during its November 5 meeting. Council authorization for submitting the plan to the Metropolitan Council for review and approval is scheduled for December 3.

Roseville's Comprehensive Plan is updated every 10 years to ensure that it continues to reflect the community's collective vision for its future and that it aligns with the Metropolitan Council's plan for the region.

Aside from modest changes to the future land-use plan, most of the 2040 updates have been technical in nature, strengthening the city's commitment to environmental sustainability and making improvements in transportation. The update recommends continuing the parks master plan and acknowledges the creation and direction of the Economic Development Authority.

Prevent Theft from Auto

Roseville police officers have seen an increase in complaints about cars being ransacked and cars being stolen. Officers are aware of this increase, but it is rare to catch a thief by increasing patrol. Criminals have a better chance of being caught with the help of the community. Please be on the lookout for suspicious activity. If something doesn't look, sound or feel right, call to 9-1-1.

You can also take steps to reduce the chance of being a victim of theft from your auto.

- Close all windows and lock your vehicle, even when parked in your driveway.
- Take valuables from your car. Thieves are looking for quick cash. Removing laptops, backpacks, golf clubs, phone chargers, and loose change as you exit your car can help reduce the likelihood of your vehicle being targeted.
- Park in a well-lit area. Thieves do not want to be seen.
- If parked in a garage, lock all the doors and windows to the garage. Do not leave keys inside the car or on a hook in the garage.
- Do not leave your vehicle running and unattended, even if it's "just for a minute."

Police Debut Body-Worn Cameras

Beginning in November, Roseville police officers will be outfitted with body-worn cameras. The recorders will document contacts between members of the department and the public with the goal of enhancing accountability and public trust by preserving officer interactions with citizens.

The department has been testing a small number of body cams since the fall of 2014. In October, all officers received training covering the policies and operation of the units.

Officers will be required to wear and use the body cams while working in any uniformed assignment and activate their recording devices when responding to all calls for service and during all law enforcement related encounters and activities.

The cost to implement the body cams is about \$165,000, which includes cataloging and storing the footage. Approximately half of the total is being covered by an \$82,000 federal grant received by the department.

Garbage services and recycling will be collected one day later than usual on the days following Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's Day.



Fall Chore -Raking Leaves

Before you pull out the snow shovel, the city encourages residents to take time to rake up your leaves, including leaves that collect along the curb or driveway. Do not rake leaves into the streets or gutters. Organic materials can wash into storm drains, which lead directly into nearby lakes and ponds and can harm water quality and cost the city to clean it up.

Here are a few options for disposing of leaves

- Put leaves in your backyard compost pile.
- Use leaves to mulch your garden and lawn.
- Drop leaves at Roseville's leaf recycling center on Dale Street, south of County Road C. It's a free service to Roseville residents that's open through November 21.
- Arrange for your trash hauler to pick up excess leaves. Leaves must be in a paper bag or a
 compostable plastic bag or in a container provided by your trash hauler. Trash haulers may
 charge an additional fee.
- Grass clippings and other yard waste or brush can be taken to a free Ramsey County Yard Waste site. Visit RamseyRecycles.com or call 651-633-3279 for location information.

A few reminders:

- Do not burn leaves. Burning leaves is a fire hazard, releases pollutants that can cause breathing problems and negative health effects.
- Do not place leaves in with the regular trash.
- Do not rake leaves into the street, even when the street sweeper is coming.

The Public Works crew will begin street sweeping when the majority of leaves have fallen. Sweeping generally occurs between 7:00 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. Staff asks residents to avoid parking on city streets during daytime hours while street sweeping is in progress. The city appreciates residents' patience as crews sweep. Deer in Roseville have become an ever-increasing sight in recent years. Official deer counts conducted by Ramsey County indicate that the local deer population is higher than the existing habitat can sustain.

After hearing concerns from residents, the City Council directed staff to continue implementing a deer management program in 2018/2019.

Because of Roseville's limited amount of natural habitat, deer have been encroaching on the community, causing damage. In addition to overgrazing native trees, shrubs and plants and providing a foothold for invasive plant species, deer damage a variety of ornamental and garden plants. The number of deer has also raised concerns about increased occurrences of Lyme disease from deer ticks as well as injuries and vehicle damage resulting from collisions with deer.

The city will contract with the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Wildlife Services Program to use sharpshooters to remove 20 deer in Roseville. Public safety is the highest priority, and the USDA has a strong safety record for conducting these types of activities in and around cities and parks, including here in Roseville in January 2017.

Removal efforts will take place on city property between December 2018 and March 2019 until 20 deer have been removed. Deer removal will be coordinated based on aerial surveys where higher numbers of complaints and/or damage have been documented, and where it is safe to carry out these types of activities. Locations being considered include Reservoir Woods Park, Villa Park, Owasso Hills Park, Harriet Alexander Nature Center and the Leaf Recycling Center.

Deer that have been removed will be processed and donated to organizations approved by the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources. If the meat is not salvageable, carcasses will be donated for proper disposal.
