2022 City Budget Finalized and Approved

With the December 6, 2021 meeting in the books, Roseville City Council adopted the 2022 budget. The \$58.1 million budget is supported by \$24.8 million in property tax revenues and is the result of a months-long process that started in April, 2021.

City Manager Pat Trudgeon is pleased with the collaborative efforts involved in the creation of this year’s budget proposal.

“I appreciate the effort of the public and council for taking a look at this budget from a holistic perspective,” Trudgeon says. “It’s exciting to see how the budget aligns with what we’ve outlined for our city priorities... now it’s time to start ‘doing the work’ to make sure these funded priorities see action in 2022.”

2022 Budget Priorities Include:

- Investment in maintaining City programs and workforce to cover inflationary costs - \$729,304 levy increase
- Investment in infrastructure - \$220,000 levy increase
- Investing in equity work to improve community outcomes - \$126,000 levy increase
- New staffing impacts to include an environmental intern, fire cadet, and communications reorganization - \$91,250 levy increase
- Use of Federal ARPA funds to assist in community COVID recovery
- Strategic use of financial reserves

Even while meeting these priorities, the \$58.1 million budget holds the line on spending and is a reduction from the 2022 total city budget. This reduction is due to the 2021 capital needs at the OVAL that aren’t replicated in 2022, and for the cost savings associated with moving IT Metro-INET functions to a separate entity in 2022.

Estimated City Tax Levy Impact

The median valued home of \$296,500 will see an increase of \$5.38 per month in city property taxes – or a \$64.56 annual increase. The majority of this increase is due to the 5.7% increase in the median valuation of homes set by the Ramsey County Assessor.

January 17, 2022: Martin Luther King Jr. Day

In honor and memorial of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. the City of Roseville declares January 17, 2022 “Martin Luther King Jr. Day. The date is honored every year on the third Monday of January to honor King Jr.’s contributions to racial justice, equality and civil rights for all. Community members are encouraged to come together in service to their neighbors and communities.

In honor of this national holiday, City Council officially proclaims January 17, 2022 Martin Luther King Jr. Day for the City of Roseville.



January: Human Trafficking Awareness Month

Human trafficking is a nationwide public health and civil rights crisis. Its victims and survivors are everywhere, with Roseville being no exception.

As a city that strives to become a place where people have opportunities available to them, and where all people are treated as fully human and worthy of a supportive community and freedom, we want to make people aware that human trafficking happens everywhere, but it is not accepted in the City of Roseville.

City Council officially declares January, 2022 as Human Trafficking Awareness and Prevention Month in the City of Roseville.



February: Black History Month

The City of Roseville is committed to recognizing and honoring the contributions of black people and African Americans throughout our history, despite the erasure of many of these accomplishments in historical accounts and documents.

As the month of February marks the birth of Frederick Douglas, W.E.B DuBois, Langston Hughes, and Abraham Lincoln, leaders whose actions greatly impacted the lives of the American Black population, the City of Roseville invites all members of the Roseville Community to renew their commitment to ensuring racial equality, understanding and justice and to participate in activities designed to advance the cause of freedom and equity for all.

City Council officially declares February, 2022 as Black History Month in the City of Roseville.

A Collaborative Approach to End Human Trafficking

In an ongoing effort to ensure that city proclamations are more than words on a piece of paper, the City of Roseville wishes to highlight renewed efforts to bring awareness to human trafficking in the city, and beyond. These approaches are championed by the Roseville Police Department and take a victim-centered approach to the enforcement of human trafficking.

Roseville Police Sex Crimes Detective and the Roseville Police Community Action Team (CAT) continue to investigate cases involving human trafficking with the goal of providing an offramp for victims and to disrupt those who promote human trafficking and sex trafficking.

In 2018, the Roseville Police Department and Roseville Police Foundation co-created the Roseville Collaboration to End Human Trafficking. The collaboration includes the Roseville Visitors Association, Roseville Rotary, SourceMN, Grace Church, Roseville Police Department, and the Roseville Police Foundation.

The collaboration is currently implementing a 3-pronged approach – Educate, Enforce, and Offramp.

Educate: After the State of Minnesota passed the Sex Trafficking Prevention Training bill (SF 3367 and HF 3287) task force leaders met with management of Roseville hotels for mandatory hotel training. Ongoing and refresher trainings aim to keep staff educated with current trends and any policy changes, and to ensure new employees have the opportunity to receive training.

Enforce: This component is limited to targeting those who promote human/sex trafficking or those who choose to purchase services from a promoter. It does NOT focus on punishment for those who are victims of human/sex trafficking.

Offramp: Perhaps the most important prong, the offramp component aims to move those being trafficked into programs that support their wellbeing and discourages re-entry into a life of abuse. Local non-profit and human trafficking victim resource, SourceMN, is included during investigative details, where they have the opportunity to immediately provide resources and support to victims, often in an adjoining hotel room or apartment unit. **Visit [SourceMN.org](https://sourcemn.org) to learn more.**



“Cases involving human trafficking can be extremely complex,” says Lt. Jen Engh, “these crimes, and those who promote these crimes are often concealed very well.”

Finance

The Finance commission’s role is to advise on short-term and long-term financial policy matters, including but not limited to cash reserve funds, budgets, financing, and capital replacement policies.

Human Rights, Inclusion and Equity (HRIEC)

Do you want to help make Roseville more welcoming and inclusive for all?

The Roseville Human Rights, Inclusion and Engagement Commission acts in an advisory capacity to the City Council on matters of human rights, inclusion and engagement.

Parks and Recreation

Do you value our city parks and recreational programs?

The Roseville Parks and Recreation Commission is an advisory committee that makes recommendations to the Director of Parks and Recreation, the City Manager and the Roseville City Council on all matters relating to parks and recreation programs, facilities and services.

Planning and Variance

Do you want to help decide how we develop vacant lots in the city?

The Planning Commission (and Variance Board) identifies and addresses issues concerning development plans, policies, and specific applications. The group offers recommendations to the city council for final action on planning cases.

Police Civil Service Commission

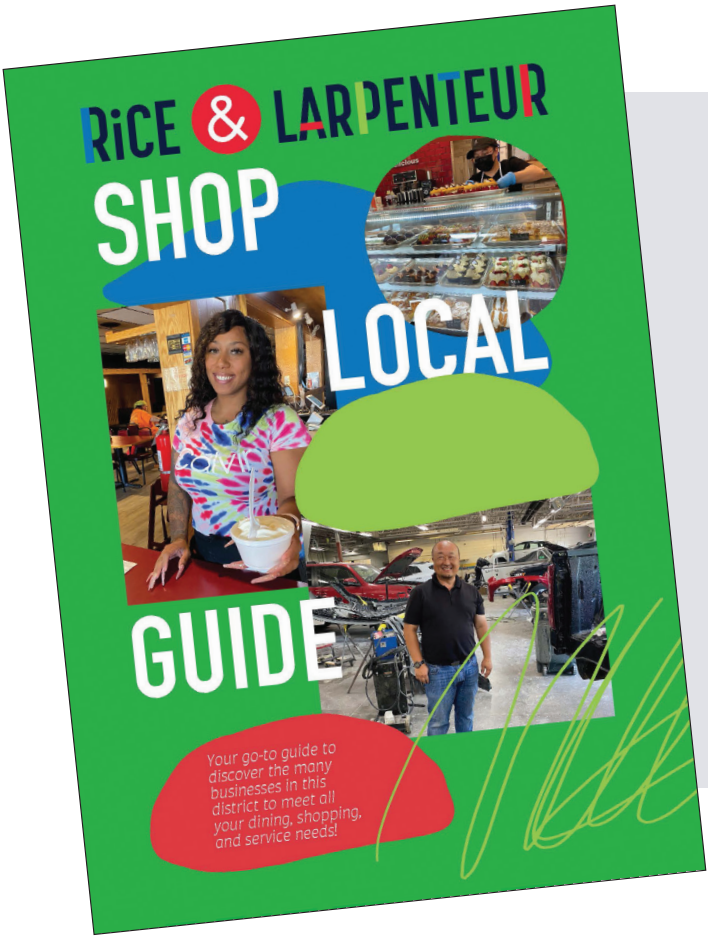
Do you want to ensure the employment practices of the police department are fair and reasonable?

Holiday Recycling: Know before you throw

As you are getting ready to toss your holiday decorations, please take note:

Holiday greenery is not accepted at Ramsey County yard waste collection sites because of the likelihood of contamination from metal wires and decorations. Please place holiday greenery in the trash, in a separate plastic bag to limit invasive pests from being dispersed.

Ramsey County yard waste sites will accept evergreen (holiday/Christmas) trees. They are mulched and later used as fuel to generate electricity.

Do not toss batteries in the trash

Do not put batteries in your curbside trash or recycling – they are considered hazardous waste. You may bring all types of batteries to a household hazardous waste collection site for free (see below).

Holiday Light Disposal

Did you know: non-LED lights can be placed in the trash, but LED lights are considered hazardous because of their energy-efficient circuit boards? Please take those items to a hazardous waste collection site, for free: RamseyCounty.us/content/holiday-lights



Do not place holiday lights (tangles) in your curbside recycling.



Roseville uses single-sort recycling. Drop all recyclables, including cardboard boxes, mail, newspapers, magazines, plastic containers (#1, #2, #5), glass bottles and jars, aluminum and metal cans, beverage cartons, and juice boxes in your recycling cart. Have it at the curb by 7:00 a.m. on your recycling day.

Recycling is picked up every other week on the same day as your trash. Call Eureka Recycling at 612-669-2783 with recycling questions or to report a missed pick-up. Interpreters are available to respond to inquiries in Hmong, Karen, Somali and Spanish. Call 612-669-2783 ext. 1 for assistance.

Public Safety Tips for Caregivers

Roseville Police Officers and Roseville Firefighters know firsthand that there is not a ‘one-size-fits-all’ approach for providing public safety services to persons with vulnerabilities. Here are a few basic tips that may help keep those in your care, safe:

Vulnerable Persons Registry

Information is vital during emergencies. Let first responders know about the uniqueness of your situation. E.g. Alzheimer’s, dementia, wandering, etc. You can register a person through the Roseville Police Department’s Online Reporting System on the Roseville Police Department website at [CityofRoseville.com/Police](https://www.cityofroseville.com/Police) or by calling the police main line 651-792-7008.

Take a Daily Photo

In the case of wandering, a recent photo is critical for helping to locate people. Often, older photos can include a different hairstyle, clothing, or other factors that make it more difficult to identify someone. For those who are more likely to wander, we encourage a daily photo and in a format that can be easily texted or emailed. When appropriate, public safety will share the photo to neighboring agencies and the public through social media as a Missing Person Alert.

Report Missing Persons Quickly

The longer the time between “last seen” and “reported missing,” the larger the search area. Do not hesitate to report 9-1-1 as soon as you are confident that a person is missing. It is easy to cancel a missing person report should you locate them.

Prioritizing Equity: Strategic Action Plan Update

As the City of Roseville continues to be more diverse, the city has outlined a strategic equity action plan to address current inequities, and make improvements to meet the needs of all our community members. This Strategic Equity Action Plan for the City of Roseville is designed to implement the goals and milestones associated with three key priorities, while including stakeholder input wherever possible.

The three priorities identified in the action plan are:

FOCUS on Hiring and Recruitment – As the city continues to identify issues, work through solutions, new programs and services, and work toward our collective vision for the future, the challenge is ensuring we have the diversity needed to meet the unique needs among all Roseville residents. City staff has been working diligently to gather available recruitment data. This next year they will analyze the data and start to implement intentional change in the city’s recruitment processes.

DIVERSIFY Representation on Boards and Commissions – After reviewing the processes, identifying opportunities for improvement, and gathering stakeholder feedback, city staff will implement some improvements to recruitment and selection processes for boards and commissions. Keep a lookout for these changes – which will begin early in 2022. The changes will include a focus on elevating communications and outreach efforts, improving the experience of residents in the commission application and interview process, and revamping the commissioner orientation and onboarding experience to provide a foundation of understanding of the role of a commissioner prior to the “on-the-job” learning that occurs at the first official meeting.

IMPLEMENT an Equity Toolkit – An equity toolkit is a list of questions that guides city leaders through reflection, analysis of available data, appropriate community engagement efforts, and planning. This toolkit helps address a new policy, program, or service in the city that directly impacts community members. This policy was created in Fall 2021 and city leaders are working to finalize equity toolkit questions before moving toward implementation.

Know the Code

Please Don't Feed the Deer

The MN DNR has a ban on all wildlife feeding that has a potential to attract and congregate deer. When City staff receives a concern about deer feeding, a site visit is scheduled and if the violation is verified, City staff forwards the complaint to the MN DNR Conservation officer for enforcement.

Snow Plow Rules and Regulations

With more than 123 miles of roadway to clear, the City of Roseville needs your help to keep snow and ice issues to a minimum during our winter months. Report hazardous conditions to Roseville Streets at 651-792-7004.

Did you know?

Parking on City streets is not allowed after a continuous 2" accumulation of snow for up to 48 hours or until the street is plowed full width (curb-to-curb). If your vehicle is parked in violation, it is considered a "nuisance vehicle" and is subject to removal and/or a fine.

Don't forget the sidewalks

Sidewalks must be cleared of snowfall within 12 hours. Not only is it dangerous, pushing or blowing snow from driveways and sidewalks onto public roads is prohibited (Minnesota Statute 160.2715). Thanks in advance, for helping keep our sidewalks and roadways safe for our community.

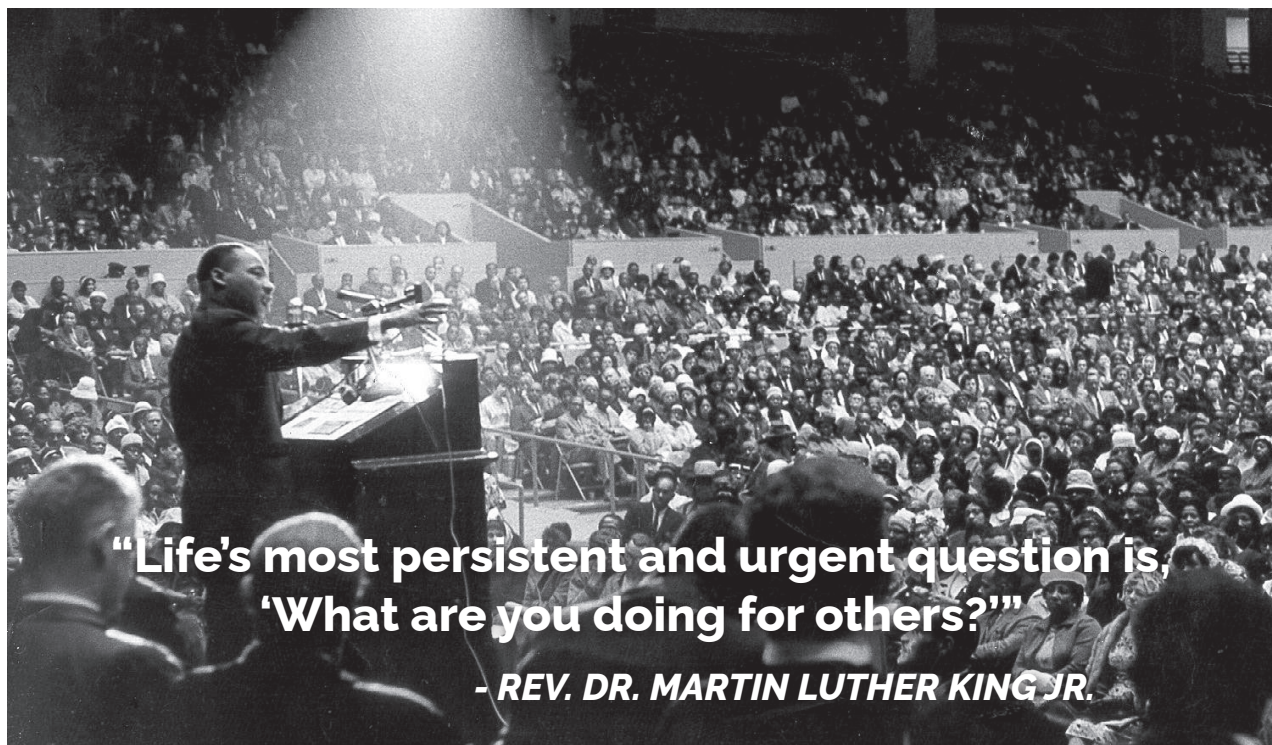

More Than a Smile

As a dentist, continuous learning is critical, as the field of dentistry is constantly changing. For Dr. Deborah Fung, owner of Designing Smiles in Roseville, that mantra holds true as much for her profession as for her relationship to the Roseville community.

"I came to Minnesota for my dental degree and the plan was to move home after," said Dr. Fung, who is from Canada. "Once I was here, I loved the area and never really had any inkling to leave."

Designing Smiles offers general dentistry services to people of all ages. They specialize in orthodontics, root canal therapy, implants, cosmetic dentistry and oral surgery. Dr. Fung says she focuses on interactive communication and attentive care for her patients—so that her team can meet their patients' personal needs, expectations and budget for dental treatment.

Why Roseville?

Dr. Fung earned her dental degree from the University of Minnesota School of Dentistry in 1992. She set up her practice in Roseville in 2000. Dr. Fung says choosing Roseville made sense for a number of reasons, including a central Twin Cities location and the advantages Roseville brings to her professional life as a Twin Cities medical hub. Personally, Dr. Fung has found Roseville helps balance work and life.

"You cannot beat the central location between Minneapolis and St. Paul, in terms of the convenience of healthcare, childcare, shopping and travel," she said. "Really, anything I need is within ten minutes of home or the office," she said.

More than teeth

Dr. Fung has always placed an emphasis on continuing her education. Around seven years ago, she was introduced to myofunctional therapy as a collaborative method to complement dentistry. Myofunctional growth pertains to the facial muscle and skeletal growth. As a result, she and her staff have woven a focus on the importance of airway development. They teach their patients that the foundation for a great healthy smile begins with our breathing habits.

So she created Counting Sheep, a sleep disordered breathing solutions clinic located adjacent to Designing Smiles where patients can learn and focus on the importance of myofunctional therapy with a speech language pathologist and dental hygienist.

"So many people do not understand the role facial muscle management plays in developing facial bones, which guide jaw growth," said Dr. Fung. "At Counting Sheep, patients can take a little time to form a goal of reducing those issues and increasing the possibility of healthy teeth structure over the course of a lifetime."

Continuous learning

Dr. Fung enjoys the learning process because she knows that new techniques impact dentistry every year, especially as medical and dental fields continue to collaborate more. But more importantly, Dr. Fung wants to be able to apply the best possible knowledge for a community she loves.

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
