Roseville Responds to



Roseville. A Way of Life.

As the COVID-19 (Coronavirus) pandemic began to emerge in the United States, the City of Roseville quickly responded and identified two goals: safeguarding the health, safety and wellbeing of residents and businesses and the city staff who service them; and putting a plan into motion for city services to be delivered with as little disruption as possible.

On March 12, the city launched a dedicated webpage, www.cityofroseville.com/coronavirus, to serve as a hub for information about the disease and Roseville's response. The following day, city officials made the decision to close all city buildings and facilities to the public and cancel events and programming in support of social distancing efforts to slow the spread of Coronavirus.

Within hours of the closure announcement, Roseville began implementing a business continuity plan designed to deliver essential services like police, fire, emergency medical and utility services, and many non-essential city services without interruption. To support social distancing strategies, efforts to provide much of city staff with the ability to work remotely were also implemented.

These initiatives enabled staff to maintain contact with residents and businesses via phone, email and online in order to continue providing services within this "new normal" paradigm.

In-person services, including Parks & Recreation programming and rentals and services provided by Roseville's License and Passport Center, were regrettably yet unavoidably closed.

Roseville's closure order was extended through April 10 by Minnesota Governor Tim Walz's #StayHomeMN executive order and then again by the city through May 3 based upon continuing developments of COVID-19 and the danger to public health.

Roseville is committed to responding to the needs of the community and providing necessary services. The city continues to monitor and assess the pandemic locally and will follow the guidance of the state health officials regarding the potential for future changes to city operations and activities.

Neighborhood Enhancement Program


Roseville is kicking off another year of the Neighborhood Enhancement Program (NEP), the city's proactive approach to inspecting properties. This summer, inspectors will look for code violations and work with property owners to make repairs when they are small and before they become more costly.

The city will use door hangers to notify residents of concerns. Staff will leave a yellow door hanger identifying the code violation and the timeframe for re-inspection. Staff will talk directly with business owners or managers about issues at places of business that need to be addressed

The program includes inspections of homes and multi-family, commercial and industrial properties. This year, staff will visit properties in the northern half of the city.

Toilet tissue is designed to disintegrate quickly so it can safely pass through sanitary sewer pipes. Other products do not break down and will clog pipes.

The City of Roseville does regular maintenance on the city's sewer lines, and is responsible for repairs to the main sewer line. Property owners are responsible for sewer repairs from the home or business to the main sewer line. If a person calls a plumber and the problem is in the main sewer line, the property owner is responsible to pay the plumber for visiting the property.

Meet Finance Director Michelle Pietrick

The City of Roseville welcomes Finance Director Michelle Pietrick. A resident of Roseville, Pietrick brings a wealth of municipal finance experience to her new post, including the past seven years as Finance Director with the City of South St. Paul.

In her new role, Pietrick is responsible for coordinating the strategic development of Roseville's budget and capital improvement plan. She will oversee the city's investment and debt management, develop and implement financial policies and manage the Finance Department's staff as well as the city's busy License and Passport centers.



Q: What attracted you to this position with the City of Roseville?

A: The opportunity to be involved in a broader range of municipal activities including economic development, the ability to help guide the budgeting in my home city, and the great things that I have heard and knew about the staff.

Q: What are you most looking forward to working on?

A: Maintaining our financial integrity and diversity, which will help preserve our AAA bond rating. To position the city to be resilient in the face of any future recessions and our ability to continue to replace our infrastructure and capital assets without having to issue debt or unduly impact our taxpayers.

Q: What got you interested in working in the field of accounting and finance?

A: When I was in high school I had the opportunity to take an accounting class that paired well with my love for math. I had the opportunity to work in billing and accounts receivable at the age of 16, which lead me to decide on accounting as my major in college.

Q: What do you like most about working in local government?

A: The ability to work in a variety of areas and to have an impact on providing services that directly help people. The people I have been fortunate to work with over the years in local government and working together towards providing the best service to our residents.

Q: How have the first few weeks gone since starting the job?

A: The first few weeks have involved learning who people are and how Roseville operates. But, I would say that it has been a most unusual first month with the current situation and having to react to quickly changing external factors while trying to get up to speed. While we are dealing with something that none of us would have ever anticipated, it has shown me how well the city's management team is working together and really solidifies that we have a well-run city.

Public Works Keeping Busy

With winter now an (almost) distant memory, Roseville's Public Works crews have begun to focus on warm weather projects. There's plenty to get done during the spring, summer and fall before the snow starts to fly again.

In addition to supervising the annual Pavement Management Program of street upgrades, crews will be making spot curb and street patching repairs, filling potholes, sealing cracks, completing repairs to pathways and freshening up pavement markings.

There are also 1,742 public hydrants in Roseville to test, flush and paint, as needed.

Stormwater management projects will receive plenty of attention, too. Lift stations, stormwater ponds, sewers, catch basins and outfalls all need to be inspect and cleaned out.

Keeping Roseville looking neat and tidy is another big priority. Streets crews complete sweeps of the city in spring and summer and during the fall, along with right-of-way mowing and streetscape maintenance throughout the summer.

The Public Works Department is also responsible for Roseville's drinking water. Crews gather, test and submit samples weekly to make sure the water supply remains safe.

These are just some of the tasks that keep Roseville's Public Works crews busy during Minnesota's non-winter months.

Free Meals Offered to Area Youth

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is working to ensure that kids do not go hungry over the summer months. The USDA will be offering free meals through the Summer Food Service Program at locations throughout Minnesota, including sites in Roseville. Meals will be provided at no cost to kids 18 years and younger.

Pathway Improvement Projects

Summer 2020 will see a number of improvements to Roseville's pathways and trails. The Public Works Department plans to construct and/or rehabilitate more than a mile of pathways across the city.

The project calls for a new pathways at Langton Lake Park and Tamarack Park and the Central Park Ballfields. Existing pathways at Willow Pond Park and in Central Park from the Victoria Ballfields to Dale St. will receive resurfacing upgrades.

Public Works will also construct a new 200-foot sidewalk connection on the east side of Dale St. from the B-Dale parking lot to the existing sidewalk that connects to sidewalks on County Road B.

Creating a Pollinator Friendly Yard

June 22-28 is National Pollinator Week. Let's celebrate bees, birds, butterflies, bats and beetles.

Pollinators are vital for most flowers, fruits and vegetables to reproduce. Many of the country's crops would not exist and crop yield and quality would be greatly reduced without pollinators. The pollinator population, in particular the honeybee, has declined rapidly in recent years because of habitat loss, pesticide overuse and disease. You can help.

- Grow plants that provide natural food sources – nuts, berries or nectar
- Provide water, such as a birdbath or small pond, for wildlife
- Offer protective cover ground cover, shrubs, tall grasses and nesting boxes
- Practice sustainable gardening use mulch or compost and avoid plants that are not native to the region or are invasive

Law enforcement agencies are reporting several types of scams related to the coronavirus. Beware of calls, texts or emails that involve COVID-19. Here are steps to help prevent becoming a victim of a scam.

- Slow Down! Delete emails that insist you act now. Phishing emails try to create a sense of urgency or demand immediate action. The goal is to get you to click on a link or provide personal information. Instead, delete the message.
- If you are not sure about the email or phone call, call a friend or family member before responding. Anyone asking you to pay over the phone or internet with MoneyGram, Western Union, iTunes, or any gift card is likely a scam.
- Rather than donating through an email solicitation or phone call, contact the charity directly, either by phone or visit the charity's website directly instead of clicking on any links in emails or other messages.
- Beware of requests for personal information. A call or email that seeks personal information like your Social Security number, banking information or login information is a phishing scam. Legitimate government agencies will not ask for that information. Do not give out your personal data unless you initiated the call or visited a trusted website.
- Check the email address or link. Inspect a link by hovering your cursor over the URL to see where it leads. Sometimes, it's obvious the web address is not legitimate. Phishers can create links that closely resemble legitimate addresses. Delete the email.
- Watch for spelling and grammatical mistakes. If an email includes spelling, punctuation or grammar errors, it's likely a sign you've received a phishing email. Delete it.
- Look for generic greetings. Phishing emails are unlikely to use your name. Greetings like "Dear sir or madam" signal an email may not be legitimate.

Roseville uses single-sort recycling. Drop recyclables, including cardboard boxes, mail, newspapers and magazines, plastic containers (#1, #2, #5), glass bottles and jars, aluminum and metal cans, beverage cartons, and juice boxes in your recycling cart. Have it at the curb by 7:00 a.m. on your recycling day.

Plastic bags cannot be recycled in the curbside recycling. Visit PlasticFilmRecycling.org to find a plastic bag drop-off location.

Summer will soon be here, and recycling is often an afterthought when planning your barbecue, party or family celebration. It doesn't have to be. Here are some ideas to reduce the use of plastic and add recycling at your event.

- Planning is key. Make informed food estimates so you have less to throw away at the end of the party.
- Use real dishes, silverware and serving spoons. If you use disposable cutlery, look for compostable options.
- Stay away from Styrofoam. It's not recyclable and it's not good for the environment.
- Serve beverages from a large dispenser rather than single serve options.
- Use cloth table coverings and napkins.
- Provide clearly marked recycling containers.
