Police Warn of New Sophisticated Scams

Roseville Police is hosting two presentations to help educate Roseville residents on the latest scams. "Identity theft and scams are becoming increasingly sophisticated," warns **Detective Ryan Weber**, who currently serves as the department's Financial Crimes and Fraud Investigator. "The best way to reduce identity theft and fraud is through prevention."

The 90-minute presentation aims to educate you on the latest scams, offers tips to prevent identity theft, and provides resources on what to do if you become a victim.

"In most cases, once your information is shared and money is transferred, it is nearly impossible to get it back," says Weber. "We're hoping to spread the word and help people detect these scams before it's too late."

The presentations will be at Roseville City Hall (2660 Civic Center Dr) in the Council Chambers on April 30, 2025 at 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. The presentations are free, but registration is required.

City Moving Forward with Maintenance Operations Center

The City of Roseville is moving forward with plans to build a new Maintenance Operations Center for the Public Works and Parks and Recreation departments.

In November 2024, Roseville voters approved a ballot question allowing the city to enact a half-cent local sales tax to build a new Public Works and Parks Operations Facility at a cost of \$64.2 million. It passed with 55% voting yes.

The new operations facility is designed to be a flexible, multipurpose space that is roughly three times the size of the current building. Portions of the current building date back to the 1950s.

The new building, to be located on the northwest corner of Lexington Ave. N. and Woodhill Drive, will serve as a more efficient, centralized hub for essential city services, including:

- Water distribution and sanitary sewer systems
- Road work and pathway work
- Snow removal
- Maintenance of the city's 33 parks
- Storage and repair of more than 300 vehicles including snowplows, street sweepers, and fire engines

City Engineer Elected President of MN Society of Professional Engineers



Roseville City Engineer **Jennifer Lowry** has stepped into a high-profile leadership role.

Lowry is currently serving as the president of the Minnesota Society of Professional Engineers (MnSPE).

The society provides professional development and Professional Engineer licensure advocacy for all engineering disciplines and industries in the state. MnSPE - an affiliate state society of the National Society of Professional Engineers – also provides outreach and leadership to support Minnesota's future STEM workforce. Through MnSPE Lowry is involved with MATHCOUNTS, a middle school competitive math program.

Lowry, who also serves as the city's Assistant Public Works Director, joined Roseville's team in 2023. The city's Engineering Department is responsible for all engineering related to the design and construction of streets, pathways, and utilities throughout the city, including preparation of plans, supervision, and inspection. It is also responsible for recycling and sustainability efforts by the city.

"Jennifer is a great asset to the City of Roseville. She is a great leader who is excellent at working with residents to meet their needs," said fellow engineer and Public Works Director Jesse Freihammer. "Her diverse work experience and expertise allows creative solutions to be found to meet city needs."

Lowry has nearly two decades of professional experience including engineering roles at the City of Minneapolis, Hennepin County, and the Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board.

Lowry earned a bachelor's of science from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. She originally thought she'd be a photographer or an architect but stumbled into engineering and found it was a great fit – she loves to know how things work.

Her favorite parts of her job are the variety of tasks and the people, both co-workers and residents.

"Providing safe and reliable city infrastructure and services isn't often understood or appreciated, but it is a huge part of what makes a city a welcoming community and I enjoy being a part of that," Lowry said

Roseville Fire Department's Calls for Service Reach Record Highs


Roseville firefighters responded to 7,544 calls in 2024, an increase of more than 9 percent in one year's time. That includes calls for fires, rescues, and emergency medical service. Roseville firefighters provide lifesaving care and medical assistance in these first critical minutes often before an ambulance arrives.

"That's more than 20 calls a day our crews are handling," said Roseville Fire Chief David Brosnahan. "Our 2025 call numbers are already on pace for another substantial increase. The fire department is facing significant challenges in managing the growing demand for emergency services."



The Chief said last year wasn't an anomaly. Total annual call volume has increased more than 36% in the last five years.

Brosnahan and Assistant Fire Chief Neil Sjostrom presented those statistics to the City Council in January and are recommending the city increase the number of fulltime firefighters in 2026 to maintain a high level of service.



The department's staffing request will be part of the city's budget process.

Brosnahan attributed the rising call numbers to several factors including the construction of more housing units, an aging population that relies more on emergency services, and evolving community expectations.



Roseville shifted from a volunteer/paid-on-call organization to professional, full-time staff in 2015. Now, residents who call 911 expect a quick, professional response, he said.



Roseville has 26 fulltime firefighters, who are all cross-trained as either a paramedic or an EMT. Between 6 to 8 firefighters are on duty at any given time

After comparing staffing levels and call volumes to other Twin Cities suburbs, Brosnahan and Sjostrom are recommending staffing levels be increased to 10 to 13 firefighters on duty at a time. This will allow RFD to respond to multiple calls at one time.

That would require adding 15 additional full-time firefighters. This staffing increase will cost an additional \$2 million annually, Brosnahan said.

"This is a serious issue for the community as emergency response times and the ability to provide adequate and equitable response and services are critical to the safety and well-being of the community," Brosnahan said.

Roseville Fire Hires Two New Cadets

The cadet program is an innovative hands-on training initiative launched in 2021 to help recruit new talent to the profession - oftentimes pulling from other sectors. Cadets in both Roseville Fire and Police Departments are paid, part-time positions that can lead to full-time job offers.

"We've had great success with our cadet program. We've hired several high-quality individuals as cadets, who we've trained and have become skilled firefighters and EMTs for the City of Roseville," said Assistant Fire Chief Neil Sjostrom.

Cadets train with the city's professional firefighters, work on industry certifications, go on emergency calls, and assist when appropriate.



Erik Castruita grew up in Isanti, Minn., and initially dreamed of being a furniture designer. He earned a bachelor's degree in product design from the University of Minnesota. Erik worked at a Twin Cities design firm for a year but felt a calling to become a first responder.

Tragically, Erik's brother-in-law, Burnsville Police Officer Paul Henrik Elmstrand, was one of three first responders killed by an armed suspect in February 2024.

"I had done a ride along with him a week prior to that. I was really close to him," Erik said. "Once that happened, I really thought about becoming a first responder a lot more. That's what really motivated me to want to do this type of work. He was a big advocate for it, and he loved it."

Erik completed his EMT certification in 2024 and became a Roseville fire cadet in January.



Dani Reali is a paid-per-call firefighter in Wisconsin who is interested in a full-time career as a first responder.

Dani joined her high school's firefighter explorer program in New Richmond, Wis., when she was a freshman.

"As soon as I was 16, I was able to take the college certificate courses. I got certified as a firefighter in the state of Wisconsin at age 17," Dani said.

Since then, she's also earned her Wisconsin fire inspector, fire instructor, hazardous material, and rope technician certifications. Upon graduating high school, Dani has served as a paid-per-call firefighter in her hometown and is currently a paid-per-call firefighter in Roberts, Wis.



Ashes has started accompanying first responders on some emergency calls.

The silver lab is a certified service dog who joined the fire department as a puppy in the fall of 2023. Her primary mission is to help soothe and calm our firefighters, who work stressful 24-hour shifts.

Her role is now expanding to comfort and calm residents experiencing a crisis. Ashes accompanies her handlers on appropriate calls where she can offer help. That includes folks receiving medical treatment from Roseville firefighter/EMTs and firefighter/paramedics, and individuals evacuating from a fire.

On a recent medical call, Ashes' presence helped a patient suffering an anxiety attack, said one of Ashes' handlers Firefighter Kristi Sjostrom. Petting Ashes lowered the patient's blood pressure and heart rate as they waited for an ambulance to arrive. Ashes also offers comfort to other agencies including Minnesota State Patrol, Ramsey County Emergency Dispatch, and Minneapolis first responders.

Ashes and her handlers train with Soldier 6, a Minnesota-based nonprofit that provides veterans and first responders with specially trained dogs. Several generous donations have made this venture possible.

Ashes will make guest appearances at several spring and summer events including Fridays with Firefighters. Come say hello and pick up her new trading card!



Meet Roseville's 2024 Sustainable Steward Gold Award Winner

From installing rooftop solar panels to planting pollinator gardens, Roseville residents are embracing sustainable practices in their own backyards!

A record number of 24 households and businesses applied for the 2024 Roseville Sustainable Steward Award. City leaders recognized the top three winners in January.

"We had many very impressive applicants this year. It was a tough competition," said Roseville Sustainability Specialist Noelle Bakken.



Gold Award Winners Anne Frenchick and Ted Thompson prioritized sustainability, energy efficiency, and reuse when remodeling their Roseville home at 449 Woodhill Dr. The couple, who have lived in Roseville since 1991, installed solar panels on their roof and added insulation to their home. They installed an air-source heat pump, an efficient furnace, and other energy efficient appliances to reduce energy usage.

They also leaned heavily into reuse. They reused salvageable items during their kitchen and backyard transformation. Using the Facebook group Buy Nothing Roseville, they were able to gather leftovers from neighbors' projects to create a landscaped flagstone path and other features in their backyard.

In the community, they adopted and maintained storm drains, which helps improve water quality. They also shared their unneeded building materials with others. Congratulations Anne and Ted, who won a \$500 prize!

Volunteers Help Kickstart Natural Resources Plan with Seeding Event

More than 50 incredible volunteers came together at Roseville parks for the Martin Luther King Day Natural Resources Seeding Event. Together, volunteers seeded a native seed mix across portions of Reservoir Woods and Villa Park, contributing to the restoration and preservation of our natural spaces.



"We appreciate all of our dedicated volunteers and want to say a huge thank you. Your hard work makes a big difference in caring for our natural spaces," said Roseville Parks Superintendent Jim Taylor.

The event was part of a new long-range plan to ensure that our parks remain healthy, beautiful, and biologically diverse spaces for all residents to enjoy. The City Council approved the Natural Resources Management Plan in 2024, which calls for the preservation and restoration of forested areas, wetlands, and prairie including oak savanna in Roseville's nearly 680 acres of parks and open space. When the seeding work was complete, volunteers gathered at the Cedarholm Community building for a networking event.

"The Natural Resources Plan really encourages us to focus on building connections among volunteers and not only focusing on the work," said Roseville Parks and Recreation Director Matthew Johnson.

The new plan builds on the city's earlier 2013 Natural Resources Management Plan. Staff and volunteers, with the help of an outside consultant, completed hundreds of preservation and restoration projects over the past decade.

New Roseville Recycling Carts

Roseville residents will receive new recycling carts in June.

The City of Roseville has switched its recycling hauler to Waste Management after a competitive bidding process. That will officially start on July 1, 2025. Waste Management was the low bidder and provided the best value for the city and its residents.

New black carts with blue lids, owned by the City of Roseville, will be deployed in phases this June. Eureka Recycling will pick up the current blue carts around the same time.

Residents will start using the new carts in July. Billing for recycling services is paid as part of the city utility bill. That will not change. There should be minimal disruption in service.

Roseville Mom Finds Sweet Success Making Maple Syrup, Teaching Others the Craft

Amy and Tony Perkins moved into their midcentury Roseville home in 2015, surrounded by a huge yard with five majestic maple trees.

Former middle school French teacher Amy later realized those trees had untapped potential.

"Both of my kids attended early childhood education and preschool at nearby Tamarack Nature Center. One year I went through their maple curriculum three times in a row," Amy explained. "By the third time, I was like: This isn't that hard. I could drill a hole in a tree. Then it hit me: I have five maple trees in my yard!"



Amy is now an award-winning maple syrup maker. She teaches children and adults the history of maple sugaring, first practiced by Native American tribes, and how to harvest sap and boil it into maple syrup in her own backyard. She's the City of Roseville's volunteer expert at the annual Tapping Time event at the Harriet Alexander Nature Center at Central Park.

"We are so lucky to have Amy as a volunteer! She brings a wealth of knowledge and experience, excellent teaching skills, and a true ability to inspire others with her passion and enthusiasm," said Roseville Parks and Recreation Deon Haider, who oversees the nature center. "It's impossible not to get swept up in Amy's excitement for maple syrup!"

Amy also started her own business, Come on Over Sugarbush Confections, where she and her business partner make and sell a variety of maple sugar candies and maple candied nuts. She judges the maple syrup competition at the Minnesota State Fair, and she holds the office of secretary in the Minnesota Maple Syrup Producers Association.



"Amy is a wonderful teacher and a natural leader. She coaches the other volunteers prior to the Tapping Time! event, which provides a good experience for those in attendance," said Roseville Volunteer Manager Rachel Boggs. "I love the warmth she brings when she volunteers, and her knowledge of maple syrup is amazing. The event would not be the same without her."

She's steadily grown her production and her knowledge of the craft, including when to tap, how to tap, and best methods for boiling. In 2023, she harvested 400 gallons of sap from more than 30 taps. She made nearly 10 gallons of syrup that year.



She also learned that sugaring - another name for harvesting maple sap - is a family tradition. Two generations back, her grandfather and his brothers spent time at their family's cabin and sugarbush near Chippewa Falls, Wisc., A handful of 80-year-old black and white photos are precious souvenirs of that history.

She said she's enjoyed how this passion has deepened her ties to her family, neighbors, and her community. A dedicated army of friends and neighbors show up every year to help with the work. Before Amy's mother passed, she told stories of her childhood memories of the family sugarbush. In 2022, Amy developed a maple syruping program with two classes at Emmet D Williams School. Every year, she teaches lessons about the history and mechanics of tapping at the school and then welcomes students to her house for a walking field trip and "hands-on" visit to the evaporator in the spring.

Amy said she is excited to share her passion and her knowledge at this year's Tapping Time!, which will be held on March 22-23.

Roseville Couple is the Force Behind the City's Newest Coffeehouse and Music Studio

Matt and Megan Sieberg own and operate Showtime Studio and Coffee, which they describe as a multi-purpose space connecting people through music, art, and coffee.

The business, at 2700 Lexington Ave N., includes two storefronts: an eclectic coffeehouse with multiple seating areas, a stage and a rotating gallery of local artwork; and a flexible studio space for musical performances, jam sessions, music lessons, dance groups, and community events.

"We have lived in Roseville for 10 years. We love Roseville and this is our way to invest back into it," Matt explained. "We are bringing a little bit more light into people's lives through music and through coffee. It's really just an excuse to bring people together."

The couple long dreamed of owning their own business where they could share their love of music and community. Megan is a registered nurse and Matt, a lifelong musician, worked in education. The couple scrimped and saved until they could buy the red one-story brick building, which dates back to 1939 and once housed Carrier's hardware store, a filling station, and tavern.

It most recently was home to County Cycles, owned by Ron Kadera. The Siebergs, who purchased the property from Kadera, said they were drawn to the building's history and deep community roots. Historic photos and blueprints of the building are displayed in the coffeeshop.

"We want to honor the Carrier family for supplying the materials that built this community and County Cycles for its dedication to service and the outdoors," Matt said.

Room for music and dance

Show Time Studio first opened in 2022. Matt has a master's degree in classical piano performance and plays a multitude of instruments, including saxophone and guitar.



"It's always been the goal to make music with people. This is a fun way to build a band around me at all times," he joked.

In addition to hosting jam sessions and concerts, four musicians including Matt teach music lessons in the space. Several dance groups have also discovered the studio.

"We have senior social dancing all the way to break dancing," Matt said. "Other styles that we have hosted include tango, ballroom, blues, and swing dancing. We are excited to share the space and get their ideas of what could happen here."



Coffeehouse opens in 2024

Megan opened the coffeehouse in July 2024. The space is carefully curated with upcycled furniture and décor. The coffee counter and stage are inset with ornate components from old pianos. Tables and chairs were sourced from Facebook Marketplace. Matt soldered together old saxophones including the one Megan played in high school to create a one-of-a kind chandelier hanging in the entry.

"We were just trying to be resourceful with what we have. We know the space will evolve," Megan said.

Customers can order an assortment of tea and coffee drinks, as well as cocoa. Coffee beans come from Tiny Footprint Coffee, which is organic and fair trade. Teas are from TeaSource based in Roseville.



Showtime Coffee uses exclusively plant-based milks including oat, soy, and almond options. Vegan pastries from Roseville's local bakery The Grateful Table are also available.

Roseville helps out

The Siebergs say the City of Roseville has supported their business startup and growth. A grant helped pay for exterior pavement and water drainage improvements on the property. A generous grant from the Roseville Area Community Foundation will cover the costs of an exterior mural to be painted this summer.

"One of our breakdancers is actually a mural artist," Matt said.

Showtime is located across the street from the city hall campus and city employees and visitors often stop in on their breaks.

"A shout out to the firefighters. They come over in groups," Matt said. "It's been amazing support from incredible people."
