Celebrate Summer in Roseville!

The City of Roseville and its community partners are hosting dozens of events offering entertainment, food, and fun for all ages.

Roseville kicks off the warm weather season with the Rice & Larpenteur Alliance Community In Bloom celebration on Saturday, May 11 at Lake McCarrons County Park. This familyfriendly celebration features free food, games, and information booths.



The city is a proud sponsor of Roseville's 6th Annual Juneteenth Celebration on Saturday, June 15 at Central Park. This event presented by the nonprofit Do Good Roseville offers free food, entertainment, and family-friendly activities. The daylong event features Black artists, performers, and vendors.

Rosefest, the city's signature summer celebration kicks off with the 32nd Annual Rose Parade on Monday, June 24. The weeklong celebration includes Taste of Rosefest; theatrical and musical entertainment; golf, pickleball, and disc golf tournaments; and Run for the Roses. Rosefest crescendos with Party in the Park on Saturday, June 29, a daylong celebration at Central Park that includes live music, games, activities, food trucks and a fireworks finale at sunset!

Residents in nearly 100 neighborhoods gather to celebrate community and safe neighborhoods with first responders at Night to Unite on Tuesday, August 6.

The city also hosts several reccurring events throughout summer including:

- Discover Your Parks at different parks seven Wednesdays including a Superhero Carnival at Acorn Park on Wednesday, June 26
- Puppet Wagon shows at neighborhood parks on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays
- Fridays with Firefighters at the Roseville Fire Station on June 14, July 12, and August 9
- **Live at the Rog**, a free concert series at the Frank Rog Amphitheater at Central Park starting on June 9

The new technology could also help the city's bottom line.

"Diesel engines have dramatically grown in cost, so we wanted to evaluate other options," Brosnahan said. "Electric engines cost more upfront, but year over year, I believe it will be less expensive."

The electric engine will cost an estimated \$1.8 million compared to \$1.1 to \$1.4 million for a diesel engine.

But the new vehicle will last an estimated 10 years as the department's primary or "first out" truck and a total of 20 years as part of the city's fleet. Diesel fire engines typically last five years as the "first out" truck with a 15-year life span.

The electric fire engine also comes with a longer five-year bumper-to-bumper warranty compared to a standard 1-year warranty on a traditional diesel apparatus, this will also help to reduce maintenance costs. In addition, the electric truck will save the city as much as \$15,000 in diesel fuel annually.

Roseville to buy electric fire truck

The City of Roseville is purchasing a new stateof-the-art electric fire engine, which will reduce greenhouse emissions and deepen the city's investment in sustainable technology.

The electric vehicle's smaller, sleeker design means it can maneuver in tighter spaces, and a quieter, more ergonomic cab will reduce firefighter injuries.

The City Council approved the purchase of the electric engine earlier this year, making Roseville one of the first cities in the state to make the investment. Fire department leaders are working with the manufacturer Rosenbauer with plans to have the fire truck in service by 2025. Roseville currently has three diesel fire engines and replaces one every five years.

"Innovation has always been part of the City of Roseville's culture," said Roseville Fire Chief David Brosnahan. "In addition, The City Council and staff have also taken a very proactive approach to sustainability, so this investment in an electric fire engine is consistent with that environmental stewardship."

Introducing Antonio Montez, the City's new Equity and **Inclusion Manager**

Antonio Montez started at the City of Roseville in late March. He comes from Ramsey County where he served as a racial and health equity administrator for the past two and a half years. Montez has nearly two decades of professional experience in equity work; government contracting and procurement; business-to-business sales; sales management and human resources.

Antonio is a key member of the City Manager's leadership team. His role in the city is to integrate equity and inclusion principles into all operations, projects, and services of the city.

Antonio was born and raised in St. Paul's Frogtown neighborhood in a multiracial family. Antonio is fluent in Spanish.

He joined the City of St. Paul as a procurement specialist focusing on how the city partnered with small businesses. When city leaders decided to provide racial equity training for all employees, Antonio served as a designated frontline champion of those efforts.

At the county, he worked with a variety of departments including the County Attorney's Office, Emergency

Communications, Sheriff's Office, Public Works, Parks and Recreation, and the County Manager's Office.

His first priority will be to get to know staff, community members, city leaders, and departments.

"Equity and inclusion work is built on relationships and trust. We have to have those good relationships to move forward in this work. My first 90 days are going to be about building trust and relationships," Montez said.

"If we have trust, we can talk about partnership and what partnership looks like as we are talking about advancing equity. Equity is about meeting folks where they are at. It's not a one-size-fits-all

Longtime Roseville Big Band director to make his final curtain call

Roseville Big Band leader Glen Newton was tapping out tunes on the piano before most youngsters could read. Glen's mother taught her precocious son to play at age 4.

"We had two pianos in the house. Mom and I played two-piano numbers together a lot," he recalled.

That early exposure kindled a lifelong passion for music and performance with Glen learning to play more than two dozen instruments as well as compose and arrange music. For more than three decades, Glen has shared that talent and showmanship as part the Roseville Big Band.

Glen is retiring as the big band director this summer after leading the group for nearly 35 years.



"He has been the heart of the band for a long time," said the band's lead trombonist Keith Miner. "He is an amazing musician. Glen pulls out and plays all sorts of instruments just for the fun of it. He also brings a lot of fun and creativity to the group with his writing and arranging."

The Roseville Big Band performed 400 times with 220 volunteer musicians during Glen's tenure. Every year they entertain crowds at the city's signature celebration, Rosefest. The Roseville Big Band is a program of the Roseville Parks and Recreation Department.

The Big Band also plays Carlton College's Midwinter Ball and 1940s themed hangar dances for the Commemorative Air Force at Fleming Field Airport in South St. Paul.

Their expansive repertoire includes over 700 songs ranging from the toe-tapping World War II-era swing anthem "Sing, Sing, Sing" to the playful 1960s pop hit "Monster Mash," to the melancholy jazz standard "My Funny Valentine."

Glen has also written 9 original compositions for the band, including the band's theme song, "Dance to the Big Band Swing." He also composes and arranges music for the band. He sings with the group when he's not filling in missing musical parts on the trumpet, trombone, or vibraphone. He often directs, plays, and sings all at the same concert.

"I am trying to combat my tendency to overcommit. This will free up time for writing family history, composing, and traveling with my wife, Jill."

"He has just been leader extraordinaire," said Karen Dunn, the Big Band's lead female singer. "I have been singing with him for more than 25 years. He arranges most of the songs for the Rosetones quartet, which performs with the band. He is quite the musical genius really and truly."

Glen, a retired software engineer, said he is stepping down so he can pursue other hobbies.

Glen was named director in 1989. He added more crowd-pleasing vocals including duets, trios, and the Rosetones quartet.

Glen incorporated imaginative flourishes into their performances, including horn moves and playful props, such as a mad scientist costume for Monster Mash. He's also helped the big band enter the social media age with more than 150,000 views of their performances on YouTube.



"Glen introduces new music regularly, so we are always playing new things. Everyone appreciates that he is trying to make it interesting for both the band members and the audience," Keith said.

"He just wants everyone to have an opportunity to play," Karen said. "He is very kind and supportive in that way."

Glen's last performance as director will be in June. The City of Roseville thanks Glen for his time, talent and dedication to our community.

Electric fire truck continued

In order to ensure operation at long emergency incidents, the new electric engine also includes an energy back-up unit. This is a small diesel engine and electric generator that is mounted on the top of the engine to provide electricity for incidents that exceed the battery capacity. This means that no matter the incident the fire department can still fully operate for as long as needed.

The city plans to pursue grants now available to help offset the initial costs.

The environmental benefits, including improved air quality at emergency scenes, will be immediate, Brosnahan said. That's because fire engines must be left running while firefighters battle a blaze or respond to an incident. Sometimes those incidents can last hours.

"I have been out on calls where we had to bring out a diesel fuel truck to refuel fire engines while they are out on the scene," Brosnahan said.

The electric truck will reduce those emissions.

Assistant Fire Chief Neil Sjostrom said improving working conditions is also another motivation. Cabs in older diesel fire engines are loud and hot, which can impact firefighters' hearing and stress levels.

Older fire engines have a 24-inch step-up into the cab. That step, done thousands of times in a career with 80 pounds of gear strapped to firefighters' backs, puts strain on knees and hips.

The electric fire truck has a 7-inch step-up and a much quieter cab, Sjostrom said.





"We believe we can reduce injuries and workers' compensation costs. But it's not just about careers." Sjostrom said. "It's our goal as an employer to be looking for ways to ensure employees have both a healthy career and a healthy retirement."



JUNETEENTH IN ROSEVIL

Celebrate Juneteenth with free food, music, entertainment, artists, and vendors from around the Twin Cities

The City of Roseville is a proud sponsor of the 6th Annual Juneteenth Celebration presented by the nonprofit Do Good Roseville. Festivities run from 11:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. on Saturday, June 15 at Roseville's Central Park, 2540 Lexington Ave. N.

"It's great we can have this celebration in our own city, so residents and people of color don't have to go to another city to be in community and honor Black culture and wealth," said Roseville resident Keith Allen, who is on the event's organizing



"It's also an opportunity to further expose my children to Juneteenth," explained Allen, who is the director of Community Health Programs at M Health Fairview. "I enjoy that my kids can have a safe place in their own community to have something that represents their culture in a positive light."

Juneteenth is the celebration of the end of slavery in the United States. Also called Black Independence Day or Jubilee, June 19 has been commemorated in African American communities since 1866. It became a federal holiday in 2021 uplifting Black culture and is now celebrated by all Americans.

M Health Fairview is an event sponsor providing blood pressure checks and health information at the celebration, Allen said. Other sponsors include Roseville Area Community Foundation, Bremer Bank, and UCare.

Roseville's Juneteenth celebration dates back to 2017. That year a small group of friends including Nyia and Rasheem Harris and their children gathered to share a modest meal.

"Roseville is a predominately white community, and most people hadn't even heard of Juneteenth in 2017. There were maybe 12 of us at a park including kids," Rasheem Harris recalls. "We made some hotdogs on the grill. We just wanted to get together to recognize Juneteenth. That was the humble beginnings of this endeavor."

Do Good Roseville began planning the grassroots community celebration in 2019. This year, hundreds of people are expected to attend centered around the Frank Rog Amphitheater.

"It's grown leaps and bounds year after year. It's wonderful to have an event that people of color can be proud of in Roseville," Rasheem Harris said.

Nyia Harris will return as the event's master of ceremonies.

Real Cooks Kitchen Soulfood and Dars Double Scoop, both Black-owned businesses, will cater the event. Food and entertainment are free.



"It's great to honor and celebrate Juneteenth alongside community. As the city works to be more equitable and inclusive in all that it does, partnering with community in a meaningful and authentic way must be central to those efforts," said Roseville Equity and Inclusion Manager Antonio Montez. "Many people didn't learn about Juneteenth in school, helping bring awareness to our community, sharing its history and celebrating Black culture is a part of that work. It's amazing to see!"

The City of Roseville will replace some water lines while Ramsey County crews have the old pavement removed. Affected residents will be notified via a door hangar.

Reserve police officer helps keep city safe

Kathryn Smith is a successful business owner, has operated a daycare for the past three decades, and is also a professional dog trainer. When she's not caring for kids or training problem pups, Kathryn volunteers as a Roseville Police reserve officer.

She patrols in a squad car, transports suspects to the county detention centers, helps with event security, directs traffic, and assists full-time Roseville police officers as needed. She also helps to train new reserve officers.

Kathryn is one of seven Roseville reserve officers who help keep the city safe.

To be a reserve, applicants must be 18 years of age or older, pass a background check, complete training, and be available to serve during the city's signature celebration - Rosefest.

"We have all different backgrounds from dog trainers and daycare operators, like me, to IT instructors, parks managers, and retired folks. We have reserve officers in their 20s, all the way up to their 70s." Kathryn said.

Kathryn always wanted to go into law enforcement, but back problems in early adulthood thwarted those career plans. She started her daycare business instead. Kathryn's love of animals prompted her to start a second business focused on dog training 15 years ago. She was working with police canines when a St. Paul police officer told her about this unique volunteer opportunity.

"The Roseville reserve program is one of the best," Kathryn said. "There is so much you can do. Reserve officers can serve on the events team, which includes helping out at parades and community events. They can complete additional training and join the patrol team. Many of us do

Kathryn is also a volunteer member of Ramsey County Sheriff Water Patrol search and rescue dive team, a sheriff reserve deputy. She's also the handler of Sgt. Fuzz, St. Paul Police Department's First Responder Therapy Canine.

"You get to know people in the community, and you get to know the officers. I enjoy it. I especially love teaching and sharing what I have learned."

"You always have to be aware of your surroundings, and that only happens when you go out over and over again," Kathryn said. You have to be focused and consistent."

Kathryn and other Roseville reserve officers who complete the advanced patrol training are allowed to drive police vehicles and run license

"We are an extra pair of eyes out there. We check the parks, make sure everything is ok," Kathryn said. "We spend time out of our squad cars and talk to people in parks and along trails, just to be a friendly presence."

"We can write citations for violations of city codes, although I have never written one," Kathryn said. "I prefer to just talk to people."

When reserve officers observe danger or run a license plate and discover a vehicle is stolen, they immediately use their radios to notify full-time officers, who will respond.

"Our Police Reserve Program is an extremely valuable community asset," says Roseville Deputy Chief of Police Joe Adams. "Not only do they provide great community service on their own, but they also free up our full-time officers so they can focus on some of the harder challenges in the community."
